The Juniors took the opening kick-off on their 3 yard line and in 5 plays had worked across midfield when a fumble cost the ball for them. There was not much action in the rest of the 1st period. During the second period May worked their way to the Santa Anna 24 yard line and lost the ball on downs, the Juniors took over and in three downs had lost two yards and punted to their 44 yard line. Four plays for May gained only 3 yards and the Juniors took over again. On the first play Eddie Hartman faked an end run and dropped a very neat pass into the arms of Kenny Haynes that was good for 37 yards and a first down, 2 plays lost 4 yards and another pass from Hartman to Haynes put the ball on the 2 yard line as the first half ended. The Juniors kicked to May to start the second half and May only gained 8 yards from scrimmage and the ball went over. In five plays the Juniors advanced the ball 56 yards for their first score with Roy Payne going the last 12 yards, and the try for extra point was missed. The Juniors kicked to the May 30 yard line and then recovered a May fumble on the May 33 and five plays later Roy Payne crossed the goal line again. The try for extra point was missed and the Juniors led 12-0. Late in the fourth period the Juniors took the ball on their 44 yard line, one play made 5 yards, then Roy

Payne tossed a beautiful pass to Haynes that was good for 50 yards. Haynes fumbled on the May 2 yard line and May recovered. Two plays later May attempted to pass from the Santa Anna end zone and little Arthur Windham intercepted the ball on the 11 yard yard line and went over the goal line standing up. Hartman passed to Loyd Rutherford for the extra point. Two plays after the kick-off the game ended. The final score Santa Anna 19, May 0.

Funeral Services For Mrs. T. T. Perry Held Wednesday

Funeral services were held at her home Wednesday, at 10:30 a. m., who died on Tuesday, September 20th at 8:00 a. m. in the Santa Anna Hospital where she had been a patient since the previous Thursday.

Rev. Nolan Fisher, pastor of the First Methodist Church, and Rev. W. F. Smith of Waco, a former pastor, officiated at the services. Bro. Smith and wife came at the week end to see Mrs. Perry and it was known she wanted him to take part in her funeral services.

Mary Elizabeth Bond was born near San Antonio February 28th, 1869, being 86 years old at the time of death. She was married to T. T. Perry, October 7th, 1885 at Bracketsville.

They moved with two children to Santa Anna in 1883 to their home in the southwest part of town, known as the Mahoney addition, where they reared their children and which has continued to be the Perry home during the 67 years and to the present time.

Mrs. Perry's health had been falling fast since the first of June and she had been seriously ill the last two weeks.

She was the oldest member in point of years, of the First Methodist Church when she died. She had also been a member of the Order of Eastern Star for many years.

Mrs. Perry's father had a stage coach stand and store at Bracketsville where drivers changed teams. She wrote a story several years ago entitled, "I Remember Stage Coach Days", which was sold to a well known magazine, but has not yet been published.

Mrs. Perry is survived by four daughters: Ida Perry Jones of Shields, Flossie Perry Davis of Los Angeles, Calif., Anzo Perry Steward of San Angelo and Ione Perry Caton of Santa Anna.

Another daughter, Sadie Perry Taylor died in the Perry home exactly two months to the day and hour preceding Mrs. Perry, on July 20th. She had come from San Antonio to assist in the care of her mother. Mrs. Perry is also survived by 6 grandchildren and eight great grandchildren. Also one sister, Mrs. M. L. Peake of Anaheim, California.

Mr. Perry passed away in 1943 at the age of 90.

Former State Senator, A. E. Wood, of Austin, died at his home on Tuesday, September 13. He was a cousin of Mrs. John C. Gregg.

Mr. Wood had been a consulting attorney in Austin for the past several years, and was a member of the original state Game and Fish Commission named in 1929. He was one of the sponsors of the law setting up that agency during the time he served as a State Senator from Austin-Georgetown district from 1920 to 1929. He was considered the "father" of the modern game management in Texas.

Lions Club To Sponsor Broom And Mop Sale

All these items have been manufactured by Texas Blind Workers in Blind Shops, which are non-profit organizations. Prices of these items will run from 25 cents to \$4.50.

Beginning in the late afternoon, every member of the club will be assigned parts of the town to canvass and every house in town will be called upon to purchase some of these items. Money derived for the Club from these sales will go into the Sight Conservation Program of the Lions Club and will be used to purchase glasses and other sight conservation items for the needy.

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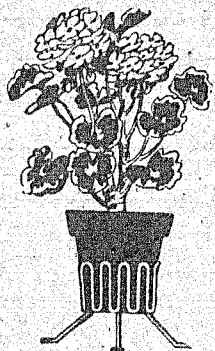
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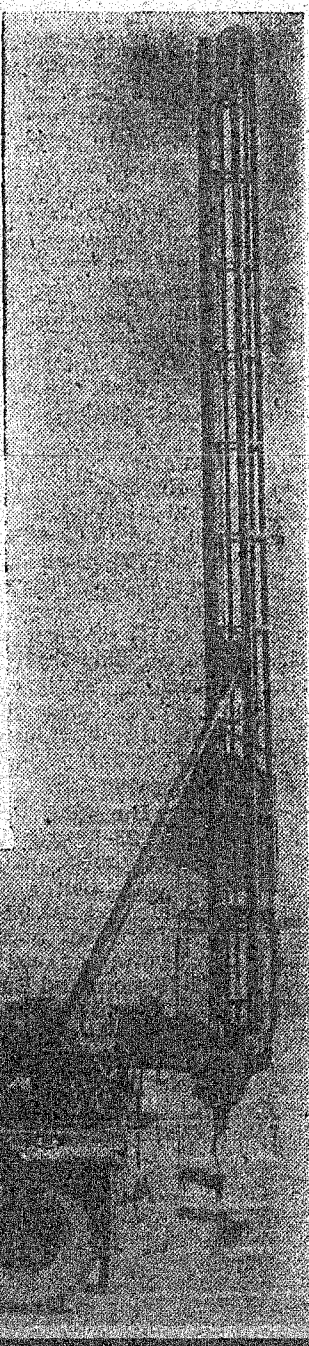

Mystery Farm No. 23 Home Of E. V. Campbell's

Vernon Campbell is the operator of Mystery Farm No. 23, as appeared in The Santa Anna News last week. The farm, known as the E. L. Woodward home place, is located 3 1/2 miles east of town on the Brownwood highway. It is owned by Mrs. Gyna Morrow of Stanton, Texas. She is a daughter of the Woodwards.

Mr. and Mrs. Campbell have lived on the farm for the past four years. The house was built in 1921 and the land was put in cultivation in the early part of the century.

Vernon, a son of the late A. E. and Mrs. Campbell, and Jane McCrary, were married in August, 1942. They have two children, Carol Sue, a Fifth Grade student in the Santa Anna schools, and Buddy, a First Grade student. Vernon has another son, Billy Campbell, by a previous marriage.

The Campbells are members of the Northside Baptist Church and he is a member of the Texas Cotton Ginners Association.

About 100 acres of the 160 acre place is in cultivation. This year Mr. Campbell has 40 acres in cotton, had 40 acres in oats and 20 acres in maize. The oats and maize were almost a complete failure, but Mr. Campbell said he got some grazing from them. However, his cotton is looking fairly well. He said he would make almost 1/2 bale to the acre of cotton, which seems to be about the average estimate around through this section of the state. He runs a few head of cattle, but does not stick to one particular breed. He said his favorite crop was cotton and his favorite livestock was cattle.

The Campbells also own and operate the Campbell Gin, located in the south part of town. The gin is ready to operate and they ginned their first two bales of the season on Saturday. Improvements at the gin include a new office building and new scales and they have added some new cleaning equipment to the gin, with the hope that it will improve the grade of cotton ginned there. Last year they only ginned 300 bales of cotton, but are expecting around 1000 this year.

House Of Our God

Lesson for September 25, 1955

WHY support churches? The first thing we need to understand about this, as Christians, is that support of the church is not optional, but a "must." During a year's time every citizen is confronted with more "causes" than most of us can keep up with. We are invited to share in many good works; orphanages, schools for the blind, boys' towns, foundations for the study of various diseases, hospitals for crippled children, the Red Cross, all sorts of things. Most of us have to decide which we shall send our few dollars to, and which not. But if a Christian thinks he has a right to decide whether or not to support the church, he does not understand what the church is. The central reason why the church calls for the support of the people of God is that it is the "house of our God."

Here God's Will is Sought and Taught. Are we talking about the real church or are we idealizing it? Well, of course no church is quite ideal. But taking the church by and large, these things are true, the church at its best wants them to come true, this is what it is driving at. For the church is the only place in town where large groups of people join in trying to know the will of God, and how to find it and how to do it. The church is the place where problems, personal and/or social, can and ought to be discussed in the light of God's Word and Will. It is the place where life is looked at in the light of heaven. A church that does not live up to its high calling is hardly worth support; but a church where there is a sincere effort to know what God wants for this community and for our part in it, a church where there is brave and honest opportunity for minister and people to think and to study and to speak out for God and his ways, a church which by prayer and service keeps the door open toward God, such a church is indeed a House of God; how can a Christian refuse to support it?

Here They Know You If those poor people in ancient Jerusalem pledged themselves to support the house of God, we who are Christians have even more reason to do so. For one thing, the church is where we really belong. Where else in the world is a person recognized for what he is, a child of God? Elsewhere you are a statistic, a consumer, a customer, a tax-payer, a coat item, a voter. These may be important facts about you. But the most important fact about any human being is not that he is like the human race, important though that is. The big fact is that every human being is made by God, for fellowship with him. Every man alive is a child of God. Either he knows that or he does not know it. Vast numbers of the human race live as if they were orphans of the world, they live pig's lives like

the prodigal in Jesus' parable. But no one will tell them they are children of God. No one will tell them of the Father's house, no one will recognize them for what they are. Only in the house of our God.

Here Citizens Are Trained

There are very shortsighted people who may tell you that money put into support of the church could better be spent in civic improvement, such as better schools or sanitation. On the contrary, supporting the church is the best thing that can be done for the betterment of society. It cannot be said too often: even if the church were only a listening post, even if a church did nothing at all but hold a meeting on Sunday, even if a church might as well be laid flat in ashes six days in the week, for all the work it does—still, even if it did no more than hear God's messages once a week, it would be doing a great and unique thing. For the people who hear those messages and believe them would come to know their true relation to God and their duty in his sight; they would live not as animals, not as the "beasts that perish" but as immortal sons and daughters of the Most High. Then if the church is more than a listening post, if it puts its members to work, they will be actually taught and trained in Christian living.

Here God's Will is Sought and Taught.

Are we talking about the real church or are we idealizing it? Well, of course no church is quite ideal. But taking the church by and large, these things are true, the church at its best wants them to come true, this is what it is driving at. For the church is the only place in town where large groups of people join in trying to know the will of God, and how to find it and how to do it. The church is the place where problems, personal and/or social, can and ought to be discussed in the light of God's Word and Will. It is the place where life is looked at in the light of heaven. 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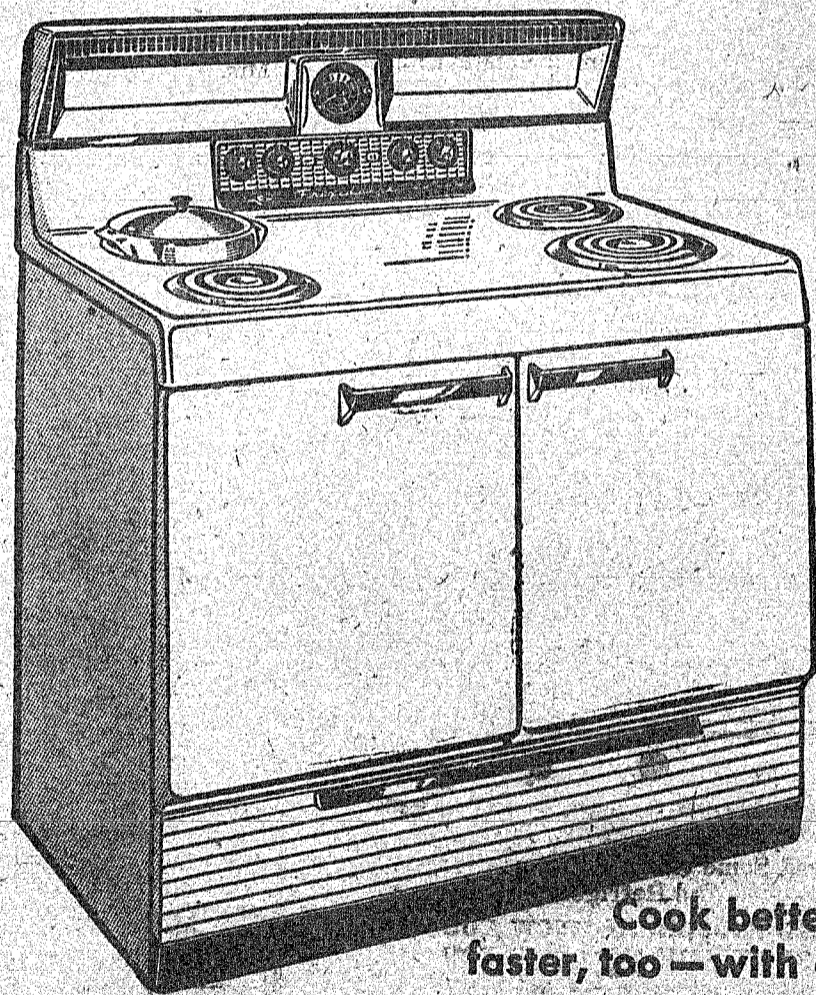
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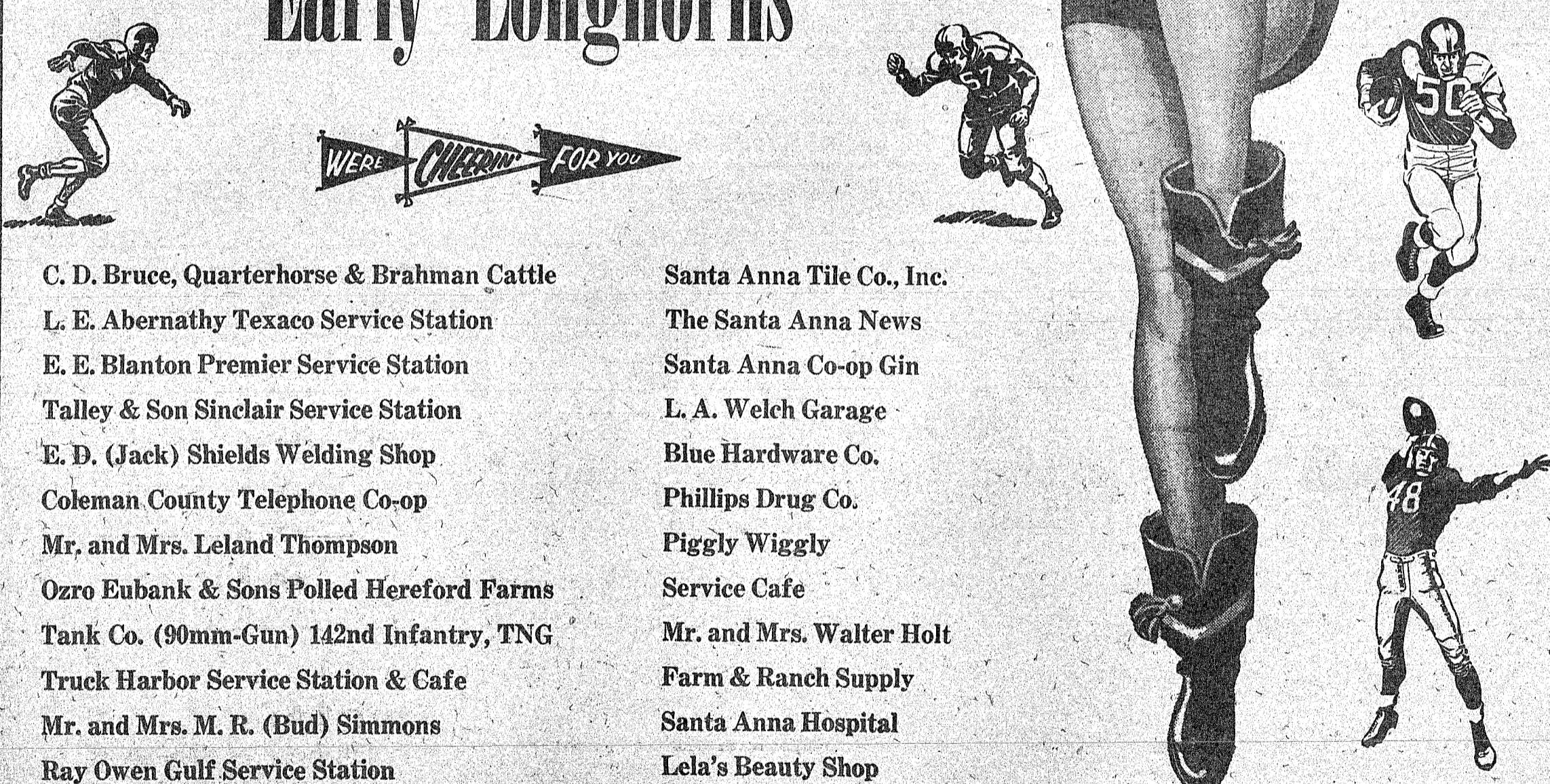

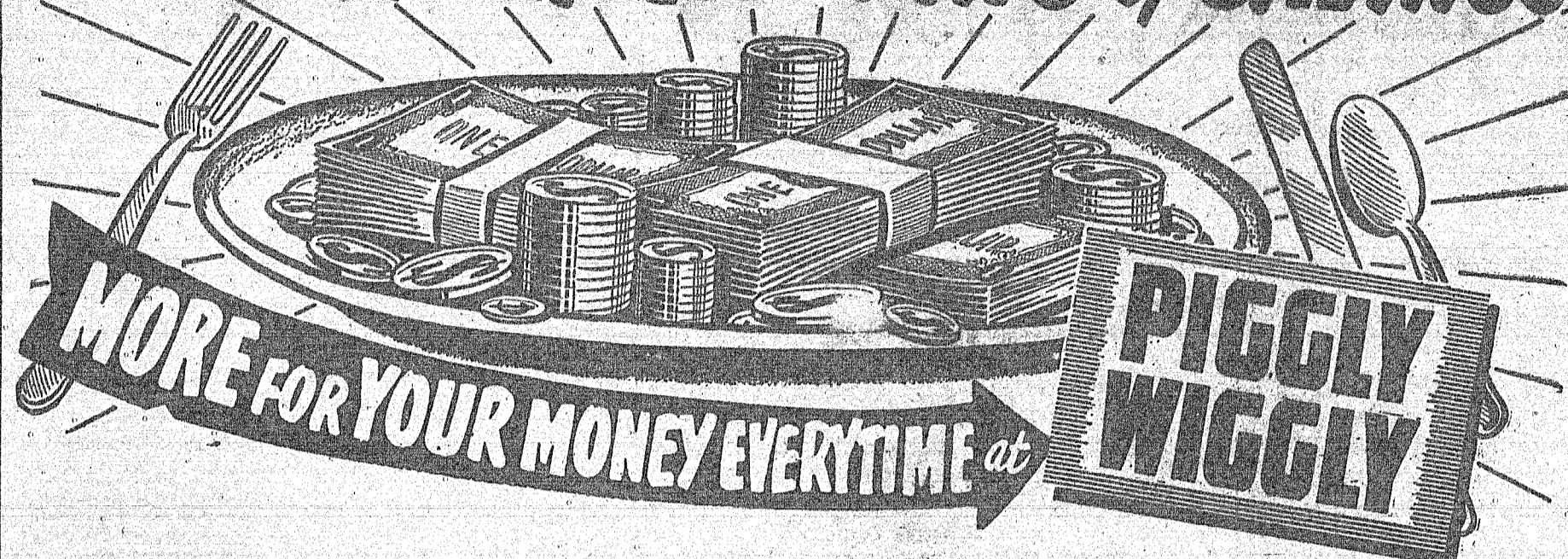
