



Shannon Mauney Places 5th In State Shot Put



Sharing with Brother Bob

by Bob Beeman You drive the team of horses pulling the "lister" down the field and back That shaped the bed for one row of

peanuts, according to my friends at Heritage Manor. They were teaching me how to plant peanuts before trac-

tors came along.

After the "lister" had the bed ready, you hooked up the "planter" and went right down the middle of the bed. Shortly after the peanuts were up, you hooked the horses to the "cultivator" and got as close to the peanut vines as possible. You did this again as soon after each rain as you could get into the field with out gettting stuck.

Hand hoeing was required to get close to the vine. Crab grass was a nussiance, it spread out the bed too much, but you could get it with the hoe. Nut grass you had to dig up (with nuts attached) run thru the grinder, burn and scatter the ashes in a large lake or it would grow back.

There weren't many insects except grasshoppers. You could take them with you to the lake to fish with you when you scattered ashes. Some people let turkeys in the field to eat the grasshoppers.

People found that to keep dust down they could plant 4 rows of peanuts and 2 rows of blackeyed peas or grain (oats, wheat, etc.) This "strip cropping" was pretty popular at one time except with the kids that got stuck picking peas.

The average peanut field was 40 acres. After digging the peanuts, you "shocked" the peanuts vines to let it dry and cure. That made it easy to load into a wagon using a pitch fork. There was usually a horse driven (he went in a circle) thrasher and a hay bailer. Sitting under the discharge shute, catching the peanuts with a burlap bag and then sew it it shut. This job was hot, dusty, noisey and worse than picking

I'd be willing to bet that whoever invented the "hot shower" grew peanuts when he was a kid.

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



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

ALAMEDA CEMETERY

THE EARLIEST ANGLO SETTLERS IN THIS AREA WERE DRAWN TOGETHER BY THE HARSH LIFE THEY FOUND IN TEXAS. WILLIAM MANSKER, WHO CAME TO TEXAS WITH HIS FAMILY IN THE MID 19TH CENTURY, SET ASIDE A PORTION OF HIS LAND FOR USE AS A SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY CEMETERY.

THE FIRST BURIAL IN ALAMEDA CEMETERY IS THE SUBJECT OF SOME DEBATE. ONE LEGEND TELLS OF A BABY STOLEN BY A LARGE PANTHER ANOTHER PERTAINS TO AMANDA ELIZABETH (HENSHAW) COFFER, IDENTIFIED ON A PLAQUE IN THE CEMETERY AS MARTHA COFFEE, SAID TO HAVE BEEN KILLED BY INDIANS IN 1860.

AT ALAMEDA COMMUNITY'S PEAK IN THE LATE 19TH CENTURY THE ALAMEDA CEMETERY ASSOCIATION WAS FORMED. A TABER-NACLE AND COMMUNITY CENTER WAS ERECTED INSIDE THE CEM-ETERY. IN 1911, E.L. REID BOUGHT THE MANSKER LAND AND DEEDED APPROXIMATELY 5 ACRES TO THE ALAMEDA CEMETERY ASSOCIATION. THOUGH THE COMMUNITY OF ALAMEDA HAD DWINDLED TO ONLY FOUR HOMES NEAR THE CEMETERY BY 1936. THE CEMETERY CONTINUED TO THRIVE

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
