## Oil Activities IN COLEMAN COUNTY

Frank Williamson No. 1 J. L. Wilkinson, Sec. 3, Block 2, GH&H Survey, wildcat three miles north of Coleman, was skidding over to start a new hole after losing the original try at 1,781, early this week.

Operator was unable to recover stuck drillpipe, and it was shot off in the hole.

The wildcat is slated to drill to 1,995 feet with rotary.

A new completion in the Templeton field, five miles southeast of Novice, is the Fulwiler & Hughes No. 5-A Gillaspay which gauged 168 barrels of 43 gravity oil in 24 hours.

Flow was through 14-64 choke with packer on casing and 400 pounds pressure on tubing. Production was from the open hole at 3,672-84 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 700-1.

Location is 330 feet from the south and 1,650 feet from the west lines of Section 1, EL Sur.

Anzac Oil Corp & R. D. Semmes have plugged and abandoned the No. 10 J. P. Morris Estate, offset 12 miles northeast of Coleman in the Anzac Morris field. It was abandoned at 2,265 feet. Location was 540 feet from the west and 50 feet south of the southeast corner of HT&B Survey 73.

Another Coleman County failure is the Creslenn Oil Co. No. 2-A Weaver Estate, southwest offset to discovery well six miles northeast of Coleman, which was plugged at 2,455 feet. It was 4,003 feet from the north and 1,650 feet from the west lines of L. Johnson Survey 480.

Glenn Hagan, et al, of Austin, have plugged and abandoned two wildcats in Coleman County.

The No. 1 T. M. Hays, 440 feet from the south and 220 feet from the west lines of Section 44, M. Gross Survey, was plugged at 1,937 feet.

No. 1 W. E. Wallace has been abandoned at 1,891 feet. It was 750 feet from the south and west lines of the northwest quarter of Section 53, HT&B Survey.

Woodley Petroleum Co. No. 1 J. W. Saunders, J. P. McLean Survey, was drilling below 3,254 feet, looking for the Gray Sand. Oper-

ator took a test in the Morris Sand at 2,988-2,998 feet, and recovered 60 feet of gas cut in mud in 90 minutes.

Two tests were taken in the Gardner Sand. First test was run at 3,158-79 feet. Tool was open one hour. Gas appeared at the surface in six minutes. Mud flowed in 50 minutes and recovery was 1,350 feet of salt water. Flowing pressure was 750 pounds and shutting pressure was 1,025 pounds.

Anzac Oil Corp., Louis Franklin et al, No. 2 Walter Scarbrough, M. Hunt Survey 274, wildcat five miles southwest of Santa Anna, was shut down for rig repairs at 1,227 feet.

Proposed depth is 1,900 feet with rotary.

W. M. Freeman, et al, No. 1 Cary Buttry, et al, Section 6, League 90, Coleman CSL, has been plugged and abandoned at 2,200 feet. The wildcat was located 14 miles south of Santa Anna.

Freeman & Witherspoon, et al, No. 1 C. D. Bruce is to be a west outpost to production one and one-quarter miles west of Santa Anna.

Location for the 1,975-foot rotary project is 265 feet north and 150 feet west of the northwest corner of C. Raquet Survey, but in J. Scott Survey 665.

H. M. Naylor Oil Co. No. 1 Blanton, HT&B Survey 61, wildcat 2 miles east of Santa Anna, has been plugged and abandoned at 1,970 feet.

Down and Lucas of Kilgore have spotted an offset to production one and a half miles south of Santa Anna. It will be the No. 1 C. L. Eeds, 984 feet from the south and 2,072 feet from the east lines of Section 62, Blk. 4, HT&B Survey.

Projected depth is 1,800 feet with rotary.

Frank Williamson No. 1 J. L. Wilkinson, Section 3, Block 2, GH&H Survey, Coleman County wildcat which lost the first hole, was drilling below 1,500 feet on the second Monday.

Proposed depth is 1,995 feet with rotary.

## At Least Eight Names To Appear On Ballot In Friday City Election

Wednesday at noon eight names had been filed with the City Secretary for a place on the ballot in the City Election to be held Friday, February 16. All names were to be filed by 6:00 p. m. Wednesday evening. It was understood that possibly three more names might be filed on the ticket.

The election is for four City Aldermen, to be elected at large from the City of Santa Anna. The four who receive the most votes will be sworn in and will serve until April 3, when the city will hold another election, and a Mayor and five aldermen will be elected.

These aldermen will be elected under the new form of city government, authorized by the voters in January.

The names that will appear in the ballot are as follows: L. A. Welch, Marshall Campbell, H. L. Markland, C. E. Flint, Amos Taylor, E. D. "Jack" Shields, R. L. "Bob" Garrett, and William E. Hartman.

The voter will vote for any 4 he chooses. Voting will be in the usual manner, marking out the ones you do not wish to vote for, and leaving the four names you want to serve as your city councilmen until April 3.

The election will be held at the Fire Station portion of the City Hall and polls will be open from 7:00 a. m. until 7:00 p. m. Every qualified voter in the City of Santa Anna should go to the polls and cast your vote for the ones you think best suited to serve our city.

## Band Boosters Club To Sponsor Basket Ball Tournament

The Santa Anna Band Boosters Club is sponsoring a basketball tournament on Feb. 20, 22, and 23, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday nights, in the High School Gym. Admission will be 25 cents for adults and 10 cents for students. All proceeds will be used for the band.

## R. K. Green Re-Elected For Three Years

R. K. Green, Superintendent of the Santa Anna School for the last four years, was re-elected for a three-year period at a meeting of the Board of Education last Tuesday night. Election of the other teachers will be at a later date.

During the past four years our school system has undergone a number of changes and it has seemed to improve the school until it is one of the best in our district, financially and scholastically. The financial condition of the school has been taken care of in such a manner that the school does not owe anything other than the bonded indebtedness, and they have a large cash balance. The bonded indebtedness is not out of comparison with other schools over the state. Several thousand dollars worth of equipment has been purchased and paid for, including three new school buses. In fact, all the departments of the school have been improved considerably in the time Mr. Green has been here.

The Santa Anna News is planning a series of articles entitled "Know Your School". Each of these articles will give a thorough discussion of each of the departments of both the high school and the ward school, and will tell of the improvements made. The first of these articles will appear next week, and then we plan to publish one about every other week, until all departments are covered.

## Program Cancelled For Acceptance Of Water Works

A program planned for Tuesday afternoon on the A. J. Newton place, where the City of Santa Anna was to formally accept the water line from Lake Brownwood to the local lakes was cancelled due to the bad weather. However, Mayor F. Z. Payne did formerly accept the project Tuesday afternoon, at the City Hall.

The project has been in operation for the past month, with the Frank Butcher Company of San Antonio making tests and running water into Lake Sealy. The pumps have been operating about 6 hours daily, and the lake is beginning to show signs of the water running into it.

This project was started soon after F. Z. Payne was elected Mayor and B. A. Parker and Wallace W. Adams were elected to the City Commission. After a bond issue was passed by the voters of Santa Anna, and other work completed, bids were called for from contractors, and the Frank Butcher Company was awarded the contract for \$117,238. Other expenses incurred on the line have brought the total cost to approximately \$125,000. The exact total will not be known until all property claims and other expenses are settled.

We now have an ample supply of good, wholesome water. Anyone can use all the water they want to, and not have to worry about there not being enough to supply the demand.

## Thomas J. Wristen Dies Suddenly Tuesday Morning

Thomas Joseph Wristen, a resident of Santa Anna since 1932, and a retired farmer, died at his home in the south part of town at 8:00 a. m. Tuesday morning, from a heart attack. Funeral services were held at the Hosch Funeral Chapel at 3:00 p. m. Wednesday, February 14, with the Rev. E. H. Wylie officiating. Burial was in the Santa Anna Cemetery, with Hosch in charge. Mr. Wristen was born in Parker County, Texas, October 29, 1876. At the age of one year, he moved with his family to Buffalo Gap, and at the age of three years the family moved to Abilene.

Wristen was married to Miss Mamie Conner on January 14, 1899, in Abilene, and they moved to Coleman County in 1914. In 1932 they moved to Santa Anna, where they have made their home since.

Survivors are: the widow, Mrs. Thomas J. Wristen of Santa Anna; one daughter, Mrs. Vivian Eubank of Corpus Christi; three sons, Dan Wristen, Thomas, Jr., Wristen, and Charles Wristen, all of Santa Anna; thirteen grandchildren and four great grandchildren. Two brothers, two sisters and a half-brother also survive.

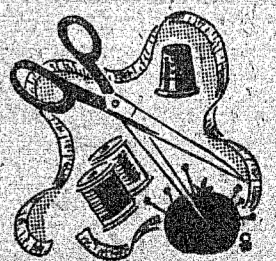


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**Notice of Election**

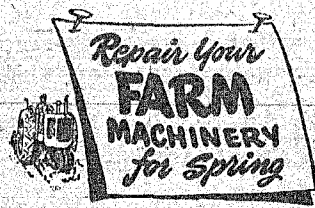

 Whereas, on the 6th day of January, the qualified electors of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, did, in an election held for that purpose, vote that the city government of the City of Santa Anna, Texas should henceforth be the Aldermanic form of government, and  
 Whereas, by virtue of such

change in city government, there now exists a vacancy in the office provided for four aldermen, which vacancy is required by law to be filled by special election called for such purpose,  
 Now, therefore, I, F. Z. Payne, Mayor of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, by authority vested in me and pursuant to the laws of the State of Texas, and the Ordinances of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, DO HEREBY ORDER AND DIRECT that a special

election be held to enable the qualified voters of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, to elect four aldermen at large from the qualified residents of said city.  
 Polls shall be opened for such election in the Fire Station portion of the City Hall at 7:00 a. m. on the 16th day of February, 1951, and shall close at 7:00 p. m. on the same day; and Le Roy V. Stockard shall be presiding judge, W. B. Sparkman shall be judge of election, and Mrs. Hardy Blue and M. W. Curry shall be clerks. In event of inability of any of the foregoing to serve in such capacity, the presiding judge or the judge shall, and they are hereby authorized to appoint any qualified person to fill such vacancy.  
 No person shall vote at such election unless he is a duly qualified voter under the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas. All votes of such election shall be by ballot, and the voters shall signify their choice in the customary manner.  
 On or before the tenth day after such election, the persons holding such election shall make due returns of all votes cast. Upon approval of the returns of said election, candidates elected by virtue of votes cast shall take the required oath and take office immediately.  
 Public notice of this order shall be given by publication in the Santa Anna News and by posting a copy hereof in the City Hall.

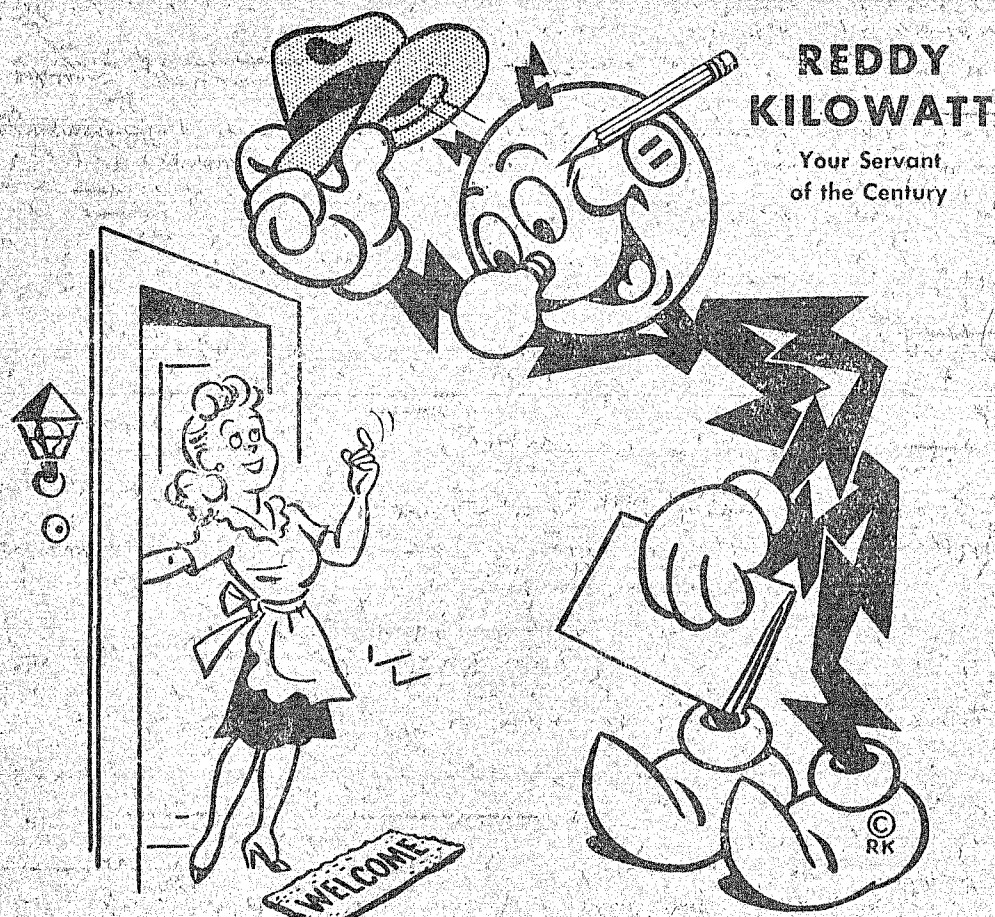

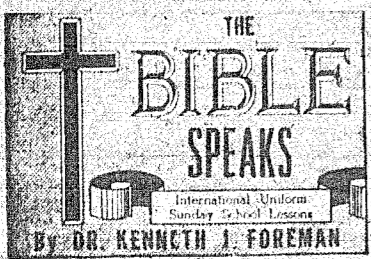

Jesus is Christ Lesson for February 16, 1951

IT SOUNDS odd to modern ears (or to any ear for the past 18 centuries) to say that Jesus "is" Christ. It sounds like saying Abraham is Lincoln, or Winston is Churchill. "Jesus Christ" has become long since a proper name like any other combination of name and surname. But in the early days of Christianity it took sermons to persuade people that Jesus was indeed the Christ, and if people knew what "Christ" means, they would see that most sermons today are really aimed at convincing people of the same thing: Jesus is Christ. When Peter said to Jesus: "You are the Christ," Jesus' reply shows that Peter had not only said something important, but something which to that time had not dawned on any one else.

Only One Christ WE shall have to think about the word "Christ" meant as Peter used the word and as Jesus understood it. The Jews of that time were looking with eager excitement for an "anointed one" (the literal meaning of Christ, or Messiah) who would put an end to all the evil of the world and usher in God's New Age. They were not quite clear how this would be done, but they were sure that only the Christ could do it.

Consider three points. First, when Peter said "You are Christ," he meant "You are unique." No Jew looked for two Christs. There is no one else in Jesus' class; there is only one of him. Every human being, to be sure, is different from all others; but Simon Peter did not mean that. What he did mean was that Jesus could not be classed as "a" teacher or "a" prophet or "a" man of God. He was the Teacher and Prophet. He was God's Man as no other man was.

We make a mistake, we get away from the original Christian faith, the faith which Jesus preached, when we put Jesus on the same level with other men, any other men. There is only one Christ.

God Was in Christ IN the second place, when Peter called Jesus "Christ" he meant that God had anointed him. He was not a man who took a notion to do what he did; he was one whom God had appointed to be and to do as God willed. We cannot understand Jesus apart from God, for his source is God.

Any one who reads the gospel of John will find this very prominent in Jesus' thinking always: "I was sent... My message is to do the will of him that sent me." Christians later than this saw

that the relation between God and Jesus was even closer than that between God and sent Jesus is called the Son of God, he is called the Word that was with God and was God. Paul says God was in Christ.

Later generations would develop the doctrine of the Trinity as it is expressed (for instance) in the Nicene Creed. Every century has its own formulas. Peter in the first century does not use the language of the fourth century, still less of the 20th; but all the formulas express in various ways the conviction Peter had: that when Christ confronts us, God confronts us.

Christ Is Lord of All A THIRD thing Peter meant when he called Jesus "Christ" and that the church means now—is that he has complete authority. All other authority, in the church or out of it, is less than his.

A word often used to express this truth is "Lord." But the word alone is not enough. It really makes less difference what words we use about Jesus than what our attitude to him is. Jesus himself once spoke sternly of people who call him "Lord, Lord," but do not do the things he says to do.

It is one thing to say, in the Creed, that we believe in "Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord;" it is another thing to carry that part of the creed into life. Jesus is our Lord; not the church, not Moses, not Paul, not any hero or saint of the church, but Jesus. Christians take orders from him first of all, for we believe that his mind was the mind of God.
