## Social Security 10 Years Old

Thirteen is indeed a lucky number for over six million Americans who are receiving cash payments under the several provisions of the Social Security Act. For it was just 13 years ago, on August 10, 1935, that the Social Security Act became law.

This law, which was designed to provide a measure of financial security to the people of the nation, was considered by President Roosevelt as one of the outstanding achievements of his administration. Improvements and extensions were made by amendments in 1939 and again in 1946. Further improvements have been considered by each succeeding Congress.

This law consists of four main parts:

1. A Federal system of retirement and survivors insurance for workers and their families—based on employer-employee contributions.

2. A Federal State plan for payment to the needy aged, needy blind, and dependent children.

3. A Federal State plan providing for the payment of unemployment benefits to unemployed workers who lose their jobs through no fault of their own.

4. Federal aid to the States for maternal and child health, public health, and vocational rehabilitation.

## Security Loan Drive Success

Total sales of U. S. Savings Bonds in Coleman County during the Security Loan Campaign were \$220,541.50 according to Mr. Robert J. Bowen, U. S. Savings Bonds Chairman. He received sales figures this week from state savings bonds headquarters in Dallas.

The county's quota was \$229,000.00. The Security Loan Campaign was launched on April 15 and continued through June 26, with sales through July 15 being credited to county quotas. Of the county's total sales, Series E Bonds accounted for \$98,112.59.

Series A sales for the state as a whole were Series E, \$41,491,000; Series F and G, \$24,462,000; total all series, \$65,953,000. Total sales for the nation were \$2,792,133,000.

**Andrew, The Man Who Brought Others**  
Lesson for August 15, 1948

MEET Andrew, brother of Simon Peter, fisherman of Galilee. Follow his career and you will account him one of the truly great men of the ages, chiefly because he was ever alert to help men on to God. He was always introducing his friends to Jesus.

There are many passages of scripture cited for this study, with the devotional reading in Luke and the Golden Text from John 1:40. "He brought him to Jesus."

**WHAT ANDREW TOLD HIS FRIENDS**

WHEN Andrew met Jesus, and discovered in him the Saviour of men, he went and found his brother, Simon, and said unto him, "We have found the Messiah, which is, being interpreted, the Christ," John 1:41.

What do we tell our friends? Do we not delight to tell our friends what we have found to be good? This was the mission of Andrew—telling his friends about Jesus, for he had found in Jesus that which was good. John the Baptist had told Andrew about Jesus, and he was determined that he would tell everyone who would listen this good news.

**HOW ANDREW KNEW ABOUT JESUS**

ANDREW got his impressions of Jesus firsthand. When he heard John the Baptist say, "Behold the Lamb of God that taketh away the sin of the world," he went on to inquire about Jesus, and Jesus bade him and John spend the day with Him. They did, from 10 o'clock in the morning until late afternoon. That was enough. Andrew knew from that day about Jesus. He was now ready to tell others what he knew about Jesus.

Do we know Jesus well enough to tell others about Him? If a fisherman could tell the story effectively, cannot everyone? But let us remember this, no man can introduce his friend to Jesus until he himself knows Jesus.

**THE MAN WHO BROUGHT OTHERS**

LET'S look for a moment at some of the people Andrew brought to Jesus. We begin, of course, with Simon, his brother. Here, I think, is the highest test of his ability to tell others about Jesus—bringing his own brother. It is often easier to tell strangers about Jesus than those of our own family.

And now we see Andrew yonder in the multitude, finding the lad with the loaves and fishes, and bringing him to Jesus. That is the test of seeing the right person at the right time. And again this is the acid test of introducing people to Jesus.

Again, we see Andrew sensing the fact that some young Greeks had come a long way to see Jesus. He knew how to help them. In this incident we see the final example of winning people to Jesus—cultured Greeks, who were familiar, we may assume, with the current thought of the world. But this simple fisherman of Galilee knew how to approach them, how to gain their attention, how to bring them to Jesus.

**THEY WAIT FOR THE ANDREWS TODAY**

THE world waits for some Andrew today. I fully believe that most people could be won to Christ if only there were enough Andrews. Rarely have I had a person to repel me when I faithfully followed the leading of the Holy Spirit to speak to such person about Jesus.

Andrew did not rely upon his own resources. He went in the might of the Lord. He knew what Jesus had done for him. He yearned to see all men enjoy their blessing. He was a simple messenger—a voice.

And God gave him words—words that fell like good seed into fertile soil. So may we today introduce our friends to Jesus. Only let us remember this—we must first know him!

# Veterans News

Veterans Administration advised veterans to give their National Service Life Insurance policies periodic "three-way checks" to make certain that their NSLI programs are consistent with their plans, obligations and incomes.

The "three-way check" should cover (1) beneficiaries, both principal and contingent; (2) manner in which proceeds are to be paid to beneficiaries, and (3) amount and type NSLI in force.

Many veterans fail to name new beneficiaries when they

marry or when a designated beneficiary dies, VA said.

If a veteran dies without naming a beneficiary, or if no designated beneficiary is alive at the time of his death, proceeds of the insurance go into his estate and are subject to inheritance taxes. Final distribution of the proceeds may not be that which the veteran would have desired.

Changes in family status or family income often require a veteran to change the method of NSLI settlement. He may elect to have his NSLI proceeds paid to his beneficiary in a lump sum or in equal monthly installments ranging from 36 to life time income.

The type and amount of NSLI owned by a veteran should be that which best fits his "pocket-book" and gives him the most coverage, VA said. NSLI policies include term, ordinary life, 30-payment life, 20-payment life, endowment at age 60, endowment at age 65 and 20 year endowment.

## State Health Department Letter

Austin, Texas. Sixty Texans died as the result of appendicitis during the first five months of 1948, according to figures released by the Texas State Department of Health.

"This figure does not appear large when compared to the deaths from cancer, tuberculosis and heart disease," Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer said,

stomach will wear off." He cautioned that the stomach ache which lasts more than three or four hours should be considered a serious matter.

Appendicitis killed 60,000 people in the United States and Canada last year, Dr. Cox said. He warned that young adults are especially susceptible to it, and that appendicitis is a leading cause of death among children and adolescents.

Operative techniques have been improved to the extent that an unruptured appendix can be removed with great safety, Dr. Cox said. It is therefore important that the negligence in appendicitis rests with the patient who fails to seek prompt medical attention.

He said it was far better that the patient be quiet until the doctor comes as moving about aggravates the inflamed parts. The patient should avoid taking anything to eat or drink until the doctor has seen him.

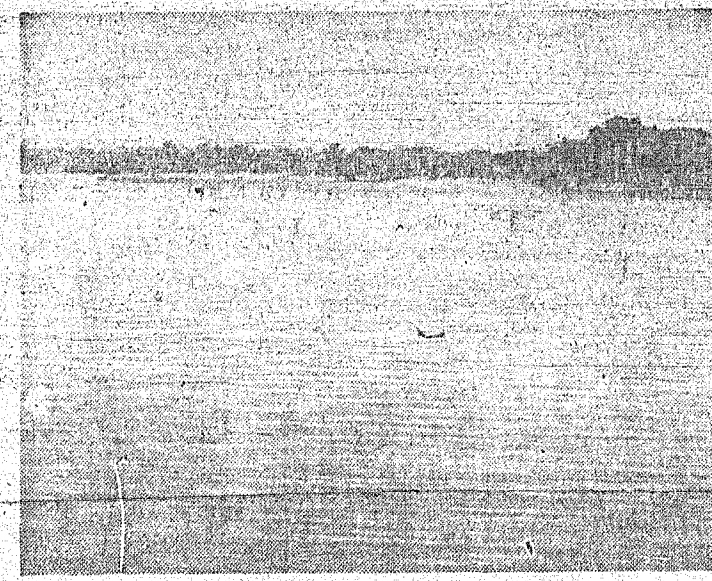
