Dear Mr. Baker: I would attempt to answer your questions in chronological order if I were able to understand the intent of the five seemingly related questions. As posed, the five questions all demand the obvious answer, "no". But then you seem to indicate that a "yes" answer to these questions demands support of Kennedy.

Pending further explanation or clarification of the questions, I would answer "no" and continue to support Kennedy. I consider Ruether a strong and efficient labor leader.

You agree the Eisenhower Administrations "have not been perfect." I would say! I think Eisenhower has proved, as did Grant, that a military hero is much more efficient in vote-getting in a governmental administration, after being elected by the un-informed, unreasoning, hero worshipping segment within the electorate. Other Allied Commanders do not seem to share the opinion of the Eisenhower supporters as to his greatness as a military strategist.

I do not believe my desire for agriculture to attain a fair share of the national income, or my wish that the nation should attain a better balanced economy, indicates a preference for a socialist state. Supporter of the Eisenhower Administrations often resort to calling liberals "socialists" as a retaliatory measure, since they can offer no plausible defense of Eisenhower's Defense, Agricultural and Economic policies.

As you are a Republican, I can understand your esteem for Mr. Byrd and Eastland. This fact is devoted campaigner for the Republican Party. His discourses are so biased as to become ridiculous.

The Democratic Party in Congress has failed to pass constructive domestic legislation over the Eisenhower vetoes, because of the conservative faction led by such as Byrd and Eastland. This fact is masquerades as Democrats in election years, in predominately Democratic states, then betray the Democratic party by voting with the Republicans in Congress.

If, as you think, Truman tried to throttle the Press, his effort must have been a singular failure.

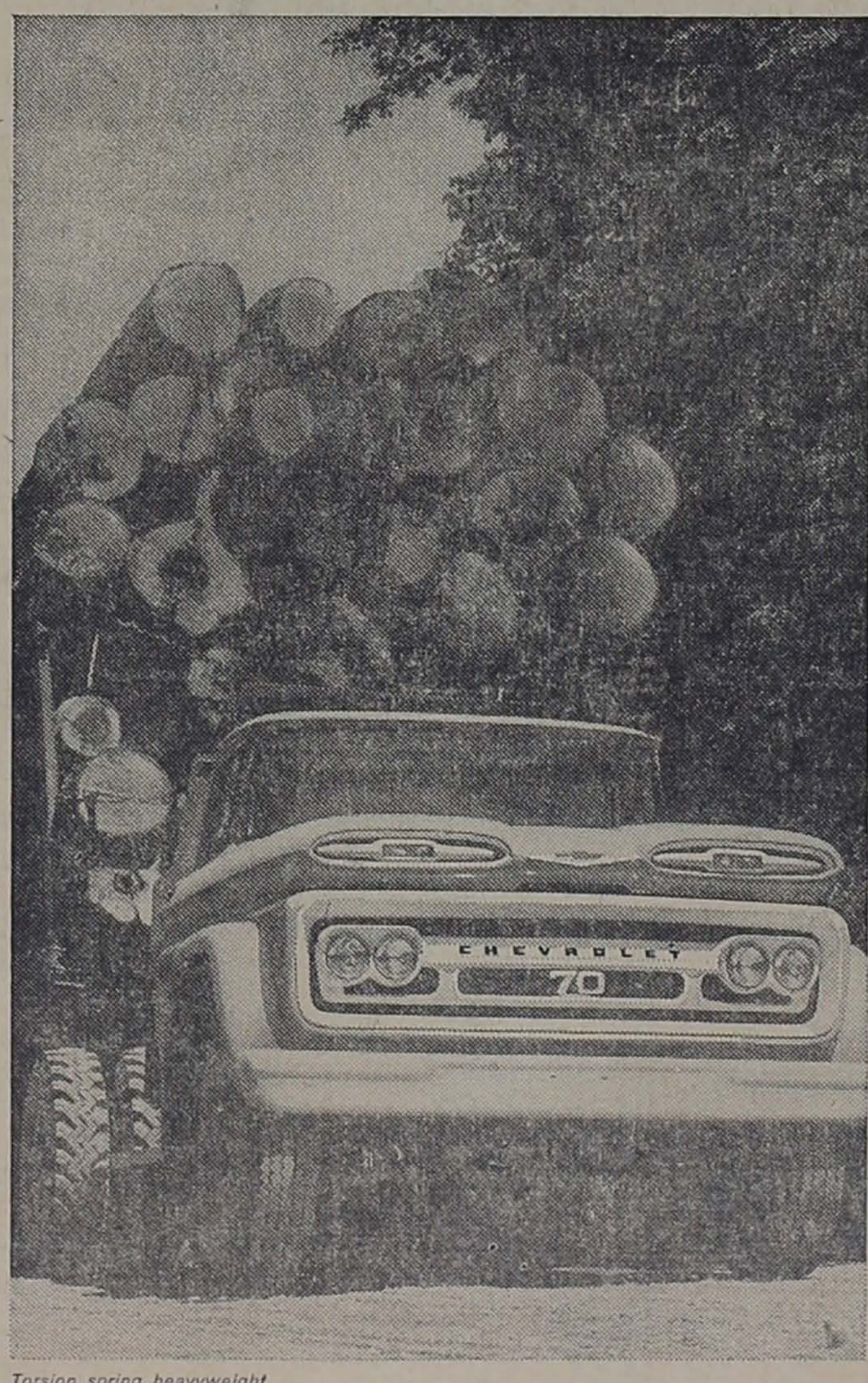

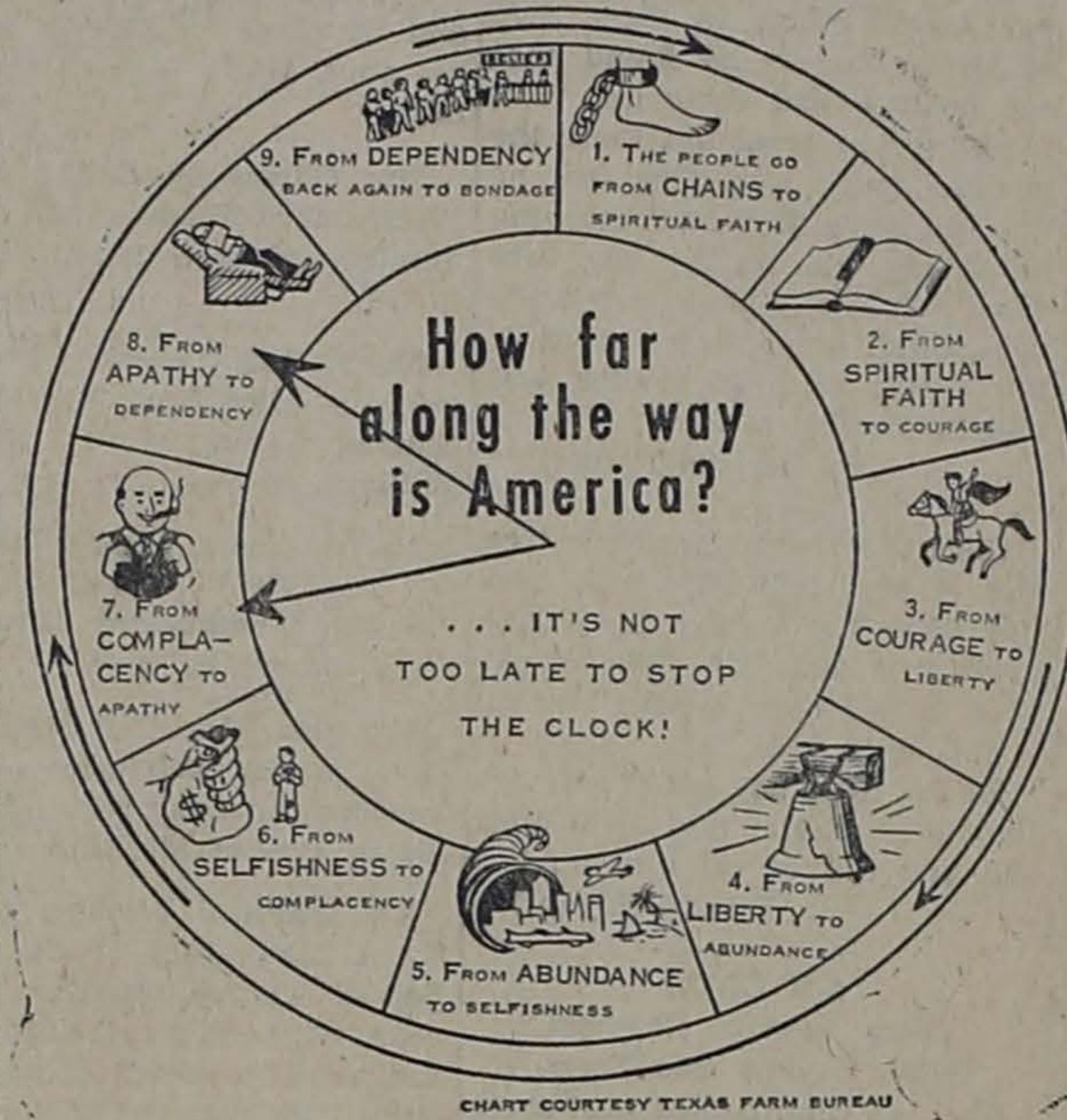

FLOOR SQUEAKS

Squeaky floors are not the result of overactive spooks in our homes. But regardless of the cause, a squeaky floor is a nuisance. Fortunately, it can generally be eliminated.

The squeaking of wooden floors is caused by the rubbing of the tongue of one strip of flooring in the groove of the adjoining strip. Floors will squeak if the floor joists and sub-floor foundations are not straight and anchored tightly. A slight deflection can be sufficient to cause movement between the tongue and groove joint and create squeaking.

Floor squeaks can be eliminated in several ways. Finish nails can be driven through the face of the offending flooring strips to prevent movement. These nails should be driven close to the tongue edge of the strip, through the sub-floor and, if possible, into a joist. The nails should then be set about 1/16" deep and the hole filled. Another method to control squeaking is to fasten the sub-floor to the finished flooring with screws from underneath. Often, floor squeaking can be controlled by lubricating the tongue and groove joints with small amounts of mineral oil.

Jack also was elected vice-president of the Oil Belt District of Student Councils while in high school and served as president of the school band.

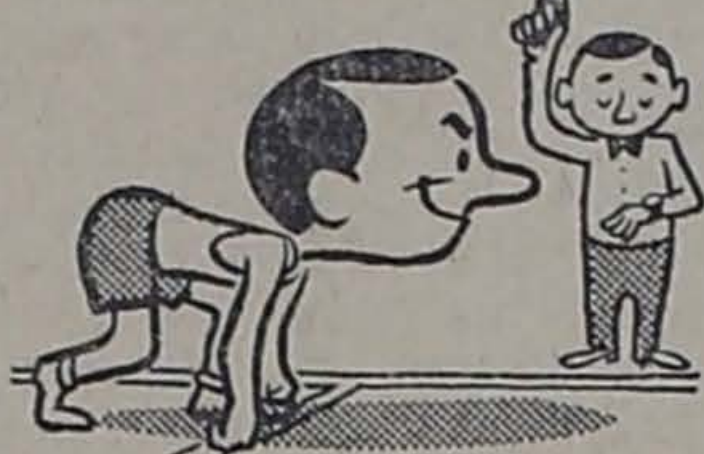
Jack plans to go right into graduate work after graduation in January and is taking two graduate courses now.

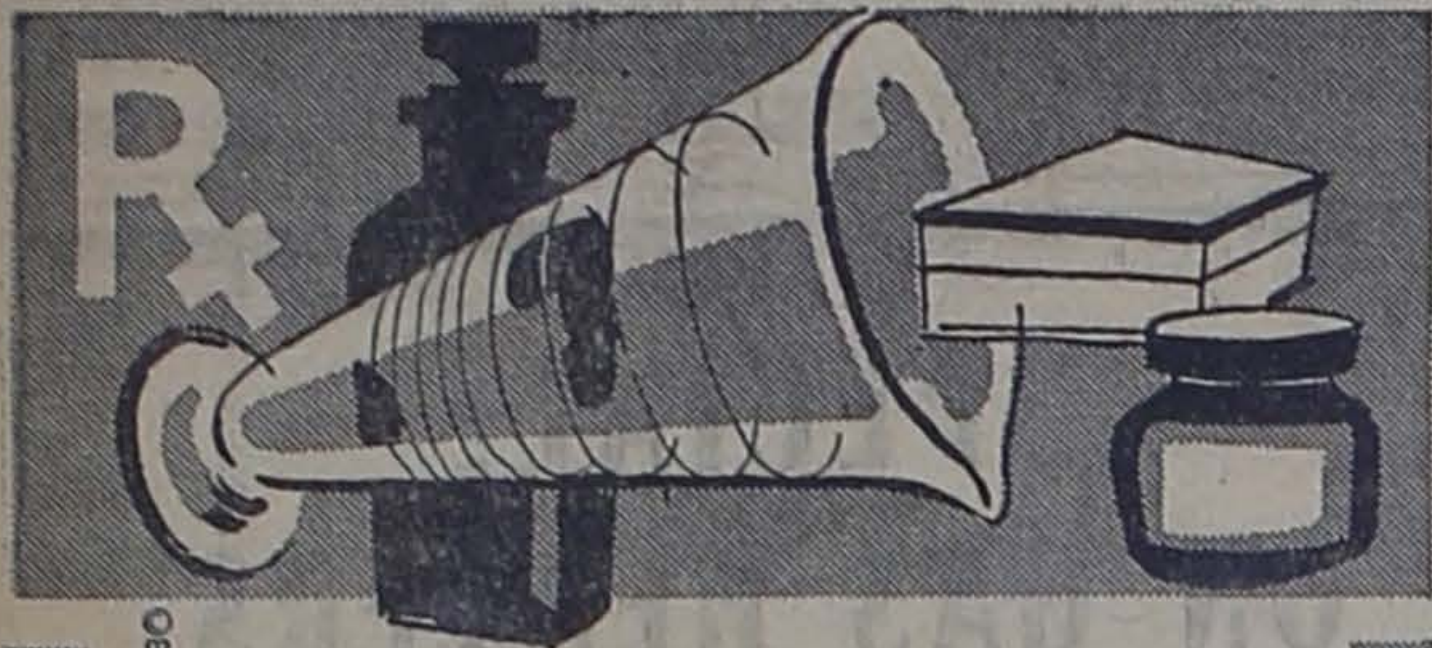
