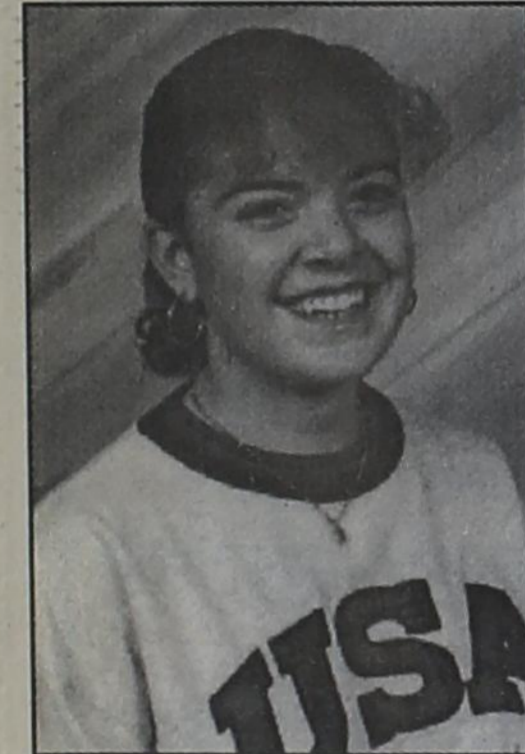
TIFFANY TROUTMAN

The Panthers traveled to the end of the earth on Friday night (166 Miles) to play the Water Valley Wildcats to a 12-12 tie. The Panthers turned the ball over via the fumble route on their first four possessions, but the Panther defense held the Wildcats to only one score on the four fumble losses.

Following a Gorman fumble on the Gorman 14 yard line the Wildcats scored in three plays. Following a 6 yard run and an incomplete pass, Ty Sisco ran it in from 8 yards out for the score with 2:58 left in the initial period. The kick failed and Water Valley was up 6-0.

The teams played on even terms until midway through the second period when the Panthers took the ball at the Wildcat 38 and scored in just 4 plays. The first play gained just 1 yard and the second play netted 0 before Margarito Sanchez broke loose and raced 34 yards to the Wildcat 3. Sanchez ran it in for the final 3 on the next play for the TD with 4:59 left in the second. The kick failed and the score was tied at 6:06 at the halftime intermission.

The Panther Marching Band performed a crowd pleasing routine at halftime, as did the Water Valley Band.

On the fourth possession following intermission after a blocked Panther punt the Wildcats got the ball at the Gorman 22 and scored in five plays. Following carries of 7 - 3 - 4 and 6, Ty Sisco went over from the 2 yard line with 6:43 left in the game. The run for points failed and the Wildcats were up 12 to 6.

But the Panthers were not done for the evening as they fought back as time was running out in the game. The Big Red took possession at the Wildcat 34 following a fumble recovery by Leslie Wood. Following a 2 yard loss, Sanchez carried for 5. Adan Rodriguez carried for 2 and Jeremy Bryan got 2 for the first down at the Wildcat 24. Bryan added a 4 yarder, Madera got 3; Bryan added 2 more and then got the first down at the Wildcat 12 on a 3 yard run. Then Sanchez popped loose for a 12 yard scamper for the TD with just 34 seconds. The Panthers then went for the 2-pointer for the win but came up short as Reece Clark was caught for a loss on a pass try. This tied the score at 12-12.

This Friday night the Panthers host the Millsap Bulldogs in an 8 p.m. game.

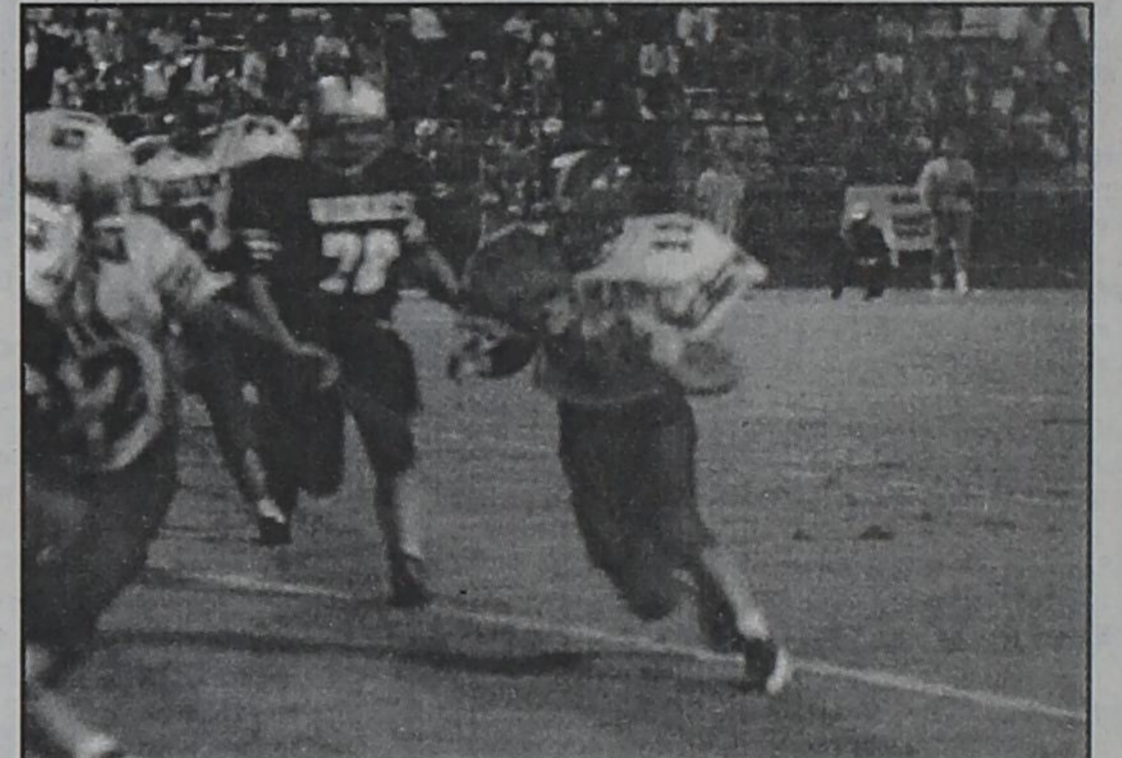

IN this field, plots for southern blight and rhizoctonia control have been put out as well as cornmeal applications and large 1+ acre plots of chemical controls for diseases. Dr. Chip Lee will discuss the newest in approved chemicals including rates and timing as well as discussing compounds that growers may see in the future for disease control. The disease pressure in this years crop will make this an interesting part of the tour.
