Comanche County Telephone Plans To Improve Services

Officials at Comanche County Telephone Company recently announced a unique plan to improve its customer service when dealing with telephone trouble spots.

The qulaity control program, called Network WATCH, will help Comanche County Telephone followup on its maintenance calls and thus improve its service, said Toney Prather, general manager of CCTC.

"At Comanche County Telephone, we are making a concerted effort to provide our subscribers with the most outstanding, trouble-free service available," Prather said. "To do this, though, we are going to need the help of our customers."

Under the NetworkWATCH Plan,

When To Signup For Social Security

"If you're over 62 and plan to retire in 1993, you should contact Social Security now," according to Glyn Hammons, Social Security man ager in Abilene. "It may be best to start your benefits in January, even if you don't plan to retire until later in the year." Hammons pointed out that under current rules, many people will receive the most benefits possible if their application takes effect in January.

He explained that people who want their applications effective in January should file any time from October 1 through January 31. However, no retirement benefits can be paid before a person turns 62.

The rules concerning how earnings affetc Social Security benefits are complicated. "Because a person's age, earnings, and benefit amount are all factors that help us decide when is the most advantageous month for your benefits to start," Hammons said, "we encourage enyone thinking about retiring next year to call Social Security's toll-free number 1-800-772-1213, on business days between 7 a. m. and 7 p. m., to make an appointment to discuss your retirement plans with a claims representative."

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





Texas **Agriculture Facts**

* Farmers and ranchers in Texas At Rising Star produce what is best suited for their region: timber in East Texas, cotton and cattle in the Plains, cotton, sheep and goats in West Texas and along the Border, cattle and poultry in Central Texas, rice and cattle along the Gulf Coast, and vegetables and grain crops in the Rio Grande

* Texas ranks first in the nation in the sales of cattle and calves, sheep and wool, goats and mohair, cotton, watermelons, spinach, and in the number of farms and ranches,

* Texas ranks second in the nation in farm cash receipts for 1991 at \$12.1 billion. California is first with \$17.9 billion.

* Agriculture employs about 18 percent of the work force in Texas in the actual production of offd and fiber, as well as in processing, transportation, manufacturing of equipment, and research to ensure the industry remains a world leader. Nationwide, that number is 17 percent.

About half of Texas farm receipts come from meat animals, at \$6.3 billion.


Eva Theo Markham Buried On March 17

The prices of these batteries are gradually coming down, making them an even better bargain. In the meantime, you have some options with standard batteries. The small, button batteries from watches, hearing aids, cameras and other small devices can sometimes be returned to the dealer or a jeweler for recycling of some of the materials. Larger batteries from flashlights, radios and children's toys pose a different problem. These batteries are a source of heavy metals in the water leaking from many old landfills. If at all possible, you should save them until you have access to a hazardous household waste collection day. Be careful, however, because if these batteries begin to corrode, they can





■ The most logical alternative is to encourage employees to provide their own glass or ceramic coffee mugs - or get the boss to buy a set that can be used by both employees and your office visitors. Of course, then you must wash the cups or mugs after they're used - but the water use has less of an impact than the constant use of throw-away cups. Coated paper cups aren't much of an alternative. Studies have shown them to be comparably as energy and

resource intensive as foam cups.
