Child Safety Seat Program Scheduled In Gorman & Eastland Co.

Dear Citizens of Gorman & Eastland County,

Several months ago, I had a letter printed in the Gorman Progress about a child safety seat distribution program that Tech*Star EMS Education had been awarded by Texas Safe Riders. At that time we were waiting for our personnel to take the required training to teach this program. All of the required training has been completed, and we have received our allotted amount of child safety seats.

We are planning for our first class here in Gorman. We will be offering two classes per month with one in Gorman and the other at Eastland Memorial Hospital. We will continue the program until May 2006, or until we run out of car seats...

To be eligible to receive a child safety seat, you must be considered low income or other wise unable to purchase a child safety seat or booster seat, own or have access to a vehicle for the car seat, and only one seat will be issued to a family. Each class is limited to 5 couples/families at one time, and program is open to all couples/families that have children that are required to ride in a child safety seat or booster seat.


Survivors include his wife, Flossie Dawkins of Ranger; one sister, Margie Harrison of Waco and several nieces and nephews.

Once again this year we will be offering physicals for all athletes grades 7-12 free of charge. This is a great deal for our kids and school. Dr. Dan Brudnak will be the physician that administers the physicals. We would like to thank him and ask you to do the same for allowing us to receive his time and expertise for free. VERY IMPORTANT: Please fill out all the information completely on the forms provided to you in this letter. We will have coaches present to take up these forms. Each year we waste time waiting on certain forms from some of our athletes as well as wasting paper making more copies for those that lost their forms. Please sign in all the pertinent places and it helps if you attend with your child so we can make sure everything is complete and if you have any questions for the doctor.

DATE and TIME: JULY 13th GIRLS: From 12 pm til 1:30 pm / BOYS: 1:30 pm til 3:00 pm at Dr Dan Brudnak's office located downtown next to the drug store.

NOTE: If you are unable to attend on this date it will be YOUR responsibility to get a physical for your child and it

WILL NOT be offered for FREE before or after the date above (normal physical fees are around \$25). Also if you choose to attend another physician for your child's physical, the UIL forms are still required and are the only one's accepted by school districts. If you bring back a physical form from a doctor's office that is not an official UIL form, it will be denied and useless. Also you may need to note that most insurances do not cover the cost of a physical. You need to make every effort to be there on the above date.

A Word in Season

DON'T FEED THE ANIMALS

I felt sorry for the mother. She was paying for their meal when her adolescent boy asked for one of the pralines at the cash register. The mom said, "No, we've already had enough to eat."

In less than 2-3 seconds the boy had actually thrown himself on the floor and was simultaneously flopping, rolling, and screaming, "I want one, I want one..." Time stood still in the café. All eyes were on the break dancing boy and the embarrassed mom. To her credit, she didn't give in to this manipulation tactic, but was able to get the boy off the floor and out the door without buying the praline.

Kids are smart. They learn early to manipulate - especially if we unknowingly encourage it. Maybe it's an hour before lunch and the child asks for a snack. You say, "It's almost lunch time, please wait." Most children will then in some way try to filibuster the Senate ("negotiate" another outcome)! Usually it's one form of whining or another. If fussing or pouting doesn't work, she may resort to anger and intimidation. It's a slippery slope, but out of parental laziness or simply not wanting conflict we often give in.

But this is the worst thing a parent can do. Never reinforce that kind of behavior in your child. If your "no" becomes a "yes" after the child's fussing fit, you have established a wrong precedent. What may seem harmless at the toddler stage can become an adolescent flopping for a praline or a teenager shoving you (or their teacher) out of the way.

My advice: Don't feed the animals! Do not support or reinforce this type of behavior in any way. By the way, it's not just kids who act this way. 


