Teens Kept Out Of Adult World

The local editor and Blair Justice of The Fort Worth Star-Telegram have written columns, the ideas of which were very similar with regard to the above named topic "Teens Kept Out Of The Adult World."

Mr. Baker speaks from experience. Mr. Blair quotes the eminent Dr. James L. Dennis of the University of Arkansas School of Medicine who recently spoke in Fort Worth.

About giving youth genuine preparation for adulthood, he mentioned the segregation of youth from adults in every walk of life including the school and church, recreation and home. Then he notes that there are all kinds of rules and regulations against employment (as well as exploitation) of the young, so we build a recreation hut or open a basketball court where they are expected to become responsible citizens; or if they flunk out in school the government plans a workcamp for more segregation.

Dr. Dennis, Mr. Blair says, has grave misgivings about the part of the anti-poverty drive that would hustle the young off to where they would be busy doing something.

Dr. Dennis would prepare the youth for being tomorrows leaders by giving them a taste of participating in city council meetings and of working (in free time) alongside of responsible adults and following some of the more admirable around. . . . It appears time to let the young get their feet wet in the business of the grown-up world.

Is it not true that the law against employment should be amended to allow youth to apprentice in business as well as on the farm?

This item could have been written by Ken, Freddie, Mike, Pat, Manning or Joe. But it wasn't.

Did you know that Attorney General Waggoner Carr sponsors and directs a youth program annually for high school youth, for the purpose of solving teenage problems and particularly for promoting ideas in character development?

These are opportunities knocking at the door; a third is the Howard Payne's Annual Americanism program to which representative students are invited.

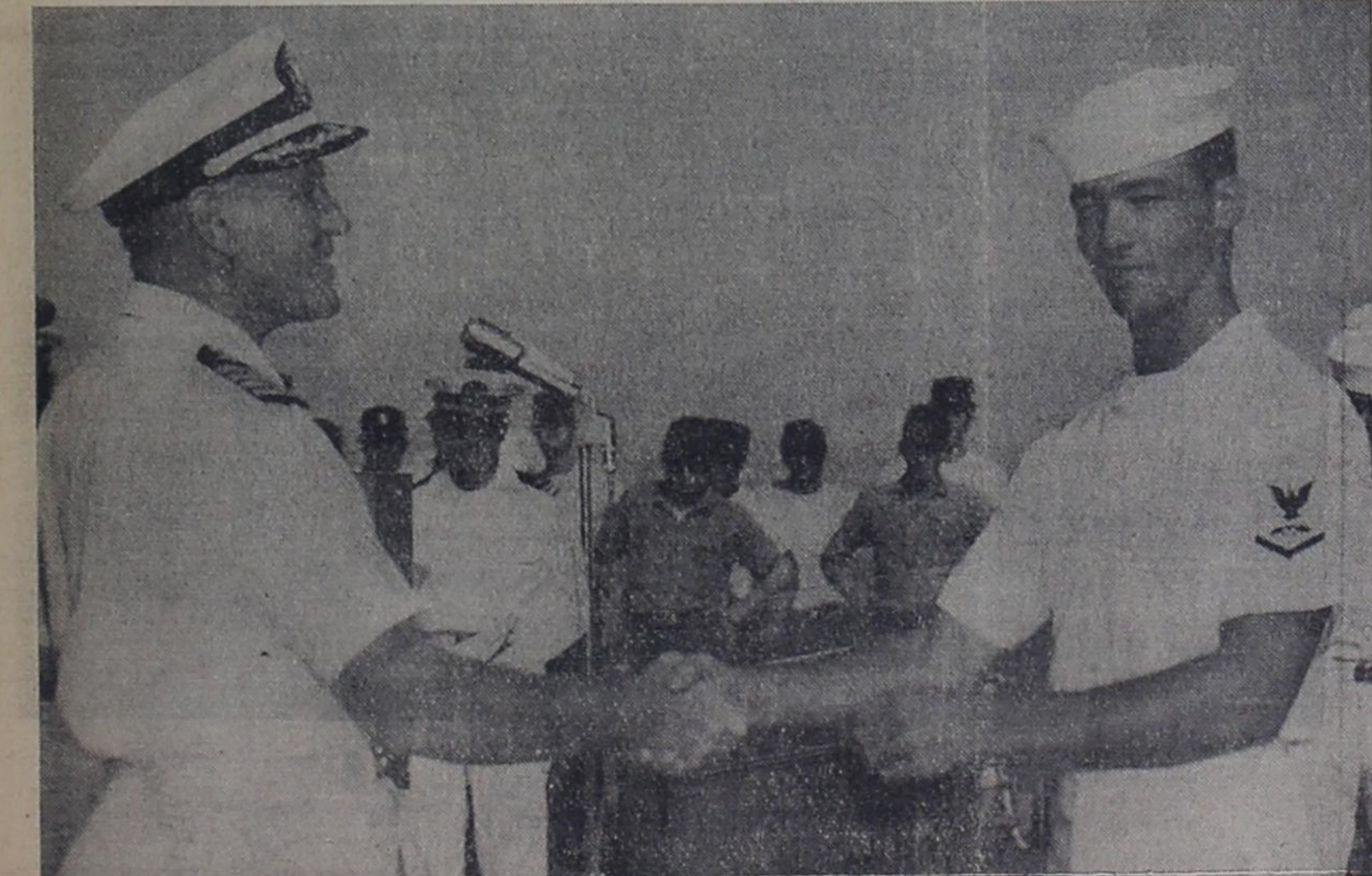

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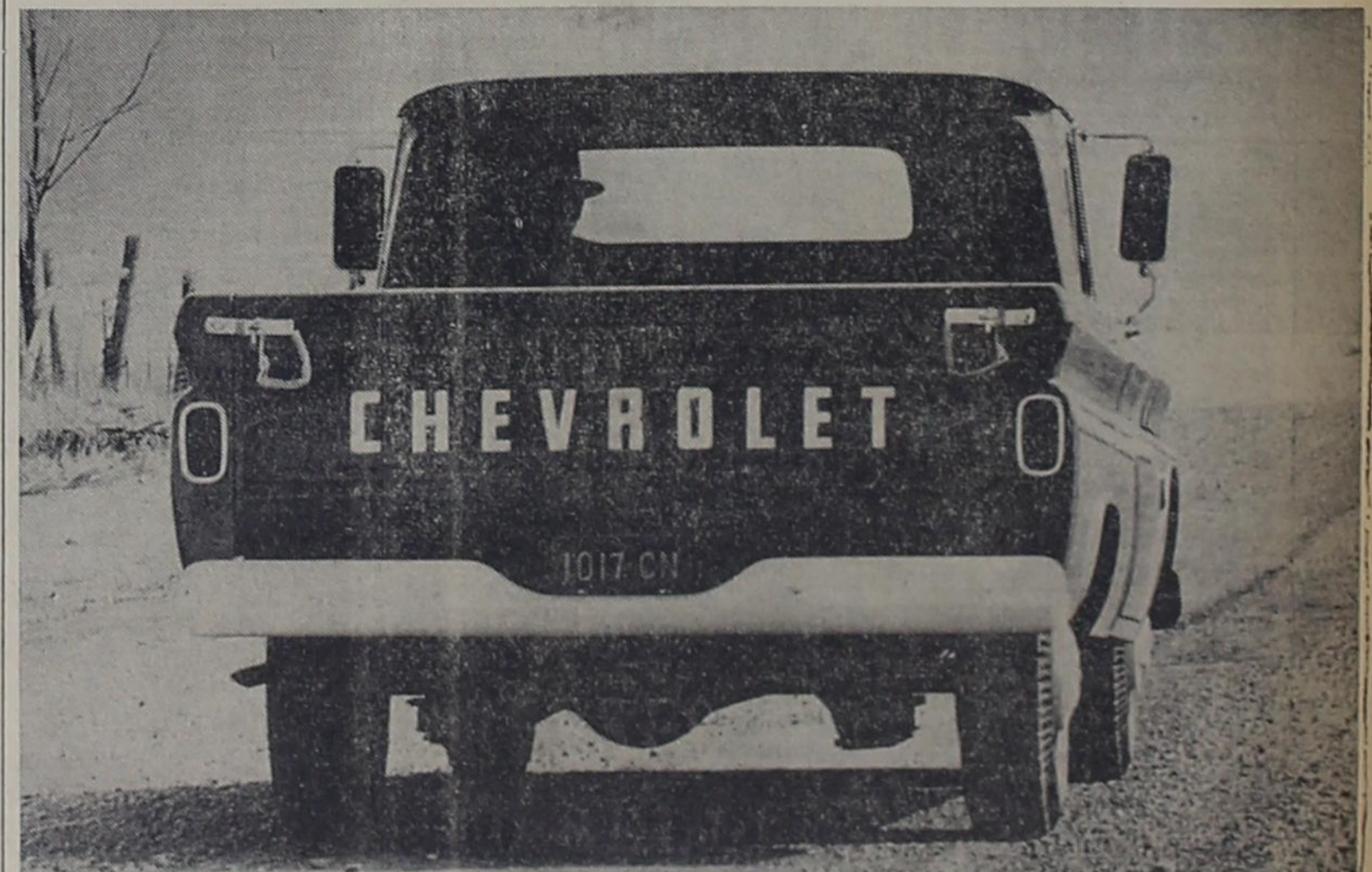
