

The second largest processing plant is Smith Drying storing and sales. The owner is Arlton Smith and he too has progressed in the past few years; enlarging in drying and storing facilities and has been selling quality seed for many years. Arlton too, is very civic-minded; ahving served on the City Commission for many years.

Last year, a group of progressive farmers built a drying and processing plant known as the Farmers' Peanut Co., Inc. They too have a very modern plant and plans are in the making that in addition to processing the farmers' peanuts; they expect to have all kinds of equipment and supplies that are not available locally at this time.

TWENTIETH CENTURY CLUB OF STEPHENVILLE OPENS SEASON

When the Twentieth Century Club of Stephenville opens its club season in October, Mrs. Clyde S. King will begin her sixty-second year of federated club work. She will be a member of the Texas Heritage Committee.

When an older sister, the late Mrs. W. J. Lasater, began organizing Gorman women into a federated club, Alice Neill was a student in high school. As the deadline approached for submitting the application and the club was one member short, her mother (the late Mrs. J. T. Neill) told Alice to sign the

During the first year of the Excelsior Club, Alice received high school credit through The University of Texas Department of Extension on work she did as a club member. The program followed an outline provided by Dr. Killis Campbell, director and focused on the American short story.

To receive the credit, the young clubwoman took a written test covering the works of such writers as Bret Harte, Edgar Allan Poe, O. Henry and George W. Cable.

An examination of early Excelsior Club books shows that members paid five cents a month and ten cents for any unexcused absences. Members of that organization included two of Alice's sisters (Mrs. W. J. Lasater and Mrs. Martha Sutton) and a future sister-in-law, Mrs. Ethel Harrell.

In 1923 Alice served as president of the club, whose

Business Firms

Comptroller Bob Bullock alerted Texas businessmen Monday to begin looking for a friendly visit from a Comptroller's enforcement officer sometime during the next nine months.

The Comptroller said that the enforcement officers from his 40 field offices will fan out across the state with the goal of offering personal assistance to each and every Texas business.

A testing of the canvassing program in July showed that 19 percent of taxpayers contacted required assistance or needed permits, he said.

In 1956 she won first place and \$25 in state competition for an article on Erath County Legends. She also received \$10 and first place in state contests for the best story on Texas folklore by an individual club member. Last year she won first prize in the federation's Texas Heritage Department for her report on Erath County cemeteries and ghost towns.

The late Mrs. G. O. Ferguson, in an published history of the Twentieth Century Club, called her one of two "watch-dogs" of the club's treasury.

Her son, Dr. C. Richard King, professor of journalism at The University of Texas, Austin, and her daughter, Mrs. B. Jack Arnall of Houston, say they have been the beneficiaries of Mrs. King's clubwork.

"As a mother's life is enriched through friendship and study, she becomes a happier person, and the whole family benefits," says Mrs. Arnall.

"When Mother was preparing a club program on Madame Chiang Kai-shek years and years ago, she must have read every book and magazine article in the library. And she shared her reading with us," recalls Dr. King.


