## Belgian Agriculture Workers Visit County Peanut Growers



M. J. Alofs and Fernand Hargot, agricultural workers for the Belgian government in Africa, visited Gorman today. After a tour of Durward Warren's farm, they visited the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association and the Gorman Peanut Company. Escorted by J. M. Cooper, County Agent, these men are studying peanut growing in Eastland County.

After touring other farms in the county Friday a picnic will be held in their honor at the City Park in Eastland at 7 p. m.

The Belgian Congo has about 600,000 acres of peanut land. They harvest around 182,000 tons of Valencia peanuts which are used for oil. At present the harvesting is done by hand.

Farms and implements are community property. Most of this area is new country. A farmer is allotted about 20 acres of land which he clears of brush and timber. He chooses the type of crop he wants to raise. The following year he may clear additional acreage. However, they do not plant the same crop but use a rotation system. As this is virgin

soil no fertilizer is used. Mr. Alofs said they were profiting by the mistakes of the American farmer. By diversifying the crops the land is protected and remains fertile.

After leaving Eastland County Alofs will go to Brownsville and Hargot to Lubbock to study cotton. They will return to Belgium sometime in August.

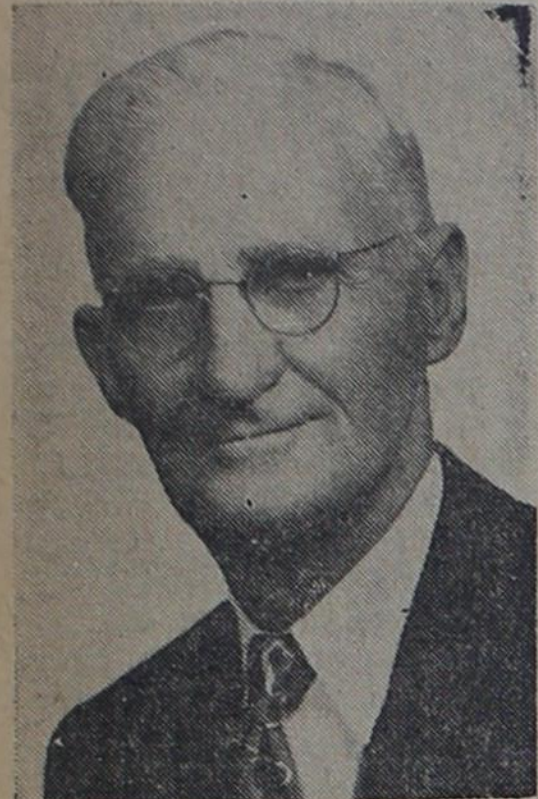

## As It Looks From Here

Omar Burleson, M. C.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — IT IS DIFFICULT, if not impossible, to identify the real monetary obligations of the Federal Government. We generally know what the Public Debt is supposed to be. We know the amount of the obligations for which appropriated money has not yet been spent. But we do not know the real obligation of the United States Treasury for programs underwritten and guaranteed by the Government.

THE PRACTICE OF FINANCING large scale spending programs by Treasury borrowing without getting the approval of the Congress is a serious defect of our system. In fact, there is considerable doubt that it is a part of our system, but it is a practice of recent years. There is even doubt that is a constitutional action.

THE GOVERNMENT IS IN THE guaranty business for num-

erous enterprises, and actually has on hand billions of borrowed money which does not show up in its obligated column. This in another instance of the Congress having yielded the control of the purse strings to the Executive Department.

IT HAS ALREADY YIELDED up to more than one-third of its control on direct appropriations on the installment plan. In other words, of our total budget more than one-third must be appropriated to meet fixed charges such as interest on the Public Debt and numerous other items over which no one has any control as to whether it shall be paid or not. The Congress should, however, control the borrowing authority of the Federal Treasury to underwrite and guarantee all the programs now in vogue.

A PART OF THIS SPENDING AUTHORITY and underwriting even applies to foreign governments. To a large degree, the President has been given a "blank check" to spend as he sees fit to meet emergencies around the world.

IT REMINDS US that in spite of all the world spending, we are in desperate trouble in many places. If our "foreign aid" has accomplished its purpose, it is a good question to ask why are we in this tragic situation in the Middle East.

THE TRUTH IS we have been caught in a web of blackmail. Countries never heard of a few years ago now emerge with demands that, unless they receive our dollars, they will go over to the Soviets on promises. Several countries which have given the right for United States defense bases within their territory are now threatening to expel us unless more "aid" is given them.

THE SENTIMENT GROWS HERE IN GASHINGTON that the U. S. is supporting a considerable number of international "moochers," who are playing both sides of the street in their dealing with Russia and America.

THERE ARE TWO PRINCIPAL WAYS to break this policy. The first cure for this situation is to challenge these threats with the exercise of greater prudence in handouts which have not proved their worth.

THE SECOND IS TO DEVELOP as rapidly as possible an operational inter-continental missile or space-wagons, which can de-

pend this country from its own shores.

UNTIL THESE TWO THINGS ARE DONE, there is little chance that our tremendous defense expenditures (which are almost two thirds of all expenditures) are likely to be reduced.

THE TIME FOR THE DEVELOPMENT of such weapons MAY be only two to four years away.

WHEN THE U. S. HAS SUCH WEAPONS, the need for foreign bases will not be necessary. These billions in handouts certainly can be reduced, if not entirely stopped. Our own defense appropriations can be reduced. Until this happens, the bill will continue to be high.

THIS IS NOT AN ATTITUDE of isolationism. The fact is, we have little choice but to engage in world cooperation. The world has gotten too small to live otherwise. We can not, however, continue to be subjected to the black mail pressure from every corner of the earth.
