The cast is long and introduces some very human characters encountered in every-day life, from the reputable physician to the sinister "quack" or "fake" doctor who hangs out his shingle in the big cities and offers to treat men's diseases, "consultation free." The story is admirably acted, and the scenes, especially the Broadway cabaret and the roadhouse, are realistically portrayed.

Although the fate of the "rounder" is tragic, the whole tone of the film is one of encouragement through warning, not one of depression and despair. The language of the screen is one understood by all, and after seeing "Open Your Eyes" one receives an impression a thousand times deeper and stronger than talks and lectures and tons of literature could ever produce. 
