## Negro School Construction Underway

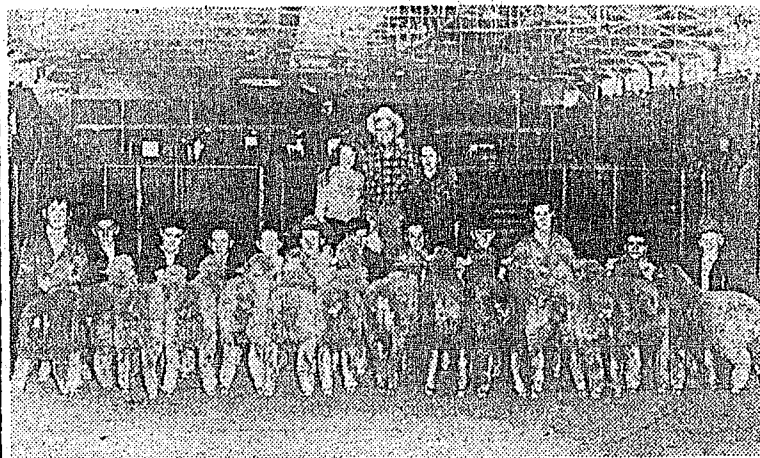
S. C. Wagner is the contractor on a 20' x 40' building, located in Block 10 of the Mahoney Addition, in the southwestern direction from the Wallace Collins Garage, that will be known as the Santa Anna Negro School.

The building will contain two rest rooms, one large class room and will have two entrances. It will be of frame construction with asbestos siding and roofing. It will have oak floors, with sub-floor and celotex ceiling. The walls will be of plywood and sheet rock and there will be a 30-ft. concrete walk in front of the building.

Harrell Cupps is the electrical contractor and Bill Rusk is the plumbing contractor. The building will have semi-indirect lighting, the same as used in the new elementary school building.

## "Onward For God And My Country"

The Boy Scouts of America observes its 46th birthday during Boy Scout Week, February 6 to 12, with its membership at an all-time high of 4,100,000 boys and adult leaders. Since 1910 more than 24½ million Americans have shared in its leisure-time program. There is scarcely an American family that does not know of Scouting first hand.

To mark this birthday the organization launches a Four-Year Program with the theme "Onward for God and My Country."

The Boy Scouts of America seeks "through organized and trained man power to give an increasingly better program to an increasing number of the nation's youth," says Dr. Arthur A. Schuck, Chief Scout Executive, and to "help today's youth to 'Be Prepared' as citizens of character, to be prepared in body, skill, spirit, will, and as a member of a team."

The Chief Scout Executive feels that this program is launched at a time when it is evident that increased emphasis on our free way of life is important. For the safety and welfare of the United States, he holds, a patriotism of the highest type is essential, a patriotism built on a firm spiritual foundation.

"As Scouting now influences the lives of three million boys," he says, "we must help them to the realization and acceptance of God as the guiding power of the universe. We must interpret and find additional methods to help a Scout in his own religious life to fulfill his obligation to God as stated in the Scout Oath and Law."

The "Onward for God and My Country" program also seeks to give youth opportunities to develop physical fitness, self-reliance, a sense of personal responsibility, a spirit of helping people, a willingness to share, and an understanding of government's democratic processes.

It is a program worthy of the support of all Americans interested in youth.

The March of Dimes drive in the Santa Anna area has surpassed the \$750 quota and money still continues to come in. Well over \$1000 has been deposited in the Santa Anna National Bank. The drive will be completed at the end of this week with the picking up of the March of Dimes containers that are located in the local stores, which is expected to yield several more dollars for the drive.

The planned activities for the March of Dimes all surpassed the amount expected. A total of \$39.00 was pledged on the KRBC-TV program on January 21; the Mother's March on Polio last Thursday netted \$493.05; the National Guard Peanuts for Polio Blockade on Saturday netted \$361.27; and the KSTA March of Dimes House Party on Monday saw pledges in the amount of \$26.01. There have been a number of small contributions deposited by individuals at the bank and several have left their contributions at The News office. A tabulation of all money turned in on Monday amounted to \$1,024.06. A final tabulation will be completed at the end of the week and the total will be announced next week.

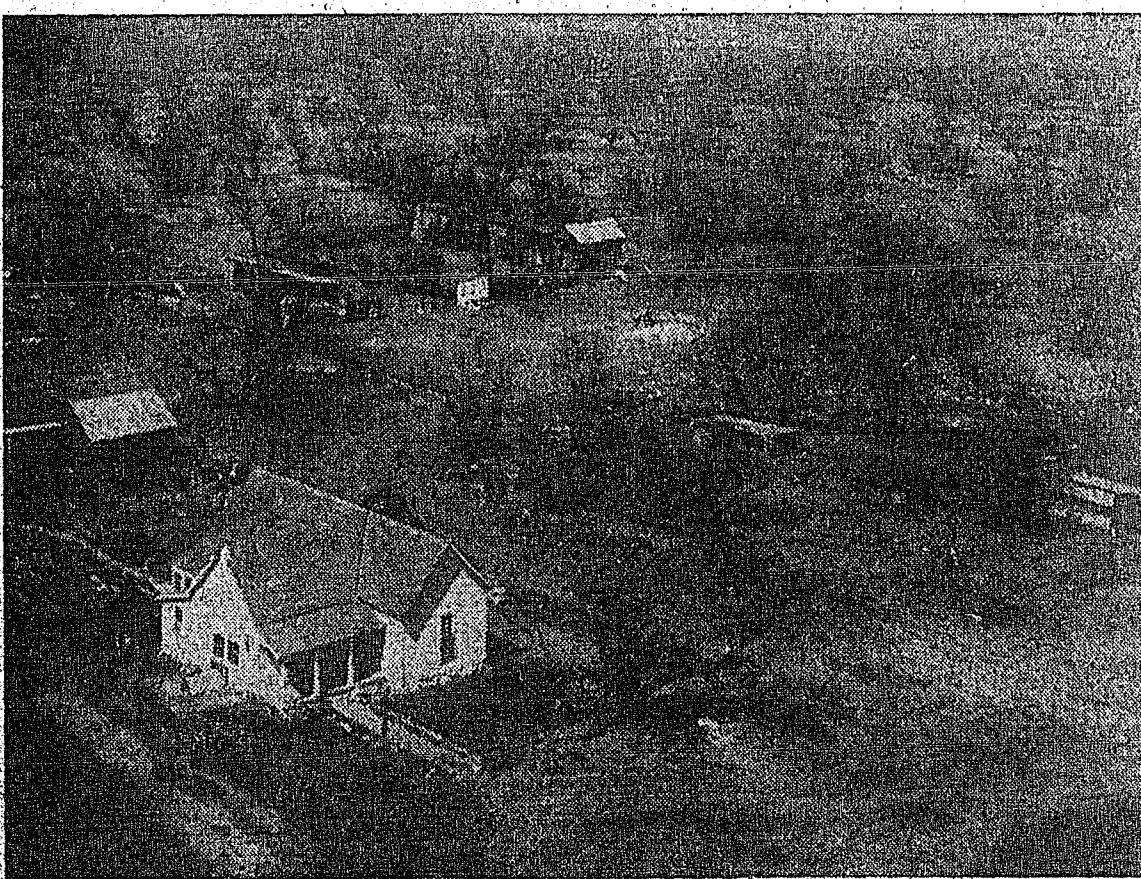

# R. L. Todd Is Owner Of Mystery Farm No. 42

Mr. and Mrs. R. L. (Dick) Todd are the owners of Mystery Farm No. 42, as appeared in The Santa Anna News last week. The farm is located about 2 1/2 miles east of Santa Anna, about 1/2 mile north of Santa Anna-Bangs highway. Mr. Todd can be seen in the picture, standing in the front yard.

The Todds purchased this 167 acre farm from the Dr. T. R. Sealy Estate in 1939 and lived on the farm nearly 17 years before moving to Santa Anna the past December. They are now making their home at the corner of North 8th Street and Avenue B.

Mr. and Mrs. Todd were married on November 11, 1900 in Rice, Texas. She is the former Luda Guthrie, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Guthrie. They came to Santa Anna in June 1904 and have been in this vicinity most of the time since. Mr. Todd is an experienced natural gas man and during 1926-27 he supervised the construction of putting natural gas in the city of Comanche, and in the few following years that time he worked in several other gas field locations. After leaving the gas business, Mr. Todd put in a dairy just west of town and operated that for 12 years. During the war years he closed his dairy and devoted all his efforts to farming, and raising cattle for market purposes.

The Todd country home has all the modern conveniences along with a number of barns and other out buildings for storage facilities and raising livestock and poultry. During the past few years Mr. Todd terraced the 55 acres in cultivation and killed the mesquite trees on his pasture land. He also enlarged the three tanks on the farm. The Todds have three sons and two daughters, four grandsons and one great-grandson.

The Dosters have a son in military service in Georgia; Sprout has one son and the only grandson; John Allen has one son, and the George's have one son.

The Todds are members of the local Methodist Church and he is a member of the Masonic Lodge. He said he did not have any hobbies.

Asked what his favorite crop was, Mr. Todd said "small grain and particularly oats." He said he had not planted any cotton since 1919 but sticks to small grain farming altogether. He runs a few head of cows and raises some calves for market each year. He likes a mixture of

Hereford and Jersey, usually lets the calves stay with the mother cow until about seven months old then puts them on feed for a few weeks just before he markets them.

Mr. Todd said he had all his cultivated land sowed in oats and it looks like he will have a fair stand. They were dry-sowed and the light rain in early December brought up some of the oats and he thought they were dead, but now it looks as though most of them are going to come out.

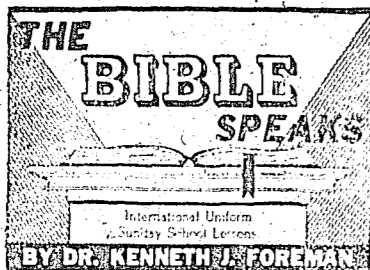
Some people are determined to do something about the Useless Gift Problem—they're holding a "White Elephant Party" Saturday at the Community Hall.

### Gratitude

Lesson for February 5, 1956

GRATITUDE is not a lost art; but it is a rare one. Ten men were cured of the same disease at the same time, but only one took time off to be thankful. When you hear people complaining about other people, one of the most frequent complaints is that Scandoo was not grateful. He never said thank you. She took it for granted. They never wrote me. After all I'd done for them, they left me alone. With him it's all take and no give. Many of these complaints are



Dr. Foreman true, although (to be honest about it) many of them come from people who aren't too grateful themselves.

### Why Don't They Come Back?

When Jesus cured those ten lepers, even he seems to have been surprised that only one of them came back to thank him. We don't know, but perhaps we can venture a guess, as to why nine-tenths of those men who had felt the miracle-working power of God, went their unthankful ways in silence. Once man may have thought: "Who knows? This cure may not be permanent. Better not rush around shouting Hallelujah till I see whether this cure is going to stick." Another perhaps said to himself, "Yes, I'm cured. But I'm sorry it had to be that Jesus from Nazareth. He doesn't have too good a reputation with the authorities,—it isn't healthy to be known as one of his friends. I'll play safe. . . . Another one maybe really meant to thank Jesus; but he "lost his address" as we would say. He kept on meaning to, some day—but he never did. And perhaps still another fully intended to express his thanks, but he said to himself, "Just an ordinary hasty Thank-you won't do. I'll wait till I can do something really Big

for him, something that will repay him, perhaps with interest, for what he has done. . . . But the time never came. Aren't these some of the very reasons you and I give for not being grateful to God or man?

### Cause for Rejoicing

Curing leprosy the way Jesus cured it is a miracle in anybody's language. Most of us think we would be grateful for miracles, if and when—; but for ordinary days, the usual course of events, we don't see God's hand and we do not feel any call to be thankful. As a matter of fact, God's mercies surround us on every side. We owe him life to begin with; it was God's creative power that brought life into being, in a universe hitherto lifeless. It is God's providence that has kept the stream of life flowing down the ages; his providence that gave you the ancestors without whom you could not be what you are. When you think of the enormous number of accidents (to call them that) which might easily have prevented your being born at all, and the "accidents" without which you would never have been born on this planet, you begin to see how grateful you should be. Most people, probably, if saved from sudden death, especially if others have been killed right beside them, will breathe a trembling "Thank-you" to God.

### Gratitude and Happiness

When Jesus said to the one grateful man, "Your faith has saved you," he was using a word that means to restore to full life. There is a hint here that gratitude is a flower whose root is faith. Also there is a hint that the thankful mind is the happy mind. People who go through the world convinced that the world owes them a living, people whose prayers are mostly "Gimme," are likely to be a little sour. The world does not give them the lush living they want. God does not answer their prayers when and as they fancy he should. So a seed of unhappiness festers in their minds. But if a man will think every day what he owes to God and to man, if it really dawns on him what a debtor he is, his mind will be bright. All this—for me? he will think; and the thought will be a seed of happiness blossoming under sun and cloud. Time spent in being grateful—in living-out gratitude, is never wasted. It is a mark of the healthy mind and spirit.

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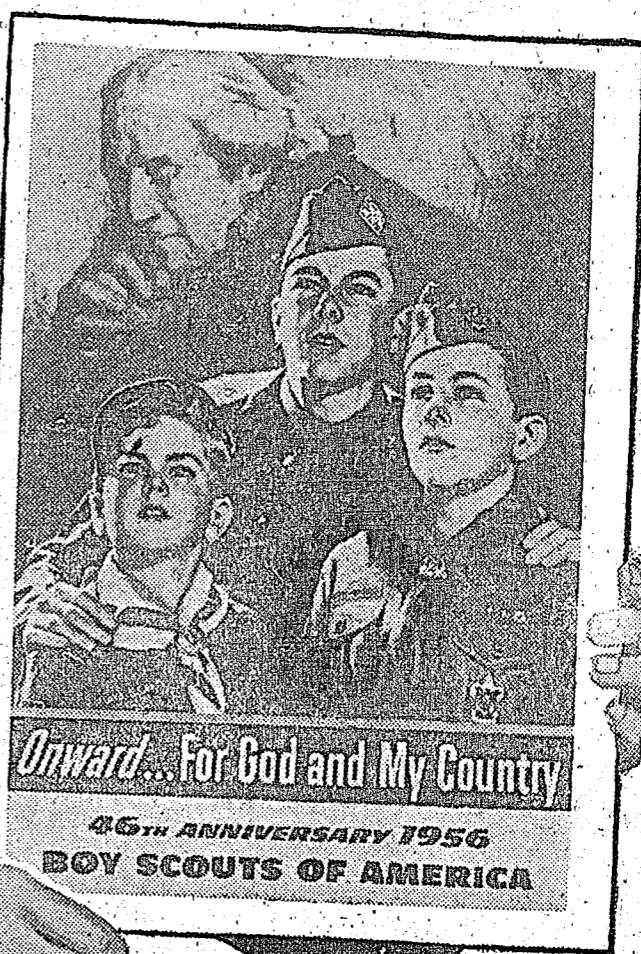
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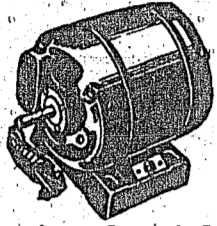

been afflicted with arthritis lately, but is improving somewhat according to last reports.

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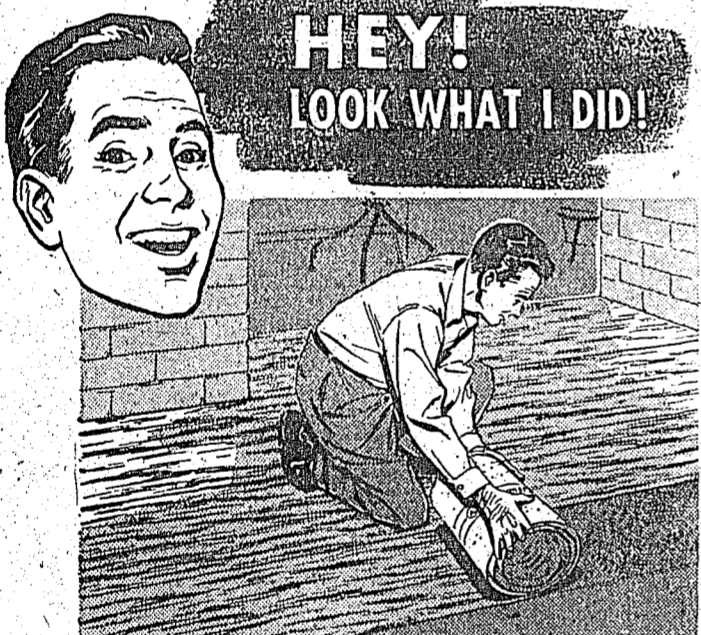


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### Self Culture Club Met With Mrs. Harris

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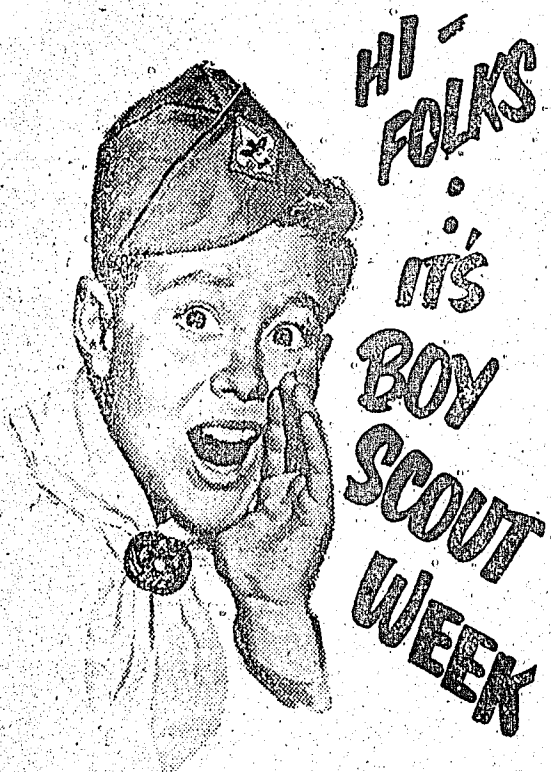


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
