

National Peanut Board Nominees Sought

USDA Ag Secretary Dan Glickman will appoint one Texas peanut farmer to the National peanut Board from a list of nominees submitted by the Texas Peanut Producers Board as outlined in the new National peanut Research, Promotion and Education order that became effective July 30. The Order was favored by 66.56 percent of the producers who voted in a national referendum between May 24 and July 2, 1999.

The Order is authorized under the commodity Research, promotion, and Consumer Information Act of 1996 and was developed to finance a coordinated program of generic promotion, information, and related research designed to maintain and expand markets for peanuts via a 1% national checkoff on all peanuts produced and marketed in the U.S. beginning with the 1999 crop.

The Order will be administered by the National Peanut Board composed of one producer member and one alternate member from each of the nine primary peanut-producing states. The minor peanut-producing states will be represented by a one at-large producer member and one at-large alternate member.

The Texas nominees will be selected at a special meeting being called by the Texas Peanut Producers Board. According to TPPB Board Chairman Billy Shannon of Quitaque, the nominating meeting has been set for 10:00 a.m., September 27, 199, at the Taylor County Expo Center, 1982 Lytle Way, Abilene, Texas.

USDA personnel will be present to oversee and to verify eligibility and count ballots. Texas peanut farmers have a vested interest in this new program and the Texas Peanut Producers Board encourages them to make every attempt to participate in this Board member selection process. Any person engaged in the production and sale of peanuts and who owns, or shares the ownership and risk of the crop is eligible to have his/her name placed for nomination.





UBJECT: SENATE BILL 845—APPLICATION FOR CERTIFICATE OF AUTHORITY TO DISPOSE OF CERTAIN MOTOR VEHICLES NOT COMPLYING WITH AIR POLLUTION EMISSIONS CONTROL-RELATED REQUIREMENTS

To inform you of the provisions of Senate Bill 845, enacted by the 76th Texas Legislature, 1999

Effective September 1, 1999, a person or business may apply to the department for a certificate of authority (COA) to dispose of a motor vehicle if the vehicle does not comply with all applicable air pollution emissions control-related requirements. Abandoned vehicles disposed of under this section of the law must also meet the following additional criteria: (1) the vehicle must be in the possession of the applicant; (2) the vehicle must be over eight years old; and (3) the vehicle must have been authorized to be towed by a police department. If the reason for disposing of the vehicle is not due to air pollution or emissions control-related requirements, then the vehicle must either not have an engine or be otherwise totally inoperable.

Air pollution and emissions control requirements are specified in Chapter 548 of the Transportation Code, which is administered by the Department of Public Safety, and the state's air quality implementation plan. Examples include the vehicle inspection requirements, as evidenced by a current inspection certificate on the vehicle windshield, and any emissions inspection and maintenance program established by the Public Safety Commission.

Applications for certificates of authority are processed at VTR Headquarters. A revised Application for Authority to Dispose of a Motor Vehicle to a Demolisher (VTR-71-2X) will be available in September 1999 at your local TxDOT Vehicle Titles and Registration Division Regional Office. You may also obtain the revised applications by calling the VTR Customer Help Desk at (512) 465-7611 in September 1999. Please request Form VTR-71-2X with a revision date of August 1999.



County Judge Pleased with Budget Process and Effort of County Officials

This is really good news and it gets even better!

a 7.62% across the board cut in the 1998-99 budget. Once again, I must commend your County employees and department heads. Across the board, each and everyone joined in the tam effort to achieve and even exceed this goal.

I am proud to announce that our 1998-99 Budget of \$3,947,390.00 has been cut to \$3,625.327.00 for 1999-2000. This represents an 8.16% and \$322.063.00 cut. In addition, the state has funded over \$32,000.00 in additional supplements, which, if deducted from next year's budget shows a true budget reduction of 9.15%.

I have recommended to the Commissioners Court a 56 cent per \$100 valuation tax rate for fiscal year 1999-2000. Projected revenues from that tax rate would be approximately \$3,765,150.00 or \$139,823.00 over the proposed budget.

This rate represents a 6 cent increase from the current rate of 50 cent per \$100 valuation. Of this 6 cent increase, 29.14 cents may be subject to rollback should you voters so decide.

A 6 cent increase represents a \$15 increase in tax to the average homeowner in Eastland County. The average home value in Eastland County being \$25,000.00.

We are extremely concerned for our elderly and those citizens in our agricultural community. As such, the over 65 exemptions will continue and Ag. Valuations will stay in place.

You may ask why the additional 2.914 (\$139,8223.00)? And that is a fair question.

Let me respond! Over the past ten years we have seen our reserve fund dwindle form \$1,500,000.00 to an estimated \$668,000.00 at the year end.

Of this \$668,000, \$360,000 or 10% of our annual budget must be held in reserve to ensure our ratings on our Jail certificates of obligation. This effectively leaves us with \$308,000.00 in accessible reserve.

The state of Texas recommends Counties hold a reserve of 1/4 (3 months) of its annual operating budget in reserve. Based upon this recommendation, our reserve should be \$903,000.00. At year end, we estimate that our spendable reserve will be 1 month operating overhead.

While this is a difficult, time economically to add to reserve it is critirent reserve.

I must tell you that this proposed budget is very tight. There will be You will recall that I had requested problems and there are unknowns that must be considered.

As you are aware, the County is applying for a \$250,000 grant for historic courthouse renovation. This 72year-old structure is in dire need of maintenance, rewiring, and updating. If we can get state funds it will greatly reduce the burden on our local taxpayers. However, we will be required to match a minimum of 15% or \$37,000.00 if the grand is awarded.

In addition, during the next two portation has scheduled the ongoing construction on FM 2214 south toward Stephenville. This leg of the project is estimated to cost the County \$60,000.

As unpopular as the subject is, there are many as yet unknowns with regard to our new jail facility. As long as we stay below 48 prisoners the increased operating cost should be relatively minimal. However, at prisoner 49 and above, there will be significant costs associated. The Commissioner's Court is committed to keep the numbers below 48 to the best of our ability until such time as a viable contract for paying prisoners can be executed.

One of the problems we have faced over the past 10 years is in not having

officials, the picture is much better than nally estimated in the year ending cal that we not further deplete our curour government services. Social security has averaged 1.8% annual Cost of Living Adjustment in the 90's. 1.8%, (which any Social Security recipient will tell you is very tight) means a loss of purchasing power to the County to a tune of \$65,000.00 per year.

I think that most will see that this year's budget and tax rate represents the tightest physical constraint on the part of County Government in many

At the same time, I believe it is imperative that we begin today to build our infrastructure and get to a place where we have the assets to take advantage of opportunities which might otherwise slip by.

Overall I hope you will be as pleased as I am with the progress made since the first of the year.

As always, I solicit your input, recommendations and criticism. I will staunchly defend your right to be heard and if a vote is needed, I strongly support the citizens rights in this regard.

Please prayerfully consider this budget, your public servants and the future of our County and all will be blessed with the outcome.

Once again, my thanks to the people of Eastland County and the employees of our County Government.
