NO TYPHOID **FEVER OUTBREAK**

Several days ago, we received numerous phone calls and questions regarding a typhoid fever outbreak in this community. To my knowledge, there is not truth to this scare and there is not epidemic going on.

The past few months, there has been sporadic cases of Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever and paratyphoid fever. To acquaint the general public about these disease processes, I would like to state a few points

Paratyphoid fever is a generalized bacterial infection which is clinically similar to typhoid fever. While clinically similar, the disease process and fatality rate are very much milder and lower than typhoid fever. Often times, the disease exhibits no more than a fever or a transient diarrhea, while some have not syptoms at all. Paratyphoid fever can be transmitted by direct or indirect contact with feces or urine of a patient or carrier. There is not absolute need to isolate a patient with paratyphoid fever. The only important thing to prevent a further spread of disease is to exclude infected persons from food handling, patient care, and from occupations involving care of the young and elderly. Adequate antibiotic treatment usually takes care of the infection. Period of communicability is commonly 1-2 weeks or for as long as the infections agent

Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever is a disease which occurs throughout the United States, expecially during the spring and summer months: Infection is acquired by the bite of an infected tick or from contamination of skin with crushed tissues or feces of the tick. This infection is not directly transmitted from man to man. Signs and symptoms include moderate to high fever, headache, chills, . preaches every 4th Sunday. and a skin rash. Preventive measure include avoiding tick-infested areas when feasible. Mortality rate is about 20% in the absence of specific treatment;

persists in the feces.

prompt treatment death is uncommon.



Emergency Loans Available From FmHA

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers, or aquaculture operators are available thru county offices of the Farmers Administration (FmHA), Jack Phillips, FmHA County supervisor, said today.

Phillips asked that those who need farm credit as a result of the drought should make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at Eastland.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home unitl May 21, 1981, for physical and production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, or buildings, (Including homes) lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts. Other loans, bevond actual losses, can be made for annual operating expenses or to make major adjustments in a farming (or ranching aquaculture) opera-

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Phillips said.

Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of five percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay. Loans beyond actual losses have various maturities, depending upon the purpose of the loan.

The interest rate for actual loss loans is five percent. Other loans are being made at an interest rate of thirteen and one-half (13½) percent.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unable to get credit from other sources.

Emergency loans can be used to help the farmer restor damaged farm operations and additional loans


