Learning to Say 'We'
Lesson for July 8, 1951

The "We-Feeling"
GOD INVENTED the family; that is what is meant by calling it a "divine institution." It is part of God's plan for each of his children that he shall learn how to live, not in a lonely cell by himself, not as a lonely wolf fighting against all comers, but as a member of a family.

The family is eternally important in many ways. These things are what Dr. Foreman speaks of.

Students of personality have found a new name for something that every one ought to have, but many one does not have. It is called the "we-feeling."

The lone wolf type of person never really thinks "we." His mind divides the world into two armed camps: on the one side is "I" and on the other side is every one else.

He goes through life assuming that nobody is for him, nobody is with him, and he in turn is for nobody and with nobody. His hand is against every man, as the Bible says. Even if he teams up with others for a while, he will quickly cross them if he thinks he will make something out of it. He is your typical criminal, "anti-social" as teachers and sociologists call him.

What It Means to Grow Up
CHILDREN usually begin life without much we-feeling, if any. They don't naturally share their toys or their dinners or anything else. They grab all they can and they don't like to be grabbed from. The process of growing up—really growing up, not merely getting older and bigger—is a process of developing a healthy we-feeling. Nearly every one develops this to some extent, of course; but when some people say "we" they don't mean very many.

We have all heard of the man who prayed: "Lord, bless me and my wife, my son John and his wife. Us four, no more. Amen!" He doesn't make a very good citizen.

But as the "we"-circle grows wider and wider we get a more and more public-spirited and service-minded citizen, till at the high point of the we-feeling we see a man like St. Paul who calls himself a debtor to all men, or like John Wesley who said, "The world is my parish," or a modern international citizen and statesman such as John R. Mott.

How the Family Helps
THE very best place to learn the "we-feeling" is in a good family. This does not necessarily mean an aristocratic family or a wealthy one. Many good families, perhaps

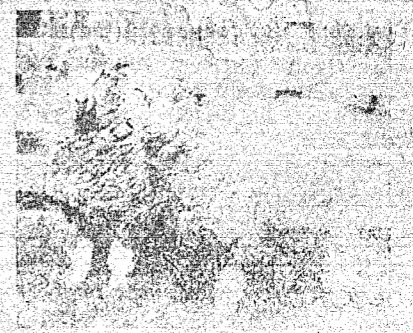

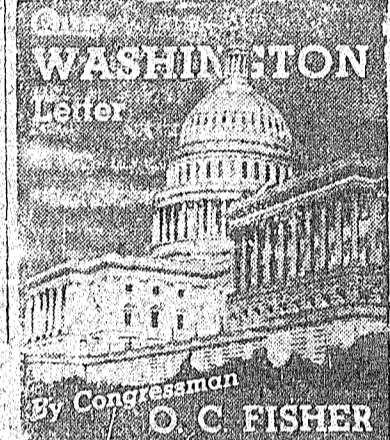

WASHINGTON STILL DRAGGING ITS FEET after six months of the present session, the House last week finally passed a Mexican labor bill which is designed to effectuate the agreement between this country and Mexico whereby Mexican laborers may be processed and permitted to enter the United States on a temporary basis to do agriculture work. A provision in a companion senate bill previously passed, gave it a floor for an employer to hire a Mexican national only in this country. If the employer could not find but or could not have found but or could not have employed in the United States, the House by a vote of two and one half to one rejected a similar provision which would have allowed the House bill.

The House and Senate versions of the labor bill are now being considered by a Conference Committee, and it is hoped an acceptable compromise can be agreed upon shortly. STOPPING OFF IN WASHINGTON for a brief tour of the capitol and city on last Friday was a large delegation of Texas Lion Club members en route back to

Texas from the International convention in Atlantic City. Traveling on a special train, the party visited briefly at the capitol which gave a number of the Congressmen a chance to see friends from their district. Among those from our area were: Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Lehman of Mason, Mr. and Mrs. Zola Price of Uvalde, Mr. John Lowrey and Mr. A. E. Prugel of Sonora, Mr. and Mrs. M. D. Buster of Llano, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Cooper of San Angelo, Mr. Sandy King of Brownwood, and Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Little of San Sabá. Pointing to the phenomenal growth of Lion Clubs in Texas, the convention delegates from the Lone Star State issued their

own publication which recorded that in 1940 there were 280 clubs, in 1945 there were 354 clubs, and in 1950 - with Herb C. Petry, Jr., of Carrizo Springs, President of Lions International to inspire and lead them - the number of clubs jumped to a total of 609, comprising 33,810 members.

Speaking of Mr. Petry, he was recently admitted to practice before the United States Supreme Court on an admission day when I had the honor of introducing him to the Court.

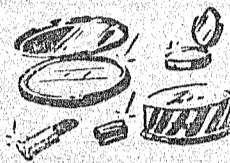

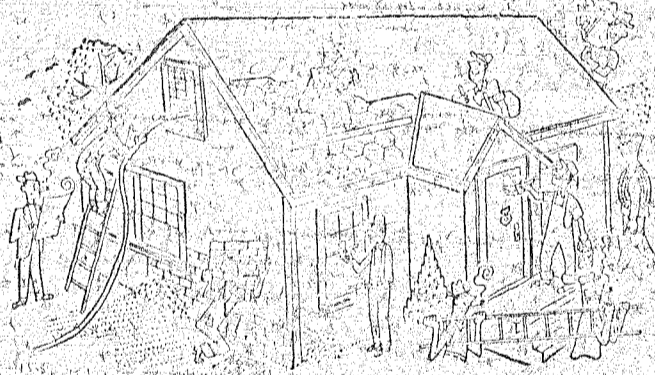

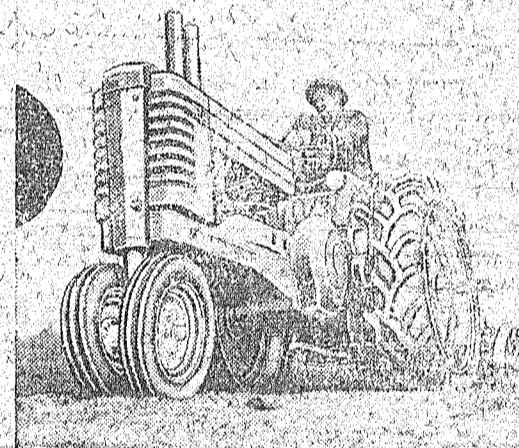
