Gorman's 42-Year Old Water Tank Receives Repairs

The \$6800 repair job on the City's 42-year old water tank is expected to be completed this week.

During the past week a crew of men from the United Bridge and Iron Co. of Tulsa, Oklahoma have worked night and day shifts in replacing the saucer base and the top ring, setting the pipe, sealing section seams and welding pits of the 75,000 gallon heavy-gauge steel tank.

An acid-resisting chemical coating, Farbertite, is being applied to the interior, followed by an application of a germicide chemical. Mayor James Mears stated that the "turn-key" contract has a 12-year guarantee with biennial inspection and resanitizing.

Previous investigation shows that a replacement with a new tank with 40-year life expectancy would have cost an initial outlay of 32 thousand dollars.

The tank can last and certainly is expected to last some years beyond the 12-year guarantee.

Gorman Fire Key Rate Is Reduced

Property owners in Gorman will probably save about \$1,230 on fire insurance premiums in the next 12 months, as a one-cent fire key rate decrease ordered by the State Board of Insurance will bring the cost of premiums down seven per cent from 1961, when they totaled \$17,564.

The latest decrease, effective November 15, lowered the rate from 48 to 47 cents. In 1961, it was 54 cents, but was cut by six cents earlier this year.

The fire key rate is the basic premium paid on each \$100 worth of insurance.

The Board determines rates after studying an analysis made by its examiners and balancing "charges" for fire hazards and "credits" for protective techniques.

Charges against Gorman totaled 53 cents, including: Twenty-four cents for inadequate water storage and supply units; two cents for deficient fire hydrants; 10 cents for a wholly-volunteer fire department; three cents for inadequate fire apparatus, and four cents for absence of a fire alarm system.

Also, a penalty of five cents was made for deficient building laws; two cents for unpaved streets, and three cents for conflagration hazards, such as overhead wires and frame ranges in mercantile districts.

The rate was reduced to 47 cents, after a six-cent credit was awarded for maintenance of an arson reward, booster trucks and night watch service, and for methods of fire prevention taught in public schools.
