Looking 'round

GOVERNOR BEAUFORD H. JESTER

Although this newspaper does not usually take sides in any political election we feel that it is of interest to every citizen in Santa Anna and in the State of Texas to review some of the accomplishments of our present governor, Beauford H. Jester.

High on the calendar was Jester's victory against imposing additional taxes on the people of Texas. He created a State Administrative Cabinet to improve public service, and played a good part in the settlement of several labor disputes over the state. He is making an all-out campaign to protect the schools tidelands oil reserves. He has set up a command post of instant relief in such cases as the Texas City disaster and others.

There were sixty-eight bills passed in the last Legislature relating to education alone, and public health has also been high on the card of accomplishments of the governor. Agriculture and the cattle industry received quite a lot of industry from Mr. Jester.

Public safety on our highways ranked high with a uniform traffic law for Texas and highway patrolmen being almost doubled. Good neighbor relations have made substantial progress.

All of the above may not be of a great amount of interest to most of the citizens of Santa Anna, but one thing that the governor is advocating is of vital importance to very citizen of this area and all of West Texas, and that is a West Texas Water Conference early in 1948 and work is now underway on a program for the future economic and industrial development of Texas.

Our water situation right here in Santa Anna is in a very critical condition. There has been a delegation from here who has gone to see the governor on different occasions concerning our water supply. Governor Jester has said he would help Santa Anna obtain a permanent water supply when and if we, as the citizens of Santa Anna go to where we needed his help. If plans work out as they should with in the next few months, Santa Anna will need the help of Governor Beauford H. Jester. Therefore the Santa Anna News ask that you give him your consideration when you go to the polls on July 24.

"Caking" Pays Dividends As Grass Matures

Gives Protein Needed For Profitable Gains By Beef Cattle

Protein pays large dividends in added gains on beef cattle when fed to supplement mature pasture grasses during late summer and early fall months. Experiment Station results and practical experience prove, according to A. L. Ward, Educational Director, National Cottonseed Products Association.

Cottonseed cake costing \$5 per hundred pounds returned \$18 worth of beef when fed to steers valued at \$24 per hundred pounds in trials at the Kansas Experiment Station, he points out.

Cattle on pasture that received 1 1/2 pounds of cottonseed cake daily per head, for 88 days gained 182 pounds per head during the period in the Kansas test.

Cattle that did not receive the protein supplement gained only 56 pounds. Each pound of cake fed results in a gain of approximately 3/4 of a pound.

During July and August, most farm pastures and ranges begin to cure out or become "burned." Protein is the first nutrient to become deficient, the protein content of grasses frequently dropping 50 per cent or more as they mature.

A protein concentrate, such as cottonseed meal, pellets or cubes, is the only supplement for grass needed by cattle under most conditions during the summer and fall. In the Kansas test, the addition of ground, shelled corn to the daily ration was not profitable during the feeding period, August 1 to November 1.

When grazing is short, some dry roughage should be fed; but grains are needed only when fattening cattle to a high finish for slaughter, or when grazing is so short that it will not furnish enough energy feed, Ward said. Protein concentrates are profitably fed in amounts exceeding these needed to balance the protein contents of dry forage when they are relatively cheaper than grain, as under present conditions.

Vitamin A supplements, such as alfalfa or bright grass hays, are necessary when feedlot cattle have not had access to green forage for two to three months. In order to satisfy requirements for Vitamin A in reproduction and growth, dairy cattle, breeding beef cows, herd bulls and calves should have access to green pasture, bright grass hay or a legume hay and should not be held off those Vitamin A feeds for periods longer than a few weeks.

Feeder calves and yearlings will carry more weight and bloom and will be in better condition to gain rapidly in the feedlot if they receive 1 1/2 to 2 pounds of cake per head daily on the grass as it begins to become dry and mature. Calves and steers which are to be marketed from the grass as slaughter cattle need 3 to 7 pounds of cake, per head daily, depending on the quality and amount of forage and the desired rate of gain. Brood cows will carry more flesh into the fall and winter seasons and will be in condition to produce larger, healthier calves and a better milk flow if they receive 1 to 2 pounds of cake as the grass becomes dry. These amounts are for cattle on pasture where normal season maturity occurs. During severe droughts and critical shortage of pasture forage, more protein is necessary.

W. R. Chambers Reviews Record and Gives Views

W. R. Bill Chambers of May candidate for State Representative issued the following statement about his record and candidacies.

In writing Mr. Chambers for the 125th Legislature, District 2, to again vote for me for Representative I request to the voters to give my position on some of the most important public questions and to a short account of my stewardship during the time I served as your representative.

When I first entered the Legislature, the big question was financial aid for assistance. After much discussion, House Bill 2 was finally passed. Tax experts were almost unanimous in their opinion that the bill would not meet the State's needs, to say nothing of the old age assistance. The General Revenue fund was in the red more than \$3,000,000. Also as I recall, the Bond Bonds were unpaid. All in all, the financial outlook was not good.

House Bill 2 did the unexpected. It not only paid the state's running expense, but paid all debts as well.

All state employees have enjoyed a substantial increase in salaries. All school teachers' salaries have been increased also. More than 2,000,000 of our elderly citizens are not receiving assistance. Yet a surplus above outstanding warrants is now more than \$50,000,000. The passing of the House Bill 2 was good legislation.

Occasionally we see a report where the money in the state's

treasury is more than \$140,000,000. To many, this is confusing. The state tax money is kept in many accounts. For instance, the doctors have an account, as do lawyers, etc. This money is used by the different professions for their special use and should be for each fund is supported by tax on the "various" groups. The money in the general revenue fund is the money that runs the state's business.

When House Bill 2 was passed, a fair division of the money to be raised by the bill was made by the Legislature. A certain percent went into the general revenue and fund and the remainder in the old age assistance fund.

Now many of our people cannot understand why the money accumulating more does not go into the old age assistance fund. The reason is this: \$35,000,000 was filled as the limit by a constitutional amendment voted by the people. \$35,000,000 is the limit for old age assistance, for the blind and dependent children. So, this accounts for a surplus that the needy feels is justly theirs. The members of the legislature have been criticized for this situation, but are in no way to blame. This burden rests on the shoulders of the voters, therefore, if the people want the ceiling removed it is their question that should and must be submitted to them for settlement.

Three items constitute the greater part of the tax burden: Public education, public high-

ways, and social security. Public money spent wisely for these purposes is not wasted.

A report from our war recruitment board gave the startling information that 43 per cent of the rural boys were physically deficient from lack of medical care. Senator Moffett introduced in the Senate the Rural Hospital Bill. I introduced the same bill in the House. This measure we hoped would induce physicians to come again to the rural communities of Texas, when the people cooperatively built these rural hospitals. Our expectations have been reasonably met. Fourteen of these hospitals are in full operation with 30 more under construction.

Another measure which was very vital to our country, especially farmers, was the bill to regulate the manufacture and sale of insect poisons. The farmers in one West Texas county lost thousands of dollars from the ravages of leaf worms. They bought about three carloads of poison which when analyzed proved to be no poison at all. Since the passage of the insecticide bill, this has not happened again.

The tax problem is always a very difficult one. A tax may be levied upon the article or commodity and the time of the levies it may be a very just tax. However, when conditions change the tax may be too high or it may not be bearing its share of the tax burden. This was found to be the situation of the tax on natural gas. Inventions, together with improved methods, gave natural gas very much more value.

Originally the value of gas was measured at the well's mouth, but when the modern cracking plants were erected and the gas was run through them, many valuable products were recovered from this gas. So it became necessary, in fairness to all tax payers, that a new formula of taxation be drawn up covering natural gas. This change has resulted in thousands of additional dollars in our treasury. I introduced this Bill, and after explaining it to the Legislature, I had the extreme satisfaction of passing it on the uncontested calendar. This is a courtesy rarely granted to any member upon a general bill, especially a tax measure.

Looking to the future, I find strengthen conservation laws so that all natural resources, especially natural gas may be conserved and developed for the upbuilding of Texas. Seventy-five per cent of government cost is in your local government. The

total indebtedness of local government in Texas is now nearing the billion dollar mark. This money must be raised almost exclusively on real property. Every cent of ad valorem tax should be left in local government. The state has an almost unlimited field from which tax can be gathered. This is not true of county and local government. Property is about all a county or precinct has to tax. So I would favor remitting this tax to the maintenance of local government.

The present rural road law is inadequate to build farm-to-market roads, in that it throws the major cost of the road upon the counties.

Eighteen per cent of our deaths are now caused by cancer. This is indeed a calamity. Let's do all we can to check this awful disease by establishing a cancer research hospital. Many people believe the ceiling

on the amount to be paid for social security should be raised or entirely lifted. I would vote to let the people express their wishes on the subject.

As to my record on public education I think it is safe to say that every school superintendent and every class room teacher in this district indorsed my record. The foregoing is only a short report of some of the measures I sponsored as your representative. My record of work on conservation, rural health, taxation and public education, I believe, meets the approval of a great majority of the people of this district.

Let us control foot and mouth


disease while we can. Boll weevil, the fruit fly, and pink bollworm should be lessened enough of what carelessness has done. We permitted these things to come upon us when by diligence and industry, we could have controlled or eradicated them.

Upon my record and experience I submit, with confidence, my candidacy to the voters of the 125th District.

REA Praised By Congressman Fisher

The rural electrification program is doing more to raise the standard of living of the American farmer than any other government program, Representative O. C. Fisher declared in an address to more than 2,000 members of the Medina REA cooperative in their annual meeting at Hondo last Saturday.

The Medina cooperative serves Uvalde and other counties in Fisher's congressional district.

Turning to the REA progress being made in the 21st district, the speaker quoted from a report of REA Administrator Claude Wickard saying that since 1942 REA Consumer connections in this district have increased by 90 percent.

"And it does not cost the tax-

payers a cent. The money that is loaned to individual REA cooperatives is paid back with interest."

Expressing satisfaction with the funds provided for REA expansion by the Congress for the next year, Fisher said: "I look for the best REA year in our history."

Fire Loses Listed By Marvin Hall

AUSTIN, July — Fires caused from defective electric refrigerators marked the only big increase in Texas insured fire losses for the month of May as dollar damage fell below one million for the second time this year.

In the actual number of fires, May contained the lowest amount for 1948. Fires numbered 140 and causes over an \$800,000 loss.

Matches and cigarettes were the worst offenders. They start-

ed 77 fires and caused 30 thousand dollars damage. Smokers in bed traded 11 cigarettes for \$650. Nine children played with matches and burned up \$700.

Overheating motors in electric refrigerators, that are already under dog-day strain in Texas, were the main cause of fire originating in the boxes. Over \$77 thousand damage was done in 51 refrigerator fires.

"These figures prove that summer weather is really here because until this month the highest number of refrigerator fires was 11 and the greatest dollar damage was 16 thousand," stated Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner. "Refrigerator blazes multiplied five times and were the second most frequent cause of fire in May."

The third greatest cause of fire was electricity which started 51 flames, followed by trash and rubbish originating 20 fires. Fifth was fires from lightning, which also showed an increase for the year.

Homes again suffered the greatest number of occupancy fires, 138 houses caught fire causing \$200 thousand damage. Also, 39 of those hard-to-get apartments burned at a cost of \$44,000.

Private garages and mercantile stores both had 28 fires in May, and fourth, 20 cafes burned, followed by 12 outbuilding fires.

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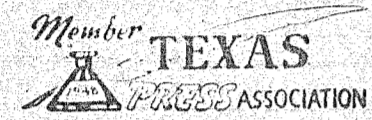

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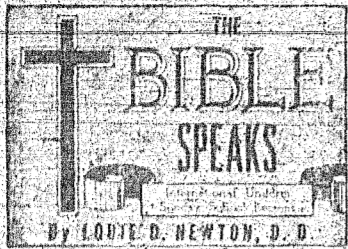
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Naomi, Woman Of Faith

State Dept. Of Health Letter

According to the biweekly report for the week ending July 3, 1943, 463 cases of diphtheria were reported throughout the State for this year.

The biweekly report is published weekly by the Texas State Department of Health. It shows the prevalence of communicable disease by counties.

In the light of our present knowledge regarding the control of diphtheria, it is unfortunate that the disease is allowed to flourish. Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, said:

For the week June 28 to July 3, 1943, 463 cases of diphtheria were reported from four counties: Hopkins, Tarrant and Val Verde. Counties reported one each. For the year 1943, seventy-seven deaths from diphtheria were reported.

A life-time immunity may be established in 90 per cent of the children receiving the diphtheria vaccine. The health officer said that parents of children over six months of age would have their children vaccinated.

The administration of toxoid vaccine will be for no discomfort to the child. Dr. Cox added, and a positive immunity can be determined by a Schick test conducted four or six months after the final dose of the toxoid has been given the child.






