Activities Of The Local National Guard Company

(Editor's note: This is the first of a series of articles concerning the local National Guard Company. Each week in the future M/Sgt. Charles Wristen will prepare an article on the activities of the National Guard, and he will be free to use the column in any way he might see fit.)

Our attendance for Wednesday night, March 4, was about the same as usual, with 30 enlisted men and 2 officers being present. We have 9 enlisted men and 1 officer in the unit that do not live here. These men have authority to drill with the Guard units in the towns where they live, when their drill attendance reports arrive here, our attendance for the night will probably be about 85%. Only two men that live here in Santa Anna failed to come to drill. Both of these men were working that night so it was impossible for them to attend drill.

Judging from the interest that the men took in their work Wednesday night, the instructors are to be praised for their work in preparing their classes. Lt. Billy J. Harvey and Sfc. Charlie R. Owen had the entire company for the first hour of training. Their class was on Drill, Ceremonies and Inspection. This was a sample of what the men will have on Federal Inspection, which will be Thursday night, March 12. Cpl. Luther J. Talley and Sfc. Gary D. Patterson had an interesting class on Individual Weapons. This period of training was on the Automatic Pistol, and was for the men that had less than two years of service to their credit. Sfc. George W. Tucker and Cpl. Johnnie A. West also had an interesting class on Intelligence. This period of training was for the men that have over two years service in the National Guard.

Sfc. William M. Power, Army Instructor Inspector from Brownwood, was present during the afternoon and night. Sfc. Power inspected personnel records during the afternoon phase of his visit and inspected our training during the two hour drill period that night. He seemed to be very satisfied with his inspection.

We had an eight hour drill Sunday, March 8, due to weather conditions, most of this drill was held indoors. Pfc. Joe B. Vinson was in charge of preparing the noon meal. Pfc. Vinson had several assistants, but Sfc. George W. Tucker and Cpl. Johnnie A. West seem to be the best future cook helpers for Pfc. Vinson. These men prepared an excellent meal of steak, gravy, potatoes, peas, coffee and canned fruit for desert. Everyone seemed to really enjoy this fine meal.

Good Rains Cover Most Of State

One of the best rains that almost anyone can remember fell here Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, with good prospects for it to continue on Wednesday. Reports from over the county indicate varying amounts, but all approaching at least three inches in the southern part of the county.

At the Coleman Gas Company gauge, 2.8 inches was registered and on the west edge of town, over three inches was registered. Rockwood reported over 4 inches the same as the Trickham-Whon area.

All the water fell very slow and gave it a chance to soak the parched earth. A number of farmers and ranchers report catching good amounts of stock water also. There is no estimate of the value of the rain. It certainly helps our prospects for a crop for the first time in three years.

City Offers Bounty On Stray Dogs

The city Council announces this week that they are offering a bounty of \$1.00 for each and every stray dog brought to the City Hall and put in the pound there. This action came as the result of numerous complaints filed by local citizens and a large number of farmers of the surrounding area who report that dogs are killing a lot of their sheep.

A number of local farmers attended the regular City Council meeting Friday night and requested the city to do something about the stray dogs. The farmers reported that between 15 and 20 of the nearby farmers and ranchers had lost from 8 to 20 sheep on separate nights as the result of dogs killing them. These men who attended the meeting said they had killed several dogs, but so far had not killed one that was licensed with the city.

In order to encourage people to catch these stray dogs and bring them to the City Hall, the City Council passed a resolution offering a reward of \$1.00 to anyone who would bring a stray dog, or an unlicensed dog.

The City Council does not want to take pet animals away from homesteads. But, the stray dogs in the town have reached such an enormous proportion that it has become necessary that something be done about it. It is the intention of the City Council to have every unlicensed dog in the city picked up and disposed of. It will take some time to get all of them and it will also take the cooperation of all the citizens of the town.

If you do not wish to pick up the stray dogs, and any unlicensed dog is considered a stray, you might tie him up and call the city. As soon as possible they will dispatch someone to come and get the dog.

It is approaching the time of year when rabies are more apt to spread among animals. During the spring of the year this disease spreads more rapidly than at any other time. These dogs that roam through the country side are more apt to contact the disease than one that stays at home. And a rabid dog can be very dangerous. It is for the benefit of every citizen in town that all stray dogs be disposed of as soon as possible. Your cooperation will be greatly appreciated.

Contest Develops In City Race

Nine local citizens filed Friday for places on the ballot for Alderman and one for Mayor on Friday, March 6, the last day for requesting names to be printed on the ballot for the City Election, to be held Tuesday, April 7.

Dr. Charles M. Henner, owner and operator of the Santa Anna Hospital, was the only one filed for Mayor. Claude Hodges, Leland Thompson, Charles Wristen, Cliff Herndon, John C. Gregg, Preston Bailey, Tom Hays, Hardy Blue and Robert L. Markland all filed as candidates for Alderman.

Herndon is the only one on the ticket seeking re-election for a second term. Wristen and Thompson were appointed during the present term and are now seeking their first elective term.

The election will be held in the fire station at the City Hall on Tuesday, April 7. Voters will vote for one person for Mayor and the five of their choice for Alderman. No run-off election will be held. The five men receiving the most votes will be considered elected to serve a two-year term as Alderman.

Total cost of the building was \$165,704.43. The bond issue voted by the local citizens was \$160,000. Cost of the building and fixtures, including side walks, Venetian blinds, furniture, etc., was \$172,442.50. This money paid out over the bond issue has been saved out of operating funds during the past two years, since the building has actually been in the working stage. The building cost figures approximately \$7.50 per square foot.

All rooms will have new desks. They are known as the chair desk type and all are movable. The new desks that have been in use in the old buildings in some of the lower grades will be used, but they were purchased for use in the new building. Plans are to make numerous additions to the building as funds become available. Play ground equipment will be added also.

During the remainder of the school year, the elementary students will use parts of the football field and some of the southern part of the school ground for play ground. By the time school begins next fall, all the play grounds are expected to be completed and all will have designated places for play.

Actual classes will begin in the new building on Monday, March 16.

There will be no guides furnished at the open house. Every guest is invited to visit each room, the auditorium, cafeteria and to look over the outside of the building.

For the past 5½ years the elementary students have been attending school in buildings brought in here from the old Camp Bowie and from some of the districts that have consolidated with Santa Anna. The arrangement has been on a temporary basis, pending the completion of the new school. The completion of this building will make Santa Anna one of the best school districts in the state, including the larger cities. Progress in the Santa Anna schools has been unexcelled during the past few years, under the direction and guidance of the Superintendent, R. K. Green.

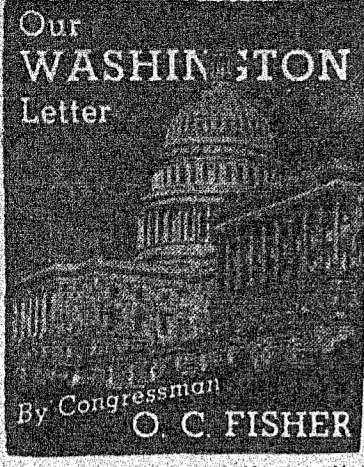

Old timers around the capitol say they have seldom seen a more vicious propaganda drive than that which is now arrayed against our tidelands legislation. By using every subtle technique and clever device they can dream up, they are attempting to fool the American people and prevent the States' confirmation to their offshore lands.

Spearheaded by old Drew Pearson and left-wing columnists who often use their columns to lobby for special interests, the recent outburst of deception and misinformation on the tidelands issue has now been raging

for two weeks. Another lobbyist against the rights of the States has been former Senator Burton K. Wheeler of Montana, now a Washington lawyer. Wheeler represents a group of lease claimants who have filed what they hope are priority leasing rights to the rich offshore minerals along the California coast line. Millions of dollars are involved and Wheeler is leaving no stones unturned.

A special interest crowd recently organized what they call the "Citizens Committee Against the Offshore Oil Grab." They are spending vast sums in newspaper advertisements, captioned "The 300-Billion Dollar Oil Giveaway", while their columnist co-conspirators are beating the drums for them.

In their attempt to poison the public mind and keep the people confused these lobbyists whine about the big "Oil Lobby" trying to steal the people's oil lands. Actually there is no such thing as an oil lobby in connection with the tidelands fight. The oil companies have little to gain or lose by tidelands legislation. They get about the same royalty from oil production regardless of who owns the land

where the development occurs. Few if any of the oil companies have taken a stand one way or another on the subject. But the clever and conniving columnists make use of the "Oil Lobby" scare because it implies something sinister and selfish. And they make much of the "giveaway" expression, hoping to arouse public prejudice in that way. One TV commentator the other day said that if Texas is "given" 10 1/2 miles of the coastal area, the U. 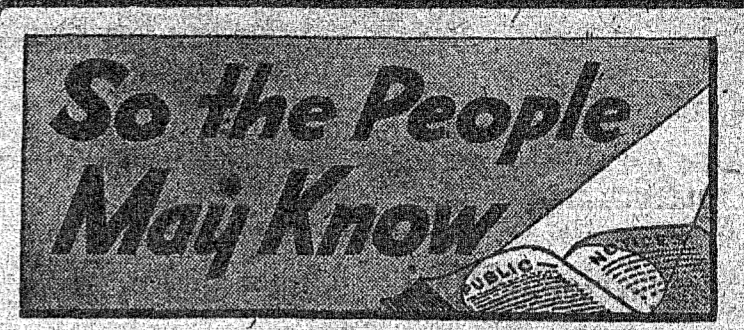

The publication laws of Texas are many. Few attorneys are familiar with all of them, and public officials charged with carrying out these laws may not have a detailed knowledge of them.

This series of articles calls attention to some of the publication laws so as to attract the interest of more citizens in the governmental units that they support with their tax dollars; and to inform government officials who may be in violation of these laws through unfamiliarity with them.

One of the provisions of the law is that the tax assessor and collector must by the first of April each year prepare the delinquent tax rolls of water control and improvement district.

Directors of water control districts must publish the delinquent tax rolls in a newspaper. The law says:

"Art. 7880-72. Water — publication of delinquent tax roll of water control and improvement district.

"The tax assessor and collector shall on or before the first of April each year prepare a delinquent tax roll, showing all charges upon the tax rolls which have not been paid and file same with directors of said district. The directors shall publish said delinquent tax list showing name of owner, description of property, and total amount due, in a newspaper published in the county where said district or any part thereof is situated. Said notice shall be published once a week for two weeks. If no newspaper is published in the county said notice may be published in a newspaper outside of the county. There shall be paid to the newspaper for publishing such a notice a reasonable fee fixed by agreement, not to exceed, however, twenty cents for each rendition or each tract of land, allowing not to exceed three lines single column thereto. The publisher of such notice shall file in the office of the district a copy of each issue of the paper containing said notice with affidavit of publication attached thereto. The notice herein provided for to be made by publication is intended to be for the information of all taxpayers and shall not be, or be held to be, a requisite to the filing of any suit for the collection of taxes and such suits may be filed without publishing such notices"

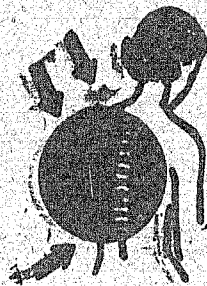

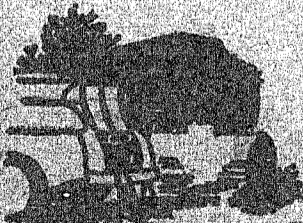

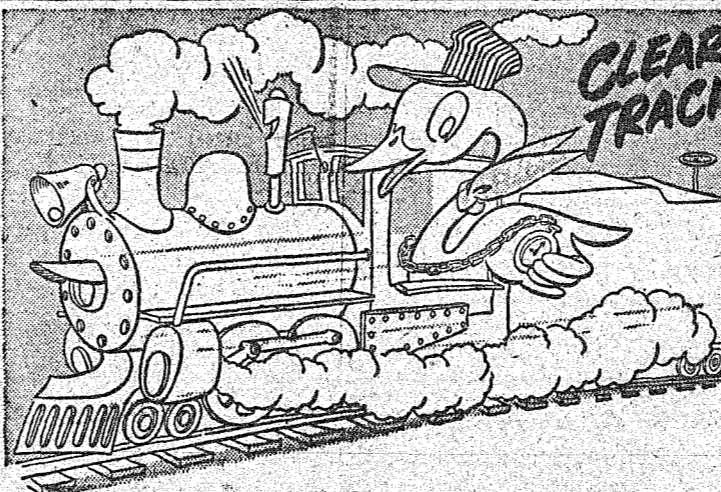

The dogs must be alive when brought in and must not be registered or licensed.

In order for an owner to claim a dog after he has been impounded, the owner must claim him within three days and pay all charges against the dog, have him vaccinated against rabies and licensed, before he can be released from the pound.

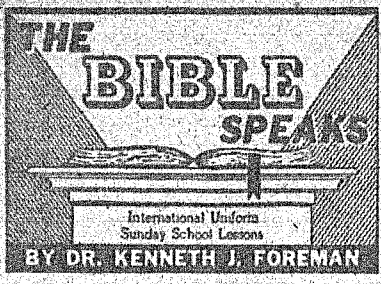

Accountable to God
Lesson for March 15, 1933

WE all know that "responsible" is a good word, even if we might have a hard time saying exactly what it means. A person feels responsible when he knows that it's up to him to make good, and knows that some one will have the right to ask him: What about it? Somebody knows about this job I am doing, somebody cares, so I will have to give him an account of what I have done. I shall have to satisfy him that I have done my best. If I fail, he will lay me out for it. If I succeed, he will praise me and see that I get my reward.

The Irresponsible

People shift into grades, just as peas or potatoes do, only not on the basis of size. People can be graded according to their sense of responsibility. At the bottom of the human heap are the irresponsible. This doesn't include babies and idiots, who can't help it. The irresponsible who really cause trouble in the world are the people who ought to be responsible, but aren't. They can't be depended on to do any job well, or at all. They never hold any job long. They have no pride in their work, no self-respect. They never carry their end of the log, they neither work nor worry, and they are no good.

Some distance above the irresponsible type are those who will give an accounting only to themselves. They don't like supervision, they don't like to ask if what they are doing satisfies anybody but themselves. They don't want their work or their lives inspected. If they suit themselves that is all they ask. Such persons make good artists, but they are too often undependable and antisocial, because they just don't care what other people think. It

is a childish attitude, after all. We all go through this stage; but if we don't pass beyond it we really cannot call ourselves grown up.

"Is He Well Liked?"

On a higher level are those whose "boss" is popular opinion. Willy, in "The Death of a Salesman," keeps asking the same two questions about everybody. "Is he liked?" and "Is he well liked?" Willy would feel the world caving in on him if he could not say "yes" to both questions about himself. One thing that makes "Death of a Salesman" one of the most moving tragedies of our time, is that Willy finds out, too late, that a man can be well liked and still a failure. Popular opinion makes a poor boss.

Above Willy's level are those who feel accountable, not to everybody and anybody, but to the "best people." If they can satisfy a small but select group they are quite contented.

If such a person is an artist, he will crave a good word from perhaps just one discriminating critic. If he is a legislator, he will receive special gifts from special people and he will vote to please those people. These persons may have high standards. (It depends on the kind of people they try to please) but they do not often serve the public well, just because they really don't care for the public nor for what people may think.

To God Alone

There is, after all, one final Judge. There is One whom all men are responsible, to whom we must give an account of ourselves. At the very top grade of humanity are those who heart's deep prayer is to be pleasing to God. This is the highest form that responsibility can take.

Now this need not be in conflict with accountability to man. Only a stupid hired man would say to the farmer: "I don't care whether you like the way I handle the tractor. I'm working to please God, not you." A person who will not do his best on his job is not likely to please the Lord. Nevertheless, in the long run, it is God's voice we shall all have to hear, and his verdict is what will count. And as Jesus so vividly prophesied, the thing God wants most to inquire about is how we treated our fellow-men.

Humanity is everybody's business. No matter how well we may please our various bosses in this world, or how well we do our particular jobs, we shall not be a success, after all, if we have failed in God's eyes.

thors, composers or artists on works such as books (which includes not only bound volumes, but also pamphlets, leaflets, and even single sheets), periodicals, speeches, plays, musical compositions, phonograph records, works of art, maps, photographs and motion pictures.

Some articles are difficult for an untrained observer to classify. Printed forms are an example of such an article.

If the form is a card or sheet having a peculiar shape or physical structure (such as perforations or notches in certain positions) that adapts the card or sheet for a particular use, so that it amounts to a new article of manufacture, the card or sheet would constitute a subject coverage by patent rather than by copyright.

If the same or another card or sheet bears graphic matter such as a written text, a compilation of figures or of other data, a chart, or a diagram, the graphic matter (as distinguished from the card or sheet itself) would be subject to coverage by copyright rather than by patent.

The function of a patent or copyright is to give its owner the right to exclude all others from infringing the patent or copyright — that is, from practicing the invention or copying the material. Patents give protection against any infringer who makes, uses or sells the invention, regardless of whether he is a copyist, and regardless of whether he actually knew of the patent. Copyrights, on the other hand, give protection only against a copyist and not against one who independently does the same thing.

A patent runs for seventeen years and cannot be renewed. A copyright runs twenty-eight years and may be renewed once for an additional period of twenty-eight years.

An inventor or author may himself apply for a patent or copyright. However, only persons trained in such work should prepare and prosecute the necessary applications, since it often happens that an unskilled person, because of his lack of knowledge of the law and the procedure, will do irreparable damage to the rights to which the inventor or author was originally entitled. Sometimes rights are forfeited completely through the mistakes of such unskilled persons.

AGRICULTURAL LAWS OF TEXAS

Farming and ranching serve a vital purpose in the nation today, and the demands made upon them have been great in time of war and peace.

The success of farming, or any kind of business, depends upon proper management. Farms and ranches must not only be properly managed locally, but they must also adhere to and be governed, in part, by laws promulgated by the Texas Department of Agriculture. How well these laws work will determine, to a large extent, the success of these agricultural enterprises.

At various times during the past few years, some discontent has been expressed on various phases of these laws. Since this year is a Legislative year, then it is the logical time to study and remedy certain inadequacies which exist in the law. In some cases, the laws should be more stringent — others should be relaxed, perhaps. But no change should be made which would hamstring the operations of so large an industry as our agriculture. Instead, the laws must provide greater protection not only for the farmer and rancher, but also for sellers and purchasers of agricultural commodities.

Yet, laws should not be made by one man or any one small group of men without the consent and advice of the persons affected. The Constitution of the United States guarantees that laws will be made by the people for the people — and this policy should be applied on the state level. The wishes of those to whom the laws will apply must always be considered before any new legislation is attempted.

In the case of agriculture, the man actually engaged in related farm work is more qualified to make known the needs and to better understand the problems at hand. For this reason, the Texas Department of Agriculture is vitally interested in having their views on new additions or subtractions in present laws.

When good workable policies are achieved through efforts of both industry and legislative action, then continued progress in agricultural fields is assured.

DIFFERENCE BETWEEN PATENT AND COPYRIGHT EXPLAINED

Alert observers frequently notice that some goods or articles

are patented whereas other seemingly similar items are copyrighted. The question accordingly arises as to what constitutes the difference between a patent and a copyright.

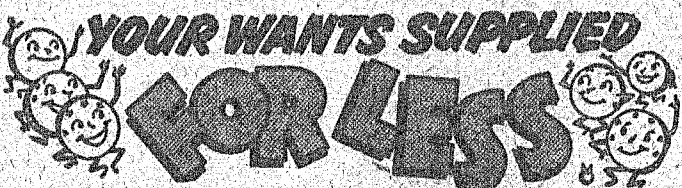
Broadly speaking, patents relate to discoveries that promote the useful arts, while copyrights relate to writings or other works that promote knowledge in any field.

Patents are granted to inventors on new useful articles of manufacture, compositions of matter, methods and processes, ornamental designs of articles of manufacture and certain types of plants.

Copyrights are granted to au-
