Adams Ordered First Declaration Copies

Probably the best known and most widely used copies of the Declaration of Independence today are those taken from the etchings made on order of John Quincy Adams, Secretary of State in 1823.

Even at that early date the original parchment was becoming battered and fading. So Adams ordered William J. Stone, "a respectable engraver" to make facsimile copies of the document, about 200 copies, for members of the Congress and their families. The copper plates from which the engravings were made are now in the Archives.

But it is believed that the making of this engraving, following the practice of the day, actually transferred some of the ink from the parchment to the copper plate, had much to do with fading the ink from the original parchment.

SOCIAL SECURITY PAYMENTS

Probably the most common question that I hear is - "How much will my Social Security payment be?"

It would be impossible for me to tell you how much your payment will be when you reach the retirement age, because benefit amounts are based on the amount you earn up until you reach the retirement age or die.

The amount of the payments to you or your family are based on your average monthly earnings under Social Security. There is more than one formula used but by far the one most commonly used is based on average monthly earnings after 1950 (or age 21 if that was after 1950).

In order to figure your Social Security payment - take your earnings beginning with 1951 up until the year you reach the retirement age - drop out the five

lowest years - and then figure your average monthly earnings for the remaining years.

After you get the average monthly earnings - you take 55% of the first \$110 and 20% of the balance.

Some examples of retirement payments:

Avg. monthly earnings of:		
\$100 - \$ 55.00	\$300 -	98.50
\$200 - 78.50	\$350 -	108.50
\$108.50 is the maximum benefit payable.		

Some examples of payments for a worker and his wife: These are for worker and his 65-year-old wife. Remember wives payments are reduced if taken before 65.

Avg. monthly earnings of:		
\$100 - \$ 82.50	\$300 -	147.80
\$200 - 117.80	\$350 -	162.80
...162.80 is the maximum on one account for a couple. However, where there is a couple with one or more children also entitled to payments they can receive as much as \$200 a month.

Turkey Recipes

ROAST WHOLE TURKEY

Start with a ready-to-cook turkey. Salt inside of turkey. Fill body and neck cavities loosely with stuffing. Stuffing swells as it cooks, thus needs room to expand. Fold neck skin toward back and fasten with skewer or a few stitches. For stitching use clean white wrapping cord and large needle. Tuck legs under band of skin at tail or tie down. To do this wrap cord around legs and under tail. This will hold legs close to the body. Fold the wing tips back on the wings. This will help to hold the neck skin in place. Grease skin of turkey with melted or softened fat. Place breast down on rack in shallow pan. Do not add water, and do not cover. Place in pre-heated oven set at proper temperature indicated on time table. Baste with fat from bottom of pan during baking, and turn from one side of the breast to the other, then breast up. Or cover the top and sides of bird with a loosely woven cloth which has been moistened in fat. Moist en cloth with fat from bottom of pan if cloth dries during cooking.

BUTTER PECAN ICE CREAM

Yield: 6 servings
1/2 cup chopped Pecans
3 tbs. butter
1 1/2 tbs. cornstarch
1/2 cup sugar
2 tbs. dark brown sugar
1 cup milk
1 tsp. vanilla
1 cup whipping cream

Toast pecans in butter in oven. Mix cornstarch and sugars. Add milk and cook over direct heat until thick, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; add vanilla. Chill. Whip cream until stiff. Fold in chilled mixture and Pecans. Pour into freezing tray of automatic refrigerator and freeze.

1/4 cup deviled ham, 1/4 cup peanut butter, 1/4 cup chopped sweet pickle, 2 tablespoons mayonnaise, bread, butter.

PEANUT BUTTER CUP CAKES

1/2 cup butter or other fat
1/2 cup peanut butter
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
4 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1 cup milk
1 tsp. vanilla
3 cups sifted soft wheat flour

Cream together with the fat, peanut butter, and sugar and add to the beaten eggs. The sifted dry ingredients are mixed alternately with the milk and vanilla. Bake in greased muffin tins in a pre-heated oven (350 degrees F.) for 20 or 30 minutes.

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Texas Political Calendar - 1958

JULY, 1958

JULY 5, 1958 — If absentee ballots to be counted by special canvassing board (in counties using voting machines) notice to be posted in office of County Clerk at least 20 days before date of election. Sec. 7(a). Art. (7.14)

JULY 6-22, 1958 — Absentee voting for First Primary. Persons may vote absentee at any time not more than 20 days nor less than 3 days prior to election. Sec. 37. Art. (5.05)

Thomas Jefferson Drafted Declaration Of Independence

The Declaration of Independence was drawn up by Thomas Jefferson, a lawyer and delegate from Virginia, and slightly amended by Adams and Franklin, delegates from Massachusetts and Pennsylvania. It was formally presented to the Continental Congress on June 28, 1776.

It was Richard Henry Lee, a Virginia farmer who introduced (on June 7) a resolution declaring "that these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent states, that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the state of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved."

On June 10, a committee of five, headed by Jefferson, was instructed to draw up a declaration of independence. Other committee members were John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Robert R. Livingston and Robert Sherman.

Frontier News Flashes

Department of Journalism & Graphic Arts
University of Houston

HOUSTON - Colorful 100-year-old Texas history is to be brought to the pages of the modern newspapers by the department of journalism and graphic arts of the University of Houston. Highlights, including politics, farm news and advertising, are taken from the yellowed pages of 100-year-old newspapers for weekly releases to newspapers over the state.

Knowing that Texas folks are intensely interested in the history of their state, Billy I. Ross, assistant professor of journalism at the University, conceived the idea of preparing historical-type human interest bits of news, to be made available - at no cost - to all weekly and daily newspapers over the state.

"The response has been tremendous, and the first releases are being made for use the first week in June," Ross said.

Charles Aycock, senior journal-

ism major at the University, is doing the research and preparing copy that is distributed.

Ross said, if the interest by newspaper editors is any indication throughout the state, Texas history in our schools is far from lacking in student interest.

FROM THE RANGERS

Battle with the Indians!

76 OF THEM KILLED!

From the following letter, from Camp Runnels, it will be seen that Captain Ford, with 213 Rangers and friendly Indians, had a fight with the Comanches on the 12th inst.

The engagement took place in the Wichita country, eight days march from Camp Runnels. Our correspondent does not give the number of killed, wounded, etc.; but we learn from the official re-

port of Captain Ford to the Governor, (which we would publish but for the length), that seventy-six Comanches were killed, eighteen taken prisoners; and of our men, only two were killed, (Robert Nickel and a Waco Indian), and three slightly wounded.

STATE NEWS

We learn from the LaGrange True Issue, that wheat in Fayette county is suffering from the rust.

The Bonham "Independent" says strawberries are abundant all over the prairies in that region.

A deck hand named Henry Clark, fell overboard from the steamer J. H. Bell, in the Trinity river on the 20th ult., and was drowned.

The engine of the steam mill of Mr. J. W. Schrimpf, on Buffalo Bayou, burst its boiler one day last week, injuring two men considerably.

We learn from the Texas Baptist that an interesting revival of religion is going on in Anderson. Several have been added to the different churches.

A new Post Office has been established in Fayette county at a place called "Cistern," on the road from Bastrop to Gonzales, and A. D. Kendall appointed post master.

The Waco Southerner speaks encouragingly of the crop prospects in McLennan county, and says the wheat is turning out splendidly, and that engagements are being made to deliver flour in Waco at \$3.60 per hundred.

The citizens of Young county have been driven by necessity to protect themselves against Indian depredations. At a recent public meeting they resolved to raise a company of Minute-Men to act as scouts to consist of 24 white men and 4 Indians. A subscription has been raised for the purpose of defraying all expenses. So says the Dallas Herald.

The Houston Telegraph is informed by the Agent of Redding & Co's. Express, that two men went to the plantation of General Welborne, in Fort Bend County, on Friday night, and represented themselves as clergymen, and asked permission to preach to the negroes. The overseer refused. They then asked to stay all night. The overseer informed them that the family was residing in town, and the house was locked up. In the altercation they seized upon the overseer, and while one held him the other gashed him in an awful manner with his knife. The overseer is not expected to live.

Washington, May 18 — In the Senate today, the bill for the admission of Oregon into the Union was passed by a majority of 18.

The bill providing for the running of the boundary line of the State of Texas, without the making of scientific investigation was passed.

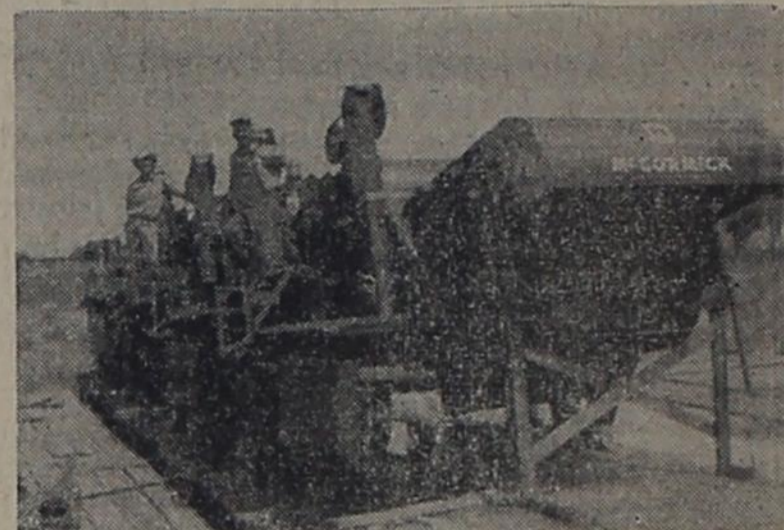

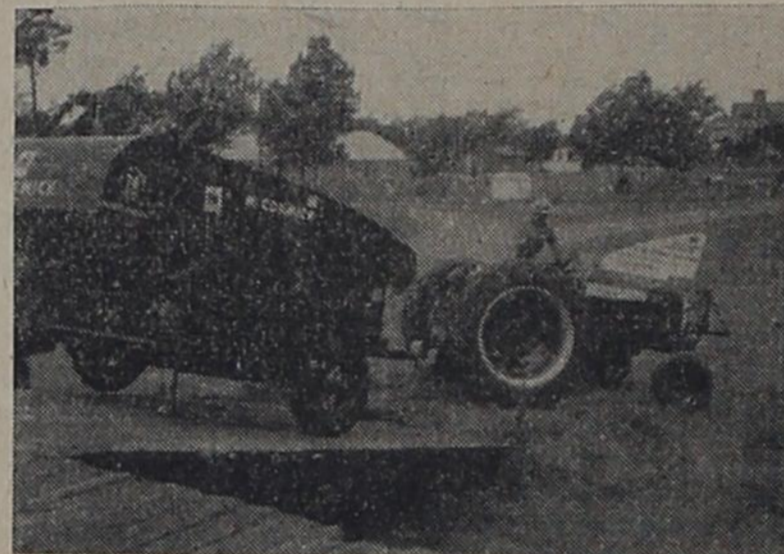

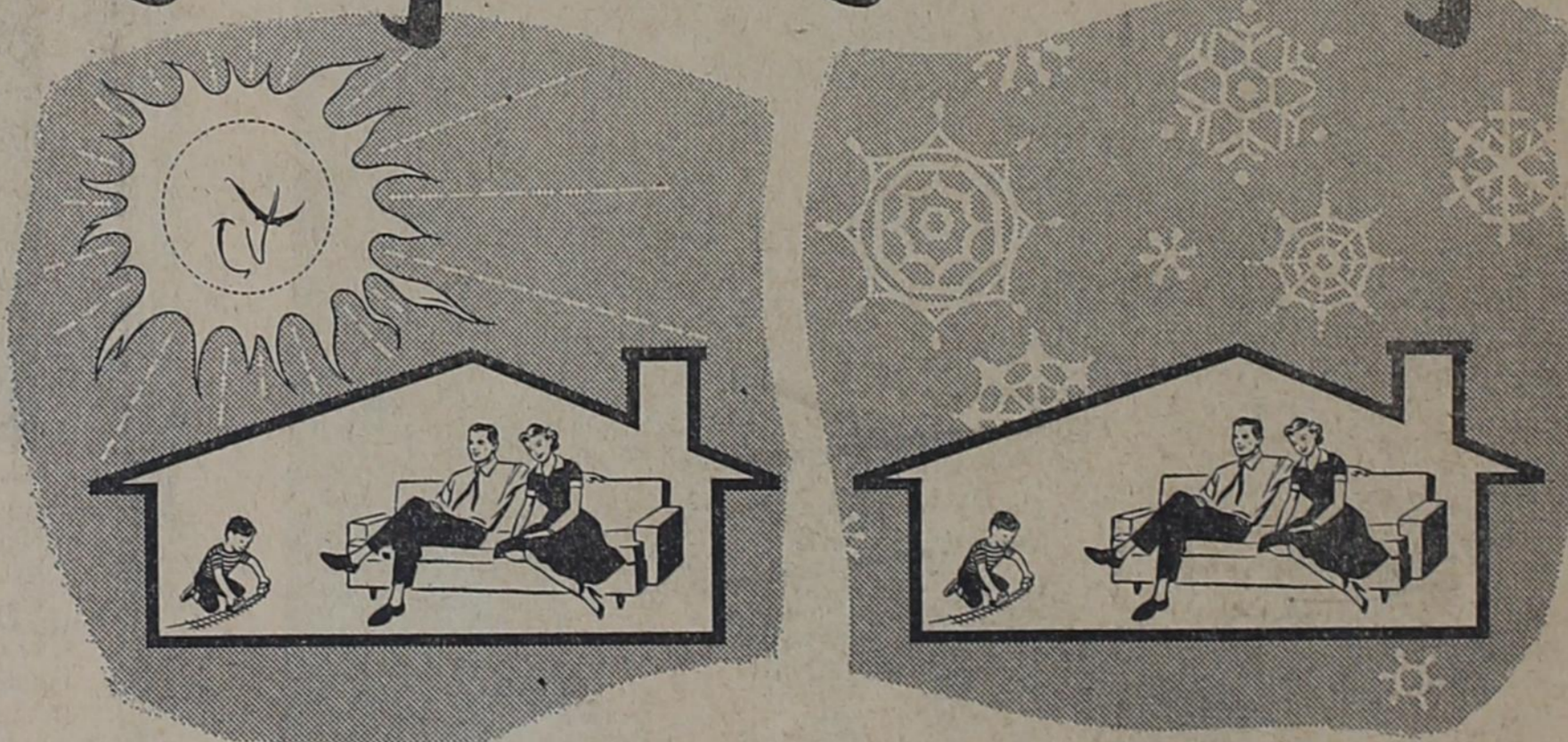

Indianapolis Motor Speedway ... Saturday, the 17th and first day of qualifications, broke bright and clear. So we got my car and the team car driven by Bob Veith into the qualifying line. We pushed Bob's car out first and by the time mine was out there were ten other cars lined up at the gate waiting for it to open at 9.

A NEW RULE
Under a new rule this year we were allowed to go onto the track for practice after we had established our position, so both of us took advantage of the time to make last minute checks on our two Bowes "Seal Fast" Specials.

My car felt real good so I pulled back into the line and waited for the official qualification runs at 11 A.M. Bob was out first and turned a terrific four lap average of 144.881 mph.

Following Bob was Ed Elisian, and all eyes were on Ed. Just the day before in practice he had toured the track at a lap of 148.148 mph. He was off the pace he set Friday but still turned in a four lap average of 145.926 and a one lap time of 146.508 for two new track records.

Next came Pat O'Connor who sat on the pole last year. Pat qualified faster than he had in 1957 as he set a time of 144.823 mph. As Pat pulled into the pits I received the signal from Harlan Flegler, Chief Steward, and pulled out on my run.

AT LAST
This was it, sixteen days of practice all behind and now was the time that really counted. All I could think about was coming through for my mechanic, George Bignotti, and my car owner Bob Bowes.

As I pulled from the pits I picked up speed until I was running flat on the floor going down the back chute.

I crossed the starting line completing my first practice lap and made up my mind that the next lap would be it.

I stuck my left hand up high, indicating I wanted to make an official run to the starter, Bill Vanderwater, and we were on the way!

As I passed George and Bob just north of the starting line I saw the "OK" wave and thought to myself "ok boss, here we go". I drove the car

down as deep into the first turn as I thought I could. Everything still felt real good as we roared out way in and out of number three and four and onto the bricks. Lap number one was in the record books. Things went just as smooth on the second lap, and as I came by I received the board from George showing the first lap had been in the 144 mph bracket—not too bad but I thought I could do better: Just a little harder into the first turn, out of it and through the second ok, and down the back chute. I headed down the bricks for the finish of my third lap. As I passed the spot where George was, I saw the board with a "3" on it; only 143 on the second lap. I couldn't figure where I had lost the time. The only thing to do now was cut a real fast one on the last lap to make up for the second.

I QUALIFY
Well, like often happens when you try to do better, sometimes you press too hard. I guess that's what happened to me. I lost some rpm getting into the first turn and I thought I'd make it up down the back chute by driving deeper into the third corner. Man did I! Deeper than I ever had before and I sure paid for it! I was in far too hard, and the back end started around just a little too much so I had to ease off the throttle for just a split second. That was all it took. When I came in I found that the last lap had been 142.971 mph. The four lap average of 144.023 mph was not as good as I had hoped or as good as the car was capable of. But at least we were in the race with the eighth fastest time for the day.

I'll start in the middle of the third row with Jimmy Bryan, 1957 USAC National Champion to my left on the pole of the third row, and A. J. Foyt, a rookie to my right on the outside of the third row. Shortly after I returned to the track from my garage Ed Elisian was moved right off the "pole" by Dick Rathmann, who turned in a blazing four laps averaging 145.974 mph to edge Elisian.

Well as I said, I wasn't too happy about the run but I'm in and race day means 200 laps instead of four so I'm going to give it an all-out try to bring home a winner.

Thanks, Jerry and Sussanne for your interesting letters. Both of you are now on the complimentary military mailing list and will receive the Progress until you return to civilian life unless you tell me otherwise. However, I will appreciate your letting me know if you change your address as Uncle Sam charges me a whole nickel for every Progress he does not deliver.

Dear Gene:

I really feel ashamed of myself for not writing you sooner, but we are kept pretty busy over here. I suppose you have heard the tales from dozens of our boys who have been over, but we are really on the move a lot.

I was really surprised at the living conditions when I got to Korea. They even have flush toilets and showers in some places. Of course, all of these have been devised by the ingenuity of the GI. Pipe and fittings are one thing that just aren't to be had in Korea. All the pipe we find has to be welded.

I am in an 8 inch Howitzer Battery of a Rocket/Howitzer Battalion. We are just about ten miles south of North Korea. Right at the moment, I am on an O.P. that is situated right on top of the DMZ. We can sit up here and watch the North Koreans working on their bunkers. We are 4000 meters south of them.

It is really fascinating to me. We have television programs that come in better than at home, but we have to haul water about 15 miles. Every drop of water we drink or use for cooking has to be purified and hauled by truck.

It is really a wonderful experience for any American to come

to this country. It certainly makes us appreciate the things we never think about at home. I sure won't say I like the place, because I certainly don't. It is too far away from Gorman to suit me. These people have nothing to speak of, but they seem very happy. A big farmer may have 2 acres of rice, rye and oats. He lives 365 days a year from this and what he might steal from the Army.

I have been planning to visit Billy Kent ever since I got here, but just haven't had time. I should get to see him in a few weeks.

They have cut the tour of duty over here to thirteen months which is a God-send.

I suppose the peanuts are needing rain as usual. The Koreans could stand a little for their rice paddies. We have been getting ready for the rainy season for the past two months. It should be here by now, but it hasn't started yet. I understand they really have some downpours.

I don't have a heck of a lot of time to write, but I sure would appreciate getting some mail from the home folks. I would try to answer them as best I could.

I don't expect you to print this long letter, but I would appreciate it if you would put my address in news. If you would send me the Progress rates and cost of mailing air mail for a year, I would send you a check for it. It takes boat mail about 5 weeks to get here.

I had better close now and get some sleep.

There have always been letters from the boys in the service. Here's a switch - a letter from a girl in the service!

I'm stationed at Eglin Air Force Base, Florida. That's about 30 or 40 miles from Pensacola. The base is pretty nice. The only things wrong are that its too far from town of any size and there isn't much of anything to do on base.

We're about 10 miles from the Gulf. There are lakes, bayous and all sorts of waterways - no matter where you go, so there's always plenty of swimming. The water is deep blue and the sands everywhere are as white as snow. Sure makes a pretty scene.

Most of the trees here are pines, next are palms. Then there are the same kind as there is around home - oaks, elms, etc. The forests are right on the roads and are thick - so thick you can't even see light in places. The pines are little and straight as an arrow, and tall - man, I reckon!

I have been assigned to Statistical Services. We call it Stat for short. I have learned or am in the process of learning about IBM machines. There are 8 different kinds here in our machine room and we're supposed to be able to use any of them when called upon, know how each operates, and why. We wire the panels or boards for each machine. Some won't do anything unless they are wired to do so. The work is interesting and fascinating. I enjoy it very much.

So far I haven't missed being away from home and it doesn't seem very far. I may think differently, though, when I would like to go home and can't.

This is good old "Sunshine State" Florida. It rains here on the average of 2 or 3 days every week. I wish the people in Gorman could have it. We sure don't need much of it here.

Can't think of anything to say now, so I'll close.

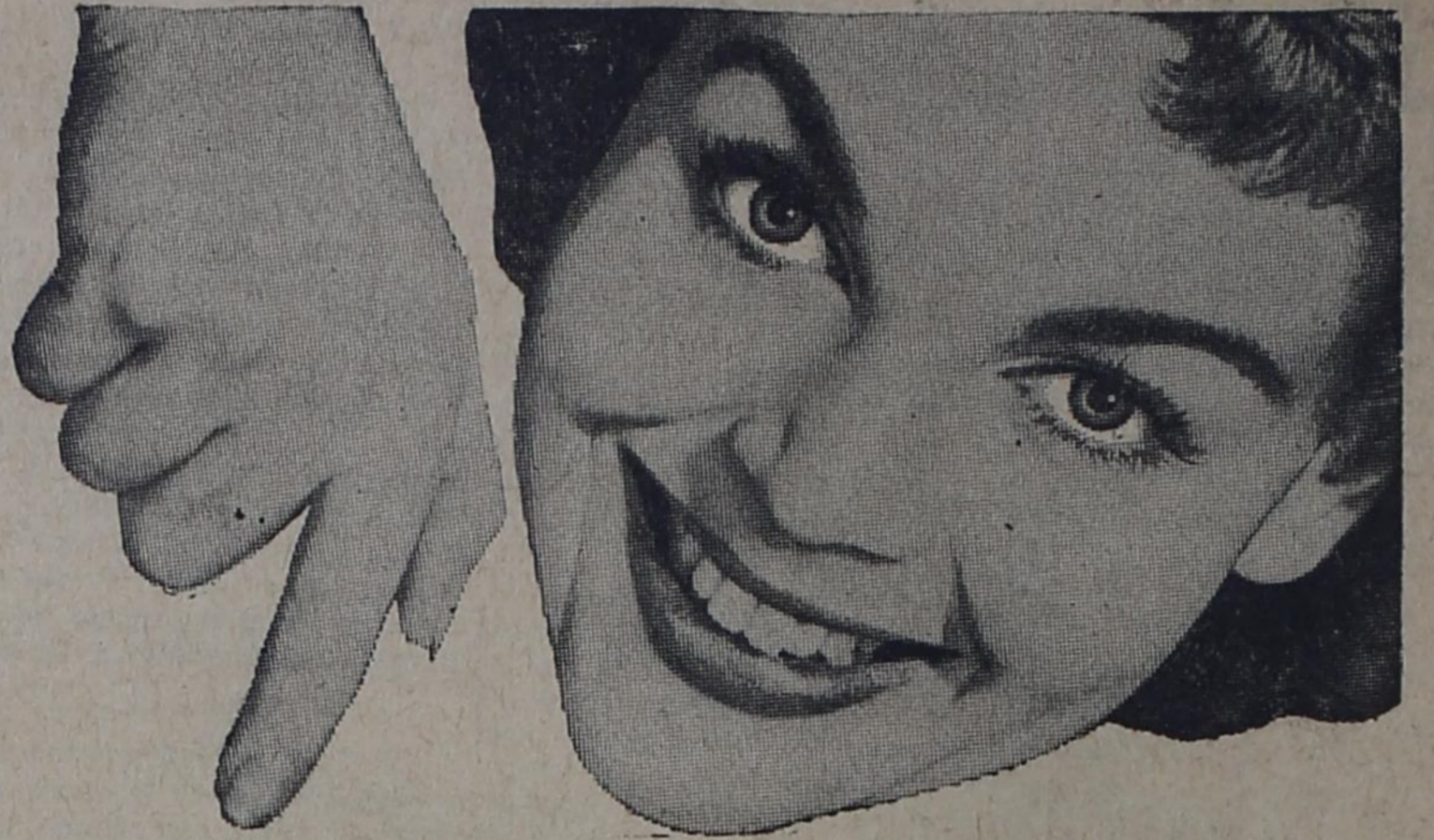
