Now the Bible teaches that every one who is able to do so, should earn his living. Saint Paul made a rule for his churches: "He that will not work, neither let him eat."

That sounds hard-boiled, but makes sense. The Bible has no use for the hobo, the loafer, the "moocher," the "grifter," the person who thinks the world owes him a living. the "grifter," the person who The world owes no one-a living.

### The Right to Work

F it is the duty of all of us to earn our board and keep, on the other hand the world ought to giveus the opportunity to do so. Along with the duty of earning a living goes the right to earn a living.

We saw, some weeks ago, that a basic Christian principle for right living is the value of individual persons. This holds good for economics as well as for all other areas of life.

What happens to the man who cannot earn a living? If he becomes an "object of charity," in a short while he loses ambition and selfrespect. And if he gets no charity, he starves.

So any system or arrangement if society, or any action or condiinn permanent or temporary, making it impossible for a man to earn his own living, is harmful to human persons and therefore sin-

### The Risks of Riches

So far, you might say that Christianity only says what everybody with common sense can see course, that everything has to bes for himself. But Christianity of s further and says something that most people forget: that getting rich is more dangerous than desirable.

The Bible urges us all to earn our own way; but it does not urge us to get rich. Christ warns us that life does not consist in the "abundance of things" a man possesses. There is no virtue in being as poor as possible.

Still, on the other hand, the more a man's property piles up, the more he is tempted to certain sins: the sin of greed, wanting more than our share, more than we can wisely use; the sin of pride, wanting to have more than any one else in sight; the sin of selfishness, wanting to use what we have for our own benefit exclusively; the sin of hoarding, wanting to fill barns or bank accounts for no particular reason except just to see the pile grow; the sin of materialism, measuring success in terms of dollars-

The main question is: Why do we want it? To have something good, or to do good with it? The big Christian question about every relationship and transaction, eco-nomic and otherwise, is a question about people. What is this going to do to people? To me? To those who depend on me? To the community?

Pope Pius XII used two words about the economic life which Protestants will agree are of top importance: Make it more human. he said, and more Christian.

It has occurred to me that after approximately three years service as your Commissioner, I should give the citizens of Precinct 2 a report on my stewardship in handling business for Coleman County, Precinct 2. The figures and statements that I shall use have been taken from the official audit and treasurer's books of Coleman County.

When I assumed office on January 1, 1948, your precinct was indebted in the amount of \$15,765.00, this amount being owed to Machinery Companies. There was \$3,048.14 in the bank at that time.

Also, when I assumed office the precinct had as equipment; one maintainer in good condition and two maintainers badly in need of repair. In addition, we had one truck and one pickup in need of repair, and one, onequarter yard dirt shovel. The above constituted a complete inventory of the assets of Precinct 2.

As of July 1 this year, I am glad to report that your precinct is completely free of debt and other encumbrances. Our bank balance was \$8,068.98 as of July 1.

As for equipment I am glad to report that your precinct now is in excellent condition. Your precinct has 4 maintainers, 4 dump trucks, 3 pickups, and one, one-half yard Quick-Way Shovel, all in good repair, and paid for. It is the feeling of your Commissioner that he is in a better position at this time to render the type of service merited by the people of this precinct than at any time in the past.

Naturally, it is my desire to do anything towards giving better service to the constituency of my precinct and the people of Coleman County as a whole. Any suggestions or recommendations that any of my friends wish to give me will be sincerely appreciated.
