



1 pkg. compressed or dry yeast 1 2 cup milk

1 4 cup sugar

1 2 tsp. salt 1 4 cup shortening

cup currants

1 4 cup chopped Pecans 2 tsp. caramel syrup Soften yeast in lukewarm wat-

er. Scald milk. Add sugar, salt, and shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Add 1 cup sifted enriched

flour and beat well. Add softened yeast and egg, beat well. Cover. Add 3|4 cup flour to make a thick batter. Beat thoroughly until smooth. Let rise until double (about 1 hour). Stir down and add currants and Pecans. Into greased, fluted muffin pans place caramel syrup; sprinkle chopped Pecans on glaze. Drop batter by spoonfuls into pans, filling 1/2 full. 



Peanuts are used in the treatment of pellagra, because they are rich in the pellegra-preventive factor, nicotinic acid. Peanut hulls have many industrial uses. They are used in grinding and polishing abrasives; as sound and temperature insulation; for making paper pulp, corrugated boxes and wall board; also, as poultry litter and for roughage in poultry and other livestock feeds.

Protein fiber made from the silk-like lining of peanut hulls is used for synthetic fabrics such as upholstery material and draperies. It has also been used in fabrics for bathing suits and dresses.
