The Abilene attorney and businessman announced his candidacy as a Democrat on August 16 with a one-day flying tour of the 17th Congressional District.

Rhodes announcement came one week after Congressman Omar Burleson, who served the District in Washington for 32 years, announced that he would retire at the end of the present term.

Since announcing his candidacy, Rhodes has visited over 50 cities in 31 counties, and has been putting together a campaign organization that will be active in all 33 counties of the 17th Congressional District.

"I've been talking with businessmen, farmers and ranchers, elected officials, and hundreds of friends from all walks of life," Rhodes said.

"The campaign is off to a great start. Support is strong in every county," he added.

"Wherever I go," Rhodes said,"the issues that people raise run along similar lines."

"But the one thing that people feel strongest about is the amount of red tape and governmental control over more and more aspects of people's lives."

Rhodes said a number have asked him how long it will take as a new congressman to have any influence in Washington.

"My answer is that seniority is on the way out in Congress. In recent years the rules have changed to take much of the power away from committee chairman.





"I have announced my candidacy for Governor of Texas. I'm confident I can and will win.

"According to a statewide poll, 6 out of 10 people are ready for a new governor. The poll only confirmed what I've been hearing all over Texas this year. People are against the idea of anyone holding the state's highest office for 10 years. No governor has asked for 10. No governor has been given 10. It goes against a tradition that's as old as Texas itself.

"There are other reasons folks are ready for a new governor. State spending has jumped from \$3 billion to \$8 billion the last 6 years. The Dallas Morning News reported, 'during Briscoe's years in office, nearly all state government will have gone on a spending spree.' And the Governor has done nothing to discourage it. He's vetoed less than two-tenths of one per cent of the two previous budgets and not one penny's worth of the current appropriations; it's the first time that's happened in twenty years. In a related story, the News pointed to the fact that during the Briscoe years the number of employees paid by the state has risen by 50,000.

"And, while we've heard the boast of 'no new taxes,' we've seen our property taxes increase by \$1 billion along with substantial hikes in state licensing fees.

and ranches.



NATO EXCERISE

Navy Airman Apprentice Michael J. Keith, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mack J. Keith of P. O. Box 13, Gorman is participating in the major NATO exercise "Display Determination."

He is serving as a vrew member aboard the amphibious assault ship USS Guadalcanal, homeported in Norfolk, Va. The Guadalcanal is deployed as a unit of the U.S. Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean Sea.

His command has joined naval forces from Portugal, Italy, Greece, Turkey, and the United Kingdom for the combined exercise which includes convoy operation on s, amphibious assault landings and antisubmarine warfare maneuvers.

"Display Determination" is designed to train NATO naval forces in combined sea operations, refine NATO procedures aand ensure that operational plans are current. Participating units will test NATO standardized doctrines, equipment and armaments, plus command and control procedures for coordinated action by NATO sea, land and air forces.

The operation will evaluate allied capability to control Mediterranean sea I an es, plus reinforce and resupply ground forces in Southern Europe. Acting as opposing forces, NATO units will simulate surface, subsurface and air attacks along the convoy routes. A series of amphibious landings also are scheduled at Saros Bay, Turkey, with follow-on exercises continuing ashore.

"Display Determination" is one of a series of annual operations, conducted each fall from Norway to Turkey, designed to provide unified and coordinated training of national and NATO forces within the Allied European Command.

A 1976 graduate of Gorman High School, he joined the Navy in July 1976.
