## Let's Get— And Keep The Record Straight

Some false and misleading statements are being circulated regarding Lyndon Johnson, the Democratic nominee for United States senator, and a recent court action in Jim Wells County.

An advertisement on behalf of Jack Porter, the Republican senatorial nominee, which has appeared in numerous Texas newspapers in the last few days carries this statement:

"Johnson got a court injunction to stop a fair and impartial recount of the votes of Jim Wells County. Why?"

Lyndon Johnson did nothing of the kind.

No recount of the votes of Jim Wells County has ever been sought by anybody.

What happened was simply this: When returns from all the precincts in Jim Wells County had been received, the chairman and 15 of the 17 members of the county executive committee met, as required by law, canvassed the returns and certified the results to the State Democratic Executive Committee.

Subsequently, the newly elected chairman of the county executive committee, who had had nothing whatever to do with the holding of the primary, undertook to file an amended certificate of results which arbitrarily excluded all of the votes cast in one precinct in the county.

Attorneys for Lyndon Johnson had no difficulty whatever obtaining an injunction to prevent the filing of such amended certificate. Under the circumstances, the injunction doubtless would have been granted in any court of competent jurisdiction in the state where application for it might have been filed.

Lyndon Johnson has not opposed a recount of the votes in Jim Wells or any other county in the state. His political opponents have never asked for a recount anywhere. Instead, they have talked vaguely about some irregularity here or there, but they have offered no proof or substantial evidence of such irregularity. They have carefully avoided filing an election contest in which the truth or falsity of their charges of irregularities in the conduct of the primary could be established beyond all reasonable doubt.

Lyndon Johnson has offered repeatedly to meet his political foes at any courthouse in Texas they might select to present their evidence of election irregularity. But his challenge has been ignored. Instead, his opponents seek to confuse the public mind by circulating false and misleading statements.

Every other Saturday, at one farm or another, the pit is dug, and the fire started. And by sundown, neighbors from miles around have come together—the women

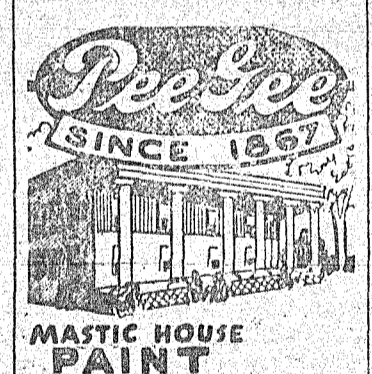
contributing cakes, pies, and coffee, the men contributing the meat for barbecuing, and the beer or ale.

True Wisdom

Lesson for October 31, 1948

WHAT is the most important thing in the world? What is worth more than anything else? Some would say Money; some Power; some Goodness; some Truth. Another answer is given by the writers of a group of books, two of which are included in our Bible. "Wisdom is the principal thing; therefore get wisdom," they say.



The books of Dr. Foreman Proverbs and Ecclesiastes in our Protestant Bible, and the books of Ecclesiastes and the Wisdom of Solomon in the Apocrypha, all have this viewpoint and are therefore called the Wisdom Literature.

Other writers in the Bible divide the human race into the Good and the Wicked, or the Believers and the Unbelievers; but these writers see mankind as the Wise and the Foolish. The books they wrote (especially Proverbs) were intended particularly for those who are so far neither foolish nor wise—that is to say, the young.

Knowledge Is Not Wisdom

WISDOM (as these writers use the word) is not the same thing as knowledge. A person may know a great many things and still be a fool. Or he may not even know how to read and write, and yet be wise. Some modern writers have said: Knowledge is knowing what to do; skill is knowing how to do it; and virtue is doing it. Wisdom is all of these put together.

But the special feature of the "Wisdom Writers" is this: True wisdom begins with the fear of God. "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom . . . the knowledge of God is understanding." In other words, wisdom without religion, without faith, is foolish after all.

We can see how in our times the story of the Nazis has shown this once more to be true. The German Reich of 1935-1939 had the best of the science of the world; they had scholarship and wealth and "know-how" in many fields; but they rejected God and defied his church—and so a nation was destroyed.

We too may profit by their example. We of the western nations have wealth and technical skills beyond any other peoples, we have the atom bombs—but have we the wisdom without which all these things are but as torches in the hands of madmen?

University on Ant-Hill

KNOWLEDGE may be expensive. It costs a great deal of money to know what it takes to be an engineer or a surgeon. Wisdom, strange to say, is less expensive. It is in fact on such a low shelf that most people pass it by.

Consider where the "Wisdom Writers" tell us we may learn wisdom. One place is experience. "Experience keeps an expensive school, but fools will learn in no other—and hardly from that," says a more modern proverb.

Many of the proverbs in our Bible are simply distilled drops of experience. "A soft answer turneth away wrath, but grievous words stir up anger," for example. Do you need an angel from the sky to tell you that?

Another source of wisdom is just Nature herself. "Go to the ant, thou sluggard (lazy fellow); consider her ways and be wise." A lazy man is a fool; but how shall he learn to be wise? Not by reading books—just by watching the ants.

Inspired Common Sense

A FORMER governor of Virginia used to say that during his term of office he received more practical help from reading Proverbs than from any of the books on political science in his library. For the science, or the art, of government is simply one specialized form of that most important art, getting along with people. And the Wisdom Literature shows us how it is done.

Some people think that inspiration is always mysterious, and that the Holy Spirit would not stoop to inspire what we could learn in any ordinary way. But the Christian church, when it declares Proverbs

### Consumers Benefit From Price Support

Consumers as well as farmers benefit from government price support programs, says Ozro Eubank, Chairman of the Coleman County Agricultural Conservation Committee.

Price support programs encourage storage of surpluses, says Mr. Eubank. When there is more wheat, corn or potatoes than can be handled by market facilities, a farmer can get a loan and put the surplus in storage. The loan program before the war helped to fill the granaries so that bread rationing was not necessary during the war. Now that the granaries have been emptied for war needs and to feed famine-stricken people in war devastated countries, the loan program is helping to fill them up again for use by consumers later on.

By the end of August this year, nearly 100 million bushels of wheat had been placed in storage under loan. For consumers, full grainers are the best assurance of enough to eat if lean years should come.

Price supports also help the consumer, the chairman points out, by encouraging an adequate production. When farmers are sure they will be protected against ruinous price drops, they follow their natural bent and do everything to produce abundantly, the chairman points out. "Price supports, coupled with conservation measures practiced by farmers made possible the 35 to 40 percent increase in food production we've had during and since the war."

On the subject of consumer prices, he says, "Certainly prices would not have been lower if less food had been produced. Food items about which there is the greatest complaint are commodities that are not supported. There are no price supports on beef and lambs."

"Farmers must protect their crops by storing them if they are to have the benefit of price supporting loans. The loan program is an incentive for farmers to produce and to protect what they produce."
