Mountaineers To End Football Season This Week At Moran; Win Over Bangs

The Santa Anna Mountaineers will journey almost 90 miles this week-end to finish the Mountaineers Football season with the Moran Bulldogs. The game will be played on the Moran Field and game time is set for 7:30 p. m. Regular prices of 60 cents and 30 cents will be charged for admission.

The Moran Bulldogs have had a very bad season this year. They have won only one of their conference games, and that was with the May Tigers last week. They won by a score of 13-6.

It is quite a ways to Moran, but a large number of Mountaineers fans are expected to follow the boys over there to see them play their last game of the season, and the last game for a number of the boys on the team.

Some of the local boys got bungled up in the game last week, but all are responding to treatment and are expected to be in top condition for the Moran game.

BEAT BANGS

The Mountaineers laced up their fifth District 11-B victory here last Thursday afternoon, when they won over a stubborn Bangs eleven by a score of 6-0. This win kept the local eleven in second place in district standing, with only one remaining game to be played.

Stanley Cobb, Mountaineer Right Tackle and one of the best in the district, recovered a Dragon fumble behind their goal line, in the third quarter, to give the Mountaineers the only score of the game.

The Mountaineers had just pushed to the Dragons one yard line and lost the ball on downs. Bangs was attempting to run the ball out of the hole when the fumble occurred.

Bangs drove to the Santa Anna five yard line in the second quarter, only to lose the ball on downs. Later in the fourth quarter the Mountaineers drove to the Bangs 15 yard line and lost the ball on a fumble.

Santa Anna led in first downs 12-4, and in rushing 180 yards to the Dragons' 126. The Mountaineers attempted five passes, completing one for five yards, while the Dragons attempted 14, completing four for 35 yards. Bangs kicked six times for 164 yards, the Mountaineers six times for 113 yards.

R. D. Hartman and Wayne Walters accounted for most of the yardage on the ground and both tackles, Cobb and Moredock, turned in mighty good games on the line. All the other boys played a good brand of ball also.

Santa Anna is standing in second place in the district. Records show that there has only been 19 points scored against Santa Anna, while they have scored 74 points in district play. This gives Santa Anna the honor of having the best line in the district, according to points scored against them.

Garland Morgan Moved Home

Garland Morgan was moved to his home Tuesday from the Sealy Hospital, where he has been for approximately 3½ months from severe burns received in early August when the bulldozer he was operating near Whon, became ignited when a gas pipe was broken.

His hands and arms are still bandaged. He is able to get about some with help, and treatments at the hospital will continue.

Rain Fall-

The News Office received a nice letter from Lyle Pearce this week requesting that we publish the amount of rainfall, if any, since last publication date.

For the past two years (or it may be 5 years or more) we didn't know we had any rainfall, but this week we did get about ½ inch Monday, which fell very nicely. The skies were clear all day Tuesday, but we still are hoping for more rain.

Lyle's letter stated further that the school where he is teaching is about the same as it was when he went there 17 years ago. There were about 1400 boys enrolled there then and about the same number now, and of the 52 teachers there at the present time only 19 of them have been there longer than he has. During his years there he has taught Plane Geometry more than seventy times and Solid Geometry over fifty times. Still he is a young man.

Plans Being Completed For Christmas Opening; Santa Claus To Be Hehe Soon

In a meeting, of the Chamber of Commerce and others interested in the Big Christmas Opening planned for Santa Anna, Monday afternoon, plans got underway for the largest affair of

this kind ever to be held in Santa Anna. Plans are for some kind of entertainment each Saturday, with more entertainment being added as time rolls along.

The main attraction will be the crowning of a Santa Anna Territory Christmas Queen. This event will take place on Friday, December 24. The time will be announced at a later date. The Queen will be selected by votes. The voting will be in the following manner: Most of the stores in Santa Anna will give free ballots for voting for the Christmas Queen with each 50 cent purchase in their store between Monday, November 22 and at a set time December 24. On this ballot, the purchaser will write the name of his or her choice for Santa Anna Christmas Queen, and drop it in a box that will be handy in each store. The names of all the stores who will handle the ballots are not available for publication this week, but will be published next week. However, most all the stores in Santa Anna will have the ballots. A tabulation of the votes will be kept at Mack's Plumbing Shop. The first tabulation will be after the close of business on December 3. On December 4, at the Grand Christmas Opening, the names of the contestants will be announced and the number of votes each has. The names of the top 20 will be carried on the bulletin board. Tabulation of the votes will be each week after the Opening, until the week before Christmas. From then on, until the voting is over, a daily tabulation will be kept. The only qualifications the Queen must have is to be 12 years of age or over. No member of the immediate family of any of the merchants or their employees are eligible for the contest. A nice gift will be presented the Queen at the coronation by the Chamber of Commerce, and the nine runner-ups.

The winning candidate will be crowned Santa Anna Christmas Queen at a program on December 24. The Queen's attendants will be runners-up in the contest and all girls in the coronation will select their own escorts. A parade will be held at 3:00 p. m. on the afternoon of December 4. Santa Claus will be leading the parade and the Santa Anna Band will also be in the parade. All the particulars are not worked out yet for the parade, but there will be some prizes here also. The parade will form at the City Hall and will march to First Street and then to main street, then through town and back to the depot, then to the street between the Tank and the Hotel, where the prizes will be awarded. Other information about the parade will be announced at a later date.

All the windows in town will be made ready for Christmas and will be unveiled on the morning of December 4. The Christmas lights will be up to be turned on, on the same day. The town will be in readiness for the Christmas season. Another attraction each Saturday will be turning loose a number of balloons with merchandise certificates attached to each balloon. Other particulars concerning the time and number to be turned loose will be announced later.

There will be plenty of free entertainment in Santa Anna all during the Christmas season, so plan now to come to Santa Anna to do your Christmas shopping and plan to do it early.

Truth Set to Music

Lesson for November 21, 1948

"THE opposite of poetry is not prose; it is science." There were poets in the world long before there were scientists, but that does not prove that poets are out of date. Many people in our modern world think we could not get along without science but could well burn all the books of poetry. If we did, it would be a dreadful mistake. Poet and scientist each has his truth to see and to speak. We need them both. Certainly if we tried to burn all the poems we should have to destroy some of the best-loved parts of the Bible.

Not All Poets Have Long Hair

SOME "practical" people sniff at poets for being peculiar. "Long-hairs" is a slang name for them as for other people who know something besides arithmetic. As a matter of fact, many poets are very practical people themselves; engineers, farmers and soldiers all have written poetry. The poets of the Bible are of many sorts. If you will look into an edition of the Bible in which the poetic sections are printed as poetry is printed in other books, you will be impressed by the very large proportion of poetry, especially in the Old Testament. The new Study Bible or the American Revised Version or Moffatt's translation will show this at a glance.

These Bible poems are of various kinds. Some are war-songs (Judges 5), some are proverbs (the book of Proverbs), drama (Job), love-songs (the Song of Songs), odes (Isaiah 40), prayers (Psalm 16), hymns for public worship (the Psalms).

The writers were never professional poets, so far as we know. Of the poems which are this week's lesson Scripture, two were written by housewives, one by a sheep-herder, one or more by a soldier-king, one by a preacher (Habakkuk), and only one (Lamentations) possibly by a professional poet. The original Hebrew book of Lamentations does not claim Jeremiah for its author; but if he was the writer, then it was written by the most practical man of his time.

World's Greatest Hymn Book

"LET me write a nation's songs, and I care not who writes their laws," said a famous man. The same thing can be said about religion. "Let me write a church's hymnbook, and I care not who writes their theologies."

The hymns our mothers loved, the hymns we heard before we heard any other kind of poetry, the hymns that we have learned by heart and that become a part of our minds—these mean far more to most people than all the printed creeds.

Now the Christian religion is a singing religion. Our very first hymnbook was the Book of Psalms, and all the hymnals since, down to the present day, grew out of this one book in the Bible. It is the greatest hymnbook in the world; not the longest nor the oldest, but the greatest in its influence for good upon mankind.

Poetry Was in Jesus Blood

OF OUR Lord Jesus himself, it truly can be said, poetry was in his veins. He came of a poetic family. His most famous ancestor, David, was a poet; another royal ancestor, Hezekiah, wrote poetry. The book he knew best, the Old Testament, was full of poetry. His own mother Mary, before he was born, sang a song of her own making, so beautiful that it is still sung in Christian churches and loved the world around.

When Jesus died on the cross, two of the last seven sentences that came from his lips were quotations from the Psalms. The poetry of his people was in his blood, for in his last agony the words that came from his breaking heart were words first spoken by the poets of the Bible long ago.

So it is always. "Truth
