Water Contract Has State O. K.; Construction On Water Line Started

Mayor F. Z. Payne, Nevin E. Trostle, manager of the Brown County Water Improvement, District No. 1, and J. C. Darroch, attorney for the water district, met with the Texas Board of Water Engineers in Austin last Friday, to confer with the engineers concerning the sale of water to Santa Anna. The board recognized the district's rights to regulate the rates and other matters pertaining to the sale.

The state board of engineers approved the proposal of the district and the City of Santa Anna to enter into a long-term contract under which Santa Anna will purchase raw water from Lake Brownwood and pipe it to Santa Anna.

Construction Starts

Frank Butcher, Construction Company of San Antonio has al-

ready started construction of the water line from Lake Brownwood to the Santa Anna filtering plant. The right-of-way is being cleared this week and digging of the ditch is expected to be started within a few days.

The first load of pipe is due to arrive here the latter part of this week and 6,000 feet are due to arrive each week until the project is completed. It is possible that the water line will be completed in about 8 weeks time.

S. A. Telephone Co. Has Over 100 Miles Rural Phone Lines

Geo. M. Johnson, manager of the Santa Anna Telephone Co., states that he now has about 170 rural telephones in the Santa Anna and Shield areas. He is taking applications for rural telephones under the REA loan program, and thus far has already accepted three applications.

Since the beginning of the REA Mr. Johnson has put up 108.1 miles of rural telephone poles and has strung 377.6 miles of wire.

Johnson requests that if you live in the Santa Anna or Shield areas and are interested in a telephone, that you contact him at the telephone office in Santa Anna as soon as possible.

Glenn Pope Injured In Mishap Monday

Glenn Pope suffered severe injuries Monday morning when his horse dragged him almost a mile across a field on his farm three miles east of Santa Anna.

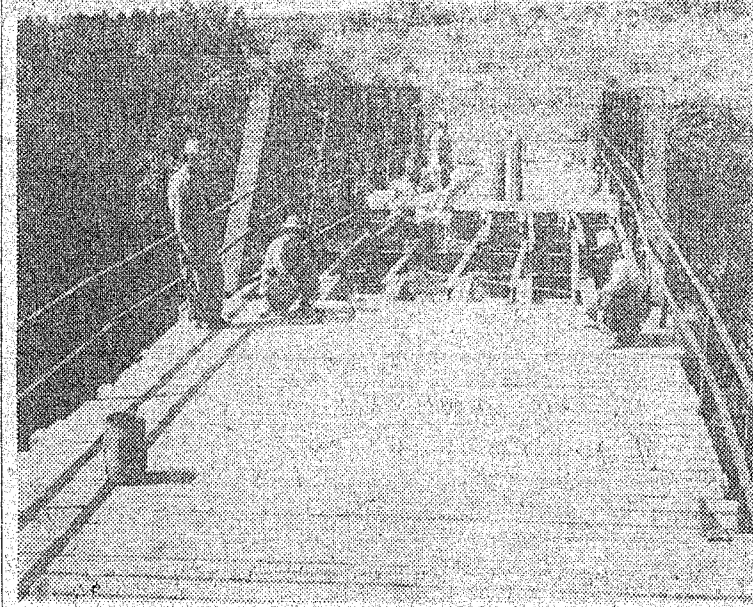
He was roping a calf, reports reveal, when his horse made too sharp a turn and fell. Pope fell also, and his arm caught in the loop which he had already fashioned for the calf.

As the horse pulled him, he took out his pocket knife and tried to cut the rope but lost his knife.

An unidentified man, driving along the Brownwood highway, which adjoins Pope's field, saw the runaway horse and stopped him.

Pope was taken to Sealy Hospital, where attendants report he is suffering from extensive abrasions on both arms, legs and stomach. His clothes were torn to ribbons.

New Bridge Crossing On Home Creek

WORKERS WERE EXPECTED to have a new floor in the Home Creek bridge crossing on the Arthur Casey place by the middle of this week. Repair of the bridge was started Tuesday, June 13. The estimated cost of the job is \$1,200. The bridge will be finished with Aluminum paint.

Earl Hardy, Commissioner of Precinct 2, and overseer of the work, said this was the first time the bridge had had a new floor in about 15 years. The old timber was so rotten it was unsafe to cross the bridge. He estimated this bridge floor should last approximately 10 to 12 years. Hardy also stated that he has had to re-floor 4 bridges on Mukewear Creek and one on Camp Creek and about 30 or 40 little bridges in the last 18 months. Flood damages washed out most of the small bridges in the spring of last year. Material and supplies to repair bridges in 1949 amounted to \$2,946.40 and labor amounted to \$9,130.76. Machinery and parts amounted to \$6,886.39. Other expenses for bridge repair in 1949 made the total \$33,330.74.

Fillmore Stearns Buried Tuesday

With a small rope about his neck, Millard Fillmore Stearns, 54, hanged to his death from the limb of a tree behind his Brown County trailer house near the Trickham community about 6:30 a. m. Monday.

Odell Stearns, bound for Coleman in response to a call for jury service drove by the trailer house about 7 o'clock that morning and saw his brother's body hanging from a tree.

A small piece of rope, tied to a strand of barbed wire over the limb, had strangled him to death. Justice of the Peace T. H. Hart said after investigation, "He clearly got up on an old rickety box on top of another box, then kicked the box over." An inquest verdict of suicide was expected later.

Only clue to the cause for the death was a scrawled note located in an old trunk inside the house. Addressed to Doris (Mrs. Roy Laughlin of Brownwood) it stated in part: "I have been suffering quite a bit . . . and I don't have anything to do with this Monday morning." The note was signed "Daddy."

Mr. Stearns lived alone in his small house about two miles southeast of Trickham. He had carefully placed all his personal belongings in the trunk where the note was found. His cigarettes, billfold and other articles were found there. Stearns was unemployed at the time of his death. He had lived in the southwestern part of the County for the past 46 years.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. in the Trickham Church. Burial was in the Trickham Cemetery.

Mr. Stearns is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Hazel Holland, Brady, and Mrs. Doris Laughlin, Brownwood; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Stearns, Trickham; two sisters, Mrs. Birdie Haynes, Trickham, and Mrs. Maury Haynes of Santa Anna; six brothers, Robert, G. K., Harley, Gordon and Odell Stearns of the Trickham area and two grandchild-

Four More Wells Expected in Soon

Four oil wells located in the townsite area of Santa Anna are expected to be completed by the end of this week on the first of next week. It seems that all wells have a fair chance of being producers.

The Lightfoot, Quinland, Rich No. 1, W. E. Vanderford was preparing to drill in Wednesday morning, and expected to reach the well in sometime Thursday. The well topped the Brenecke at 1315 feet Friday night and took a 17-foot core Saturday morning. Pipe was run and cement set Saturday.

The Lightfoot Quinland Shield No. 1 Brannan-Ball well flowed 32 barrels through a 1/2 inch

choke, indicating a potential of 763 barrels per day.

The Glass, Norton No. 3 Copeland, north offset to the No. 1, proved the rig of Tues. evening and was looking for a casing tool rig to be moved in Wednesday to complete the well.

The Driver No. 2, Copeland was drilling at 1600 feet Tuesday evening, and expected to reach the Brenecke Thursday.

The CDFG Oil Co. No. 1, W. B. Griffin expected to reach the Brenecke Wednesday night. Pipe was to be run Thursday.

Mrs. Collier became a member of the Methodist Church, in early girlhood, and continued faithful and active in the services of the church, as long as physically able.

Mr. and Mrs. Collier and family moved to Santa Anna in 1909, and this has continued to be the family home.

Mr. Collier died on February 4, 1936.

Mrs. Collier was a very industrious woman, much like the Solomon in Proverbs.

Until just a few years ago, she delighted to work in her home, her garden and yard.

She is survived by 6 daughters and five sons.

School Auditors Check Local School Records

Stamps of approval were put on the manner in which the Santa Anna public schools were operated in the year just past by the State Auditors, who were here two days last week. The auditors checked the operation of the school and the lunch room and were well pleased with the operation of both.

When the new school laws were put into effect, all schools in Texas were put under the state auditing system, and each year an auditor will visit the schools and check their records.

The average daily attendance of students enrolled in a school directly determines the number of teachers the school will have the following year. The auditors checked the average daily attendance of the students for the 1948-49 year and found our schools had the correct number of teachers for the past year. They also checked the teachers' credentials, college transcripts, numbers of years teaching experience and other factors to see if all our teachers met the standard of qualifications.

The second day was spent in checking the operations of the lunch room and splendid reports were turned in for both the operation of the school and lunch room.

Mr. R. K. Green requests that the average daily attendance be stressed to parents and students alike. The average for the past year was very low in comparison to the number of students enrolled. Parents should see that their children are in school every day if it is possible for them to be there.

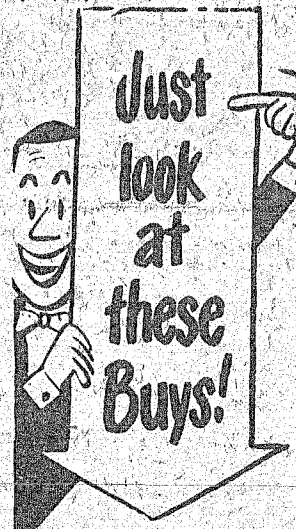

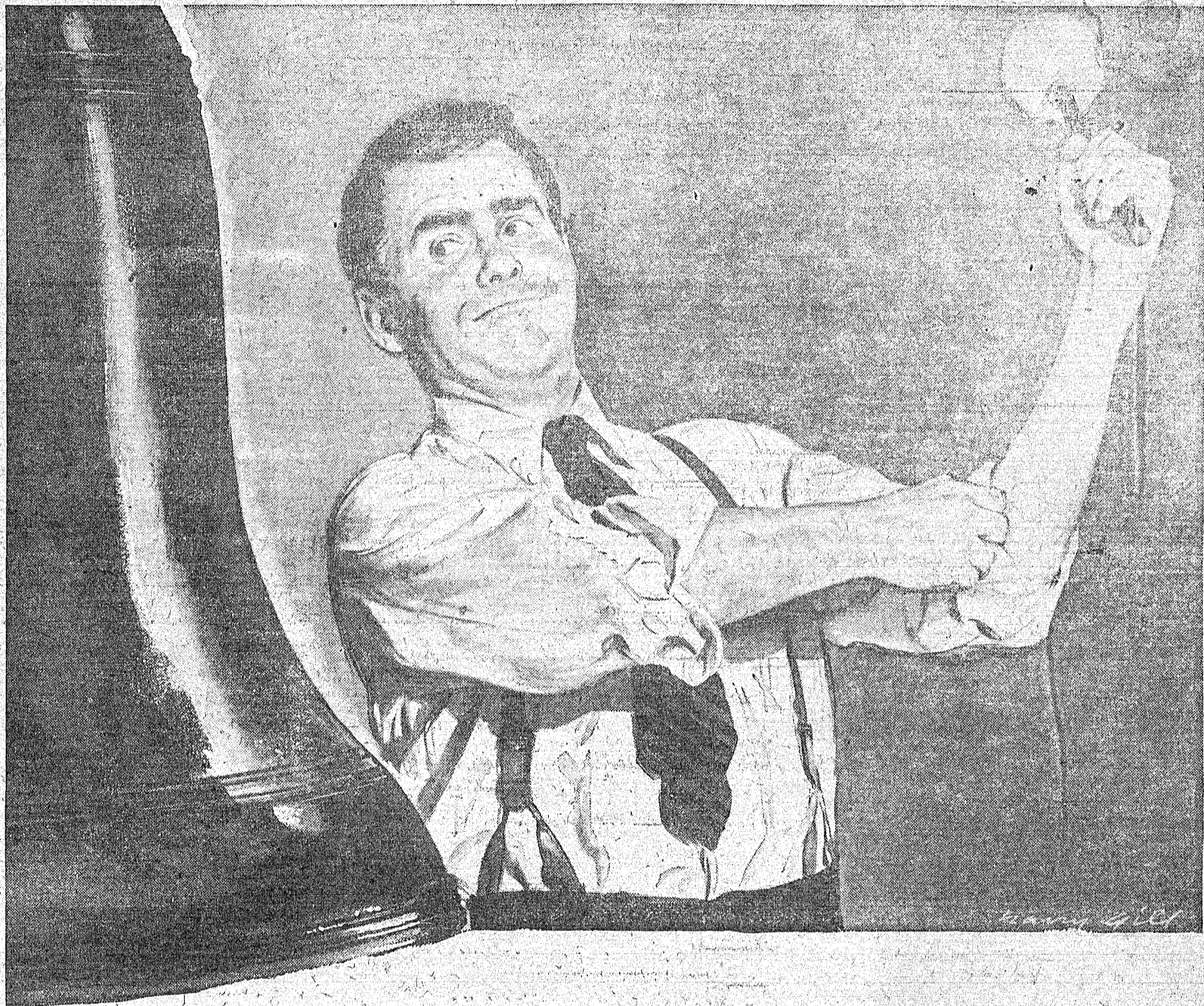

SCRIPTURE: The Book of Jonah. EVANGELICAL HEADING: Ephesians 3:14-21.

Peevish Prophet

Lesson for June 23, 1950.

JONAH THOUGHT he knew better than God. When men said, "Be a prophet," Jonah decided to take a long vacation. He took a ship for a far place so far away he thought even God could not follow. When God said, "Preach to Nineveh," Jonah decided that was the very thing he did not want to do. When God said in effect, "Be a missionary," Jonah thought he would rather be a tourist. Of all the prophets on record, Jonah was the peevish one.

The remarkable and unique little book of Jonah is perhaps the most misunderstood book in the Bible. Nobody knows how much ink has been wasted on the whale (which, incidentally, was not a whale but a fish), whereas the real message of Jonah is not about whales at all. It is about taking the message of God to the most unlikely places in the world; it is the story of how the very people who ought to be doing it, sometimes won't do it.

Does God Care?

CONSIDER the good reasons Jonah might have given for not going to Nineveh. They are like the reasons people give nowadays for not believing in foreign missions. A mission to Nineveh was about as foreign a mission as any one could have thought of, in those days.

Reason number one: The Ninevites were mean people. So they were. Assyria, of which Nineveh was the capital city, had done, and would do Israel more harm than any other enemy she had.

The Ninevites were an unscrupulous, greedy people. They knew no law but force. They spread by violence into many a country. They were the nation nobody loved.

Should the message of God be given to such a city? Jonah thought not. God said it should.

And, of course, God was right. If the message of God had been sent only to peoples and nations that "deserved" such a favor, God's messengers would all have stayed at home.

Too Far From God

REASON number two: Nineveh is a long way off. Indeed it was. To reach Nineveh, Jonah would have to pass through at least a dozen other cities, all of which no doubt needed preaching. Were there not enough people at home who needed preaching? Of course there were. Only Jonah did not preach to them. He had a wonderful missionary opportunity there on the ship. Every man of the crew was a heathen. But Jonah was fast asleep.

This is often too true. People will protest about foreign missions: why send preachers and doctors and teachers and money so far away? Aren't there plenty of heathen right at home? Of course; but you won't often find the objector to foreign missions doing much about it. Any church that is awake and active in supporting foreign missions will be found to be just as alive and intelligent in meeting the problems of the neighborhood.

Judge The World

REASON number three: (This sounds like a silly reason, but Jonah actually put it forward—Jonah 4:2.) God is too good! What was the use of preaching to Nineveh, Jonah wanted to know, if God was going to be gracious and not destroy the city with fire from the sky?

If God is good and merciful, why should we bother about sending missionaries anywhere? Won't he save every one anyhow? Isn't God too good to judge the world?

Jonah overlooked the fact that God had mercy on the Ninevites because they repented. Nowhere in the Bible is there any encouragement to believe that God has mercy on the unrepentant. To all who turn to him, God is gracious, and the job of the missionary, whatever else he does, is to persuade people to turn to God. "Be ye reconciled to God," said Paul, the great Christian missionary. If

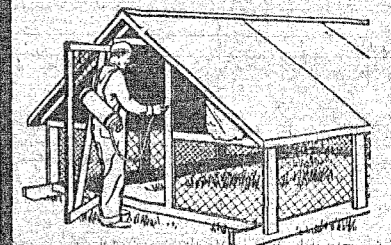
