They will also deliver them to your residence free of charge. These cans have been purchased and are being sold at cost in order to get as many people to use covered cans

Mr. Bass stated that the city now has contacts where they can get more cans on short notice. However, everyone who possibly can is urged to get one

during the next few days.



Another bill that caused a good deal of controversy — one to ban resort lodges from state parks — was killed in the House, 63 to 59.

Barring revival of the bill. which seems unlikely, the state parks board can sell bonds to private investors and build resort lodges at Inks Lake near Burnet, Lake Texoma, and Possum Kingdom Lake.



The act was passed because some city, county, and other local government officials had failed to comply with state regulations requiring them to publish in the newspapers facts concerning the financing and operation of their of-

The mandatory publications act provided that "all public officers of the state, counties, cities and school districts who are required by law to publish legal notices or financial statements and who shall fall, refuse, or neglect to make such publications shall be guilty of malfeasance of office and subject to forfeiture of salary for the month in which such failure occurs. Such officers shall be subject to removal from office upon wilful continuance of such neglect of

The act also provides that "suits to enjoin or recover payments of salary and for removal from office under law shall be instituted in the proper district court by the county or district attorney of the county in which the offending of-

Dog owners are also requested to keep their dogs at home as much as possible. Even if they are licensed they are not supposed to be allowed to roam and cause disturbances over the city. Should harm befall your dog while he is not on your property, the owner has no recourse.

Further complaints have been filed at the City Hall by farmers of our area, indicating that large groups of dogs have been killing their sheep.

We are going to exert every effort to enforce our dog ordinances and request the cooperation of owners in this matter.
