## Our Medical Care Is Threatened by PL-93:641

The Administrator, Richard Arnold of Blackwell Hospital has released the third in a series of news releases from the Hubbard Lake Hospital Group, Inc. and Northeast Texas Health Advisory Group concerning PL-93:641, The National Health Planning and Resources Development Act of 1974.

### OUR MEDICAL CARE THREATENED

It has become obvious over the last several weeks that a very real threat exists to hospitals, nursing homes and the general quality of medical care in Gorman and towns like Gorman.

The threat comes from the National Health Planning and Resource Development Act of 1974, a new federal law that creates an experimental "two-level" system of medical care.

In plain language, what the law sets up is a plan that would force anyone with any kind of serious illness to go to a "region-all" center for treatment, leaving small-town doctors with hospitals that are only first-aid stations and with arbitrary bureaucratic regulations in place of their own good judgment to decide which cases they can or cannot handle.

First-rate doctors will not move into a "primary care" (meaning simple care only) area where they are allowed to use only a few of their skills and those already here will have little reason to stay.

Ed Miller, the Texarkana attorney who headed the steering system to set up the Northeast Texas Health Systems Agency under this new law, told a public hearing in Marshall last month that there was no doubt it meant "sweeping changes" in the whole health care delivery system. And he rightly added that anyone who didn't like it should look to Washington and try to change the law.

The federal government is reaching out to take more control over peoples' lives, but access to close-by, first-rate medical care is too basic a need to lose without a fight. So be sure to let Congress know your need and wants, Act today for your cause.

The many retired persons who've moved to your county and other rural parts of Texas will be forced back to the cities they left if that's where all the doctors are. And there are many other implications, all frightening to people in rural areas.

If you have a heart attack or a bad accident, you want the quickest medical attention you can get, even if transfer to a larger medical center is indicated.

A town is made up of many services, merchants with a variety of inventories desired by buyers, food stores, drug stores, services of such professionals as lawyers, accountants, insurance agents, and the usual government services. Schools are necessary to make a complete city, too. And certainly adequate medical care is essential to the make-up of a complete town.

Government planners should recognize this! Your reason for residing in or near a town is made up of all these above facilities. There is no reason for the existence of a town or city unless it has a complete range of services and goods to offer its area residents, particularly medical care of the first class.

Doctors, nurses and technicians can go elsewhere to practice their professions. So it's the people — not the medical health team — who have the most to lose.

What better time than the Bicentennial year to see whether elected officials shall pay any attention to what the people want?

## Ralph Dunn Gets Radar Patent

Ralph L. Dunn of Gorman has received a patent on "Surveillance Radar" Number 39-45005. The patent was awarded March 16, 1976. The Surveillance Radar was developed by Mr. Dunn in his last years with the department of the Army where he served as an electrical engineer for 30 years, specializing in radar technique for battlefield surveillance. Mr. Dunn retired in 1972 when he and his wife, Ruth, moved to Gorman. They are active members of First United Methodist Church and he is Junior Warden of Gorman Masonic Lodge.

The "Surveillance Radar" exemplary claim reads: Is a radar apparatus having a pulsed transmitter source of linearly polarized radio-frequency energy, a duplexer, a receiver, and a directional antenna system including a rotatable dipole antenna for radiating linearly polarized-frequency energy, means interconnecting said duplexer and said dipole antenna for rotating said linearly polarized energy at a prescribed rate, means for rotating said dipole antenna in a vertical plane at said prescribed rate, a cathode ray tube indicator means independent of said pulsed transmitter source and in a circuit with said cathode ray tube indicator for generating a circular trace on the face of said cathode ray tube indicator, and means in circuit with said cathode ray tube indicator and said responsive to the video output of said receiver of distorting the clutter pattern from natural targets along the perimeter of said circular trace when the linear polarization energy is reflected from a man-made target having a defined plane polarization.

In a letter accompanying the patent stated: "The issuance of the patent is evidence and official recognition of original and creative work on your part. We commend you and your inventive effort and appreciate your interest and cooperation in protecting the interest of the government in the invention."

The patent is assigned to the U. S. Government. —GP—

## USDA Names Peanut Adm. Committee

Appointment of six members and their alternates to serve on the Peanut Administrative Committee was announced April 26th by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The 18-member committee, consisting of nine producers and nine handlers, recommends regulations to apply under the federal peanut marketing agreement. W. C. Knope, field rep. with USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, in Lakeland, Fla., said the program provides quality control of peanuts to ensure that only wholesome peanuts are allowed into edible outlets.

Each production area: South eastern, Southwestern, and Virginia-Carolina - is entitled to three producer and three handler members, with an alternate for each.

Members named for the Southwestern area are: Producers - Wayne Eaves, Gorman; and E. A. Walker, De Leon. Handlers - George W. Moorow, Denison, and T. H. Birdsong, III, Gorman. —GP—

Lewis, says that "there is one vice of which no man in the world is free; which everyone in the world loathes when he sees it in someone else; and of which hardly any people, except Christians, ever imagine that they are guilty themselves. My friends, I write today to ask you for your prayers. The sin of pride has been pointed out in my life on many occasions and I need help to handle it. To those I have hurt because of my pride, I ask forgiveness. To those who criticize, I ask your prayers, not your criticism. I'm just a fellow struggler, trying to bring it all together. The road is not always easy, and I need some help. Whenever we find that our religious life is making us feel that we are good-above all, that we are better than someone else - I think we may be sure that we are being acted on, not by God, but by the Devil. In my own life, I think I've been believing the devil, and I will need God to change me. How about you? David Currie

Our Lord's promise is based on the condition, "whosoever . . . shall confess me before men." As a declaration of one's faith in Christ, confession is a step all must take to get into Christ. (Acts 8:37). However, the word "confess" appears in other passages of scripture as an admission of one's sins. It is stated as a condition for the forgiveness of sins. For example, John wrote, "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (I John 1:9).

A fundamental truth taught in the New Testament is: confession before forgiveness. For one to have his sins forgiven, he must confess his sins. Since the establishment of the church on Pentecost, confess-

ion, whether it be a declaration of one's faith in Christ or whether it be an admission of one's sins, is absolutely essential to salvation. The Holy Spirit directed John to write, "Every spirit that confesseth that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh is of God; and every spirit that confesseth not that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh is not of God; and this that spirit of antichrist." 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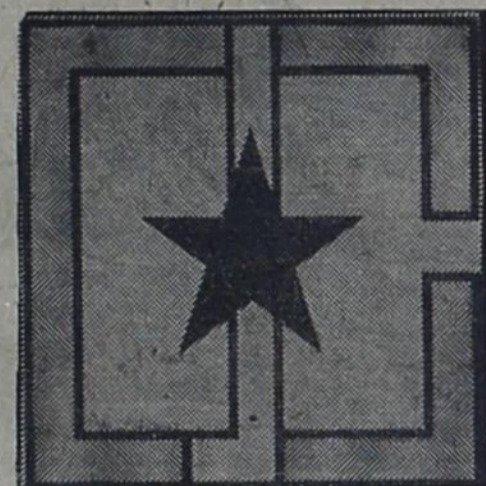
