Smith-Doxey Cotton Application Mailed To Co. Agent

Applications for the Smith-Doxey cotton services were mailed to county agents for every group of farmers organized for cotton improvement, according to H. J. Matejowsky, who is in charge of the Abilene cotton classing office, U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration.

"Farmers can get their 1951 cotton crop classed without paying a fee and USDA market prices mailed them every week without cost, if they belong to a cotton improvement group," Matejowsky said.

Congress provided for these USDA services in the Smith-Doxey Act passed in 1937, to encourage farmers to grow improved varieties of cotton particularly adapted to their soil.

"Applications should be returned to this office as soon as all farmers in the group have planted their cotton," Matejowsky emphasized.

Farmers not in cotton improvement groups are urged to join. Applications for the services and details about the program can be secured from the county agent's office.

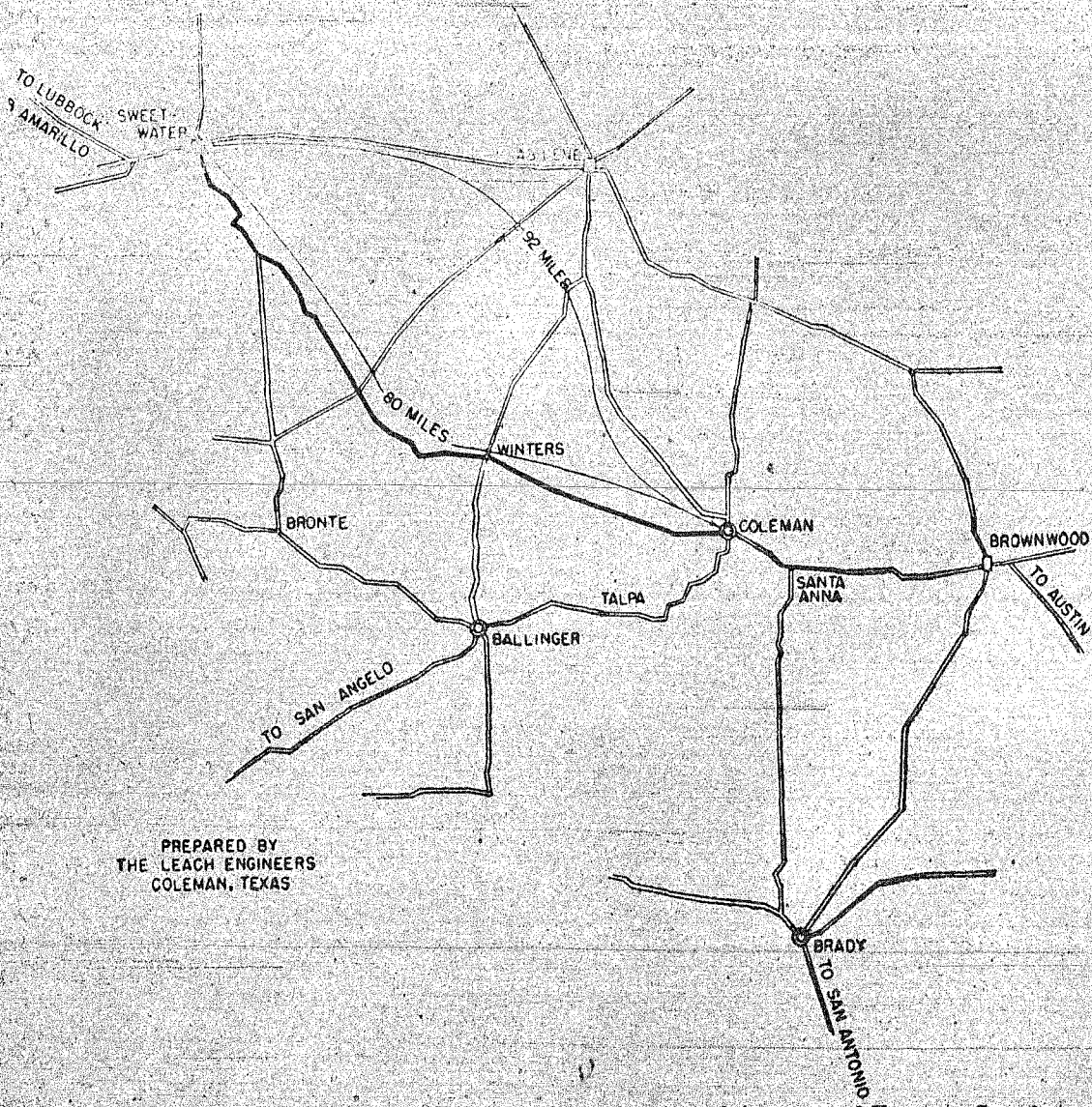
WTCU To Continue Operation in Mason

The Supreme Court of Texas wrote the final chapter of the issue when in February the Court confirmed the Utility Company's right to operate in the city limits.

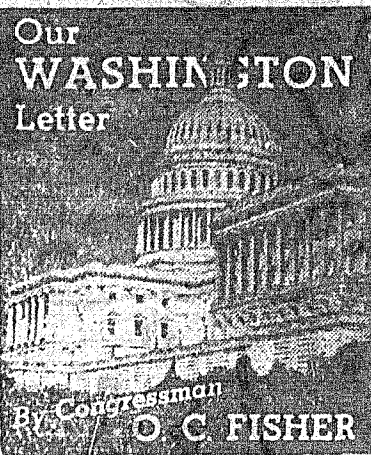

A NEW ROUTE OF TRAVEL for people traveling from the plains area of Texas to San Antonio and valley section will be opened May 19, when the Coleman-Sweetwater highway will be officially opened, as the last gap in the western section of Coleman County is completed. The new route will afford a saving of 12 miles, as well as relieve the strain of heavy traffic on presently traveled highways. Many travelers, too, will be afforded a look at a section of West Texas they have not seen before, including many spots of scenic beauty. In late July of last year my assistant, Latham Ables, came in one morning with a teletype message from the Marine Corps. It was orders for active duty and he had but five days to report.

On April 29, on the threshold of a bright and useful career, 2nd Lt. Ables gave his life for his country as he led a Marine platoon against the Communist hordes in Korea.

I last saw Latham in December after he had received orders to report to the West Coast for debarkation. He was happy when it turned out that the trip would enable him and his charming and lovely wife, Beverly, to stop over in Brownwood for a visit with his mother and also with Beverly's mother in Corsias, Christ. Besides there was the Cotton Bowl game being played in Dallas on January 1st and he

hoped to be able to see that before leaving for the war front.

He had been training at Quantico, the home base of the fighting Marines whose achievements on the field of battle have become interwoven with the finest traditions of bravery and gallantry in American military history. From the Halls of Montezuma to the shores of Tripoli, the dauntless Leathernecks have carried the banner of freedom on scores of battlefields where American interests and the cause of freedom have been challenged. Another chapter in that glorious record has been written by them in the hills and rice paddies of far-away Korea.

Only writers of history, recording the Korean war from their vantage point can properly appraise the wisdom of our intervention in that conflict. We have all been disturbed by reports of foreign policy bungling in the Far East and possible military blunders there. In a speech to parliament last December 14, Winston Churchill said: "War is little more than a catalogue of mistakes and misfortunes."

General Ridgway says the Korean conflict may well turn out to be the turning point in the upsurge and challenge of world communism to enslave the free world. If that should turn out to be true, then the supreme sacrifice of Lt. Ables and the others who have died there, will be fitted into that dramatic moment in our history and the survival of civilization as we know it.

Yet, it is so hard to justify the waste of individual lives of our bravest and finest young men, fighting 6,000 miles from our shores. If we think in terms of individual lives, we know that the life of Latham Ables - young,

useful and ambitious, - is worth more than all the Chinese Reds in Asia. The same could, of course, be said of many others.

Latham graduated from Texas University in 1949, and I immediately invited him to come to Washington and head my office staff. I took much pride in his acceptance and even more pride in his hard work and intelligent devotion to the minutest problems of our district. When we announced the tragic news of his death here, scores of calls came, many from members of Congress who knew him and knew of his fine qualities.

After his departure for Japan, and thence to Korea, Latham wrote me at intervals. He asked that I send him my weekly newsletters and spoke of how he missed his work here, and wanted to be remembered to all his friends, of whom he had many. His last letter was dated April, written from the front lines.

"I landed in Korea on February 16 (my birthday)," he wrote, "and was assigned to B Company, 5th Marines. Upon reporting I was given command of a rifle platoon and told that we were moving up in the attack. Since then we have been on the line with the exception of a couple of weeks spent in the division reserve."

Speaking of his outfit, he said, "I can say that there is a mistaken idea in the states 'low morale' of the troops over here, or at least as far as the 5th Marines are concerned. The boys are the finest I have ever seen and morale is about as high as it can get. Nothing at all seems to faze them and their combat is terrific."

There is much more to be said. I have lost a valued and loyal friend. The family's loss is beyond description. To them our deepest sympathy is extended. The Nation has lost one of its finest and most promising young men. To paraphrase the words of Lincoln:

"It is rather for us, the living to be dedicated to the unfinished task remaining before them; that these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave their last full measure of devotion"
