

The Junior Varsity will begin the scrimmage around 6:00 p.m. with the varsity scrimmaging after. So come out to the first scrimmage and support the Panthers.







Hay Net is a national clearinghouse for producers with shortages or surpluses of hay. Farmers and ranchers are encouraged to sign up and register their hay situation at the Eastland County Service Center. FSA will use its nationwide computer network to share the information. Producers in need of hay will be provided with lists of the closest producers with hay to spare, and vice versa, allowing them to contact each other and make arrangements. "I'm very pleased to be a part of this effort," said David Martin. "It's a great tool for getting badly needed hay to people who need it as quickly and efficiently as possible. ## **CROSSROADS** Treatment Center **Opening in Gorman**

CROSSROADS Treatment Center will be opening in Gorman tenatively on September 15, 1998. The Project Director of the new facility is Jerry Gaither, of Stephenville, TX. The Center will be located at 438 Roosevelt St. (the old Blackwell Hospital building).

Crossroads Treatment Center is a residential program established for boys with alcohol and drug dependency problems. The center will provide a hightly structured and individualized program in an enviornment where youth can learn to live a life free from drugs and alcohol. The youth and their families are introduced to the priciples of recovery by a caring, highly trained team of professionals.

Mr. Gaither met with the city council last Thursday night to announce the tenative date for the opening of Crossroads. He was there to address any concerns they might have.

Crossroads has five facilities in the state of Texas. The Gorman facility will house only boys from the ages of 11 to 17 years . The average stay for each boy Executive Director of the East- eration for six months. Further is 6 to 9 months. The boys will be evaluated periodically by the Center's physician, Dr. Wilson of Granbury. The facility will house up to 32 boys. There will be three house parents living at the facility. Mr. Gaither will be bringing some of his staff from other Crossroads centers in Texas and stated they will be hiring anywhere from 30 to 45 locals. Applications will be accepted August 21, 1998. For more information you can call Mr. Gaither at 734-3733.

Mr. Gaither also stated to the city commission that there are plans in the works for a community wide meeting at the Senior Citizen's Center here in Gorman. This would give the public an opportunity to come and meet with him and express any concerns they may have. The exact date of the meeting has not been set yet. Mr. Gaither still had not met with the school to work out the particulars needed for educational purposes for his clients.

Am I ever glad to be back in the real world. I learned a lot of useful things at SMU, but having someone else do all the cooking and cleaning and landscaping kinda detached me from the real world. I've been back since Saturday the 8th, but it wasn't until my trip to Heritage Manor that I felt I had my feet on solid ground.

My District Superintendent supplied the Methodist Church here with a computer so we could send and get email. I couldn't help thinking what a change this was from letter writing with pen and ink. That sounded like a good topic for my visit with my friends at Heritage Manor. Regular mail.

The mailman (postal carrier) drove a buggy until he got a Mode "T". He would come by between 8 & 10 a.m. except on Sundays. Mondays, Cynthia Earles would find empty beer and whisky bottles in her mail box, from "Those men" that were drinkin' and partyin' Saturday night. Veno Hale said she would occasionally find "Dead meat" (unidentifiable). Nobody else had that kind of trouble, but did have to watch for packages. Sears Robuck and Montgomery Ward had lots of customers in this area. My friends remembered getting clothes, shoes, scrub boards, baby chickens and turkeys and even a wood stove through the mail. Velma Bennett remembered their mailbox and several others were mounted on a wagon wheel so the mailman could stay in one place and spin the wheel around to the right box.

Letters were real popular even though they cost 3 cents. Long distance phone calls were not even considered and telegrams were only to announce deaths. I tried to relate the 3 cents to other objects to put things in perspective. Bubble gum as a penny, people owned cows so nobody know what a gallon of milk cost, "light bread" was eight cents. It came in waxed paper, unsliced. When they started putting it in bags with a twist tie, Cynthia Earles used them and drinks at the concession stand. scrap paper for hair rollers.

That took us to heating the curling iron on the kerosene lamp and from there we went to the "right way" to blow them out. Except for an Aladin Lamp, you turned it down to put it out. It also gave off more light. If anyone has one of these, I would like to see it.
