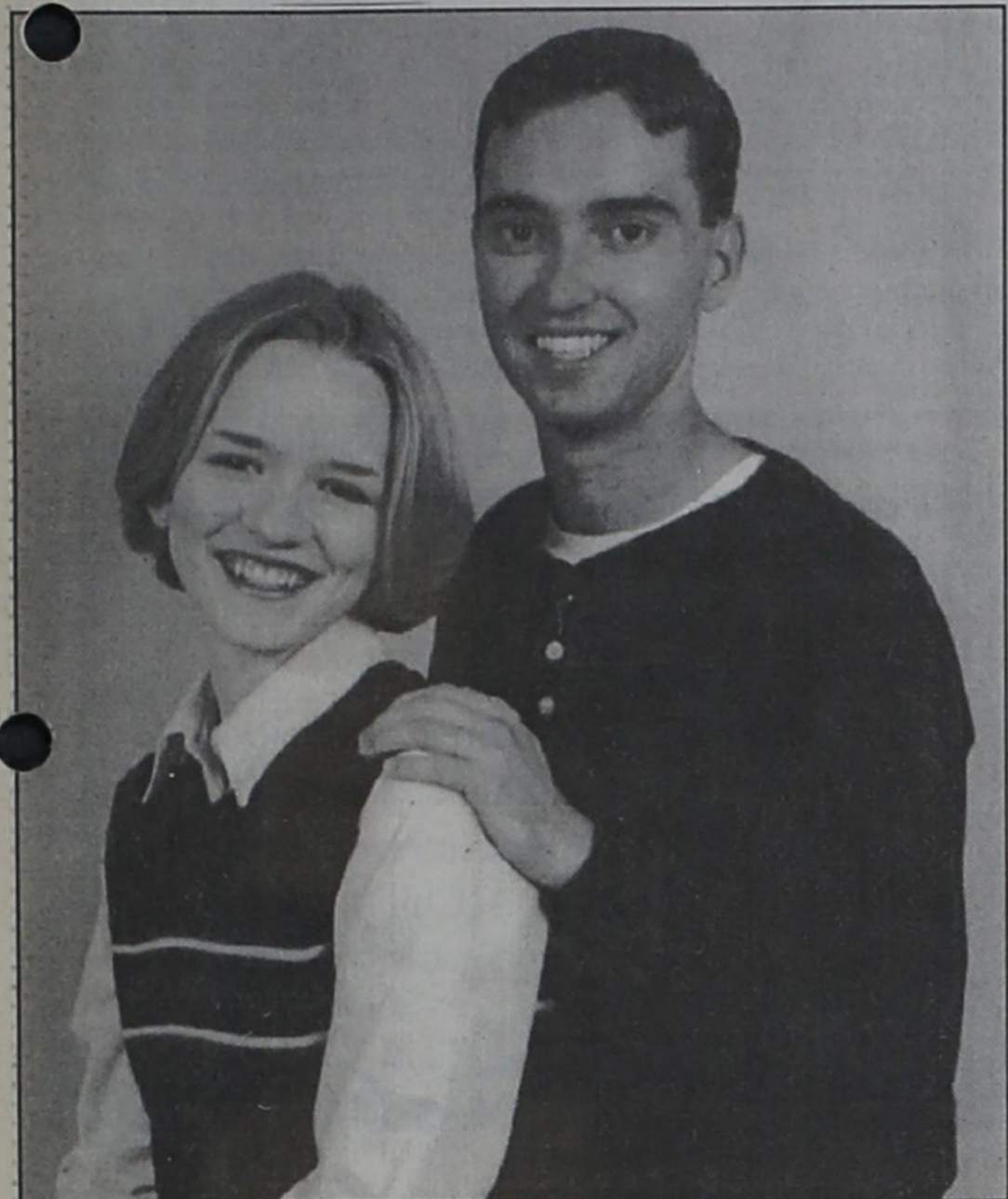

Sabrina Glasson and Neely Carter Announce Engagement



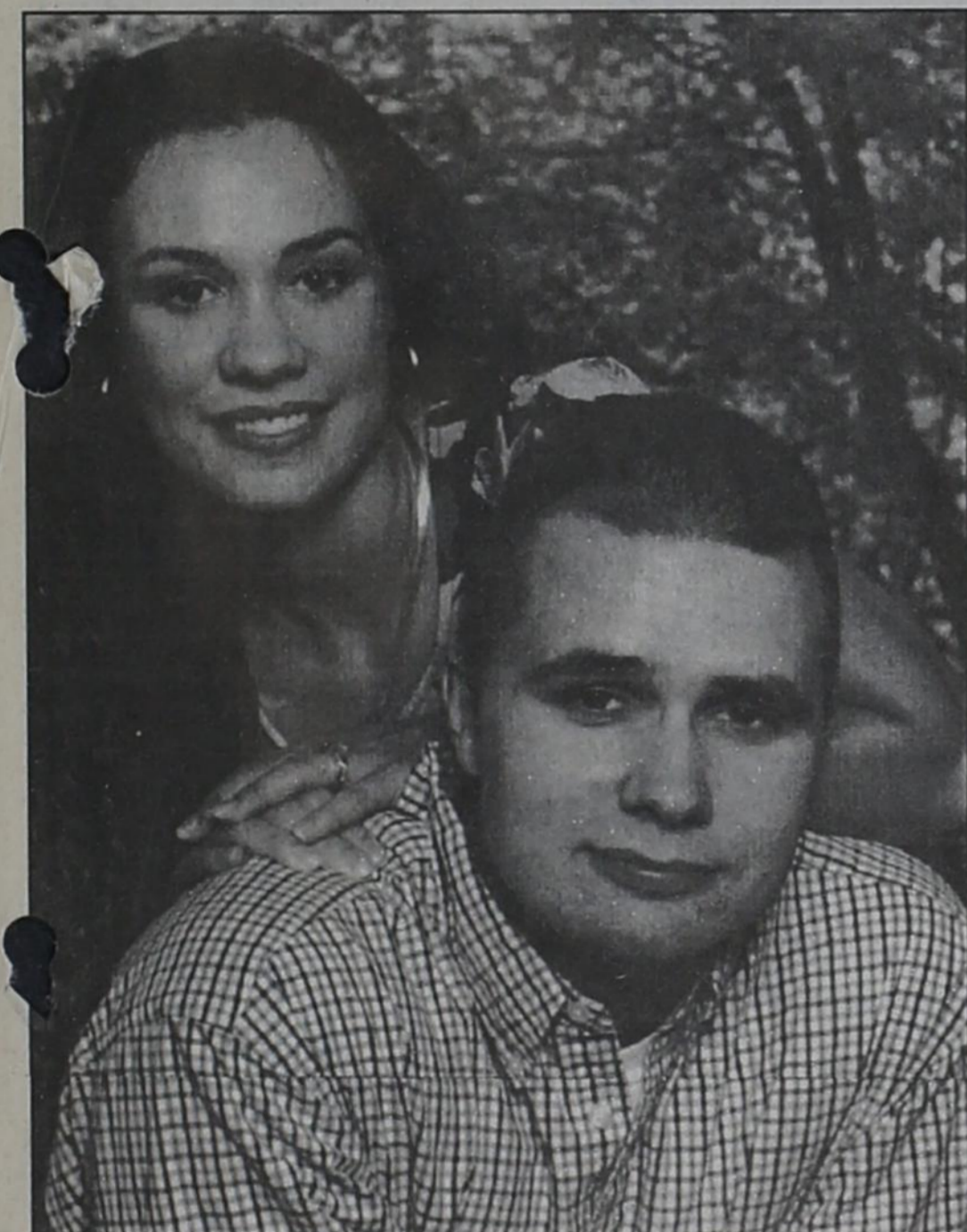

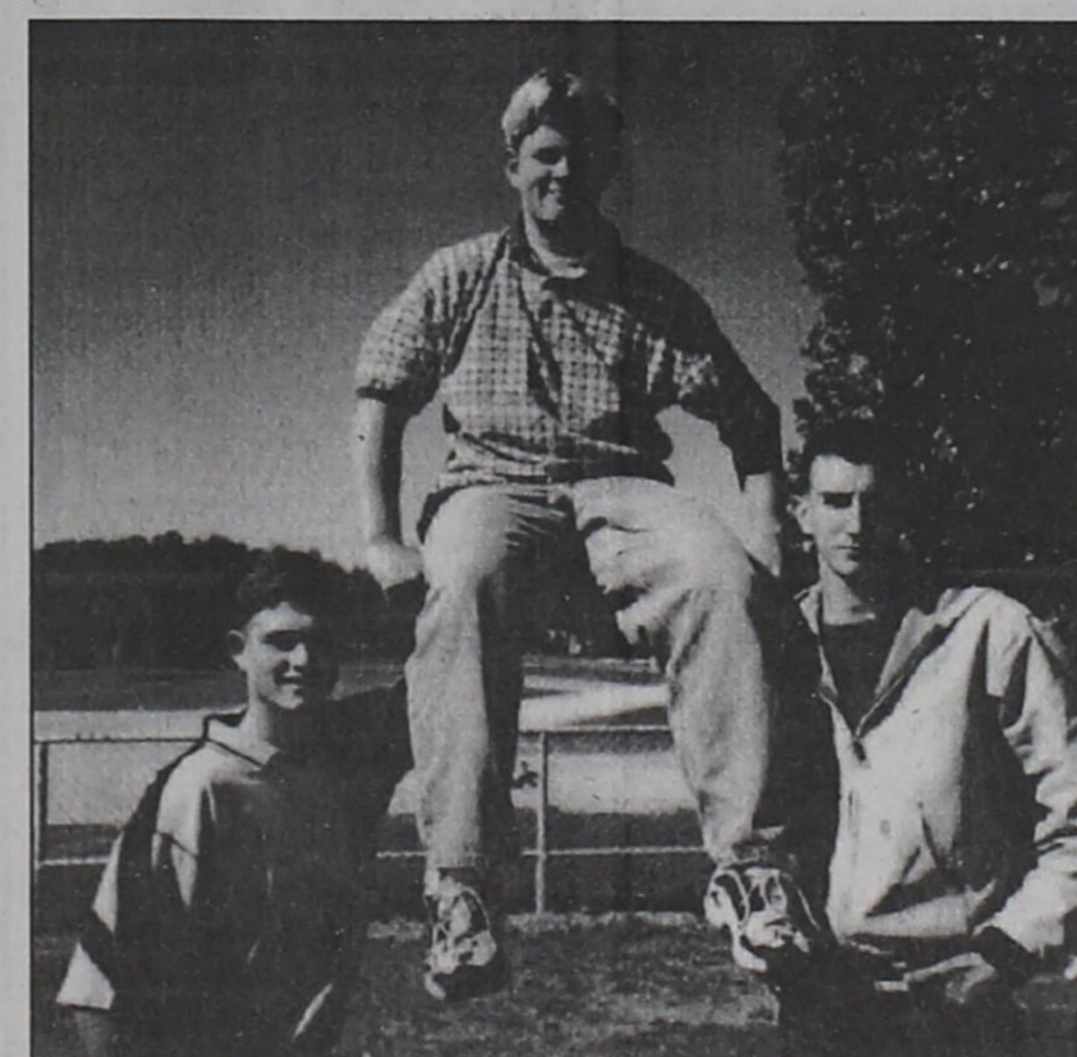
Halloween Parade Another Huge Success

Panthers Blank Wildcats 47/0; Play at Tolar on Friday Night

The Gorman Panthers played host to the Rising Star Wildcats on Friday night with their parents present of Parents Night and came away with a lopsided victory 47-0. The Big Red defense held the Cats to a total of 135 yards and forced 5 turnovers. This win puts the Panthers at 8-1 for the season and 6-0 in District 14-A. They have won 6 games in a row after losing to Class 2A Albany.

The Panthers wasted little time in showing their power as they took a punt at their own 48 and went the distance in 9 plays with Margarito Sanchez getting the score from 1 yard out with 6:27 left in the first. The drive featured runs of 2 and 4 by Blake Guthery, runs of 6 and 11 by Sanchez, and a great pass play from Cody Foster to Robert Seaton for 25. After Foster ran for 3, Sanchez got the TD. Richard Svarosky booted the point after and the Panthers never looked back.

On their next possession the Big Red got the ball on their own 40 and scored in just 4 plays. Following a 10 yard penalty on Gorman, Cody Foster hit Cisco Maderas on a beautiful 10 yard pass. Then Blake Guthery ran for 15 to set Gorman up at the Wildcat 44. From there Guthery finished the drive on a beautiful run up the middle to make the score 13-0. Svarosky kicked the point after and the score rose to 14-0 with 3:03 left in the first.

Then on the next possession by Gorman they got the ball on the 50 after holding the Cats on downs. From there they scored in 7 plays with Dathan Wright getting the honors from 1 yard out on a pass with 9:48 left in the half. The drive featured a 22 yard pass to Guthery, a 9 yarder by Foster and a 19 yard run by Guthery. Svarosky added the point after and Gorman led 21-0.

Then with 2:48 left in the half, the Panthers scored again on a beautiful 20 yard run by Cisco Madera. The drive featured runs of 22 and 8 by Guthery, runs of 12 and 11 by Cisco Madera to make the score 28-0 after Svarosky added the point after.

With 1:19 left in the half, Gorman hit the score board on a pass play to Guthery after the Panthers get the ball on a fumble at the Cat 34. The drive featured a 10 yarder by Wright before the pass to Guthery. The kick for point failed and Gorman led 34 to 0 at half-time.

Both bands performed at the intermission and did a great job.

Following the half the Panther reserves took to the field and added 13 more points in the last 2 periods.

With 10 seconds left in the third, Wright raced for 32 yards for the score. They drive featured runs of 17 by Madera, a 7 yarder by Adrian Torrez and an 11 yard run by Wright. Svarosky kicked the point after and Gorman led 41-0.

Gorman's defense held the Cats on the Gorman 23 and started a drive. David Seaton ran for 11 yards to set the Big Red up at the Panther 34. Then in one big blast by Brandon Gilmore for 66 yards finished the drive with 1:04 left. The kick failed and Gorman had a 47-0 victory.

This win sets Gorman up for the playoffs, and depends on the upcoming game at Tolar on Friday. If the Panthers defeat Tolar the Panthers will be District 14A Champions. If they lose they are still the runner-up team. If Tolar loses they will be in a tie for the runner-up spot. So this final game of the regular season will be a real battle.
