## County Farm Group Plan Tour July 29

A Farm Tour on July 29th is being sponsored by the county farm group to include some of the outstanding turkey ranches, hog farms, cattle ranches, peanut farms, chicken farms, and a demonstration on diversified farming in Eastland County. If time permits, the tour group will visit the pecan orchard belonging to J. W. Sitton, located between the O. C. Stewart farm and the Herman Schaefer farm.

A cordial invitation is being extended to all interested to bring a sack lunch and join the cavalcade to spend the day touring and inspecting some of Eastland County's outstanding farms and farming operations.

## Continued Work For Economy Is Brashear Pledge



State Representative Paul Brashear promised to continue his efforts to obtain for the 76th Legislative District and the State of Texas the maximum in good government for a minimum outlay of tax dollars in a formal statement this week in connection with his bid for re-election.

Mr. Brashear announced last January that he would run again, promising to issue a formal statement later. He is now completing his second term as a member of the Legislature.

During the 54th Legislature, his first term, Mr. Brashear served on a number of important committees, including the Military and Veterans Affairs, Agriculture and Penitentiaries committees. In the 55th Legislature, Mr. Brashear served as chairman of the Military and Veterans Affairs committee. He was also a member of the State Hospitals and Special Schools, Liquor Regulations, Oil, Gas and Mining committees.

Mr. Brashear is a native of the 76th District, having been born at Atwell in Callahan County in 1917. He is married to the former Helen Ray of the Scranton community. They have two daughters - Ann Etta, who is married and lives in Abilene, and Sarah, who attends the Cisco Schools. They have one granddaughter.

A veteran of U. S. Army duty in World War II, Mr. Brashear is an active member of the American Legion. He was recently appointed to serve a 6-year term of the American Legion's Legislative Committee, a statewide body. He is currently chairman of this committee.

Mr. Brashear's education includes graduation from high school at Cross Plains, Cisco Junior College and a business college in Austin.

In private life, Mr. Brashear is an insurance man and a farmer. He began farming as a boy and has owned and operated farms in Eastland and Callahan counties all of his life. He currently owns a farm in Callahan county. His extensive knowledge of farm and soil conservation resulted from several years as an employee of the U. S. Department of Agriculture soil conservation service units in Eastland and adjoining counties.

Prior to his election as a state representative, Mr. Brashear served as secretary in the House of Representatives and as assistant sergeant-at-arms of the Texas Senate, gaining valuable experience in legislative procedure. He spent three years as manager of the Chamber of Commerce in Cisco, a post he resigned in order to devote more time to his legislative duties and to enter the insurance business.

"During my two terms of office, I have been able to learn the things necessary for a Representative to do the best job in serving his District," Brashear said. "I have endeavored at all times to work for an honest, efficient state government. It has been my purpose to support legislation in the best interest of our district first and the state of Texas as a whole.

"Each of my votes were cast after due consideration of good business principles. I have supported measures for better state employee salaries, decent benefits for the aged, improved water programs, along with legislation

Due to the duties of the office of District Clerk, which you have heretofore entrusted to me, I have been unable to see all of you as of this date, and probably will not be able to see you before July 26th. As most of you know the duties of the District Clerk are many. He must be posted and familiar with the Rules of Practice and Procedure in all civil actions as well as criminal cases brought in the District Courts of our county and the State of Texas. It is his duty to issue all process in connection with these cases, whether civil or criminal, and to record and keep all the records of and for the District Court, and to issue abstracts of judgement, to consider the solvency of various bonds and to approve or reject them. He is responsible for all moneys paid into the registry of the Court as Trust Funds and Child Support Funds, as well as moneys deposited as Court Costs, Fines, etc. There are many other duties that could be mentioned, but space will not permit.

When I first asked you for this important office, I told you that if elected I would render you the most efficient service possible. I have tried to make that promise good, and I welcome an investigation of my record, and when you have done this and considered the experience I have had, I hope you will help me again in this campaign.

During my tenure in office we have filed and processed nearly Six Thousand Cases which is almost double the number of cases filed and processed for the same length of time preceding it. This, of course, was largely due to the years following the war and our oil activity, which always causes more litigation. ## Absentee Voters

### Must Observe Regulations

Absentee voting was begun on Monday, July 7, 1958 and will extend through July 22, 1958 in Eastland County for the July Democratic Primary Election.

County Clerk Johnson Smith said that absentee ballots are now available. In announcing the beginning of absentee voting, Smith reminded county citizens of rules regarding casting absentee votes.

"Any person who expects to be out of the county on the day of the election may cast his vote at the clerk's office", Smith pointed out.

He also explained that persons prevented from going to the polls because of illness, or physical disability, may nevertheless, cast their votes by applying for an application by mail from the clerk's office and having it signed by a physician with an explanation of why they will be unable to appear at the polls on July 26.

Smith pointed out that persons who are now outside the county and will not return during the time absentee voting is going on or on election day can also cast their ballots by mail. They too, should also send for application forms.

Persons physically able to come to the clerk's office must do so, however. They cannot vote by mail if they are in the county between the dates of July 7 and July 22.

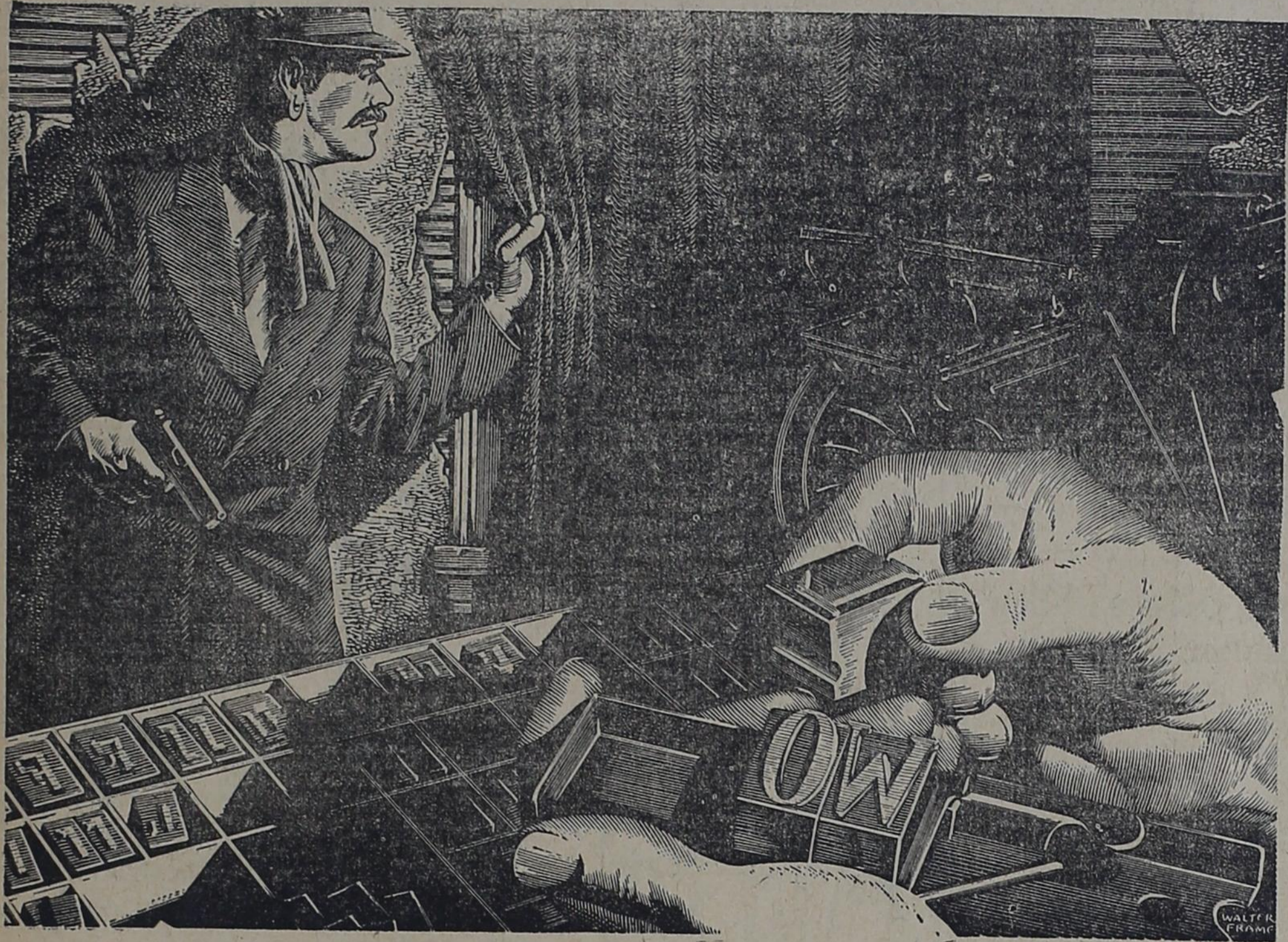
Broilers are the gay young things of the chicken population and, thanks to their tender age, will always be tender on your plate. However you prepare them, do yourself a favor by shaking Ac'cent on them before cooking.

## Freedom of the Press, Here and Now

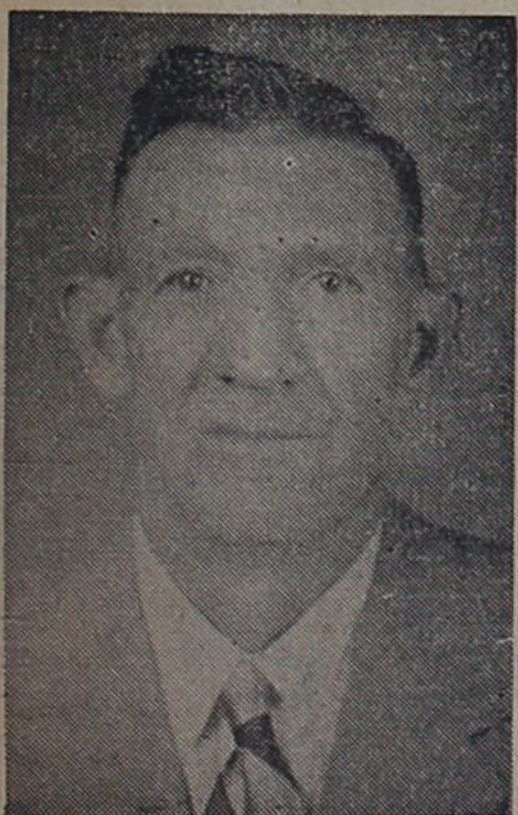
