repair and up to \$1500 to be used to improve the Frank A. Gray Memorial Park.

The proposal for the grant to complete the Senior Citizens Building was presented to the Commission with a proposed Federal Grant of \$14,000 and a local matching fund of \$1400 to be spent from Revenue Sharing Funds. The Commission passed a resolution to present the proposal as was presented by the Mayor. The application has been filed and the first hearing on it will be on May 7 in Abilene.

Several items in connection with the Senior Citizens building were discussed and some decisions were made as to what should be done. The building is getting near completion as far as we can go with the funds that we have. The suspended ceiling is about completed with insulation installed. The lights are all in, the plumbing is about completed, the rooms have been framed and sheet rock up on them. The walls are about ready to be painted. The airconditioning system

should be completed within a few days. It is our hopes now that we can move into the building for serving of the meals some time in May. We have had a number of people who have donated labor on the inside work. I wish to thank all who have helped for it has made it possible to get as much done as we have.

We discussed the purchase of crushed rock to put on some of the streets and voted to purchase at least 2000 tons. There are a number of places that rock is needed. We are planning on doing a great deal of street work during the next year.

We discussed plans to sell water to the contractors for the highway construction between Carbon and De Leon. We feel that we can supply their needs without affecting our own water demands. We will know more about this at a later meeting.

The proposed budget for the next year will appear elsewhere in this edition of the paper. With the hearing date set. We hope that we can make the budget without a tax increase, but will have to wait until we take a closer look.

I have been told that there will be a 15% increase in charges to us for water this year. We may have to adjust rates again in order to take

care of this increase. You will recall that we had to increase rates two years ago when our cost went up and we may have to do so again. This will be discussed at the meeting on May 1. We are also taking a look at increasing the charge for water and sewer traps. At the present time the material and labor for these taps is more than the charge. We have been comparing these costs with our neighbors and find that we are well below most other towns in our charges. As we all know, inflation has caused everything we buy to go up and we must recover this cost in some manner. I can assure you that we will keep costs as low as possible in all areas.

I attended a meeting of the County Taxing Unit last week and heard some proposals as to the progress that they have made in establishing the machinery with which to implement the new tax by January 1, 1982. As I have told you before, at that time all property will go on all tax rolls within the county at 100% of market value. Between now and that time an appraisal company will appraise all real property in the county and give those values to each taxing unit. In Gorman, your property will be on

the tax roll for the same value on the City, School and the Hospital Board tax rolls, as well as the County. After these values are set, there will be a county Equalization Board to hear all who wish to be heard. When this Board has acted, your tax values are set for that year and each taxing unit will set what ever rate is necessary in order to raise the revenue needed. When our property goes on at market price, our rate will be lowered considerably. As I secure more information on the progress that has been made, I will let you know. Yes, by the way, this is costing each taxing unit to get the values set and tax cards and maps prepared. It looks like the cost to the City may be close to \$5,000. Remember, this is necessary to comply with a state law passed by the last Legislature.

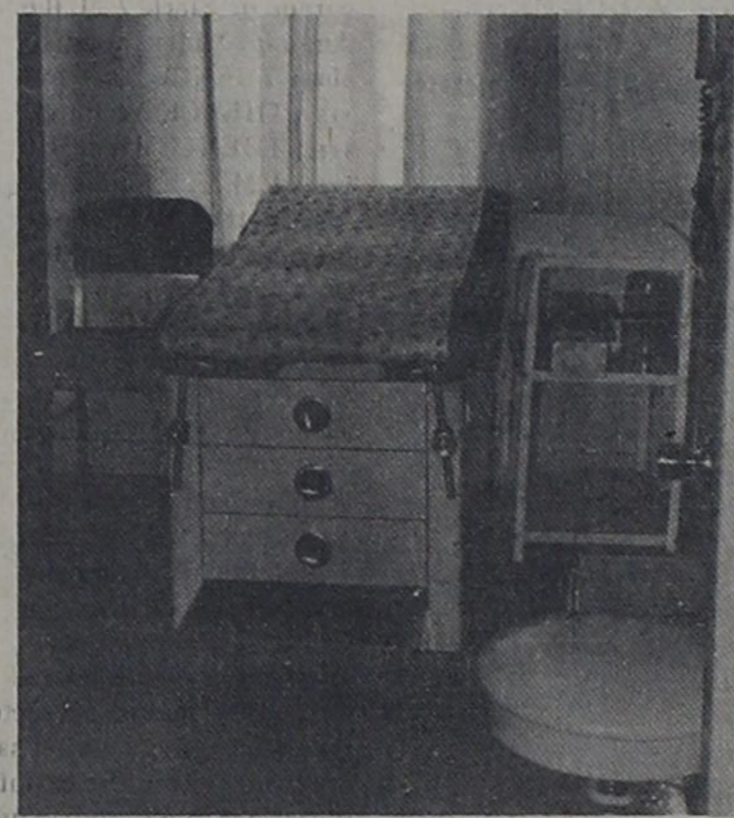

## Homemaking Tips

By Janet Thomas

Flower arrangements, whether fresh or dried, add much beauty to the home. In the next few weeks, spring flowers will be abundant.

Flowers and foliage may be successfully preserved by different methods. Flowers that you wish to dry should be gathered just as they become mature. The best time to pick the flowers is in the morning before noon and after the morning dew has disappeared.

The simplest method is air-drying. The flowers that are best for air-drying are cockscomb, corn flowers, stock, golden rod and baby's breath. Tie the straight stems of the flowers into bunches near the stem ends and string upside down. Let flowers dry 3 to 4 weeks in a closet or attic. Total darkness and lack of dampness is essential. Once the flowers and leaves are dry, the colors are "set". They will not fade and with normal, gentle care, the flowers should last two or more years.

Another method of dry

flowers is the borax - cornmeal method. Flowers are beautifully dried in equal parts of borax and cornmeal. Flowers that respond to this treatment are zinnias, mori-golds, roses, daisies, carnations, larkspur and holly-hock.

To prepare the flowers for drying in the cornmeal - borax, cut off all flower stems. Insert a 6 inch length of No. 20 florist wire through center of the flower head. Depending upon the thickness of the flower blossom, bend an 1/8" or 1/4" of the wire tip backwards, then pull, letting this "hook" catch hold firmly in the flower head. The hook has now vanished and the remaining wire is the flower stem.

Next, mix one part borax to one part cornmeal. Use a deep box with a lid. Gently bury the flowers in the borax and cornmeal. Be certain that blossoms are covered. The tightly closed box should be placed in a dry, warm, dark place for about three

Foliage is beautifully preserved in a solution of glycerine and water. Magnolia leaves which have been treated by the glycerine method are well worth the time spent. They will last indefinitely. Cut branches when leaves are fully matured and full of moisture. Wash foliage to remove dust and dirt. Crush the woody stem so it will absorb the glycerine solution. Several inches of stem should be immersed in half glycerine and half water solution. Let the stems stay in the glycerine solution for several weeks. Rub the foliage with glycerine once a day. Remove from the solution when the leaves take on a pliable texture.

**RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:** Do you have trouble with pie meringues? If your meringue often "weeps" or shrinks, then here is a recipe that never fails.

#### PIE MERINGUE

4 tablespoons sugar  
2 tablespoons corn starch  
1 cup water  
3 egg white  
3 teaspoons sugar  
Stir in 4 tablespoons sugar and corn starch together until well blended. Slowly add water, stirring until smooth. Bring mixture to a boil and stir until glossy and thick. Cool mixture.

Meanwhile, beat egg whites and remaining 3 teaspoons sugar. Slowly add cooled liquid to egg white.

**NOTE:** Cornstarch mixture must be cooled. This meringue keeps longer, does not shrink or weep.

### USDA PROPOSES LOAN DIFFERENTIALS, DISCOUNTS AND PREMIUMS FOR 1980-CROP PEANUTS

A proposed schedule of loan differentials, discounts and premiums for the 1980 peanut program was announced today by Ray Fitzgerald, administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

The peanut support program is required by law. Differentials, premiums and discounts are based on the national average support levels of \$455. per short ton for quota peanuts and \$250. per ton for additional pea-

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nuts.

Fitzgerald said USDA proposes to use basically the same method in determining the 1980 rates as that used for the 1979 crop.

Differentials for Virginia type peanuts would be 2 percent above the sound mature kernel value of runner type peanuts; differentials for Spanish type peanuts would be one-half percent above the sound mature kernel value of runner peanuts.

The loan value per ton for Valencia types suitable for cleaning and roasting and grown in the Southwest would be the same as for

Virginia type peanuts.

The deadline for receiving public comment on the proposals is June 16. Written comments should be sent to the Director, Price Support and Loan Division 3741-S, USDA ASCS, P. O. Box 2415, Washington, D. C. 20013. Comments will be available for inspection during normal business hours in room 3725 of USDA's South building, 14th and Independence Avenue, SW, Washington, D. C.

# HOW TO WRITE A BUSINESS LETTER

By Malcolm Forbes, President and Editor-in-Chief of Forbes Magazine

This article is part of a series prepared at the request of International Paper Company to help all Americans read better, write better and communicate better.

A good business letter can get you a job interview, get you off the hook, or get you money. It's totally asinine to blow your chances of getting whatever you want—with a business letter that turns people off instead of turning them on.

Most business letters seem to fall into three categories: stultifying if not stupid, mundane (most of them), and first rate (rare). Here's the approach I've found that separates the winners from the losers (most of it's just good common sense)—it starts before you write your letter.

Know what you want. If you don't, write it down—in one sentence. "I want to get an interview within the next two weeks." That simple. List the major points you want to get across—it'll keep you on course.

## HOW TO ANSWER

If you're answering a letter, check the points that need answering and keep the letter in front of you while you write. This way you won't forget anything—that would cause another round of letters.

Answer promptly if you're going to answer at all. Don't sit on a letter—that invites the person on the other end to sit on whatever you want from him.

Plunge right in. Call him by name—not "Dear Sir, Madam, or Ms." "Dear Mr. Chrisanthopoulos"—and be sure to spell it right. That'll get him (thus, you) off to a good start. (Usually, you can get his name just by phoning his company—or from a business directory in the library.)

Tell what your letter is about in the first paragraph in one or two sentences. Don't keep your reader guessing or he might file your letter away—even before he finishes it—in the round file.

If you're answering a letter, refer to the date it was written, so the reader won't waste time hunting for it.

People who read business letters are as human as the rest of us. Reading a letter shouldn't be a chore—reward the reader for the time he gives you.



Writing a good letter can help you do better.

## MAKE IT ENJOYABLE

Write so he'll enjoy it. Write the entire letter from his point of view—what's in it for him! Beat him to the draw—surprise him by answering the questions and objections he might have.

Be positive—he'll be more receptive to what you have to say.

Be nice. Contrary to the cliché, genuinely nice guys most often finish first or very near it. I admit it's not easy when you've got a gripe. To be agreeable while disagreeing—that's an art.

Be natural—write the way you talk. Imagine him sitting in front of you—what would you say to him?

Business jargon too often is cold, stiff, unnatural.

Suppose I came up to you and said, "I acknowledge receipt of your letter and I beg to thank you." You'd think, "Huh? You're put-

ting me on." The acid test—read your letter out loud when you're done. You might get a shock—but you'll know for sure if it sounds natural.

Don't be cute or flippant. The reader won't take you seriously. This doesn't mean you've got to be dull. You prefer your letter to knock 'em dead rather than bore 'em to death.

## KEY POINTS

Three points to remember:

Have a sense of humor. That's refreshing anywhere—a nice surprise in a business letter.

Be specific. If I tell you there's a new fuel that could save gasoline, you might not believe me. But suppose I tell you this:

"Gasohol"—10% alcohol, 90% gasoline—works as well as straight gasoline. Since

you can make alcohol from grain or corn stalks, wood or wood waste, coal—even garbage, it's worth some real follow-through.

Now you've got something to sink your teeth into.

Lean more heavily on nouns and verbs, less on adjectives. Use the active voice instead of the passive. Your writing will have more guts.

Which of these is stronger? Active voice: "I kicked out my money manager." Or, passive voice: "My money manager was kicked

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out by me." (By the way, neither is true. My son, Malcolm Jr., manages most Forbes money—he's a brilliant moneymen.)

Give it the best you've got. When you don't want something enough to make the effort, making an effort is a waste.

Make your letter look appetizing—or you'll strike out before you even get to bat. Type it—on good quality 8 1/2 x 11" stationery. Keep it neat, and use paragraphing that makes it easier to read.

## BREVITY AND EMPHASIS

Keep your letter short—one page, if possible. Keep your paragraphs short. After all, who's going to benefit if your letter is quick and easy to read?

You. For emphasis, underline important words. And sometimes indent sentences as well as paragraphs.

EDIT RUTHLESSLY. Somebody said that words are like inflated money—the more you use, the less each is worth. Go through your entire letter as many times

as it takes. Annihilate all unnecessary words, sentences—even paragraphs.

Sum it up and get out. The last paragraph should tell the reader exactly what you want him to do—or what you're going to do. Short and sweet. "May I have an appointment? Next Monday, the 16th, I'll call your secretary to see when it'll be most convenient for you."

Close with something simple like, "Sincerely." And for heaven's sake sign legibly. The biggest ego trip I know is a completely illegible signature.

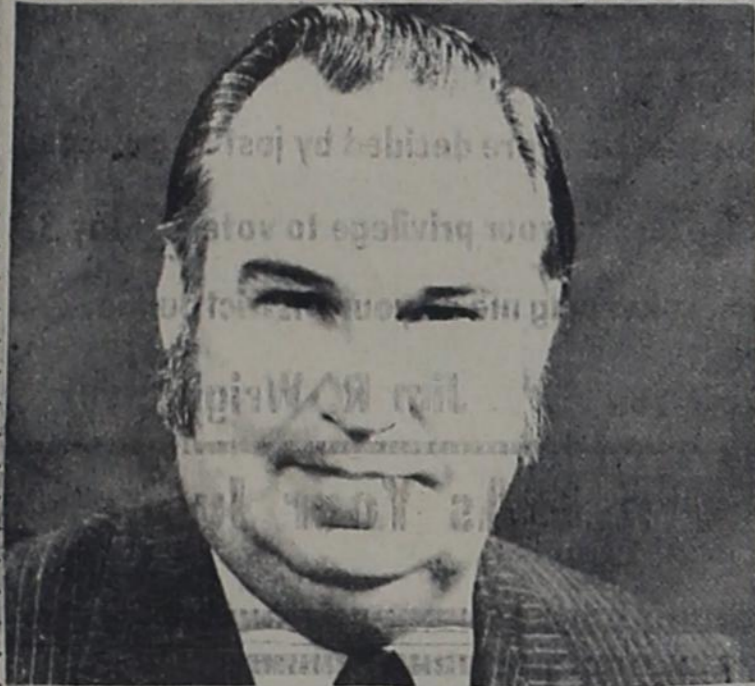

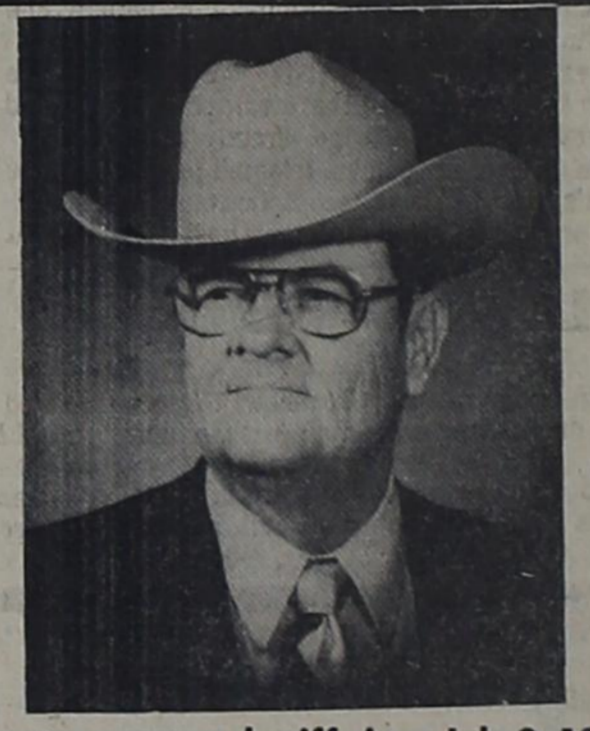

## This doctor flies

After all, medical profession's

BEDFORD — When Dr. Steve Weinberg goes to work, he often heads toward the airport rather than a medical building.

Weinberg's practice has really taken off — and landed — in towns like Hamilton, Comanche and West. For four years, Weinberg, 37, a Bedford surgeon, has flown in his private airplane to towns where patients need his skills.

He flies to Meridian, Dublin, Comanche, West, Gorman, Breckenridge and Hamilton to perform surgery. Weinberg could get plenty of work in his own backyard, but he has selfish reasons for his circuit surgery practice.

He likes to fly. "I tell people that by doing this I get to mix my vocation and my avocation," he said.

At the start of a trip, Weinberg taxis down the runway at Mangham Airport in North Richland Hills at 8 a.m. Then with a burst of power, his Mooney Executive airplane soars into the blue toward the skyline of Fort Worth, on the way to Meridian, about 100 miles southwest.

"There are no stop lights, no traffic jams and no traffic cops up here," Weinberg said. "When the weather is bad and I have to drive my car, about half the time I get a ticket because I'm driving too fast."

Pointing out landmarks, he set a course for Meridian. "The bumps don't bother me. We call it moderate turbulence when your head hits the roof."

"In June, it's really beautiful," he said. "Everything's green then. Flying is a very relaxing thing for me. That's one of the main reasons I do this."

"I started doing this about four years ago," he said. "It was because I bought an airplane, love to fly and wanted to use the plane more."

"I didn't advertise to do it. I just talked to a couple of friends. Dr. George Smith from West was the first to call. That grew to the seven towns I go to now. Once you start doing this, your fame — or infamy — spreads quickly."

Weinberg made his first landing at Clifton, a town about 10 miles from Meridian. He was picked up at the Clifton airfield by Verna Cunningham, an employee of the Meridian Hospital. He was at the 22-bed hospital to perform surgery on a local woman. As Weinberg disappeared into the operating room, the woman's family gathered in the waiting room for him to complete the surgery.

"I'm glad Dr. Weinberg is here," said the patient's husband. "We're all concerned about the operation, but we feel confident about him." June Morris, administrator of Meridian Hospital, said, "At the time he started coming down here, we only had one physician, and he wasn't a surgeon, so Steve would come down and do all the surgeries. We now have another surgeon, but a lot of people here have gotten to know Dr. Weinberg and some still prefer him."

WITHIN A few hours, Weinberg emerged from surgery with good news for the family of his patient. She came through the surgery in good shape. # This doctor flies to work

## After all, medical profession's symbol has wings

**BEDFORD**—When Dr. Steve Weinberg goes to work, he often heads toward the airport rather than a medical building.

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"I started doing this about four years ago," he said. "It was because I bought an airplane, love to fly and wanted to use the plane more."

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The next stop in his trip that day was supposed to be Gorman, but the surgery in that town had been canceled and Weinberg decided to go directly to Dublin.

"More doctors are coming to small towns now," he said. "It's like having a Texaco station on every corner. The problems with a small town hospital is not that

you don't have the proper equipment—a knife is a knife. But it's a lack of highly sophisticated post-operative facilities."

However, Weinberg said, he would not advise those small hospitals to invest in sophisticated facilities.

"I would be very much against a small hospital staffing and equipping an expensive intensive-care unit," he said. "The alternative is to send critically ill patients to a larger hospital."

"Most of the small hospitals I go to know their limitations—what they can and cannot do. Most of these patients want to have their surgery in their hometowns or not have it at all. People in a doctor-rich area might not appreciate that philosophy."

By the time Weinberg arrived at the Clifton airport, the wind was blowing in strong gusts. His takeoff was bumpy and he fought the plane.

"The bumps don't bother me," he said. "We call it moderate turbulence when your head hits the roof."

He has been flying airplanes 17 years, since he was a freshman in medical school.

He was picked up at the Dublin airport by John Hodges, administrator of that town's hospital. The first order of business was a quick bite to eat in the hospital cafeteria.

As he ate, two of the town's physicians took turns sharing information with him about the patients he would be seeing. He would examine 13 patients in only a few hours.

"WE'RE FORTUNATE to have him," said Lavern Crawford, director of nursing at Dublin Hospital. "You can see how our doctors go to him with their problems. He sees as many patients in the time he's here as some doctors see in an eight-hour period."

Hodges said, "It's a lot cheaper for him to come down here than for us to send all our patients up there."

Pointing to an Army Field Unit X-ray machine used in the Dublin Hospital, Weinberg said he admires the work done by physicians in hospitals that do not have advanced equipment.

"My colleagues (in the Hurst-Euleless-Bedford area) don't give the doctors here enough credit," he said. "They do very well with what equipment they have."

Back at the Dublin Airport, Weinberg climbed into his airplane for the final leg of his trip, back to the H-E-B area. The wind was at his back and he had time to reminisce.

He grew up in Tulsa, Okla., and went to undergraduate school at Oklahoma University. Then he went to medical school at the University of Iowa, graduating in 1967. He did his surgery training at Southwestern Medical School.

Weinberg has lived in Texas for 13 years except for part of the two years he was in the Air Force.

He is on the board of directors of the Hurst-Euleless-Bedford Chamber of Commerce, is an officer in the Rotary Club and is on the board of directors of Airport Bank.

He has two children—Steven, 6, and Shannon, 5.

Landing on the grass runway at Mangham Airport, Weinberg finished a day on the surgery circuit. The time is 4:30 p.m. He maneuvered his plane into a hangar as nonchalantly as someone would drive a car into a garage.

Looking at his log book, Weinberg figured that last year he flew about 30,000 miles to visit the seven towns in which he does surgery.

"It's fun," he said. "And, in a masochistic kind of way, it's relaxing."

Location is 1,650 feet from the north and 3,142 feet from the west lines of Theresa Tyler Survey 51.

Daily potential was 118 barrels of 40.3 gravity oil. Flow was through a 16-64-inch choke with 640 pounds casing and 285 pounds tubing pressures.

## Tips For Safe Driving

With fewer daylight hours and children going to school, now is a time for cautious driving. Experts at ANCO, the windshield wiper people, offer the following tips:

- Turn on your lights as soon as daylight fades. Waiting until other motorists do so is not accurate enough when it comes to seeing and being seen by pedestrians and other motorists.
- Slow down at school crosswalks and near school playgrounds. Because many children linger on playgrounds after school, a crosswalk guard is not always on duty. It's up to you to watch for children at crossings.
- Make sure that you can see through the windshield and the back window. Children moving around in the back seat can obstruct your view in the rearview mirror and make driving more hazardous.
- Check windshield wipers. Wipers in good condition can aid visibility. Worn or improperly installed wipers can spell trouble in a sudden rainstorm. Chattering, streaking or smearing wipers can drastically cut visibility.
- Check the windshield washer fluid reservoir. Use of proper washer fluid will enhance visibility by cutting road grime. As soon as rain starts, turn on your wipers and squirt washer fluid on the windshield to remove dirt.
- Switch to snow tires and snowblades. If you drive in a northern state where winter quickly follows fall, switch to snow tires and replace regular windshield wipers with snowblades. Snow tires can increase traction on ice by 10-30 percent, depending upon tire type and construction. Snowblades are specially designed to prevent ice build-up freezing the blades to your windshield.
- Following these simple driving tips can help prevent serious accidents and save lives.
