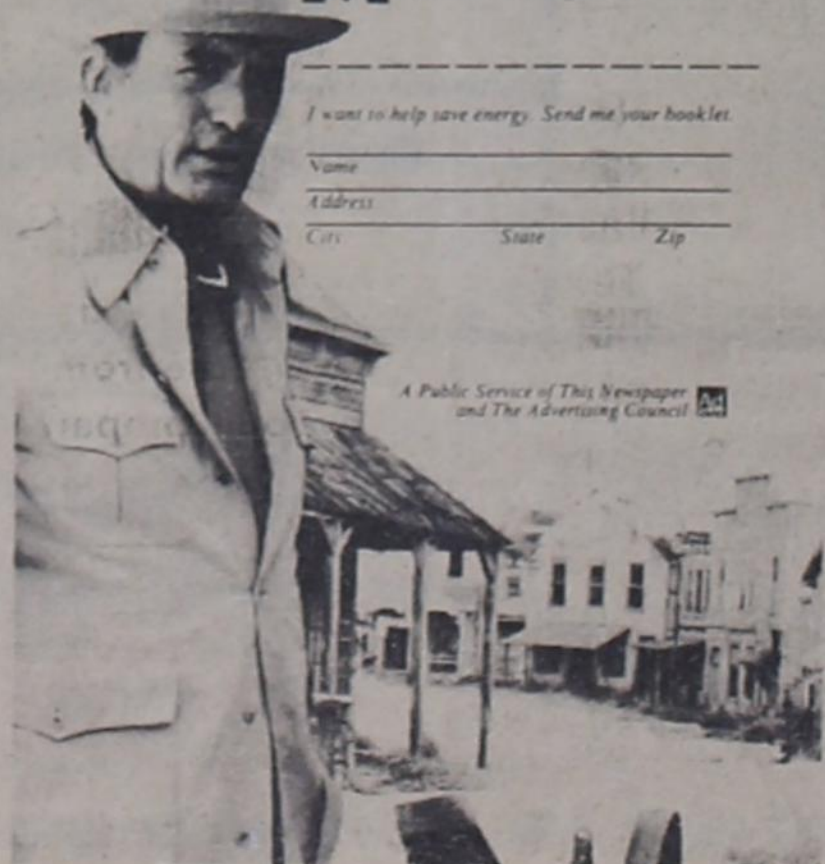

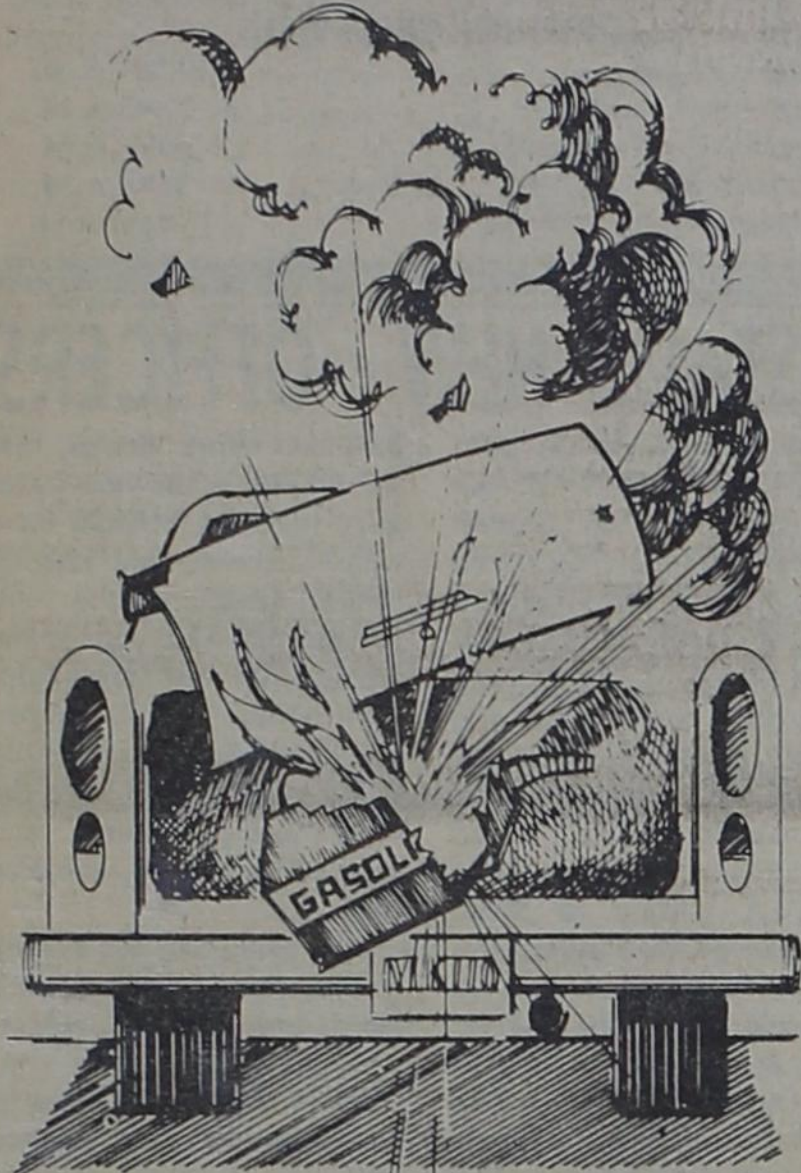

## SAVE \$\$\$\$ , SAVE FUEL



From the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation

According to recent surveys, the American driving public in general looks on fuel conservation at this time as a need to save money because of the escalating cost of fuel. But whether the drivers want to save money or to save fuel, the final result is the same — less fuel is consumed.

Many drivers once knew how to drive in a fuel-efficient manner, usually learned in a desire to conserve a high schooler's allowance for other pleasures. And many first-time car owners used every bit of know-how to up the mpg of their pride and joy. The savings of those simple driving tips are substantial — as a one-time automotive editor discovered when he checked out a story.

The editor learned of a Southern California driver who could nearly double the average driver's gas mileage. Checking on it, the editor rented a car and drove it for several hours over Los Angeles streets. Later he met with the expert and asked her to follow the same route. Against his 13.2 mpg over that route, in the same car the expert got 23.33 mpg.

She explained her system, which she called "feather-footing," as driving as if there were an egg between her foot and the accelerator.

You can save money and fuel by using her tips — but don't use a real egg:

Driving an automatic transmission-equipped car? Use gentle starts to get it into the highest gear quicker...that means more turns of the drive wheels per piston stroke...which means less fuel used.

Car running rough? Something as simple as a tune-up can possibly bring another five miles from every gallon of fuel.

Tires underinflated? Not only does underinflation wear them out faster, the rolling resistance on the road reduces mileage 1 mpg or more.

Vacations-by-the-tankful: Planning a fuel-conserving trip away from the trials and tribulations of the workaday world can be simple for most Texans. Simply spread out an Official State Travel Map and plot an 11-inch circle (5 1/2 inches each way) around your home. Any place in that circle should be available for a vacation.

(In case you don't have a map handy, travel hints in these columns will contain directions and mileages.)

Texans in the Dallas/Fort Worth metropolplex can select from a wide range of interesting trips. For instance, there's Granbury, population 4,927. Picturesquely located on Lake Granbury, the county seat of Hood County was settled in 1854 by Thomas Lambert who united with the settlement called Stockton to form the nucleus of Granbury. The city square is on the National Register of Historic Places and historical tours are available. Annual Granbury events include a rodeo in March, a junior rodeo in April, a giant July 4th celebration and Square Fair with a Harvest Festival and arts and crafts in mid-October. The Granbury Opera House on the square was built in 1866 and restored and reopened in 1975. With productions occasionally throughout the year, 12 weeks of summer stock are produced.

Acton State Park is a historical site only. The small park, about six miles east of Granbury, contains the grave of Elizabeth Crockett, second wife of Davy, and monument erected by order of the 1911 Texas Legislature.

Lake Granbury is an 8,500-acre impoundment of the Brazos at De Cordova Bend, Parks, camps and service facilities for outdoor recreation dot the 103-mile shoreline. The lake courses by the city following the looping channel to the dam named for Jacob de Cordova. A man of unusual abilities, de Cordova accumulated land scrip for more than a million Texas acres and lectured throughout the East, billing himself as "publicity agent of an empire" to stimulate interest in Texas.

ROUTE: From Fort Worth, US 377 southwest through Cresson (41 miles). Reverse route for return.

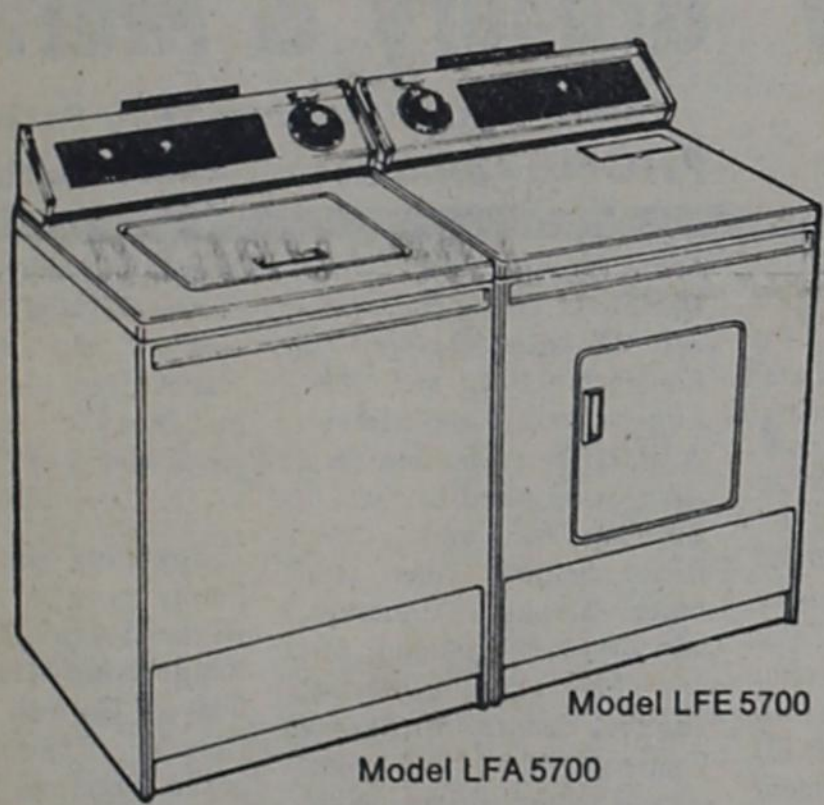
### Three County 4-H Members Participate In Fashion Revue

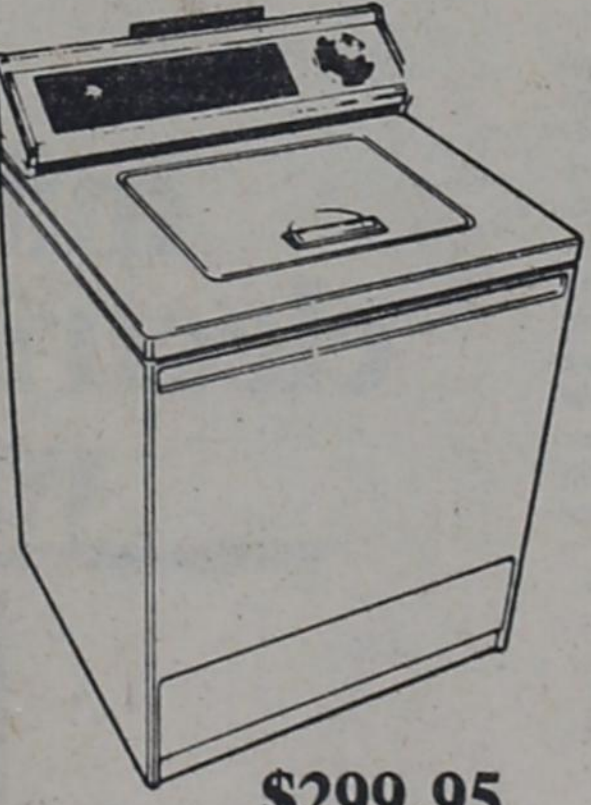

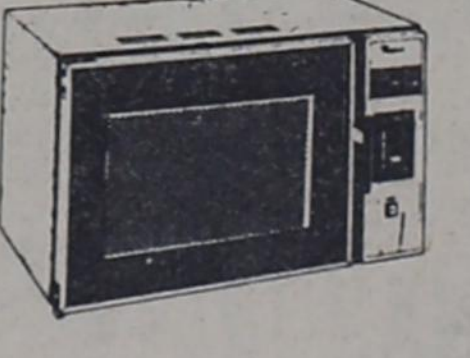

**CITY CHIT CHAT**

The City Commission met in regular session on June 21, at 8:00 A.M. with the Mayor and all Commissioners present, except Hershell Cordell. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.  
The Commission discussed the tax situation at length and implications that the new tax bill 1060 might have on our city tax structure. At this time we know that this bill calls for a county wide equalization of property

values and set all property at 100% of market value. It is uncertain just how soon this program will be set in motion. With all of the uncertainties of just what would be done in this matter, the Commission voted to rescind the action taken on May 3, 1979 that would have raised all values 10% for tax purposes. We feel that we can cut some figures in the budget and still be able to operate for the current year without this raise.  
In view of the fact that we rescinded the tax increase of 10%, we decided that we would exercise the option to

continue taxing automobiles for this year. Ordinance 279 was read for the first time that will allow the city to continue to tax at least for this year. Many of the cities and school districts within the county are continuing this tax on automobiles. We are aware of the fact that many of the cars are not on the tax roll at the present time, but we will make an effort to put all of them on the rolls for this year. We are asking the citizens to cooperate with us in this matter since we did decide not to increase tax values. After this year, it might be possible to drop all cars and light trucks except those used in conducting a business.

Arlton Smith was elected as president of the Equalization Board and Hershell Cordell was elected as secretary. The Board will meet in a work session on June 26 at 7:00 P.M. At this meeting we will be looking at new property, improvements that have been made, and will possibly be adjusting some values up and possible some down. May I again remind you that we say we are assessing taxes on 30% of market value, when in reality, we are assessing on about 10% to 15%. Take a look at your statement from last year and multiply it by three and one third and then decide if you would sell your property for that amount. In most cases if you multiply by six, seven, eight or even ten or twelve you might get a figure that you would consider selling your property for. We know that this is true and needs correcting, which we hope will be done when we get the county wide appraisal done. This should make our taxes more equalized for all of our citizens. It will not mean that the amount of taxes you pay will skyrocket, but they will go up as inflation continues to go up. The public meeting for the Equalization Board will be announced later.

Work shops were discussed and suggestions were sent to WCTCOG in Abilene as to some topics that would be good to cover in the work-shops. Subject matter and dates will be set in the near future and we expect both our elected officials as well as employees to take part in some of these sessions.

Some salaries were adjusted for the last employees who went to work for the city. These adjustment brought these salaries up to just above the minimum wage. We normally review salaries near the end of the calendar year and grant increase as we can afford with the beginning of the new year. We want all of our employees to understand that we would like to make more and better adjustments if possible, but this can not be done without additional income from taxes, which we are not

getting.  
The Commission appointed Limneo Aguila, M.D. as City Health Officer for the year, beginning on June 21, 1979 to that date in 1980.  
We are waiting for a report from Abilene on our request for a grant to redo the theater building. We should know something soon on this.

The Equipment is on the grounds for the work on the water tower and will start within the next two to three weeks. The contractor is waiting now for Robert to return from National Guard Camp.

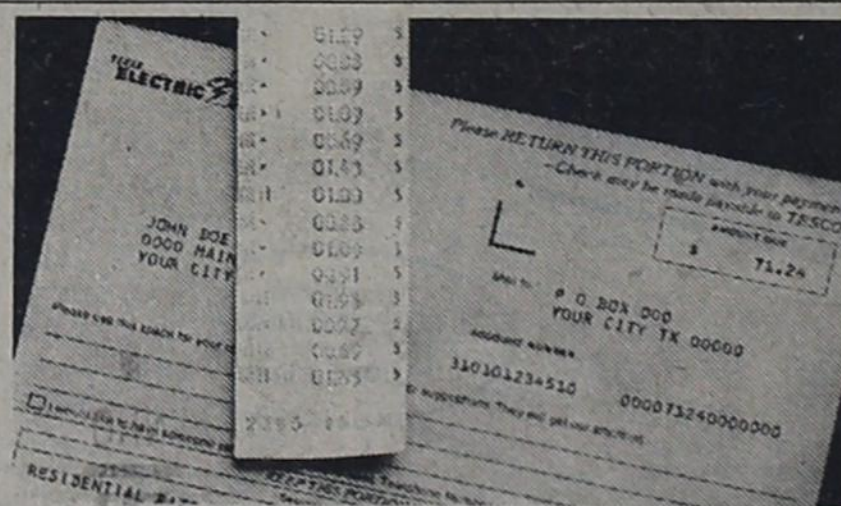
