An Editorial—

It has been called to the attention of your editor that some pranks, most likely young boys, have been going around over town at night pulling up some of the new street markers that have recently been installed in our city.

These street markers were bought and paid for by the property owners on the property where they are placed. These property owners are all working together in an effort to beautify our little city. Of course, these street markers have been put up through the co-operation of the property owner, the city officials and the Chamber of Commerce.

Now it appears that some detrimental persons are attempting to destroy the attempts of the city to beautify our town.

We do not have any form of an officer who stays in our city. It is not generally considered that we need one. We have got along fine without one for the past several months, but it is things of this sort that will cause us to have one, if they continue.

City Ordinance No. 19, Chapter 2, Article 4 states that it shall be unlawful for any person to deface, mark, scratch, cut or otherwise deface any city property. It also calls for a penalty of not less than a \$5.00 fine and not more than a \$100.00 fine to a person convicted of such a crime.

These street markers come under this category. They are on city property and the upkeep on them is for the city to see about.

Monday night of this week 5 street markers in the South part of town were pulled out of the ground. One of them was dismantled and parts of it were placed in different parts of town. The persons doing this can be convicted under the above mentioned City Ordinance, and if it happens again, a consecrated effort will be put forth to find out who these unwanted persons are and convict them of their crime.

Map Of House Numbers Ready; In C of C Office

However, these are not for sale, they are just to give you an idea as to what house numbers will look like. Some of the stores in Santa Anna already have the numbers on sale and others are expected to have them, soon.

If you live on one of the streets that does not have a street marker, and you are interested in getting one put on your street, you might contact Mr. Barnes at the Chamber of Commerce.

If enough are still interested in the street markers, he can get the order off and they can be here and put up by next summer.

Last Rites For Leon Bartlett Held Thursday

Re-burial services were held at the First Baptist Church at 3 p. m. on Thursday, October 14, for James Leon Bartlett, who was killed in action on December 10, 1941 at Nichols Field, near Manila, in the Philippine Islands.

Rev. S. R. Smith of Brownwood and Rev. T. M. Gillham, former pastor and pastor of the First Baptist Church, respectively, officiated.

A full military funeral was conducted by the American Legion at the cemetery.

Leon was born on November 10, 1913, in Santa Anna, and had spent most of his life here. At ten years of age he was converted and joined the Baptist Church and continued to be a very active member.

He was a graduate of Santa Anna High School, of the class of 1930, and attended Hardin-Simmons University for three years, where he was a member of the famous Cowboy Band, and made several trips with them to Madison Square Garden and other eastern points.

He was employed as bookkeeper of the Burton-Lingo Company in Odessa, where he volunteered for the Air Force in May, 1941.

After training for a few months at March Field in California, he sailed for overseas duty in October.

He is survived by the parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. Ed Bartlett of Santa Anna; one brother, Clyde of Merkel and one sister, Mrs. R. E. Allbright of Baton Rouge, La. 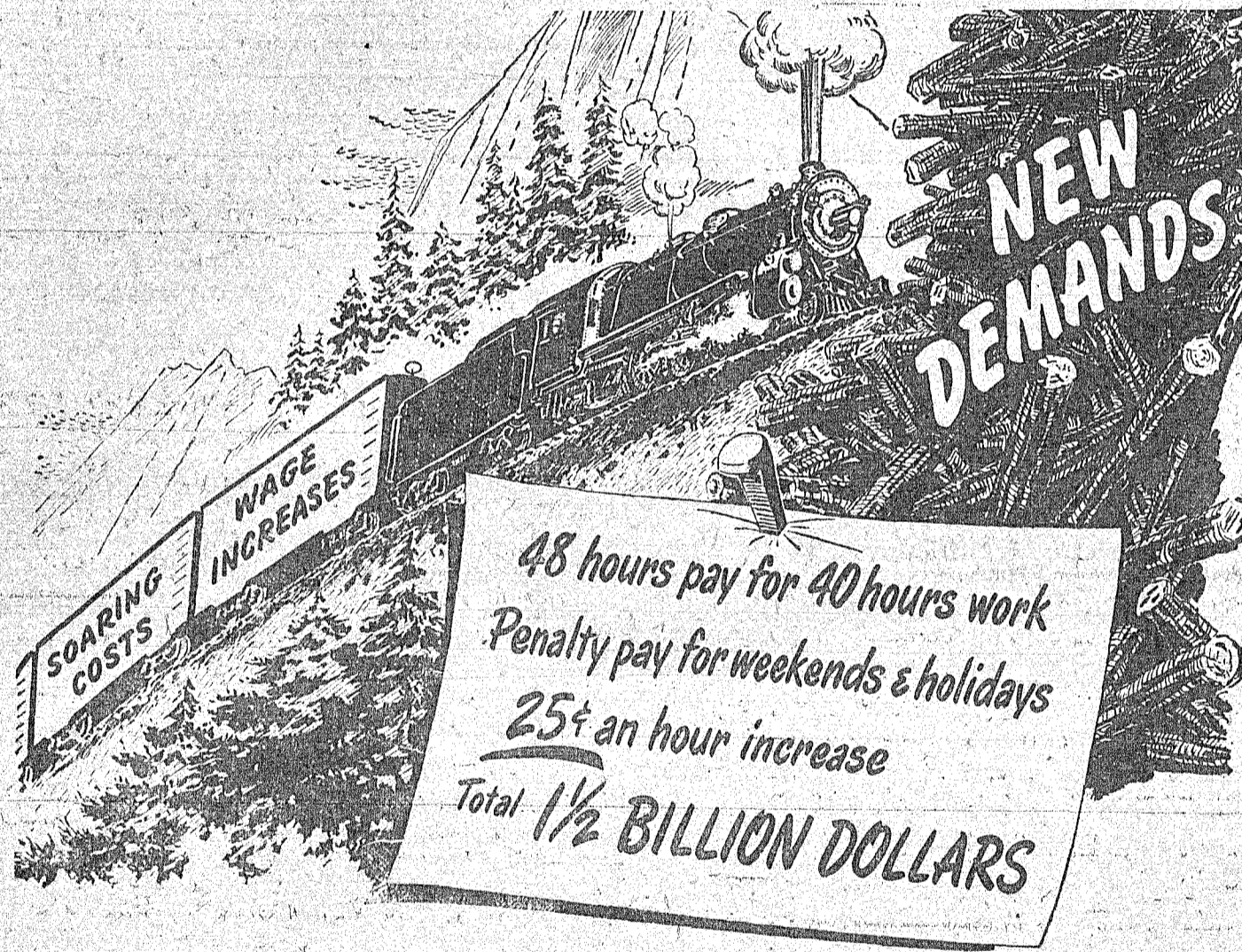

1 1/2 Billion Dollar Road Block!

RAILROADS MUST OPERATE around the clock every day and night of the year.

Although they know this, leaders of 16 railroad unions are demanding a five-day, Monday through Friday, week for one million railroad employees.

They want 48 hours pay for 40 hours work—in itself a 20% wage increase.

They also demand a minimum of 12 hours pay for any work performed on Saturdays, and 16 hours pay for any work performed on Sundays and holidays.

On top of all this they want an additional increase of 25c an hour for every employe!

You'd Pay the Bill!

Summing up these demands, they mean that these union leaders seek to force the railroads to give one million employes an annual raise which would average \$1500 per employe!

The total cost of this would be no less than 1 1/2 billion dollars per year, which is more than twice the expected net income of the railroads this year.

You'd pay the bill, because if these increased costs are forced on the railroads,

they must have still further rate and fare increases.

Demands Unreasonable

These employes have had substantial raises during and since the war. Their average weekly earnings are higher than the average weekly earnings of workers in manufacturing industries. They have more job security than the average worker in American industry. They also enjoy paid vacations, a retirement system and other advantages more generous than the average worker receives.

In contrast with the demands of these 16 unions, which add up to the equivalent of 48c an hour, the Conductors and Trainmen recently settled their wage request for an increase of 10c an hour.

Railroads Run for Everybody—Not Employes Alone

The railroad industry must serve not one but many groups—producers, businessmen, shippers, passengers and the general public—night and day, every day of the year. These unions are proceeding in utter disregard of this important difference between railroads and other industries. Industrial plants can be shut down over weekends and holidays, but freight, mail, express and passengers must continue to move. *Everybody who enters railroad employment knows this.*

Strike Threat

On September 18, 1948, the leaders of these 16 unions began taking a strike vote. *But the threat of a strike will not alter the opposition of the railroads to such unreasonable demands!*

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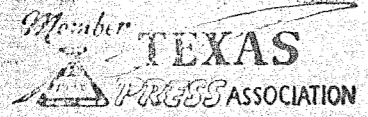

His Hand in History

Lesson for October 24, 1948

SUPPOSE you were given a long flexible wire and were asked to arrange it on a pattern which would represent history, what would you do to it? Some people would cut that wire into little bits and let them fall in a pile like jackstraws. History, they would say, is a meaningless collection of disconnected events—it has no real pattern.

Someone else would arrange the wire like a long arrow pointing upward; others would make it into an arrow pointing downward; these would be the pure optimists and pessimists among historians.

Others would arrange it in a series of up-and-down curves—history, they would say, sometimes goes up and sometimes down, but it never gets anywhere. Others again would make an immense circle; history goes around and around in cycles, repeating itself.

Others still might take that wire and shape it into a kind of spiral, almost repeating itself but never quite, often seeming to go backward but actually making some progress.

God's Chosen People

A GOOD deal of the Old Testament is taken up with history. Starting with Genesis and going through Esther, most of what you read is history. But it is not mere chronicles, that is to say it is not a mere listing of events.

The historical parts of the Bible were written by men who had a theory of history. They would agree that the Golden Age is ahead of us, not behind.

They would all agree that the most important figure in human history is not a human being at all, but God the Creator. They would all agree that his hand can be seen—if you look for it—in the events of man's existence here. And they all affirm that among all the nations of the earth there was one which could be called truly God's chosen people, the little nation called Israel, the people we know as the Jews.

The whole of Hebrew history is a sort of sermon on this text: Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people. The history of any nation, ancient or modern, would illustrate that text just as well; only the Israelite historians saw it most clearly. They showed how, when their people followed God's leading and his laws, they prospered; when they went their own stupid, selfish ways they suffered.

Somehow Good

ONE great lesson the Old Testament history teaches is that God's will is good, and that when man defies and disobeys that will, he does it to his own destruction, but that God can bring good out of evil.

People often act from bad motives; yet even the worst of motives God can overrule. David waded in blood to his throne, and he treated cruelly many of his enemies. That was not good; yet God brought out of that a national independence and strength.

David put Solomon on the throne because he was the son of his favorite wife; that was pure favoritism. Yet God brought good out of a choice which was selfish.

When the Israelites were tempted to fall for the cheap and nasty gods whose shrines filled the land, that was bad; but it gave the prophets their great opportunity to make perfectly clear the difference between false and true religion.

The Voice of God

HISTORY is no bucket of ashes. If you have ears to listen, it is the voice of God. These ancient tales of a nation long since dead, that lived in all scarce 500 years, carry God's voice to us today.

The diseases which are fatal to a nation's life are here described; the foundations on which alone true national well-

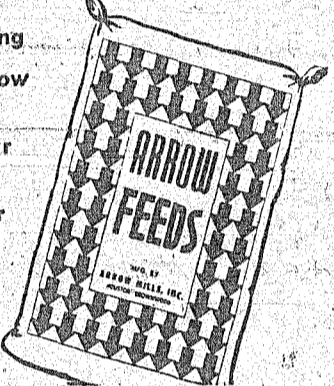

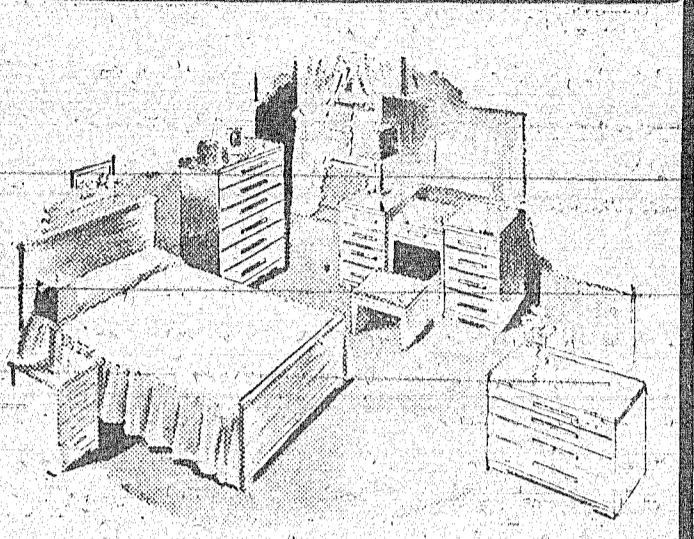
