Panthers Defeated by Santo; Travel To Lometa On Friday

If the Panthers could put together two good halves in one game they would be in good shape, but the Panthers seem to lose their steam in the second half. In the game Friday night the Big Red led 27 to 20 at the halfway mark, but were outscored 21

to 0 in the second half and were defeated by the Santo Wildcats before a very large Homecoming crowd. Santo hit the scoreboard on their first possession, taking the ball on their own 47 after an interception of a Panthers pass and moved the distance in 8 plays with the help of a Gorman 15 yard penalty, when Brent Procter scored from the one with 7:21 left. Jeff Woodard kicked the point after and Santo led 7-0.

Then after holding the Panthers on their next possession, the Wildcats took the ball on their own 28 and scored in 7 plays. The drive featured runs of 32, 25 and 12 yards before Tanner Thornburg went in for the score on a 3 yard run with 16 seconds left in the first period. Woodard added the point after and Santo was up 14-0.

Then the Panthers came alive and took the ball on their own 25 and scored in 10 plays with Don Mauney getting the final 7 yards on a run with 8:28 left in the half. The drive featured a 20 yard pass to Paul Petree, runs of 5, 10 and 5, and a pass to Mauney for 9, before Mauney scored. The kick for point failed and the score was 14-6.

The Wildcats came right back with a drive of their own as they took the ball on their own 35 and scored in just 4 plays with the help of two 15 yard penalties on the Panthers. Brent Procter got the honors from 11 yards out with 6:40 left. The kick for point failed and the score was 20-6.

The Panthers answered the Wildcat score with a drive of their own as they took the ball on the Wildcat 37 and scored in 5 plays with Marco Herrera catching a beautiful 18 yard pass from Nick Guthery for the score with 4:48 left. Mauney booted the point after and the score was 20-13.

The Panthers got another scoring drive going when they took the ball on their own 45 and scored in six plays with Don Mauney getting the final 2 yards with 1:24 left. Mauney kicked the point after and the score was knotted at 20-20.

But the Panthers were still not done as they got another break when they intercepted a Wildcat pass on the Santo 27. And it took only one big tremendous run by Marco Herrera to score as he took a delayed

handoff and raced the 27 yards untouched for the score with 1:01 left in the half. Mauney booted the point after and the Panthers had a 27 to 20 advantage at halftime.

The Panther Marching Band entertained the Homecoming crowd at halftime by playing while the different nominees for the four honors were escorted on the field. Rachel Reeves was crowned as the Homecoming Queen. Mary Campbell was named Football Sweetheart; Lacy Pack was named Band Sweetheart; and Marco Herrera was chosen as the Band Beau.

Following the halftime activities, Santo came out ready to play after being shocked with 27 points in the second quarter by the Panthers and started a drive on their own 38 and scored in 7 plays with Jeremy Fallin getting the final yard with 9:22 left in the third. A pass to Tim Burns added the two pointer and Santo led 28-27.

The Wildcats added another score with 7:04 left in the third when Brent Procter took a handoff and raced 47 yards for the score. The run for points failed and the score was 34 to 27.

The Wildcats added another score with 11:40 left in the game when they started a drive on their own 30 and scored in 8 plays with Jeremy Fallin getting the final one yard for the score. Woodard added the point after and the final score was 41-27.

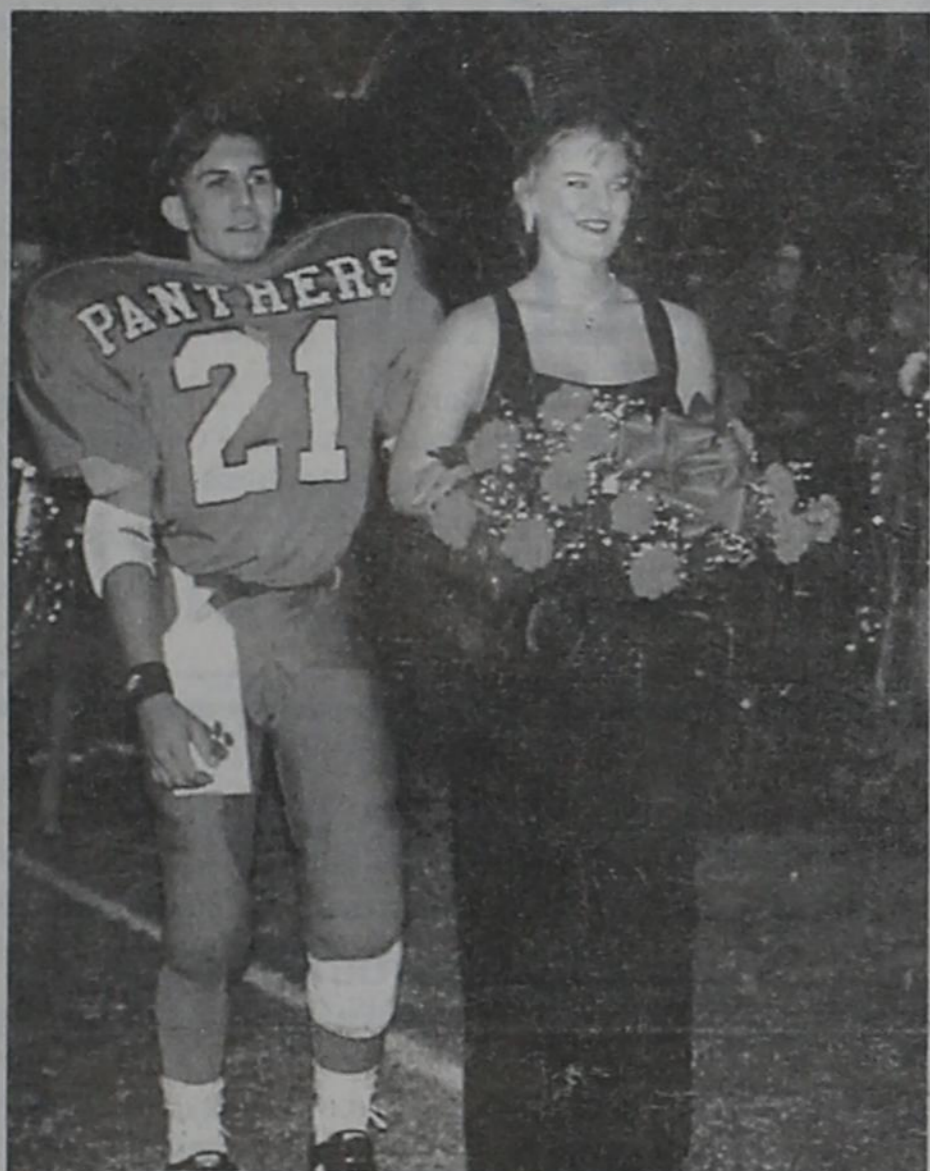
The Big Red defense just couldn't stop the Wildcat runners, who amassed 353 yards on the ground. The passing defense by the Panthers was good, but the running defense had difficulties all night.

Marco Herrera led the Panthers with 123 yards on 18 carries. Don Mauney had 121 yards on 25 carries. Nick Guthery had 6 yards on 6 keepers, but was caught behind the line on two pass tries. Paul Petree had 3 yards on 4 carries.

This week the Panthers begin District play as they travel to Lometa to take on the Hornets. The Big Red will have to have play a full game (first and second half) to come away with a victory in their first District game as the Hornets always play the Panthers tough. So let's all follow the Panthers to Lometa and support them.

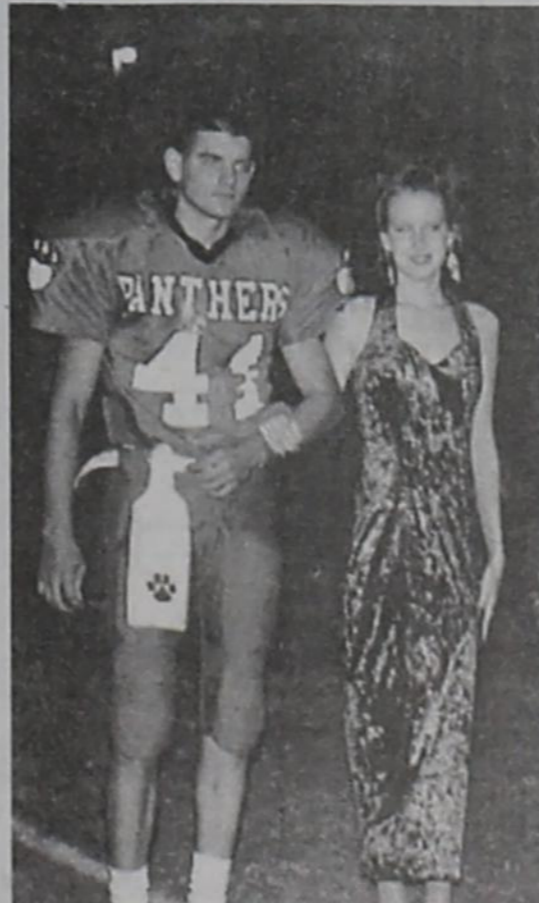

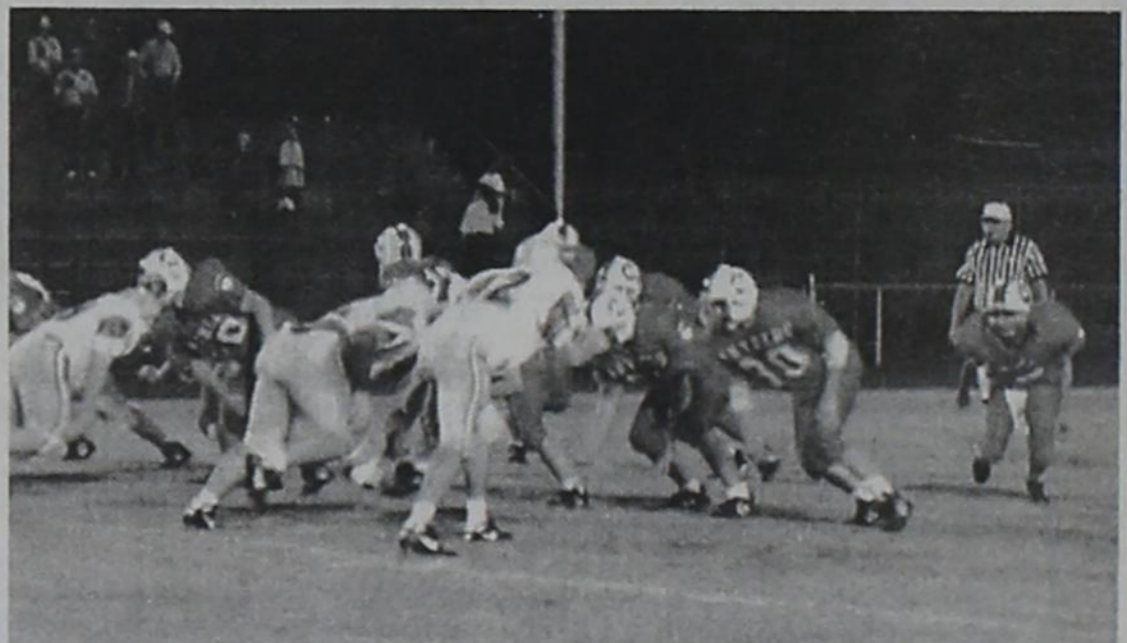

Stenholm Announce Funding

Washington — House and Senate conferees working on agriculture appropriations legislation for fiscal year 1995 have agreed to increase funding for boll weevil eradication efforts, according to Rep. Charles Stenholm, Chairman of the House Agriculture Subcommittee on Department Operations.

"After working long and hard to secure increased funding, I am extremely pleased that the conferees accepted the House position to provide increased program support for the national boll weevil eradication effort," said Stenholm. "The Boll Weevil Eradication Program Office, which has relocated in Abilene, and the 12-14 new jobs which it brings to the Big Country, will greatly benefit from this increased funding."

The House Appropriations Committee had originally designated \$13,084 million in funding for the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) to continue the Boll Weevil Eradication Program; boll weevils have been ranked by USDA as the **single most destructive pest** in Texas, Arkansas and Alabama. As a result of an amendment Stenholm introduced in June, \$5 million in additional funding was directed to APHIS for boll weevil eradication efforts for fiscal year 1995.

The Boll Weevil Eradication Program is a jointly funded partnership wherein producers contribute 70 percent of the cost, and APHIS makes up the remaining 30 percent. Studies have shown that this proven eradication program returns over \$12 in economic benefits to growers and their communities for every \$1 of cost. In addition, the program has resulted in reductions of pesticide use of up to 90 percent in areas where eradication is complete.
