

## FOOTBALL PRACTICE TO BEGIN MONDAY FOR PANTHERS OF 1967

The Gorman High School Panthers of 1967 will officially begin their football season on Monday, August 14, with two-a-day workouts in shorts. First day for issuing contact equipment is August 21. The club will begin two-a-day contact activities on that day. The morning workout will begin at 7:00 and the evening workout will begin at 6:00.

The Panthers were hit hard by graduation last year, losing eight stalwarts by that route. Another player is lost because of eligibility. On the positive side of the ledger, however, twelve lettermen return to fill the starting positions vacated by seven seniors. Returning Panthers who appear unusually hungry to make this a successful season include four all-district players: Tommy Simmons, John Shell, Jim Tom Garrett, and Daryl Hirst, as well as other standouts last year in the form of Ed Sutton, Jimmy Warren, Wayne Huff, David Guthery, Robert Redman, Doyle Shipman, Leslie Sharp, and Jerry Mathews are among the lettermen expected to help out also.

Also on the bright side of the picture are a crop of fine freshmen expected to report for workouts this season. This is a hopeful sign, for in the past several seasons there have been few freshmen coming out for football. This fine crop of freshmen hopefuls should help keep those up-perclassmen on their toes.

Coach Joe Neill stated on Wednesday that he was looking forward to working with the fine bunch of athletes in Gorman.

As of Wednesday the position of assistant coach was still undetermined.

There is also a position open on the faculty for a band director.

## PHILLIP LEWIS WINS THIRD IN FIDDLERS CONTEST

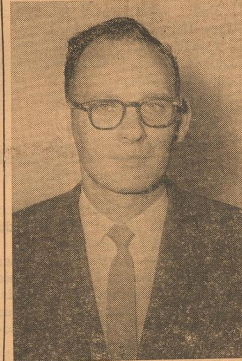

## \$2,642,745.20 CONTRACTS LET FOR LAKE PROCTOR WATER FACILITIES

Othell Clark and Ross Wilson, members of the Upper Leon Municipal Water District Board representing Gorman, attended a meeting last Wednesday night and the following contracts were awarded.

Contracts for \$2,642,745.20 were awarded Wednesday night, subject to approval of the local Water Board and of HUD, for the new water treatment plant to be located at Lake Proctor.

The new facilities at Lake Proctor will provide water for the cities of Dublin, De Leon, Comanche, and Gorman.

Elm Fork Construction Company of Dallas was awarded Contract A for the water treatment facilities. The contract was for \$893,800.

Preload, Inc. was the low bidder for the one million gallon reservoir to be located at the Filter Plant, with a bid of \$79,800.

ence in Dallas on August 3, on the implementation of Title XIX, commonly referred to as Medicaid, of the Social Security Act in Texas.

The one-day meeting, sponsored by the Texas Nursing Home Association, State Department of Public Welfare, and Texas State Department of Health was based on the theme, "Meet The Challenge Of Change," and dealt with the responsibilities of the nursing home and state employees under this new program.

Title XIX, being implemented in Texas starting September 1st, will replace the current Kerr-Mills welfare programs which have been functioning in Texas since 1962. This new, joint federal and state program, will initially provide the following services to certain categorical groups of the medically indigent welfare recipients: physician services, in-patient hospital services, out-patient hospital services, skilled nursing home services, and other laboratory and x-ray services. These services will be available to the eligible blind, aged, and totally

and permanently disabled and families of dependent children. Medicaid is the companion legislation to medicare passed by Congress in 1965 as a part of Public Law 89-97. Since medicare is a joint federal-state program, while medicare is strictly a federal program, each state legislature had to pass legislation enabling the state to participate in the program. Senate Bill 2, passed by the Texas Legislature and signed by Governor John Connally on May 11, 1967, was Texas' enabling legislation.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office or position for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold

any other office or position of profit under this state, or the United States."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

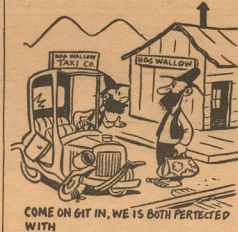
