PATROL OF BORDER ALONG RIO GRANDE IS DIFFICULT


EL PASO, June 20.—Nightly, through the "back door" of the United States, aliens and liquor smugglers attempt to cross the Rio Grande river. With 900 miles of sand dunes, shrubbery and mountain to patrol, it is no easy task to prevent their entrance, says George J. Harris, federal director of the district.
Thirteen hundred aliens have been turned back in the last 10 months and now that the Japanese are to be excluded also, officials anticipate more difficulty than ever.
El Paso formerly was the center of the Chinese immigration difficulties. There were two schools in Juarez which coached Chinese in answering the questions the government agents might ask. Hundreds of their pupils stole into the United States. Mounted river guards patrol the border, and occasionally one is killed in a skirmish with smugglers.
"It's too big a job for the few men we have," Harris said. "Fortunately relief is in sight. The Hudspeth appropriation bill provided for 500 additional inspectors, and we expect it to help the situation greatly."

DALLAS—Dallas now has eight machine switching telephone central offices. There are 45,635 dial telephones in use here. With the conversion of one more central office this city will be entirely automatic in its telephone operation. The cost of the change will have been four million dollars and Dallas will be the largest city in the world with entire machine switching telephone equipment.

Are American Women Experts In Making Pie Crusts?

One of our former food commissioners once declared that American pie crusts is generally bad, but he stated that the filling was usually good, even though the crust contained too much fat.
That is possibly a fair statement. However, the average experienced cook and baker feel rather proud of their pastry and especially do they pride themselves on their ability to bake pies, the lower crust of which is as tender as the upper and one not juice soaked regardless of what the filling may be.
Pastry for years has been tabooed among various people as being a most indigestible food, and it is agreed that certain people are better off without this food. However, if pie crust is correctly made—not too greasy and not eaten in too great quantities, the average stomach can take care of it very easily. What is more popular with a man than a good apple pie, and how many young and older women, too, do we see eating individual butter scotch pies in the tea rooms?

Do you have difficulty in making good pastry? A very satisfactory crust for any type of pie can be made with the following:
1 1/2 cups sifted flour.
1/2 cup lard or vegetable shortening.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/4 level teaspoon baking powder.
Enough cold water to make a stiff dough.
Sift the flour, baking powder and salt together into a bowl and then cut shortening into it with a case knife. If you can manage two knives, use two to save time.
The old fashioned idea was that we should have the shortening very cold if we desired to have a flaky pie crust and some of us still believe in that method. However, a great many people use and prefer a liquid shortening in the form of some oil. Others instead of using a very cold water prefer to make a hot water pie crust. I am old fashioned enough to believe that the cold shortening and the cold water give me the best results.

After the shortening is cut in until it is rather mealy, add a little cold water at a time until a stiff dough is formed. It should be mixed very little—a knife being advisable to use rather than a spoon. Stirring must be avoided or the crust will be toughened.
Divide the dough in half. Roll each out carefully on a floured board to about one-eighth inch thickness. In placing the bottom crust on the tin be careful not to stretch it over the sides and allow all air to escape from underneath. After the top crust is placed over the pie, if it is brushed with a bit of cold water, the crust will have a nice golden color when baked. Milk will also give a golden shade but the crust browns and burns more quickly. Press the crusts to the tin before cutting off the surplus.

If you wish to have the juice of the fruit slightly thickened, sprinkle the lower crust with some sugar and flour well mixed, before putting in the filling. Repeat this process before putting on the top crust, also dot with butter, about one table-

spoonful to a pie. Moisten the edge of the lower crust slightly before putting on the upper crust. Then pinch the two together—the water helping to hold them. If the pie is a very juicy one a piece of cloth about an inch and a quarter wide wrung out of cold water and wound around the crust will prevent the crust from becoming too brown, and at the same time prevent the juice from escaping. The oven should be moderately hot for the baking. A small funnel of paper inserted in the opening on top of a pie is claimed by many to allow steam to escape and thus prevent juices from escaping around the edges of the pie.
Whenever there is a bit of crust left over roll it out very thin, sprinkle on some dried grate cheese, and cut it out quite thin; fold and roll out again. Cut in strips about four inches long by one-half inch wide and bake in a quick oven. Serve with salads or soups.



Texas Commander American Legion Urges Flag Etiquette

As a result of a campaign waged by Dr. M. W. Sherwood of Temple, State Commander of the American Legion, the State Textbook Commission has authorized the teaching of "Flag Etiquette" in the public schools. The standard flag rules are to be made a part of the civics textbooks.

TEMPLE, Texas.—Within another year or so the proud American who wants to be patriotic on July 4 and takes his family out to see the big parade, may find one of his children nudging him and whispering to him to lift his hat with his right hand and place it over his heart as the American flag comes sweeping by in the procession.

That observation was made here recently by Dr. W. M. Sherwood, state commander of the American Legion, who has been advised that standard flag rules are to be taught in the public schools of Texas as part of the course in civics. Under the leadership of Commander Sherwood the Texas department of the legion carried on the campaign to bring about teaching of the flag etiquette in the schools of Texas.

"It will be a glorious day for Texas," said State Commander Sherwood, "when all of our children learn the accepted rules of draping and paying proper respect to Old Glory on all occasions, and just as soon as they begin their studies of these rules in the public schools they will put their newly acquired information to good use by assisting their elders in decorating floats and buildings for patriotic occasions.

"All of us are loyal citizens. We would fight for our country at the drop of the hat, if necessary. But few of us have ever been told that we should lift our hat and place it over our heart as the national colors come by in parade, and that is the reason so few of us do it.

"If I could send a Fourth of July message to the people of Texas I would say, let us begin now to help our children learn the flag rules they are going to study in school later. When the flag comes by in parade, the man should lift his hat and place it over his heart. The woman should place her right hand over her heart. All should remain quiet until the colors have passed."

TEXAN NOW STUDYING BIRD LIFE IN ALASKA

AUSTIN, June 20.—Members of the faculty of the University of Texas and former students are interested in the news that Capt. George Finlay Simmons, of Houston, and the schooner, Blossom, in which he was making a scientific cruise, are now at Dakar, Africa, where they have been since the resignation of the crew on May 30.

Mr. Simmons is a graduate of the university, having received the bachelor of arts and master of arts degrees, and was instructor in the department of zoology for one year. He was assistant in the office of the state bird, fish and game commissioner, and is considered an authority on the bird life of Texas. He has written a book on Texas birds which will be printed by the University of Texas Press, as soon as the author returns to read proof on the volume. Mr. Simmons was recently joined by his wife who did not sail on the schooner, but went to Africa last March to meet her husband. She was formerly Miss Amede Hatcher of Fort Worth.

It is stated by members of the crew who have left the ship that many birds have been captured for study, and among them are several hitherto unknown. After his return to the United States, Mr. Simmons expects to become curator of the Cleveland museum, at Cleveland, O.
