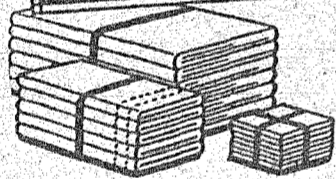

Our WASHINGTON Letter

Texans in Washington last week included a group interested in various phases of our domestic wool industry. On Thursday a hearing was held on the question of disposal of the government's 100 million pound stockpile of wool acquired under the loan program. This accumulation is expected to increase to a total of about 140 million pounds by April. The growers are anxious that it be disposed of as soon as possible, in an orderly way, and it is hoped the military will be able to absorb a portion of this.

Testifying for growers were several spokesmen, including Penrose Metcalfe, chairman of a group representing the National Wool Growers Association. Also participating in the hearing was R. W. Hodge of Del Rio, Fred Earwood of Sonora, Walter Pfleger of Eden and J. B. McCord of Coleman.

Also on the wool agenda for the week was a hearing by the Department of Agriculture on a proposed plan for advertising and promotion of wool and lamb, under Sec. 708 of the National Wool Act, enacted last year. Under this plan a referendum may be held to obtain grower approval of a slight deduction from incentive payments to raise funds for the purpose. The Texans took part in the discussions of a plan that has been formulated and submitted to the Secretary of Agriculture.

Another hearing on Friday dealt with the question of permitting the assignment of incentive payments in advance. The Texans, with Metcalfe being the chief spokesman, opposed the move to allow such assignments. Metcalfe, who also spoke for California, Idaho, South Dakota, Wyoming and

New Mexico growers, expressed much concern that to allow such assignments, with Government approval, would adversely affect the wool market and give an improper advantage to the National Wool Marketing Association. A decision is expected within a week.

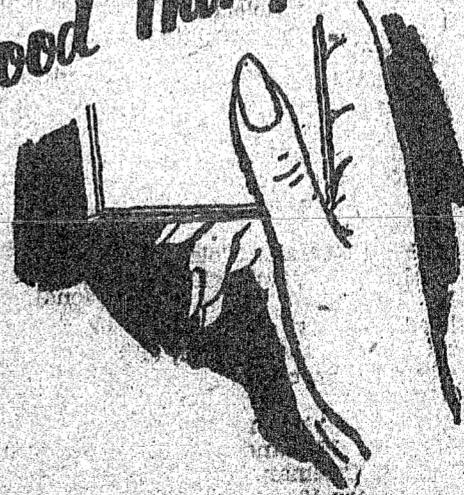

State Capitol NEWS

Austin — Veterans land sale scandals overshadowed law-making in both branches of the Legislature for another week.

Investigations spread still wider. Involved were three departments of the state, both chambers of the Legislature, grand juries of Travis, Bexar and DeWitt counties, and probably others.

More of the approximately 80 "block deals" were brought before investigators.

Mike Rowan, a former executive secretary of the Veterans Land Board, testified that several legislators had exerted "unusual influence" to push veterans' applications through.

He named Senators Doyle Willis of Fort Worth and Warren McDonald of Tyler and Representative Douglas Bergman of Dallas. Rowan said it was "unfair" but he couldn't remember names of the others.

So far Atty. Gen. Shepperd has filed nine suits for forfeiture of block sales and recovery of a total of \$1,539,505 to the state.

Tax Slow Down

With land sales taking legislative precedence, taxes, the Legislature's big problem, have taken a back seat.

Rep. Jerry Sadler sharply reminded the House revenue and taxation committee that the session was one-third over and no revenue bills had been reviewed or acted upon. He demanded an "immediate" hearing on his bill for a \$3.30 per barrel hike on beer tax.

Rep. Charles J. Kirkham of Cleburne offered a new tax plan — a "road use" tax, as a substitute for the administration's two-cent gasoline tax hike proposal. So far the gas tax hasn't been heard by committee.

Kirkham's plan would levy a \$5 fee on commercial motor vehicles, plus a graduated tax scale based on gross weight, ranging from six mills to 22 mills, all estimated revenue to go to highway purposes.

Insurance Clean-up

Final passage of the first major bill to "clean up the insurance mess" was voted by the House. Control of the stock and securities of insurance companies, under the bill, will go to the Board of Insurance Commissioners.

This bill is in for a fight in the Senate where a counter measure would give insurance stock supervision to the securities division of the Secretary of State's office. The Senate bill has been heard and parked in sub-committee.

Water Bills, Too

Favorable report has been given by a Senate committee to the administration's \$100 million state bond issue plan for aid to water districts. Rival measures for the same amount of bonds have been put in House sub-committee.

Passed by the Senate were two of the water bills, regulating pollution from oil wells, and requiring reports to the state by water districts.

Advertising and Newspapers

Representative Vernon E. Smith of Fort Worth introduced a bill specifically prohibiting the Board of Examiners in Optometry from making any regulations restricting optometrists' advertising.

Attorney General Shepperd had previously ruled void, such an order made by the board but rescinded.

Rep. E. "Kika" de la Garza of Mission introduced a bill to prohibit any court, grand jury or legislative committee from attempting to compel a newspaper or press service employee from revealing the source of his information.

Rudder Honored

Newly appointed Land Commissioner J. Earl Rudder received honors this week. He has been promoted from colonel to brigadier general in the U.S. Army Reserves.

He also received appointment to a commission to revisit the Normandy Invasion Beachhead, where he made part of his outstanding military record in the Invasion.

Red Ink

"In the red" for the first time in 13 years is the State Treasury's general revenue fund. Treasurer Jesse James announced that banks have agreed to cash warrants without discount.

Treasury calls were set for the 5th and 20th of each month, and James said the time lag would not exceed 20 days. The general fund is to get back on a cash basis around May 1.

Auto Dealers' Fight

Authorized car dealers won the first round of a bitter fight with the "independents" or used car dealers. A Senate committee voted a favorable report on Sen. Gus Strauss' bill to license all dealers. The bill also would prohibit sale of new cars by dealers not having agreements with manufacturers or distributors.

Sidelights

Expunged from Senate records was a resolution by Sen. Kilmer Corbin calling for the retirement of Maurice Acres, chief executive aide to Gov. Allan Shivers. Only Corbin voted for it — Rep. J. O. Gillham's bill to double college fees was parked in sub-committee, after much discussion in which a large representation of students from the University of Texas took part — Sen. George Parkhouse's labor bill, to prohibit payment of unemployment benefits to workers in an integrated industry was favorably reported by the Senate state affairs committee. The bill is based principally on a case in which Texas Ford Motor Co. employees were idled because of a strike in the East — Offices of the federal district attorney for West Texas are being moved from Austin to San Antonio. San Antonian Russell Wine has succeeded Charles F. Herring of Austin as US district attorney.

New Texas Travel Map Ready

Austin — A special accordion wrap-around fold has been developed and is one of the features of the 1955 Official Texas Travel Map which is being published today, it was announced in Austin by D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer. The old wheeze about needing another map as a guide for refolding an opened travel map is not true of the Texas map, he pointed out.

In addition to the simpler folding used, the map is also easier to read than ever before. The rapid growth of the Texas Highway System has presented more of a problem each year in preparing the map. The system has been growing at the rate of about 3,000 miles a year, he said, and space must be found somehow for this additional mileage.

Most of the topographical relief has been taken off this year, so that more essential information may be read easily and quickly. "The map can also be truly considered a Texas production," Greer went on to say, "since the paper is made in East Texas from Texas trees, and the map is printed right here in Texas too." The colored pictorial side of the map this year features events and state scenes of general interest, and emphasizes the fact that regardless of what you want to see, its in Texas, Greer stated.

One-half million copies of the 1954 map were distributed to travelers last year. Requests were almost equally divided between out-of-state tourists and Texans, Greer said. In addition to being distributed by the Austin Office and the Highway Department's 25 district offices, the maps are distributed through the seven Highway Travel Information Bureaus on the state's borders, and are sent to those who return a special map card which they can obtain when purchasing license plates.

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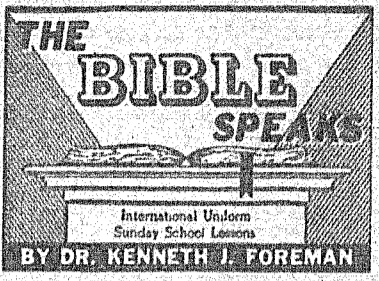

Story With Power

Lesson for February 27, 1955

EVERYBODY knows the words "Minister of the Gospel," but not everybody stops to think what they mean. Literally, the title means "Servant of the Good News." The minister is a man with a story to tell. There are many words to describe a minister, but in Protestant churches the commonest, probably, is "Preacher." This is a Bible word too and it originally meant some one who announces something. The preacher is not a giver of advice, first of all, but a teller of news. The message of the church, if it is faithful to the ideal Christ intended, is first of all, whatever else it may be, first of all a story of what God has done for men.

Story of a Life

A crank-sided philosopher who did not much care for preachers once made the sarcastic remark that a preacher has a very simple job: all he does is to go to a man and say, "God has told me to tell you that you are a very wicked man. Ten dollars, please!" If that were all that preachers could say, it certainly would not be worth ten cents. Men need to be told that they are on the wrong road, certainly. But they know that, sometimes better than the preacher does. What the church is called on to preach—that is, to proclaim, to tell, to persuade men that it is true—is a story. First of all it is the story of a life, the life of Jesus Christ. The earliest Christian preaching of which we have any record told the story of Jesus. The four Gospels which we now have in writing got started as sermons. What we have before us in Matthew, Mark, Luke and John is what the earliest Christian preachers—who, by the way, were all what we call "laymen"—told

people in market-places, in private homes or in synagogues, wherever they could get a hearing—what they told about Jesus, who he was, what he did, what he said. Christian preaching that leaves out the story of Jesus is not really Christian. Preaching that concentrates on the death of Christ and says little about his life and teachings is not New Testament preaching. When the early church put the four Gospels—stories about Jesus—in the front of the New Testament, they knew what they were doing. What is in the front of the New Testament ought not to be out of sight in the church.

Story of a Death

More space is used up, in our written Gospels, telling the story of Jesus' last week, his trial and execution, than is used for any other week in his lifetime. Now that last week was to all appearances a tragedy, coming swiftly to a shameful end. It is not a "nice" story. But the church told it, and still tells it. It was not at all necessary to dwell on it, one might think. All men die; why not Jesus too? But the church was not content to say simply that Jesus died on such and such a day. There was much more to be said, and much of what we have in the Epistles of the New Testament is just more "preaching" only this time not simply telling the story but explaining what it means. The four gospels all say that Jesus died for our sins. The gospels tell us about a cross; the rest of the New Testament tells why that cross had to be. The cross marks the peak of the wickedness of the world. But it also marks the outpouring of the love of God. Nothing else that has ever happened, has expressed the love of God so eloquently as the Cross has done.

To Every Creature

A right church is never like a club. A club has nothing to say to people on the outside. Its members talk to one another, inside the club. But a church has something to say, a story to tell, a story to explain. It is the most important story in the world. You can believe other stories or not and it may make very little difference. But whether or not you believe the story the church has to tell, makes all the difference in the world with you, the difference between life and death. So the church has set out to tell this story of God to every creature in the world. So long as there is still one soul who has not heard it, or does not believe it, the work of the church is not yet done.

Farm Families And Social Security

(Editor's note: This is another in a series of articles prepared for farm families by R. R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager of the Social Security Administration Office in Abilene.)

In our previous articles, we have described the general coverage provisions of the self-employed farmer and rancher, and those working as employees on farms and ranches. In today's article, we would like to describe how farm earnings for social security purposes determined, and reported.

A self-employed farmer or rancher determines his net earnings for social security purposes in much the same manner as the business man has been doing for the past four years. However, the farmer and rancher has a simplified manner of reporting with two options available to him to determine his net income for social security purposes. This does not change the manner or method that the farmer and rancher reports his income for income tax purposes, and the option can be used only for social security purposes.

For low-income farmers and ranchers, those of you who report their income tax on a cash basis, and whose gross income is \$1800 or less, have the choice of reporting your actual net earnings, after taking all deductions allowed by law necessary in the operation of your farm or ranch, or reporting one-half your gross income. Either the net or one-half the gross must be \$400 or more.

For farmers and ranchers whose gross income is over \$1800, you must determine your actual net earnings. If these net earnings, or \$900, whichever you prefer.

Free upon request from Abilene Social Security Office, is an informative booklet called "Facts for Farm Families." This pamphlet should be in the hands of every farmer and rancher, as well as every farm and ranch employee. It describes how you can determine your net earnings from your farm or ranch operations under the new social security amendments, as well as a table showing estimated benefits, how to report your farm and ranch employees, tells how you qualify for benefits, and gives the social security tax

Central Colorado Soil Conservation District News

J. W. Vance, district supervisor living south of Coleman, reported he is seeding 140 acres to madred sweetclover. Vance grew 125 acres of sweetclover several years ago that produced an abundance of grazing and caused an increase of one-third in yields of small grain and grain sorghum following the two years of sweetclover.

Sweetclover is an excellent crop to improve soil fertility. Adding soil fertility is like making deposits to a bank account in that both must have adequate reserves so that withdrawals will meet the needs for continuing profitable operations. The soil fertility balance needs watching as closely as the bank balance to prevent overdrafts. Signs of overdrafts from the soil balance are indicated by plow-pans, high per cent run-off of rainfall, land hard to plow, crusting and sealing over, fast evaporation of soil moisture, land that takes in moisture slowly and low crop yields.

Moisture penetration tests throughout the District indicate that cover and soil condition play a big part in getting moisture into the soil. Moisture tests on the Kenneth Lockett ranch south of Gouldbusk showed 3 inches of penetration on bare rangeland and 7 inches of penetration on curly mesquite grass stubble averaging about 500 pounds of litter per acre. Buffalo, mesquite, and Texas winter grass cover averaging 2000 pounds of litter per acre, showed the moisture had penetrated to 25 inches. In the Gouldbusk area

the moisture was down 20 inches or more on terraced cropland with a fair cover of oats, and 13 inches where there was no cover. On the Gordon Monsey and adjoining farms south of Moxelle, the moisture was down 17 inches on rangeland with 1500 to 2000 pounds of litter per acre. Rangeland with less than 500 pounds of litter per acre, showed only 5 inches of moisture penetration. On terraced cultivated land under last years maize stubble, the moisture was down 9 inches and on terraced land with a fair cover of oats, it was down over 11 inches of moisture penetration.

Unterraced bare cropland on the Tidmore farm north of Rockwood showed the moisture to be down better than 20 inches. On the Marcus Johnson farm north of Rockwood the soil was still soggy wet at 25 inches on bedded terraced land. On bare rangeland, it was 5 inches to dry soil, while under buffalo grass stubble, it was 16 inches to dry soil.

In the Burkett area on the Elmer Key farm, the moisture was down 28 inches or more on rangeland with 2000 pounds or more of indian grass and sand bluestem litter per acre. Under curly mesquite grass with less than 500 pounds per acre, it was down only 9 inches.

The Chester Bouldin ranch in Leaday area, had 4 inches of penetration on bare rangeland and 12 under buffalo grass yielding approximately 2000 pounds of litter an acre.

Archie Bryson who ranches south of Gouldbusk reported he has preparations underway to start pitting and overseeding bare rangeland areas. This practice, to get improved range condition, is becoming more popular each year. Good grass management is essential to bring seeded areas into high production. Bryson plans to plant 30 acres of blue panic grass on cropland for use as supplemental grazing so that complete rest can be given the pastures that have been overseeded.

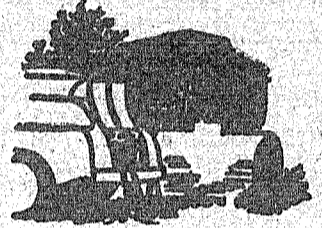

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DROUGHT HAY PROGRAM NEARS CLOSE

A recent order by the United States Department of Agriculture proclaimed a February 15 deadline on applications for emergency hay under the Texas drought relief program.

Judging from letters to the Texas Department of Agriculture, some confusion exists among buyers and hay dealers alike, as to the exact meaning of the order.

The February deadline affects eligible farmers who have not yet applied for relief but had intentions of doing so. Local Farm Home Administration offices were instructed to issue no more allotments after that date.

However, the TDA will con-

tinue to use state and federal funds for making payments under hay contracts through March 31. If the farmer already has his allotment, he can make his purchase and obtain delivery before the end of March and still be eligible for reimbursement.

The railroad's 50 percent reduction in rate for hauling hay was also set to expire February 15. The government will continue to pay half the actual cost of transporting hay up to \$10 per ton on all deliveries to eligible farmers and ranchers until midnight, March 31.

Requests for reimbursement of hay transportation costs should be forwarded to the Texas Department of Agriculture, Capitol

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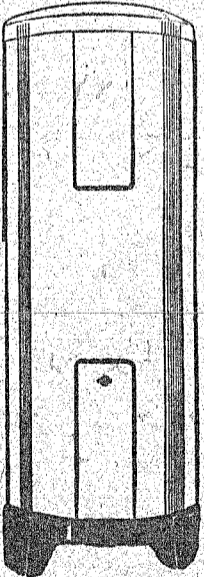
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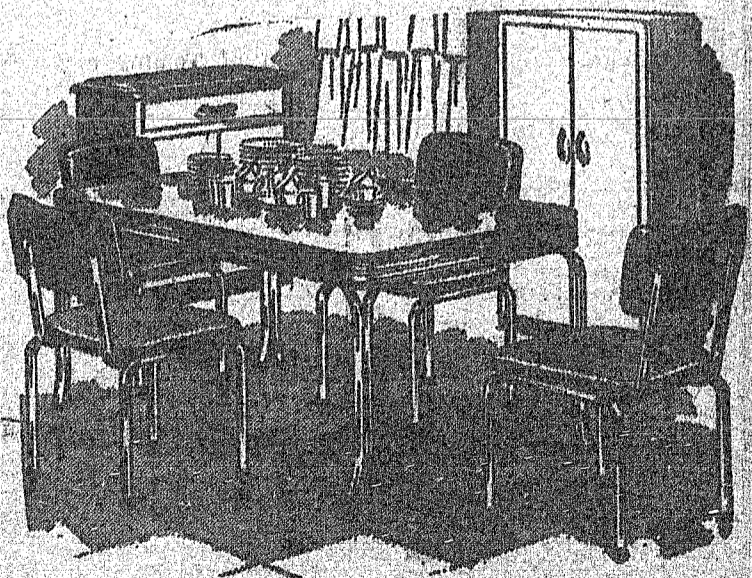
