Questioning revealed that he had rushed home from work, fed his cattle, shaved, put on a fresh shirt and hurried to the Fire Hall to attend the Business Mens Club meeting. After waiting fifteen minutes for somebody to turn up he looked at the postcard telling of the meeting. It was dated Monday, January 7.

Tuesday morning — The following letter was handed to me in person by W. J. (Bill) Ormsby. Mr. and Mrs. Ormsby suffered all of the agony of seeing a cherished grandchild stricken with Polio. Fortunately Mr. Ormsby had a Polio Insurance Policy which saved the March of Dimes several thousand dollars. However, he has spent many hours in hospitals and can give you first hand information on the value of this great organization. As he states, all money contributed to the March of Dimes is used to help Polio patients.

Mr. Baker:

Will you please give a little space in your paper for a word in behalf of the March of Dimes. Since I knew you would, (a full page, if necessary) I wonder if the folks realize what the March of Dimes is really doing.

For the past two years the wife myself and Mike have spent a big part of our time in and around Polio Hospitals and know first hand what polio is doing to our children. Also what a wonderful work the March of Dimes is doing for the victims of polio.

I know you think it can't happen to you. Probably we thought that too. But it did and will happen to thousands more in 1952.

We have just recently returned from Warm Springs, Georgia with Mike. The work they are doing to restore crippled children is beyond imagination unless you could be there to see the some three hundred victims in every imaginable stage of affliction caused by polio.

The Foundation Buildings are modern and fire proof, and staffed by the best surgeons and nurses in the land - all at the disposal of any polio victim who goes there regardless of race, creed, or color. Their only way of keeping up this work is with help of your Dimes and Dollars.

They urgently need more beds, buildings and equipment. The usual waiting time to be admitted is from three to four months after you make application because they do not have room. This can not be taken care of if we don't give more dimes and dollars.

And remember if you give a dollar some victim receives a full dollar's worth of treatment from that dollar. No one makes one cent of profit. It is all used one hundred percent for the prevention and cure of Polio.

Did you know that while President Roosevelt was at Warm Springs taking baths for his affliction he conceived the idea of a National Hospital for Polio victims. It is said that he only had about \$200,000.00 of his own money at the time but that he gave every cent of it to start the building of this great hospital.

If you could see the hundreds of victims we have seen and see what your Dimes and Dollars are doing for them, you would not have to be reminded to give. Lets give and give again. It may be you or your loved ones next. Let's put Gorman and Eastland County away over the top for the March of Dimes.

SECTION 4. South Quarter-be between East McCall Street (Railroad), South Kent Street and South Crescent Street. On February 7th and 8th.

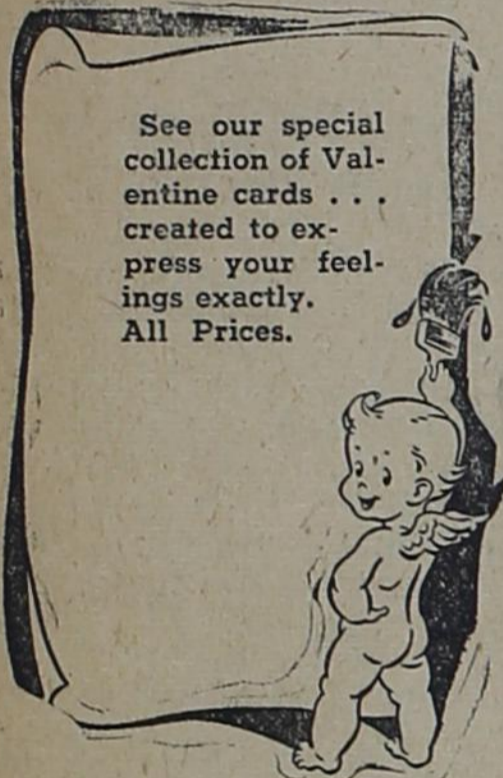

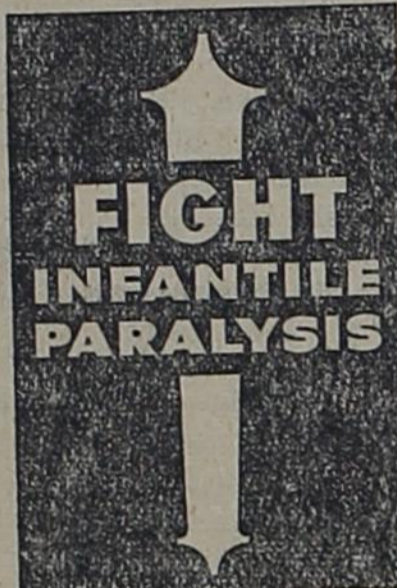

The Spirit of God brings this true peace to the hearts of God's children. The Psalmist said, "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in troubles."

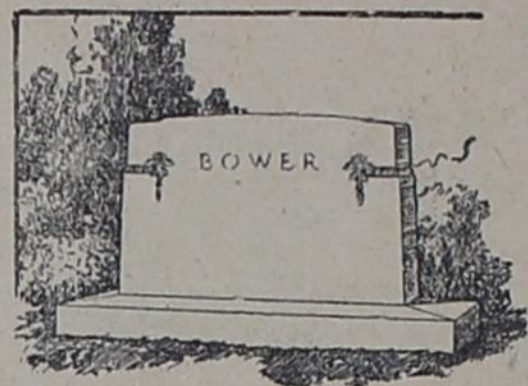
