Crafty Ideas FOR EASY EASTER BUNNY ANYTHING GOES WITH STYROFOAM

Make this adorable bunny this Easter with STYRO-FOAM* brand plastic foam. This furry creature is simple to make and the kids can help!



To make the bunny's face, glue a 1" ball of Styrofoam 2" down from the top of a 6" x 4" egg, for the nose. (Use 1" chenille stem to hold in place.) For cheeks, glue 1" balls on each side, slightly below the nose. Use a file or palette knife to tuck a 3" square of nylon hose around the nose and cheeks. Tuck fabric by holding firmly with thumb and use a palette knife to tuck it into Styrofoam 1/4" or more around each shape. Tuck the edges completely into Styrofoam. Glue plastic eyes on each side of the nose. Body: To the 6" x 4" egg, glue one half of a 1/2" x 2" egg of Styrofoam on either side for the "arms". (Cut egg with a plastic serrated knife.) For the hands, cut a 1" ball in half and glue at end of arms. Tuck a 3 1/2" circle of white fur around each arm and a piece of hose around each hand. Tuck 5" x 1" white fur across top of the face from cheek to cheek. To make the ears, fold a 6" white bump chenille in half with a 3" pink bump chenille in the middle, shape and push into the top of the head. Glue to hold. Repeat for the other ear. Then tuck 4" x 5" white fur from back of ears down the back of the bunny. If material wrinkles, cut small darts to fit the shape of the egg. Tuck pieces of fur in front

and sides to cover the rest of the egg. Glue a white pom-pom on back for tail. To make the bunny's carrot, fold a green bump chenille in half and point open end upward. Lay an orange bump chenille downward and pin to the hand. Make the "feet" by cutting a 1 1/2" x 2" egg in half and cover with white felt.

Attach both to the body with T pins. Finally, cut 2 small teeth from white felt and attach under the nose.

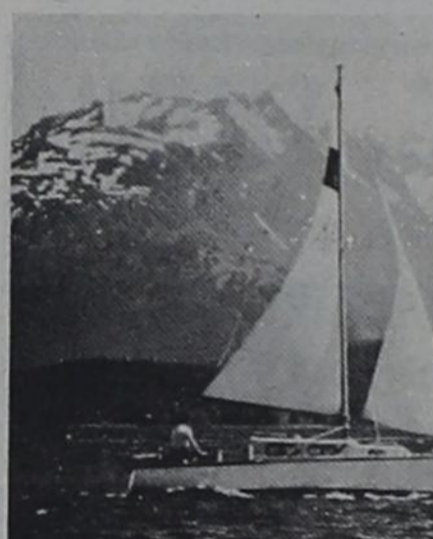

Homemaking Hints

This week marks the 1982 National Poison Week. The theme for this year observance is "Children Act Fast...So Do Poisons."

To prevent poisoning accidents, we all need to practice safety rules in our homes.

Adult carelessness is usually a direct cause of accidental poisonings. Poisonous household plants cause the greatest number of child poisonings. Detergents, cleaners, and soaps rank second. Vitamin and mineral preparations rank third. Until the 1970's, aspirin was the substance most commonly involved in poisonings of young children. However, since safety closures were put in use, deaths of young children from aspirin ingestion have decreased 76 percent.

Parents and grandparents might use the following check-list to poison proof their homes.

Keep all household products and medicines out of the reach of children and preferably, locked up when not in use.

When these products are in use, never let them out of your sight—even if you must answer the telephone or doorbell. Take them with you!

Store internal medicines separately from other household products.

Keep items in their original containers.

Leave the original labels on all products, and read the label before using.

Avoid taking medicines in front of children since youngsters tend to imitate grown-up.

Refer to medicines as "medicine" and not as

"candy."

Clean out the medicine cabinet periodically, and dispose of unneeded medicines when the illness for which they were prescribed is over.

Use safety packaging properly — by closing the container securely after use.

Is your home poison-proof? If it's not, someone may get hurt. Take time to poison-proof your home now!!!

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK STRAWBERRY ANGEL FOOD DESSERT

1 large angel food cake
1 cup milk
1 (3 oz.) pkg. strawberry jello
1 (20 oz.) pkg. frozen strawberries
1 pkg. vanilla instant pudding mix
2 cups vanilla ice cream
1 cup boiling water
Whipping cream or non-dairy whipped topping

Dissolve jello in boiling water. Add frozen strawberries. Set in refrigerator until almost set. Crumble cake in a 13 x 9 inch glass pan. Mix pudding, milk & ice cream together and pour over cake. Spread jello mixture over top of this layer. Return to refrigerator until ready to serve. Before serving, spread whipping cream over the top.

—Stick to the time limit. Close with a summary of major points and an effective quotation, surprise statement or appeal for action.

To recognize the accomplishments of 4-Her's, Union Oil Co. offers medals of honor to a maximum of four members per county and an expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago for each state winner.

Cutworm larvae usually appear as dingy, grayish-black smooth worms that curl into a ball or tight "C-shape" when disturbed.

The larvae have chewing mouth parts and damage plants by their feeding activity.

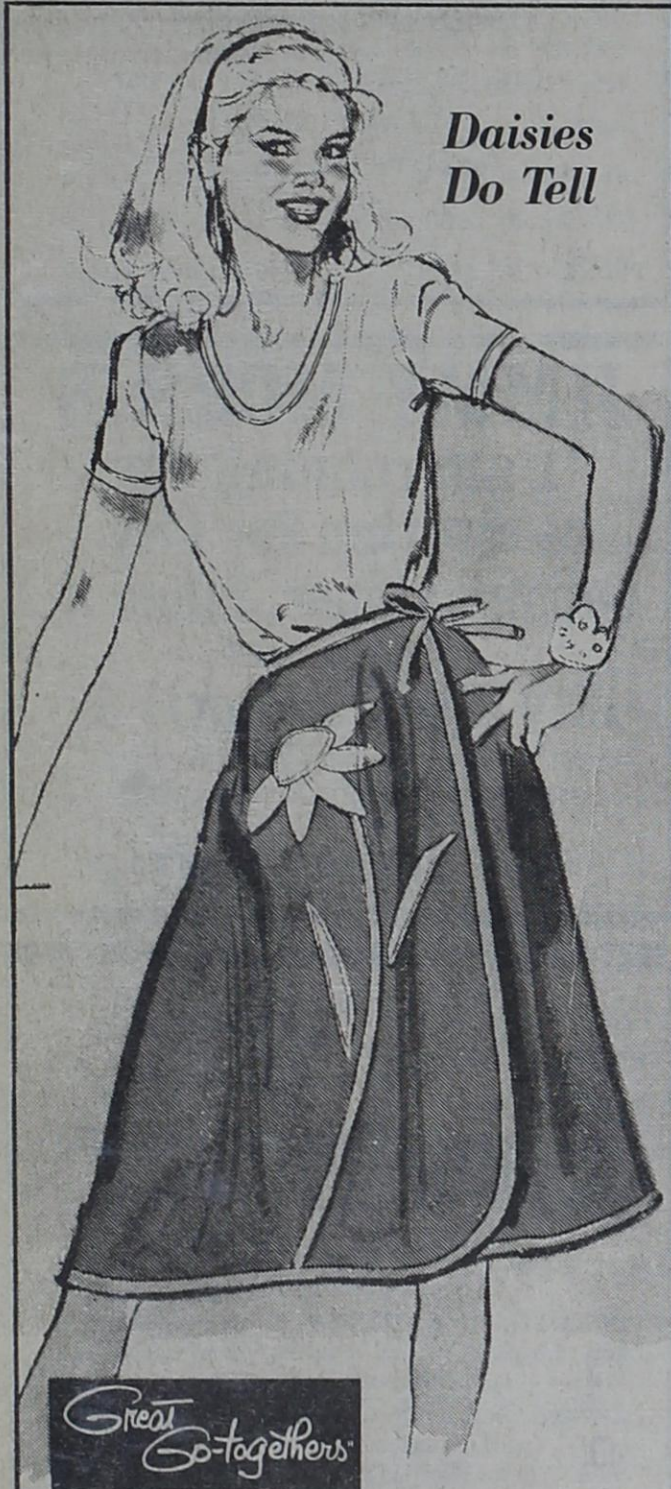

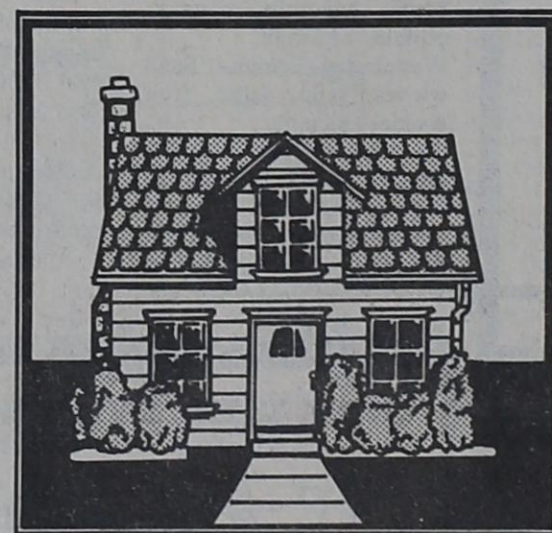
