#### Fans flock from game

The gates to Joe Riley Stadium in Charleston, S.C., were padlocked for a recent game between the Charleston Riverdogs and the Columbus RedStixx, keeping hundreds of fans gathered outside the ballpark until the game was declared official and the attendance was recorded as zero.

Nobody — not even the fans saw the Charleston Riverdogs lose 4-2 to the Columbus RedStixx.

The Charleston Riverdogs continued their outlandish tradition of "Nobody Night" — a promotion designed to set the record for professional baseball's lowest attendance.

#### Paper wants shirts left on

In Beijing, they're known by the nickname "bare-chested masters."

The Beijing Youth Daily, vexed at what it calls a "little bad habit" unworthy of a modern Olympic metropolis, has put its eyes where its city's stomachs are, running random photos of Beijing's topless men to shame them into putting their shirts back on.

# Commissioners' court opposes cloud-seeding

The Bailey County Commissioners' Court unanimously passed a resolution Wednesday opposing cloud-seeding.

The resolution states that many Bailey County farmers "believe cloud-seeding has resulted in cloud dissipation, rather than rain enhancement, in Bailey County."

It also asks that cloud-seeding be stopped and never authorized in Texas again.

County Judge Marilyn Cox said Commissioner Joey Kindle asked that the resolution be placed on the court's agenda.

Kindle said Wednesday that in his opinion, hail prevention has often been a higher priority than rain enhancement under the program.

Therefore, he suggested, in counties where there is still plenty of underground water, farmers might be likelier to support the program because it cuts down hail damage while their crops are not entirely dependent on rainfall.

That's fine for them, he said, "but we're going to be out of business."

Commissioner C.E. Grant said a simi-

lar situation developed when cloud-seeding was done during the '70s.

"People who had water didn't want rain, so they liked it (cloud-seeding)," Grant said. "It was north vs. south in Bailey County."

Cox said "farmers have said that if they'd had a gun, they'd have shot the plane when the clouds started flattening."

"In the '70s, people did shoot at the planes," Grant said.

# Football tickets to go on sale

People who held reserved-seat season tickets Muleshoe Mule football last year may pick up their new ones at the district administration office, 514 W. Avenue G, beginning Aug. 12.

Those whose names appear on the seating chart may pick up their tickets in person, by mail (with the ticket holder's personal check) or via a third party (if payment is made with the ticket holder's personal check).

The tickets can be picked up during regular business hours. The cost is \$17.50 per person, and the tickets are good for all varsity games.



## West Nile vaccine available

Dr. Barry Cowart of Muleshoe said Friday that local veterinarians are prepared to administer West Nile virus shots to area horses.

The cost is \$15, and two injections (about three weeks apart) are recommended for the first year, Cowart said.

After the first year, annual shots are recommended.

The disease has spread rapidly since its first U.S. detection in 1999, and already has been reported in 33 states.

South Plains veterinarians be-

gan last week recommending that horse owners have their animals vaccinated, on the assumption that a West Texas outbreak of West Nile is likely.

Horses do not become immune to the virus for a few weeks after the first shots, veterinarians say.

The first horse to die from West Nile virus in Texas was near Beaumont. Authorities say the horse developed a stumbling gait in which its left front foot would cross in front of the right, creating an effect like a drunken person trying walk a straight



## District announces free-lunch policy

The Muleshoe School District has announced its policy for providing free and reduced-price meals for children under the National School Breakfast and National School Lunch programs.

Copies of the policy are available to the public at each school and at the foodservice office.

Household size and income criteria will be used to determine eligibility.

For example, children in a household of four people would be eligible for free meals if the annual household income is \$23,530 or below (\$453 per week or below).

## Watermelon field day scheduled

LUBBOCK—Tuesday is the day for the annual watermelon-variety field day at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center north of Lubbock.

The field tour is scheduled for 10 a.m. to noon, according to David Bender, a vegetable researcher at the center. The event is open to the public.

"Participants will have an opportunity to view 36 seeded and seedless watermelon cultivars at this field day," Bender said. "These melons were grown on raised, plasticmulched beds watered by drip irrigation."

Bender and others will explain how the melon trial was planted, cared for and watered during the growing season, plus discuss the results of this year's trial.

"This trial is one of five conducted at different locations in the Texas statewide watermelon trials," Bender said. "The trials are funded by watermelonseed industry. Cultivars include industry standards and the latest releases from commercial breeding programs.

"This is an excellent way to evaluate and compare differences in rind quality,

## 'TLC' may curb underage drinking

whose parents closely monitored their lives were less likely to engage in underage drinking, according to a study at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"These findings have helped us to better understand conditions related to teen drinking," said Dr. James Bray, an associate professor of family and community medicine at Baylor.

"It is important for parents to be aware of their children's whereabouts, and who they are with," Bray said.

A study supported by a grant from the National Institute of Alcoholism and Alcohol Abuse annually surveyed 7,540 adolescents over a three-year period. Participants were surveyed in five school districts in the Houston, metropolitan area, all ranging from sixth to 10th grade. Fifty-one percent of the subjects were female and represented one of three ethnic groups - white, Mexi-

American

Participants were asked questions about their perception of family stress and conflict within the household. These factors helped to predict which teens were more likely to drink.

Results showed that adolescents who reported high levels of stress and high levels of family conflict were more likely to use alcohol.

Furthermore, parents who were kept informed of their teens' whereabouts were less likely to have children who engaged in underage drink-

Bray offers the following tips to help minimize household stress and conflict:

· Make time for family discussions. Daily talks help to reconnect the family and encourage communication.

 Know where children are and who they are with. Teens are less likely to get into trouble if parents are aware of what they are doing.

· Be aware of how each

can-American and African- child is performing academically. Ask him/her to share ideas learned in school and check over any homework.

· Monitor each child's actions without being overbearing. Giving your child some flexibility to make decisions helps establish parent-child trust; and

· Make household rules and enforce them. Teens in a controlled environment are less likely to engage in substance use.

# Texas barbecue getting its due

Barbecuing Around Texas, by Richard K. Troxell (Plano: Republic of Texas Press, 2000. 302 pp. Illustrations, introduction, index. \$18.95 paper).

As if any of us needed one more item to pack before leaving on a trip, here's a must but only if you're traveling in Texas, and if you love barbecue: Richard K. Troxell's Barbecuing Around Texas.

Up to now, locating barbecue establishments involved following one's nose or relying on a list of 50 Texas barbecue joints compiled by three Texas Monthly staffers for the May 1997 issue.

The magazine claimed to have discovered the best barbecue in Texas (a claim with which Troxell takes issue), but as we all know, when it comes to barbecue, opinions are like smoke —worth every scent.

Let me begin by saying there are only two things wrong with Troxell's book:

First, the entry for Cooper's Old Time Pit Bar-B-Q in Llano was inadvertently omitted by the printer (Cooper's made Texas Monthly's list and mine, for what it's worth - as one of the top three barbecue joints in Texas);

Second, my opinion is that all books that treat foods, and the ratings thereof, are in fact, reference books and training manuals, and as such should be redesigned with the pages laminated and the covers opening to the size, shape and stiffness of a cafeteria tray. An optional cup holder and paper towel dispenser would

be nice touches also;

And third, who cares about side dishes? Unless they're holding extra helpings of meat, of course.

After thumbing through Troxell's book, a "so many joints, so little time" thought occurred. That was followed by a "why not the best?" thought, and I promptly marked the couple dozen places with 8.5 and above ratings targets for my own sampling forays. Or as Troxell puts it, "testing."

NOTE: Perhaps Buck (or son, Johny) were having an "off" day when the author visited Buck's in Commerce.

Anyway, for the record (I've shared my thoughts with Troxell), and since I've done far more "testing" in the past eight years, in my opinion Buck's rates a consistent 8.5 or better.

You might feel the same about your favorite local joint, but bear in mind that Richard Troxell was on a mission and a glorious mission it was - to seduce all Texas barbecue lovers with the possibility of other, new favorites and to show us the way.

I've already been to several of the author's 8.5-plus selections, and with few exceptions, I rated them as highly as he did.

Idid, however, use my own, totally subjective method (closer, I think, to most folks' way) of determining how much I enjoyed a particular place and its fare.

Here it is: Under normal circumstances, if the smell of the place makes my mouth water, I give it a 10. If I have just finished a full meal less

than an hour prior and a place still makes my mouth water, I give it a 20.

If the place looks like a BBQ joint, I give it a 10. Any item on the menu gets a 10 if I reach the point of loosening my belt in public in order to continue eating.

The same applies if I am unable to swallow but keep stuffing my mouth and chewing.

A waitress who acts as if I don't have sauce or grease on my face and behind my ears gets a 10 unless she asks if I have any room for dessert.

I have shared my personal rating system simply to illustrate the need — and hence Troxell's motivation — to produce such a book to help people like me understand why a particular item tastes good. And, far more importantly, where one is likely to find a higher percentage of those items.

Troxell encourages everyone to "test" barbecue. His rating system is just one way of doing that.

John Troesser, editor of the e - z i n www.texasescapes.com, says Troxell's system should be the standard by which all Texas BBQ is judged, but Troxell readily admits there are others. Who could argue with all that research, though?

Troxell, who rated Buck's a 7, also notes that any given pit master can be "off" on any given day and for any number of reasons. Maybe they got up on the wrong side of the grill, maybe it was improper wood selection, or perhaps they failed to apply the sound principles of firebox feng shui.

On that same given day, rap music and outlandish piercings aside, any given adult's taste in just about anything can vary as widely as say, well, the variations in the spelling of Bar-Be-Q.

As difficult as it is to imagine, there are reports of a few people in Texas who don't care for BB-Cue at all, no matter the raves or ratings.

I'll bet if a study were conducted, those same non-BBQ folks were the same ones who were listening to rap music and skewering themselves on purpose!

Troxell says he had fun traveling, gained insight as well as girth through his exhaustive research, and made friends across the state. But even he is loathe to posit his book as the last word on the subject of barbecue except in Memphis and Kansas City.

In fact, the next word on the subject from Troxell and Republic of Texas Press, More Barbecuing Around Texas (or something like that), is due out next year - unless, of course, all the Texas barbecue joints go out of business.

Oh, there is one other thing wrong with Barbecuing Around Texas, and nearly every barbecue fan is likely to find the same problem: We weren't invited to help with the creation of the book.
