First Baptist Church To Hold Programs

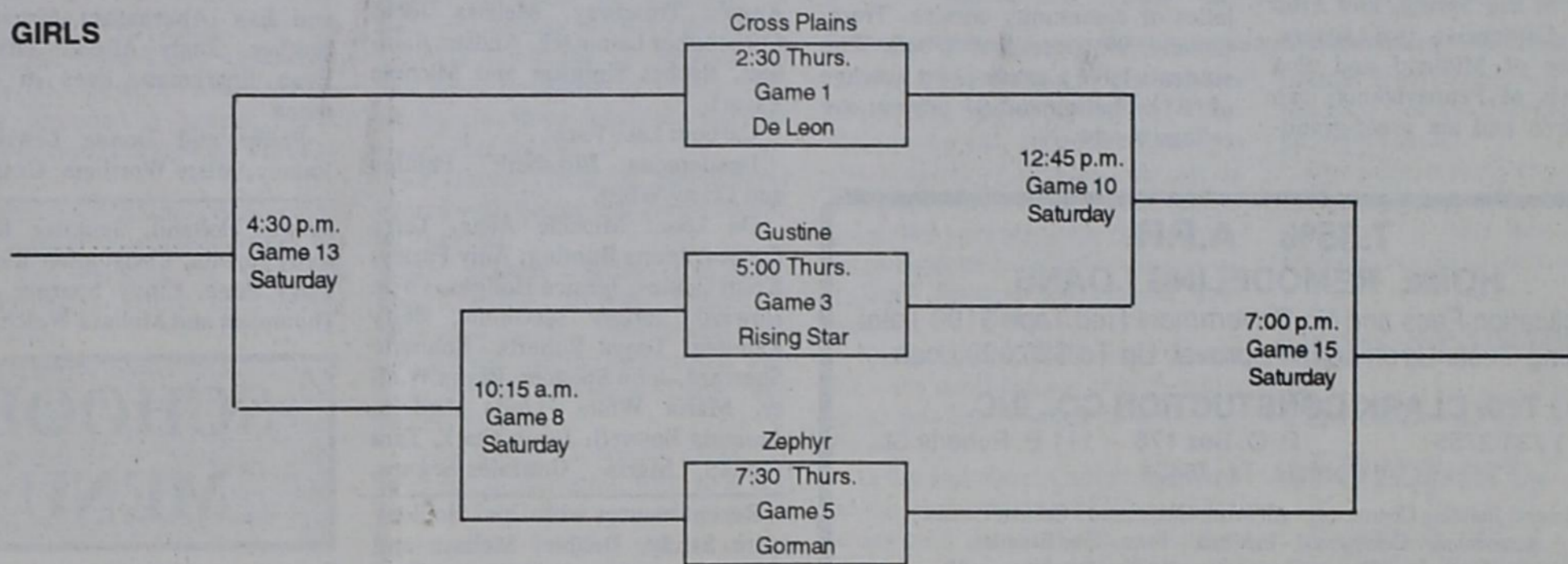

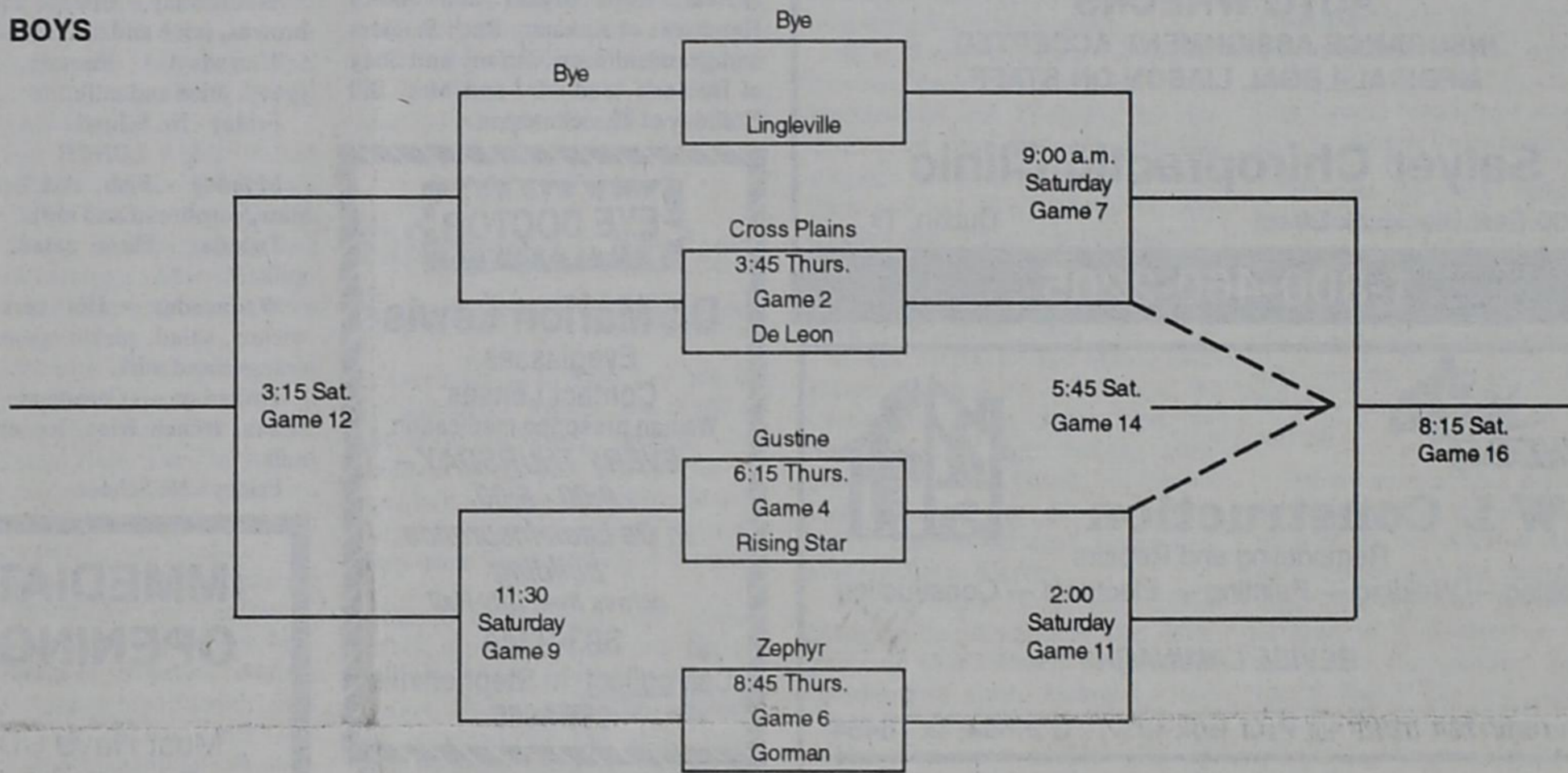

Local Students Included In Who's Who

A large number of students from this area are included in the 27th Annual Edition of Who's Who Among American High School Students 1992-93. Who's Who, published by Educational Communications, Inc., Lake Forest, Ill., is the largest high school recognition publication in the country. Students are nominated by high school principals and guidance counselors, national youth groups, churches or by the publishing company based upon students' performance in scholarship award contests or extracurricular activities. Final selection is determined on the basis of criteria which include high achievement in academics and leadership in school activities, athletics or community service. Traditionally, 99 percent of Who's Who students have a grade point average of 'B' or better and 97 percent are college bound.

The 27th edition of Who's Who, published in 16 regional volumes, features nearly 725,000 students or just over 5 percent of the nation's 12,000,000 high school students. They represent approximately 15,000 of the 22,000 public, private and parochial high schools in the country. Who's Who students also compete for \$125,000 in scholarship awards and participate in the publication's annual opinion poll of teen attitudes. The book is distributed to up to 15,000 high schools, colleges, universities and public libraries throughout the country. Subcommittee Takes Up Issue of Property

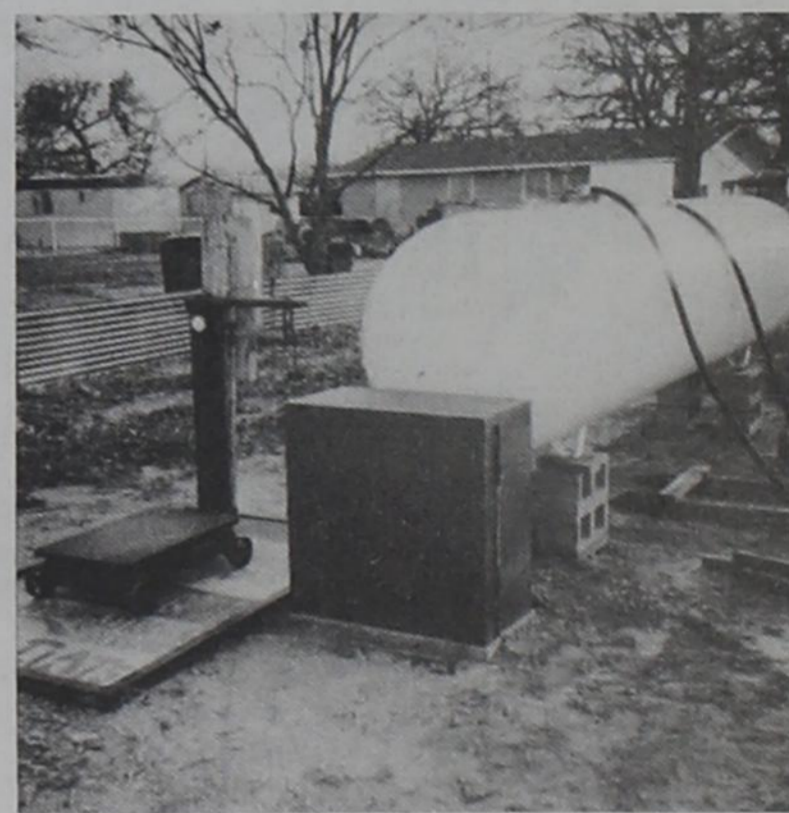
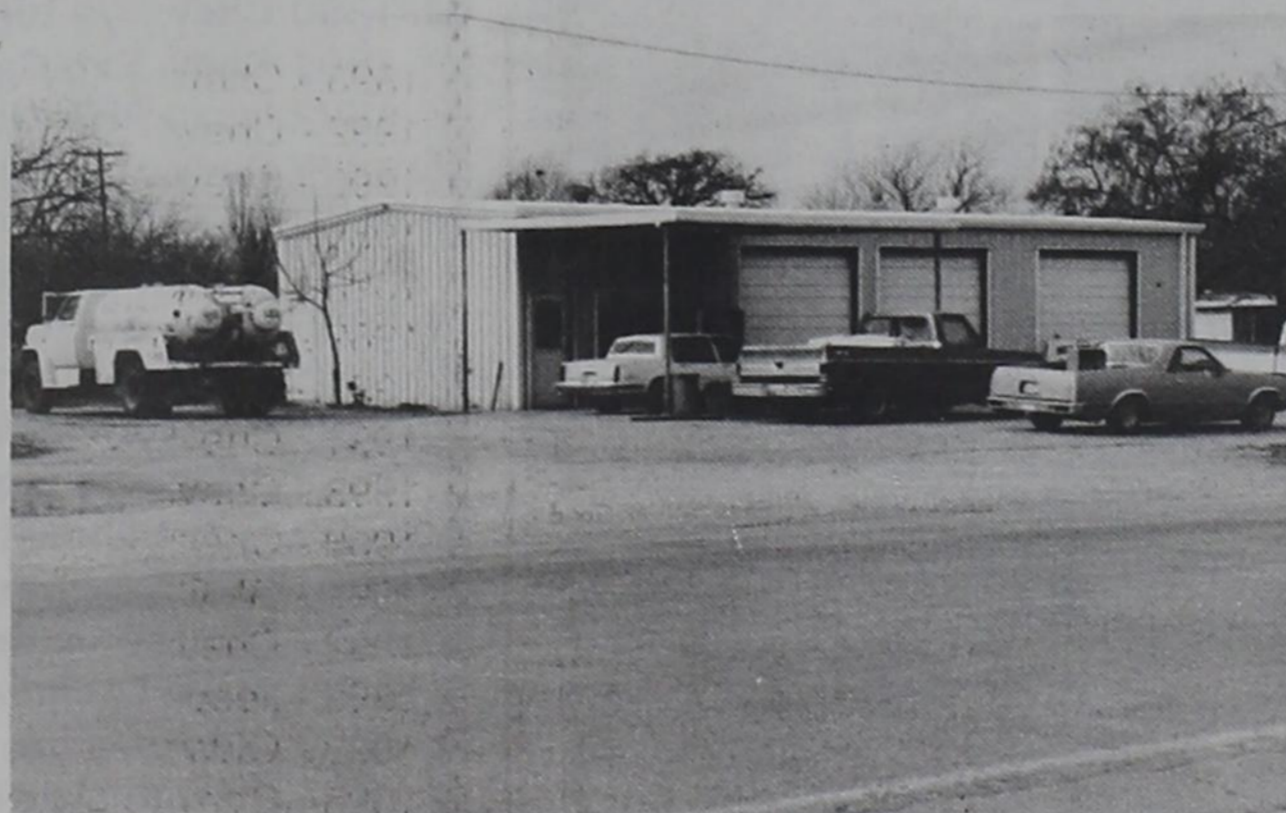
Washington, D.C. — Congressman Charles W. Stenholm, D-Tex., Chairman of the Department of Operations and Nutrition Subcommittee of the House Agriculture Committee, held a hearing to review H.R. 561, the "Private Property Protection Act of 1993." This legislation requires federal agencies to establish procedures to assess whether federal regulations would result in the "takings" of private property.

"Private property rights are a fundamental cornerstone in this country, and a critical part of the free enterprise system," Stenholm said. This legislation attempts to address the increasing challenges that property owners face as a result of federal, state and local government actions."

Debate surrounding private property rights is moving toward defining some of the complicated issues such as compensation for property "takings" and whether the devaluation of land is considered a "taking" under the Constitution. Moreover, recent issues like the Endangered Species Act and the Clean Water Act are playing larger roles in affecting property owners and their ability to utilize their property as they wish.

Following the expert testimony and debate during this hearing, Stenholm said he will move forward to encourage the passage of this legislation which he considers critical to both agriculture and property owners.

CHRISTMAS MUSIC

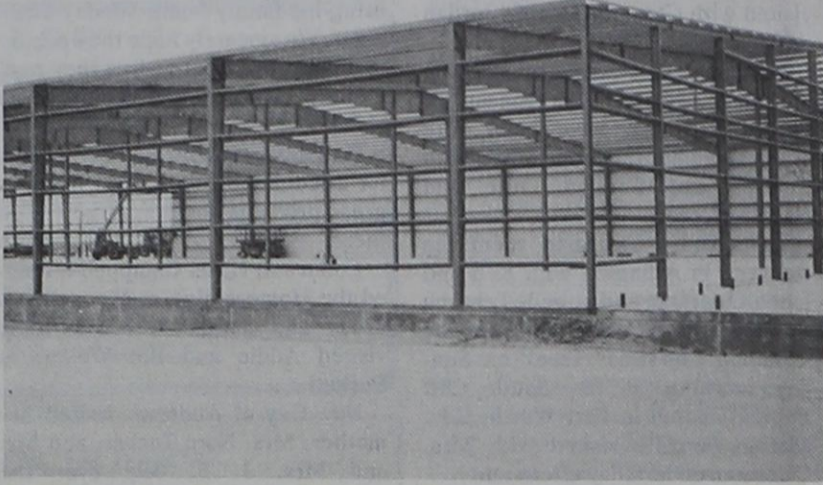
