## Shivers Favors Lifting Ceiling On Old-Age Aid

Fortright answers to four questions put to him in a letter from a West Texas this week placed Gov. Allan Shivers clearly on record for a "fair and equitable" old-age assistance system in Texas.

Replying to a communication from Archie Yates, 1318 North 15th St., Abilene, Shivers set forth in one-two-three fashion his views on old-age assistance. He wrote Yates as follows:

"Your first question is, 'Do you favor the removal of the ceiling on old-age pensions and payments to needy children and dependent blind?' My answer is yes.

"Your second question is, 'Will you or will you not do all you can to have a constitutional amendment submitted to the people to be voted on at the earliest possible time?' My answer is, I will.

"Your third question is, 'Will you or will you not, if ceiling is removed, support a law raising such payments?' My answer is: This is a matter entirely for the Legislature, but I will be happy to see the Legislature pass such laws as it feels fair and just in all the circumstances.

"Your fourth question is, 'Do you or do you not favor the State taking a lien on whatever property the old folks may have?' My answer is, I do not."

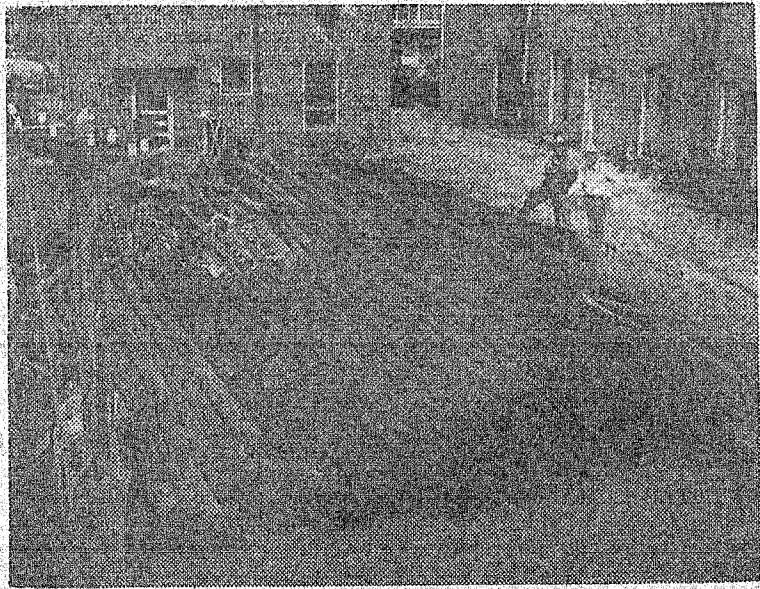
In the letter to Yates, Gov. Shivers pointed out that, as a member of the State Senate in 1935, he wrote and sponsored the first old-age pension law that Texas had. Shivers also was a co-author of the 1941 tax bill which to this day provides for the old-age assistance program.

"As a public official," he said, "I have always endeavored to work for a fair and equitable old-age assistance program in Texas."

## New Rural Telephone Posts

NEW TELEPHONE POST ARRIVED at the Santa Anna Telephone Company last week to be used in building several miles of new rural telephone lines. Over 200 posts were in this shipment and the company is looking for another shipment to arrive in about 3 weeks.

So far the telephone company has 12 applications for rural telephones from the Santa Anna exchange. There have been others asking for information, and a number of them are expected to make application soon. George M. Johnson, manager of the local telephone company states that he has 170 rural telephones now and plans are being made to put up several miles of new lines in the Santa Anna and Sheild area. There has been some rumors made that the Santa Anna company would not serve the Sheild area under proposed REA program, but Mr. Johnson states that he will definitely serve all the Sheild area, and all rumors that he will not serve it are false.

Johnson states that 17 to 24 posts are used in putting up a mile of telephone line, according to the weight of the wire and the number of strans of wire used. Anyone in the Santa Anna area or the Sheild area, who does not have a telephone, and is interested in one, is requested to contact Mr. Johnson, or his son, Douglas Johnson, at the Santa Anna Telephone Company for information. His maps are expected to be completed within the next few days and all information you may desire will be ready for you.

## New School Law Creates Interest And Enrollment In Schools

AUSTIN, Texas.—Texas' new school laws, in force one year, have had the desired effect of providing better education and of bringing more children into the classroom.

Average enrollment skyrocketed more than 100,000. L. P. Sturgeon, state associate commissioner of education, said here.

"A renewed interest among educators in getting children into the schools, plus more attractive programs offered the pupils have had the desired effect," Sturgeon said.

"The spotlight of publicity thrown upon the schools while new education laws were being studied by the public and enacted by last legislature has caused Texans to take more interest in their schools than ever before."

But even with the increase in attendance, there are still approximately 150,000 children of school age in Texas who are not enrolled, Sturgeon said. These are children whose parents are starting them in school a year late or older children who do not enter high school.

One of the most serious problems confronting school districts is lack of classroom facilities, according to Charles H. Tennyson, executive secretary of the Texas State Teachers Association.

"Surveys by that organization and state school officials show that 50 per cent of the school districts this year increased their classroom facilities. Many others will add classrooms during 1950 and '51, Tennyson said.

"These necessary additional facilities will be made available due to increased revenue obtained by the schools through the new and equitable laws which produce more funds, from both state and local taxes," Tennyson said.

## Plans Complete For Coleman's Annual Rodeo

Plans are now complete for Coleman's 13th annual Rodeo, to be held in their \$60,000 order arena, on the nights of July 12, 13, 14 and 15. The shows are to start each night at 8:15 and will open with a Grand Entry Parade, which will consist of about 300 horses and riders in their typical western regalia.

A big parade will be held downtown each afternoon. The parade is usually two miles or more long and is quite a sight for all horse lovers and rodeo fans.

The rodeo program this year has many feature events which gives promise of being Coleman's best rodeo. The usual events of Saddle Bronc Ridding, Steer Bulldogging, Calf Roping, Bareback Bronc Ridding and Bull Ridding have been added to make this a very colorful and entertaining show.

Toots Mansfield, World's champion calf roper, has been matched against Coleman's own Rex Beck, who also won many roping events, in a special matched calf roping event for a purse of \$500.00.

The Hardin-Simmons Cowboy Band will be on hand to furnish music and color each night and the Sheriff's Posse of Abilene will present their famous Quadrille each night. Slivers Johnson and his mysterious Austin automobile will provide part of the humor of the show. Among other features will be a standing Roman Jump, a tumbling act and numerous trick riders, among whom will be Dorothy Satisfield of Cheyenne, Wyoming and Paul and Marie St. Croy of Red Bluff, California.

The well being drilled on the J. W. Taber tract, south of the city limits on the Rockwood highway, took an approximate 15 foot core Tuesday night, and appeared to be drilling deeper Wednesday. No definite report has been made on this well.

The CDFG Oil Co. No. 1, W. B. Griffin was tested early this week. It indicated a potential of 31 barrels per hour. All the wells located in this field have an allowable of 20 barrels per day.

Fred Pool has moved his rig from the Taylor-Kemp location to the Preston West place, just inside the city limits on the Trickham-Whon road. The well was spudded early this week and is scheduled to the Breneke Sand.

**God's Greatest**

Lesson for July 9, 1950

A GREAT man cannot always be seen at close range. His contemporaries may not know what to make of him. Current celebrities outshine him, his enemies cry him down, circumstances hide his true greatness. You have to stand off from him, perhaps several centuries away, before you can see his true height. Great men are like tall mountains; within a few miles of them, the traveler cannot see them for the masses of smaller, ridges and peaks that hide the distant view. Only far out on the plain can we see the great peak towering into the blue.

**Not Much Chance**

MOSES was such a man. At many times in his life, if you had been there, you would have thought he had very little chance to live, much less to succeed. Suppose you had seen him in the first three months of his life? He was born under a death sentence; his parents were breaking the law of the land by keeping him alive at all.

Then later if you had seen him in his sea-going bassinet among the reeds in the river, you might have thought: Will the contraption float? Even if a princess finds the baby, won't she know what he is and send him straight off to be killed?

Or years later, when Moses was a sort of pampered stepson of the palace, what promise was in him? Pharaoh's court was full always of proud young fellows spilling for a fight. Moses might have looked to you just like another useless aristocrat. And then when Moses was out in the wilds, tending another man's sheep, married to an ignorant back-country lass who never understood him in the least; would you have put much faith in that discouraged old ranch-hand?

**God's Man**

BUT don't judge a man by what his contemporaries say. We know now, we have known for centuries, that Moses was one of God's greatest and best.

Consider what the world owes to that one man. Of all his services, let us note three in particular. For one thing, we trace the Ten Commandments back to him. Not that he was the first to call stealing or adultery or premeditated murder men have known as much since early times. But we do associate the Ten Commandments with Moses' name. He preached and taught that religion is ethical, that is, right living is tied in with and tied up to right religion.

Faith and life flow into and support each other. Some religions declare that if a man pleases God that is all that matters; he can ride his neighbors as he pleases. Other religions (or substitutes for religion) say that if a man treats other men right he can let God go. Not so Moses; not so the Jews nor the Christians!

Moses was also the man through whom God revealed some of the most important truths we know about God. Moses taught his people, and through them teaches us, of a spiritual God, not like anything "in heaven above or the earth beneath or in the waters under the earth." God has "no manner of form." God is pure spirit, without a body like men or like anything.

To this day men find that hard to take in; but it is an important truth for any one who wants to think truly about God and to find him.

**Moses and Christ**

ABOVE all, there would have been no Christianity if Moses had never lived, or if he had failed. If the children of Israel had done what they wanted to do, sink back to Egypt and slavery, the whole great history of the Old Testament would have been unwritten. Poets and prophets would have died unborn.

But he would have had to make a start somewhere else besides with the Hebrew people, and the whole history of religion would have been different. There would have been no New

**Our WASHINGTON Letter**  
  
By Congressman **O. C. FISHER**

A GRIM CALMNESS pervaded the Capitol last week as the Korean situation was watched with an interest reminiscent of war days. The President's dramatic and historic announcement that we would use military force to protect Formosa and South Korea was received in Congress with jubilation and approval. The extension of the draft law for a year—a week ago somewhat controversial—was passed by the House with but four dissenting votes a few hours after the President's announcement.

The invasion into south Korea was not expected. It had been forecast for months, and many had urged the President last year to tell the world we would lend military assistance to south Korea if it should be attacked. But it was announced months ago that both Formosa and Korea were not considered essential to U. S. defense.

Now, however, the picture has changed and little Korea has become the symbol of freedom, of the right to live in peace and security in a world surrounded by Communist brigands.

If you will look at your map you will see that Korea is a peninsula jutting out into the sea of Japan, a hundred miles from Tokyo. It is bounded on the northwest by Manchuria for some 500 miles, and its area is within 100 miles of Russia's Vladivostok. In area it is a third the size of Texas but with more than four times as many people.

Korea is highly strategic militarily from the standpoint of both Russia and Japan. Long ago Korea became to Japan "a dagger pointed at her heart." In fact Russia and Japan fought two wars in the past over control of Korea, with Japan winning the 1904 contest. So, in 1910 Japan annexed the peninsula and it remained that way until the close of World War II.

BACK IN 1943 the United States, China and Great Britain pledged at the Cairo Conference that Korea would become independent. And later Russia subscribed to this pledge at Potsdam. But meantime at Yalta in

1945 a secret agreement is reported to have been made to capture North Korea to the 38th parallel, when she entered the Japanese war. The U. S. was to occupy the southern part.

The theory was that the military occupations would be temporary and that a free democratic government would be set up. We complied with our part of the bargain and withdrew our 30,000 troops in January of 1949.

But not so with Russia. She refused to allow North Korea to hold a free election or join in any sort of united government. Instead, a puppet government in the North was set up, asserting control over the south as well. A free election conducted by the United Nations created the Southern Republic, and it claimed jurisdiction over the north where the Russians would not permit an election.

IN THE MEANTIME the United Nations took a hand to try to break the stalemate. A UN commission was sent to Korea to get the facts. But it was stopped at the 38th parallel and was not allowed inside the Russian dominated portion. The election in the south followed.

Moscow claimed its troops were withdrawn from Korea in December of 1948.

Nod the UN declaration is giving military aid to the embattled southerners.

GENERAL CONSENSUS here seems to be that if Russia throws her full military support behind the invasion, the south will be overrun. But most people think Russia, through her puppet, is simply probing a soft spot in the free world to find out how far they can go without having the free world hit back.

But now the free world is hitting back. If the free world had hit back at Hitler and at Japan in the 30's, perhaps World War II could have been averted. And Russia has now been told that this kind of monkey business will not be tolerated by Uncle Sam; that appeasement is out; that a show-down on the effectiveness an integrity of the UN is at hand; that the Russian postwar crimes against free people will be challenged around the world.

As one observer said, the future of the free world is at stake. We have a chance to stop the Russians today without war; if

we fail to make the most of that sets, we shall have to try to stop chance, then on some future day, them with a war that could end as surely as the sun rises and in the ruin of our civilization.

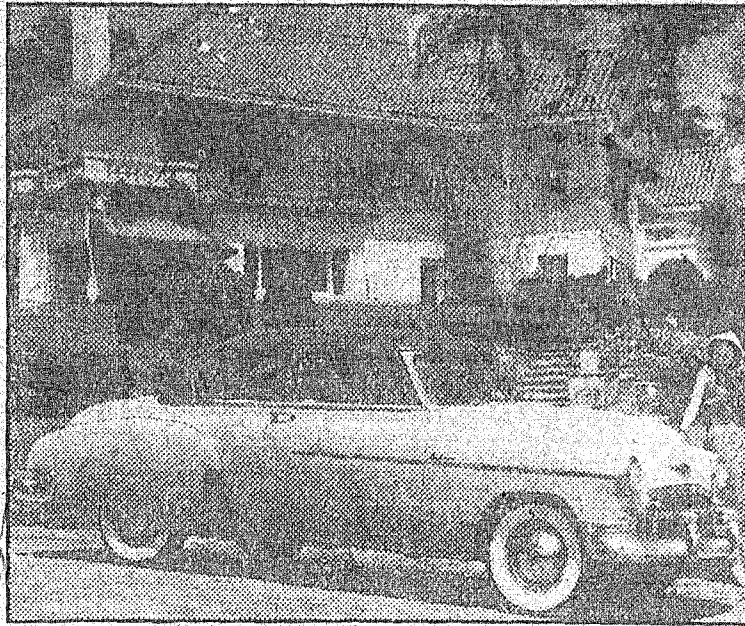

Some poisonous substances may be accidentally introduced into food, Dr. Cox said. "For instance, rodent and insect poisons, spray residues on fruit and vegetables, and poisons from metal containers."

"To point up the deadliness of some food poisons, he related the story of the housewife who suspected some home-canned green beans she had just opened were tainted."

"She barely tasted one of them, but it killed her in a matter of hours. Such instances are rare but do occur."

**Food Poisoning Can Be Thing Of The Past, Geo. Cox Says**

AUSTIN—Food poisoning and the spread of food-borne diseases can be "things of the past," State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox asserted here.

"People need only remember things to bring about the end of the food poisoning disease classification," Dr. Cox declared. "Buy food from safe sources, prepare it in a sanitary fashion, and serve and store it correctly."

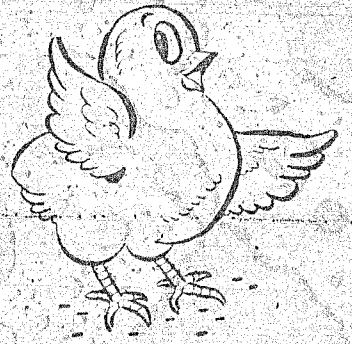
He said state laws covered the sale of contaminated food to the housewife, but "only the home-maker can see that food is properly stored and cleanly prepared for serving to the family."

There is a difference between food infection and food intoxication, he pointed out.

Food infection comes from eating or drinking a product contaminated by a germ, typhoid fever, para-typhoid fever and tuberculosis are examples. Animal parasites can also gain entry to the body in this way. That, the doctor said, is how people get trichinosis and tapeworm.

The growth and multiplication of certain toxin forming bacteria in unrefrigerated foods bring on food intoxication, according to the explanation. That is, the source of staphylococcus infec-

**Pierce Brooks Opposes New Taxes In Race For Lt. Governor**

Pierce Brooks, Dallas business man, has opened his campaign for Lieutenant Governor with a declaration that he is opposed to any new taxes until the State's financial affairs are put on a sound and sensible business basis and waste and extravagance are eliminated from the operation of the State government.

Brooks declared in his opening address that the State is facing the worst financial crisis in its history.

"It is over-spending its prospective income at the rate of \$6,000,000 per month," he said, "and reports from Austin say that in addition to the \$500,000,000 the State is spending this year an additional \$150,000,000 in new tax money will be needed next year."

The Dallas business man pointed out that the cost of the State government has increased more than 500 percent since 1935, while the cost of the Federal government, aside from the cost of World War II, did not increase that much.

"I believe," Brooks said, "that through the elimination of waste and extravagance, by spending the tax dollar more wisely and by getting a full dollar's value for every dollar spent, the \$300,000,000 the State is spending this year can buy all needed supplies and equipment, pay adequate salaries to all essential employees, take care of the old folks, and provide all essential services without any new taxes."

Brooks said the big problem facing the State is not political but a business problem and he said it must be attacked from a business viewpoint.

"If it were a political problem," Brooks declared, "then seven of my opponents in this campaign for Lieutenant Governor should have been able to do something about it. They were members of either the House or Senate

during the period when the cost of State government increased more than 500 percent and they didn't or couldn't do anything about it. They stood idly by and allowed the cost of government to double, treble and then reach runaway proportions. What can the people expect them to do about eliminating waste and extravagance and about getting a full dollar's value for every dollar spent?"

Brooks said that only by the election of a business man to the Lieutenant Governorship can the people of Texas be assured of a direct and vigorous attack on the runaway cost of government, "and that man," Brooks continued, "must be completely free from entangling alliances, political obligations, cliques, clan and groups which grow up when men stay in office too long."

Turning to old age pensions Brooks said:

"I want to find out why the State is short-changing the old folks, cutting old age pension checks while thousands of state owned automobiles are burning up half a million dollars worth of gasoline, oil and tires on vacation trips, hunting and fishing trips, and shopping tours."

Brooks said he has no doubts as to the outcome of his campaign. "I am a business man," he said, "and not a professional office holder. I am the only major candidate who, as Lieutenant Governor, will be absolutely free and unhampered by previous associations, commitments, agreements and alliances to tackle the acute business problems now facing the State."

**Ben Ramsey Is Candidate For Lt. Governor of Texas**

Ben Ramsey, candidate for lieutenant governor and former Secretary of State, last week completed another chapter in his person-to-person handshaking tour of the state.

Ramsey found considerable interest in his program for economy in government, blacktop roads to every farm home, soil and water conservation and rural telephones at reasonable rates.

Ramsey, a 46-year-old country lawyer from San Augustine in East Texas, has been conducting soil and water conservation experiments on his own farm near San Augustine. Several classes of students studying conservation have visited the farm to observe the results of the experiments.

Ramsey is campaigning for the office of lieutenant governor, the presiding office of the state Senate, on the basis of his experience. Ramsey served in both the House and Senate before he became Secretary of State, a position he resigned in February in anticipation of making the race for lieutenant governor. He was elected to the House in 1931, the same year he received his license to practice law. He served two terms and was then elected to the Senate in 1941. In 1947 he was elected president pro tem (assistant presiding officer) by his fellow senators, in recognition of his leadership. Ramsey retired from the Senate in 1947 and in 1949 he was appointed Secretary of State by the late Governor Beauford Jester. Ramsey continued to serve as Secretary of State under Governor

Allan Shivers, resigning in February.

**W. O. Reed Making Vigorous Race For Lt. Governor**

A state government, like a family, should live within its income, W. O. Reed, former Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, declared this week as he vigorously pushed his campaign for Lieutenant Governor.

Reed, who is now serving his ninth consecutive term in the Legislature from Dallas county, is well qualified to speak with authority on economy in government, for he has actually done something about it.

He was the author of the pay-as-you-go law which put Texas on a cash basis and prevents the Legislature from spending money it does not have. While Reed was Speaker in 1947-48, he directed legislation which resulted in a surplus of over \$90,000,000 in the general revenue fund at the end of his term.

"Additional taxes are not the answer to the rising cost of state government," he declared. "I am definitely opposed to any kind of a general sales tax, income tax or gross receipts tax."

"I firmly believe that if common sense and practical business economy are used in running our state, Texas can halt the runaway cost of government expenditures."

Reed, who is the oldest member of the Texas Legislature in point of service, is an attorney who worked during the day and attended school at night to obtain an education. He co-sponsored and actively supported the Veterans Land Law.

As a candidate for Lieutenant Governor, Reed has declared that he will support a more efficient, long-rang farm-to-market road program; legislation to make Texas highways safer; the development of our soil and conserving of the water supply of Texas, to aid our parched towns, farms and ranches; continued support of rural electrification and rural telephones for our farms and ranches.

"As your Lieutenant Governor," Reed stated, "I pledge that I will strive to give the people of Texas the same progressive debt-free government that I helped direct when Speaker of the House of Representatives in 1947-48."

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
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


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
