Mr. W. C. (Bill) McHorse, owner and operator of the M & W Furniture Store in Coleman is sponsoring a musical contest at the Howell Theatre in Coleman Thursday night, June 14. The program will be conducted in a manner similar to the Horace Hyatt radio program, where each contestant will be allowed to sing any song they want to. Mr. McHorse states that a first prize of \$50.00 will be awarded to the contestant judged the best by the greatest amount of applause from the audience. Each one will also receive a pass to the Howell Theatre for 30 days.

Lt. Col J. J. Gregg Jr Receives Bronze Star Medal

Lieutenant Colonel J. J. Gregg, Jr., recently was presented with the Bronze Star Medal for service rendered to the Republic of Korea during the period from August 1 to November 2, 1951. The citation is as follows: "Lieutenant Colonel JOSEPH J. GREGG, JR., 0409980, (then Major), Infantry, United States Army, Colonel GREGG, a member of the United States Military Advisory Group to the Republic of Korea, is cited for meritorious service during the period 1 August to 2 November 1950. As Senior Advisor to The Adjutant General, Republic of Korea, Army initiated an accelerated program to train technicians in the preparation of service records and the maintenance of central files at Republic of Korea Army Headquarters; established the United States Augmentation Personnel Selection and assisted in organizing teams for the administration of the records of augmentation personnel in United Nations units; and gave advice of inestimable value to the activation, establishment and operations of the Republic of Korea Army Publications and Printing Center. The meritorious service of Colonel GREGG contributed materially to the successful operation of United Nations Forces in Korea and reflects great credit on himself and the military service."

It seems that his doctor has advised him that the strain placed upon him in the capacity as Mayor has been detrimental to his health, and that he is not able to take the time from his other duties as Commander of the local National Guard Company and Instructor in the local Veterans School to serve as Mayor.

City Alderman C. E. Flint is serving as Mayor Pro-tem for the present time. It has not been decided just when a new Mayor will be named.

Saturday Rain Amounts To 1.35 Inches

Rain fell in Santa Anna amounting to 1.35 inches Saturday night and early Sunday morning. The rain was beginning to be needed by the farmers of this area.

The hard rains we had some two weeks ago did not soak much in the ground and it was beginning to get dry for the farmers to continue their planting. This rain fell over a period of several hours and most of it soaked in the ground. Apparently the rain was fairly general all over this section of the state, and could be valued at a million or millions of dollars.

Most farmers are planting all the cotton they can get. However, there seems to be quite a shortage of cotton seed throughout the state, and it will most likely cause a lot of our farmers to have to plant other crops. A large number of farmers are also planting grain sorghums and a number are considering taking the castor bean route.

Cotton Classing To Help Farmers Get Top Market Prices

According to H. J. Matejowsky, who is in charge of the Abilene cotton classing office, U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration, the Smith-Doxey cotton services can help farmers sell their 1951 cotton crop for top prices. Nearly every farmer knows how to work his land to produce the most cotton per acre, but when it comes to selling it at the highest market price, he's often up a stump. That's where the USDA service comes in.

Under the Smith-Doxey Act, passed by Congress in 1937, farmers in organized improvement groups can get their cotton classed without paying a fee, and USDA cotton prices mailed to them without cost.

"When a farmer knows the grade and staple of his cotton, then he can figure out how much it's worth by the USDA quotation sheet," Matejowsky explained, pointing out that this gives the farmer real bargaining power in selling his cotton for the highest market prices.

At the regular meeting of the City Council Tuesday night, June 5, the City Aldermen requested that property owners of the City of Santa Anna clean up their lots, especially vacant lots, and requested that all dog owners get their dogs vaccinated against rabies and licensed before July 2, 1951.

Due to some complaints that have been reported to the city, the Council feels that property owners should be responsible for their property, and feel the property owners should see that their lots are cleaned of all weeds and rubbish that would be a harbour for disease carrying insects.

One case of polio has been reported in Santa Anna already, and it is feared that others might be struck with the dreaded disease. The City Council wants to do all they can to prevent any more cases in our city. In doing so, they are going to give the entire town at least one good spraying a week, and possibly more, depending upon the weather conditions. Polio is not a disease that plays favorites, but is likely to strike any person. It is usually considered that it strikes children more so than grown-ups, but it has been known to strike at least one person in the sixty years of age.

The Council is asking that you cooperate with them, and get your property cleaned up. In a display ad elsewhere in this issue of the News requests your cooperation.

The Council also feels that the dogs running loose in our city should be brought under control. These dogs might be carriers of the polio disease, and it is known that they carry rabies. They decided at the meeting that they would enforce the City Dog Ordinance to the effect that the owners of all dogs to be vaccinated against rabies before they are licensed. After July 2, 1951, the city dogged and they will be all picked up unless they are licensed. But money will be paid to the owner.

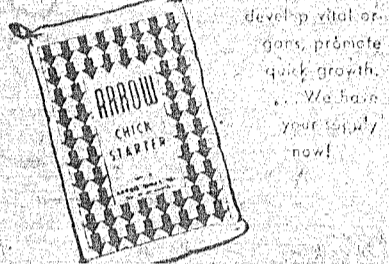

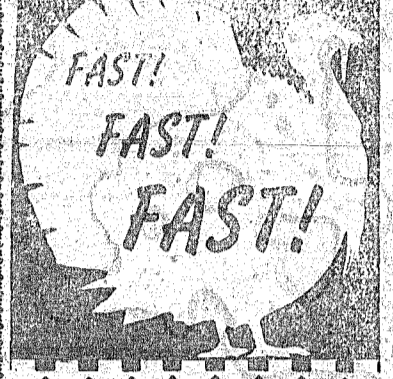

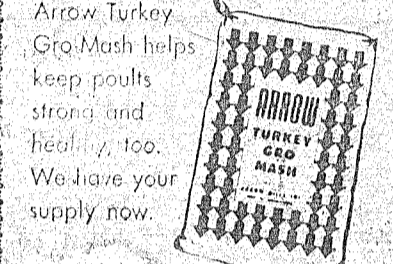

Former Santa Anna Boy Makes Himself Known In Korea

Pvt. Jerry D. Bibrey who is a boyhood in Santa Anna, including a part of high school attendance, is doing well his part in Korea.

He is fighting with the 15th Infantry Regiment's "Hogens Hoodlums" whose Korean exploits are legendary in the 3rd Infantry.

Bibrey, 19, the youngest man in the outfit, and the smallest, 5 ft. 4 in. and weighing 125 lbs., had a nickname of "Baby-san" Korean for Mr. Baby, until the boys learned better.

He lost his nickname when his platoon was guarding the south bank of the Han river, when he tired of being a jeep driver, upon request, his sergeant handed his rifle to Bibrey, and aiming at a hole on the bare hills across the river, Bibrey fired, and an enemy soldier leaped out of the hole and fell on his face, and Bibrey lost his nickname.

Pvt. Bibrey is a son of J. D. Bibrey of Santa Anna and Mrs. Beatrice Riley of Odessa. His grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. George Morris and Mr. and Mrs. Raz Bibrey of Santa Anna, in whose homes he stayed during much of his boyhood.

Not to Be Served
Lesson for June 10, 1951

HERE are at least three ideas of what religion is, and two of them are wrong if Jesus was right. To put this more correctly: All three ideas have some truth in them, but if either the first or the second is taken as the main and only truth, then religion goes wrong; while Christ's truth carries in itself all the truth the others have.



Religion Is Not Retreat

FIRST of these wrong ideas about religion is that it is a retreat from the world, a private conference between God and the soul, and nothing more. People holding this idea have literally fled from the world; they have lived as hermits; they have taken vows of silence, and not spoken to a living soul for years on end; they have lived in little huts in communities devoted to contemplation and prayer.

Now the relation between God and the soul is extremely important. Prayer and contemplation are the very atmosphere of religion, and the Christian ought always to be truly separate from the world. But he is treating to a cell won't answer. Nobody is any better for taking a vow of silence.

Jesus was not that kind of person. His apartness from the world was not marked by a brick wall, but by his being a different kind of person, in the world.

Religion Is Not a Guarantee

ANOTHER wrong idea about religion is that it is a means of gain. Being religious is supposed to be a sure way of getting what you want. It means getting God on your side, it means having all your prayers answered, it means prosperity and success. Surely no one could study the story of Jesus and come away with that notion in his head. Jesus got neither health, wealth, popularity nor success out of being what he was and doing what he did. The most respectable citizens regarded him as a wicked man; his property was only the clothes he wore; he is known to us as a "man of sorrows and acquainted with grief"; as for success, it is written that "he came to his own, and his own received him not."

Well, some one will ask, do you mean to say there is nothing in being a Christian? Don't you get anything at all out of it? That is a fair question.

Yes, there is everything to be gained; but not in that money-making, happiness-guaranteeing fashion. The person who "goes in for religion" hoping to advance his own interests, is still only a selfish man.

This is the ideal of service, in its deepest, widest sense; and it takes in both those other ideals of religion. One of the best ways of serving others is to pray for them, as Jesus did. One of the best things we can do for others is to live as close to God as we can. But as Jesus himself said: "For their sakes I dedicate myself."

It is true, also, that something is to be gained from religion; but nothing that a selfish, greedy, money-loving person can understand. As one of the great creeds expresses it, the "benefits of redemption" are assurance of God's love, peace of conscience, increase of grace, and perseverance therein to the end.

These are priceless, but no one can understand such things or even wish for them so long as he is a self-loving person. Jesus served men's bodies and minds, he taught and healed; but deeper than this, he came to save men—save them from their worst selves, bringing them out from slavery of sin, into the freedom of God.

So the Christian who wants to know the full meaning of his religion will, like his Master, so far as he can find opportunity, serve others' needs in every way he can. And the best service one person can do for another, after all, is to introduce him to Christ.
