Firemen Quench Flame In Poynor Red Sox 5 to 1

The Volunteer Firemen hardly gave Poynor's Red Sox a chance to start blazing Tuesday night. In the first inning Norman Park pitching for the Firemen, walked McDaniels, lead off man for the Red Sox. McDaniel got as far as third before Bob Love, Stub Poynor and Simpson faded from the plate for three outs.

Gabe Wright, lead off man for the Firemen beat out a bunt. W C Browning sacrificed, sending Wright to second. Hallmark tripled scoring Wright, and then scored on an overthrow to third. Dick Foster and Herb Whitlock could not connect with Simpson's fast ball and went down swinging.

The Red Sox tried to build a fire in the 3rd inning. Eison and Jackson struck out and McDaniel walked. Skaggs batting for Bob Love hit a 2 bagger scoring McDaniel. Poynor popped out. The Firemen kept the blaze under control the rest of the game.

In the second inning Westmoreland (Fats) singled going to 2nd on an overthrow. Parks went out on a high fly sending Westmoreland to third. Barbee tripled scoring Westmoreland. Wayne Eaves struck out and Gabe Wright was safe on an error. Browning hit a high one for the third out.

Simpson pitching for the Red Sox was relieved by Leonard in the sixth. A heated discussion took place in the sixth when Simpson tried to steal third and collided with Hallmark. Townley, backed by Empire Jackson of Cisco called Simpson out and the decision stuck.

The Firemen made their final score in the 5th when Eaves stretched a single into a triple. Wright struck out. Browning hit a long fly to center and Eaves scored. Hallmark went out swinging.

Mrs. H. H. Linder, the widow of the late Rev. H. H. Linder, died at the home of her son, Roy Linder of Loraine, Texas and was buried at the Gorman Cemetery on Monday, July 30th. Funeral services with Rev. J. L. Ray officiating were held at the Gorman Methodist Church at 2:30 o'clock.

Mrs. Linder was born in Georgia on January 15th, 1871 and she was married to Mr. Linder December 9th, 1890. They came to Texas in about 1903. The couple had made their home in the parsonages of a number of mid-west Texas towns during the time of his ministry.

Rev. Linder passed away on March 9th, 1938 at which time he was living with his son, S. E. Linder of Gorman. Interment was made in the Gorman Cemetery. It was the request of his widow that her funeral services be held from the same church, the Methodist and that she be laid beside him.

State Fair To Have Storybook Of Texas Ag.

The Heart of Texas area will have an impressive display of its own as part of the "Storybook of Texas Agriculture" at the 1951 State Fair of Texas, Dallas, Oct. 6-21.

The name "Heart of Texas" will be emphasized through use of a giant cutout heart superimposed on a map of the area, which is Extension District 8 of the Texas A&M College System. Corn and peanuts rate attention as top crops, and will be personalized as figures on an animated swing. Other hearts will be used as frames for displays of corn, cotton, and growing pea-

nut plants. Other products to be shown or illustrated are beef cattle, dairy cattle, turkeys, eggs, clover, pecans, peaches, wool, honey, apples, pears, grain sorghums, turnips, onions, potatoes, and blackeyed peas. Peach and pecan trees will frame the exhibit.

District 8 includes Stephens, Palo Pinto, Eastland, Erath, Brown, Comanche, Mills, Hamilton, Bosque, Hood, Somervell, Johnson, Ellis, Hill, McLennan, Limestone, Falls and Coryell counties.

The Storybook of Texas Agriculture is a unique, new type of agriculture show developed by the fair and Texas A&M. For the first time, every part of the state is represented in the show, through the 14 Extension Districts of the A&M College System.

Age, 36; born September 16, 1914, Dtenos Kaundas, Lithuania; height, 5' 6"; weight, 157 pounds; build, medium; hair, brown; eyes, blue; complexion, light; race, white; nationality, American.

Steinberg, who used the name Sid Stein in connection with his Communist Party work, resided at Jackson Heights, Long Island, New York, prior to his disappearance. From April, 1930, to September, 1932, he resided in Worcester, Massachusetts and prior to assuming his duties as a full time functionary of the Communist Party. Steinberg worked as a meat cutter in New York and New Jersey. He attended grammar and high school in Lithuania and was naturalized in March, 1938, in New York City. He has been in the Communist Party since about 1936 and was at one time an organizer in New Jersey. He also held

other offices in the Communist Party in Camden County, New Jersey, and in 1945 became Chairman of the New Jersey State Communist Party. His parents, two sisters and three brothers reside at Worcester, Massachusetts.

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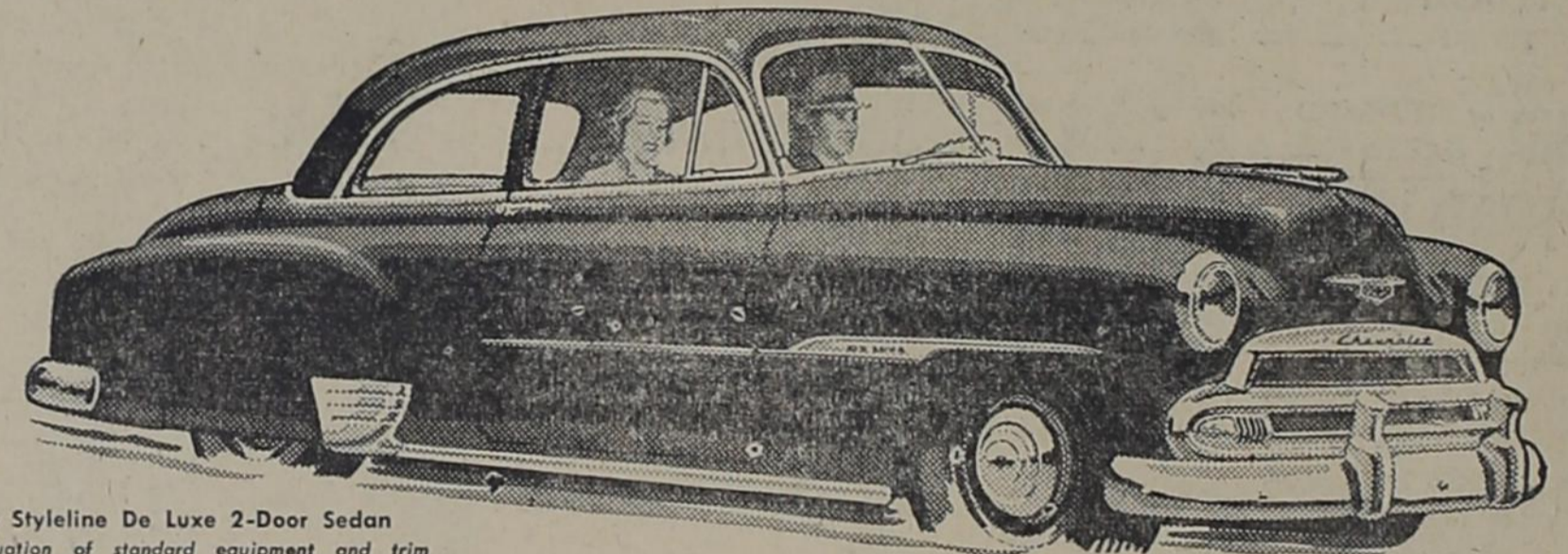

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Bats Feed On Harmful Insects

AUSTIN, Aug. 8.—Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, today took mild exception to recent reports that South Texas faces an invasion from rabid vampire bats.

The health official referred to a widely circulated newspaper story quoting a Mexican government rabies specialist, Dr. Aurelio Malaga-Alba, that pig-faced vampire bats carrying the dread disease had been discovered 100 miles southwest of Presidio County in the Big Bend country.

"I think it's a remote, fantastic interpretation," Dr. Cox said. "This whole problem was discussed at the U. S.-Mexican Border Public Health Conference in Chihuahua two years ago.

He said he was sure Dr. Malaga-Alba is "entirely competent," and that the State Health Department would take every advantage of his warning.

"But the story didn't mention several pertinent facts about the situation. Vampire bats require a tropical environment. The story didn't mention that. And it didn't mention that vampire bats are relatively rare even in tropical

The newspaper story, originating in the Austin American, was "interesting," the long-time health officer said. But he believes it might make all bats vampire bats "in the eyes of the public."

"And for the most part, bats are beneficial. Only the vampire is a blood sucker. The rest feed on harmful insects, including mosquitoes," Dr. Cox warned.

San Antonio has an ordinance which makes it unlawful to kill bats of familiar species. The State Bureau of Laboratories said they had never found bats positive for rabies.

Dr. Cox's statement: "The invasion of Texas by this vampire bat is a remote, fantastic interpretation (of Dr. Malaga-Alba's report.) This bat is known to inhabit only certain southern geographical locations. Vampire bat history was discussed last year at the U. S.-Mexico Border Public Health Association in Chihuahua. Its limited migrations are to be expected.

"Isolated rabies infections caused by the bat have been reported from time to time in animals and man; however, there is no reason to expect bats to visit over the Rio Grande."

"SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDER

Congressional revolt on control measures could be forerunner of a very healthy movement.

It could mean end to all controls. Many bureaucratic economists run around Washington today with very red faces.

Merchandise shortages, heralded for months, have not occurred to any considerable extent. Retailers in apparel, dry goods, appliances have taken heavy price reductions the past few weeks trying to move goods. Warehouses are bulging.

Washington officialdom has come perilously close to talking country into depression.

The economy is unhealthy today. But even a very healthy man could be made quite sick if a few quack surgeons performed drastic operations to take care of some condition they feared he might acquire in the future.

Actually, so-called control measures have been meaningless.

With fanfare the Office of Price Stabilization forced retailers to spend thousands of extra dollars making up ceiling price lists.

Yet, with so much strong competition for the consumer's dollar, or the part remaining after taxes, few, if any items, are sold at the "ceiling" prices.

Credit control is a smoke screen. Issue of whether a man should pay for a new car in 15, 18, or 21 months is a side issue on controlling inflation.

Big financial houses who have influence with Federal Reserve Board, apparently are guiding lights behind credit restrictions.

There has been a fear that if Korea ends, mounting unemployment would leave financial houses with extensive repossessions.

The biggest force for inflation is found in Washington.

That is the constant drive by bureaucrats to spend more billions in fantastic schemes all over the world.

The new report by the Federal Trade Commission shows clearly how the greedy maw of the bureaus swallows dollars.

For example, food manufacturing concerns, in the first quarter of this year, paid out almost half of their profits in income taxes. After taxes, food companies profits were 2.6 cents out of each dollar sold. But oil companies, who maintain a price structure that apparently eliminates any price competition, made a profit after taxes of 10.2 cents from every dollar of sales.

It is interesting to note that cartel oil companies are one of the prime beneficiaries of the Marshall Plan. On a recent typical day, ECA announced another \$13,000,000 outlay.

Of that total, almost one-third, or \$4 million was for oil from Saudi Arabia and Iran for the Netherlands and Norway.

There is no denying there is a grave danger from inflation.

But it is hard to conceive that if Mother needs a new range to replace the one burned out, that she is endangering the country by paying for it in 24 months instead of 15 months. On the other hand, it should be simple to see that giving away billions of dollars of American products will, and has, caused inflation.

One major control is needed.

That is control of government spending.
