CHICAGO, Sept. 11 .- The senate com mittee investigating campaign expenditures today wound up a two weeks' inquiry into charges of Gov. Cox that the Republican party is seeking a \$15,000,-000 fund. The sessions here also developed testimony bearing on charges that the Democratic party solicited campaign contributions from many sources, especially office holders.

The committee will meet again on Sept. 22 in either Washington or New York, Chairman Kenyon being empowered to choose the city. Democrats Arraigned.

The committee had planned a meeting in Pittsburg to investigate reports that Pennsylvania interests were taking an active part in financing the Democratic campaign. Republican plans for a seven-day drive for funds in Chicago and testimony that the Democrats had assessed girl employes of the internal revenue of fice at Aberdeen, S. D. \$40 each to help finance the Democratic campaign, were the topics of today's inquiry.

Miss Eunice Coyne, a newspaper re-porter in Aberdeen and Miss Jesse Burchard, of Minneapolis, a clerk in the Aberdeen internal revenue collector's office, told of Democratic effort to raise money from girl clerks. Miss Burchard said that she had willingly contributed \$40 of her salary of \$100 a month after receiving a letter from a Democratic cam paign fund raiser asking her to call at his hotel and "arrange" this matter." About a dozen of the girl clerks went to the hotel, she testified, and subscribed \$50 each. Some of the girls who did no have that much cash gave post-dated

High-Jackers Spent Much of Loot in Ranger on Paramours Bought One Girl Four Dollars' Worth of Gum-Drops-"Oklahoma Curly," Mystery Man, Is Sought.

Whimpering and weak after three days of almost constant grilling by police, Charles Mims, arrested here three days ago and taken to Eastland with a companion, following robbery of twenty-five men in the Oklahoma cabaret, cast aside his mask of bravado Friday night and confessed that he was implicated in the robbery of a poker game here shortly, before his arrest and also in the looting of the First National bank at Graham August 16.
Flight from Graham in a stolen car following the robbery, later an eleven-mile trudge

over hilly country afoot while he and his two companions were burdened with heavy coin bags taken from the bank, the burying of \$300 worth of pennies under a rock to lessen their loads, a swim across the Brazos river and the scattering of several hundred silver dollars

Woman's Tale Is Not Upheld; Bosley Freed

Mike Bosley, chief of the Ranger detective department, who was held for several days following charges of Mrs. Dan Hamilton, who was arrested in connection with the arrest of Charles Mims and a companion high-jacker here three days ago, for complicity in the hold-up of a poker game above a local garage, was released yesterday on a \$750 appearance bond. Bosley was released first on his own recognizance and later mailed the bond from Ranger to Eastland after he had returned

The release of Bosley was haled in Ranger with commendation by friends of the detective, who scout the charge that he was in any way connected with the lawlessness of the high-jacker band and brand charges of the woman as being the veriest untruths. To buttress their statements they point to the record of Bosley as a police official which most able members of the local

In a number of instances, friends point out, Bosley has been most aggressive in the hunting down of wrong-doers and has never wavered in his stand for enforcement of the law, city, county and state, as it is

Bosley is held in high regard by his colleagues on the Ranger police

The appearance bond is returnable Oct. 1. Bosley declares that he is entirely willing to stand investigation now that it has begun and feels assured that full inquiry will show him to be in no way impli-

Mims and Tompson were arrested by Chief of Police Reynolds at the Moore hotel on Oak street following a running gun-fight from the cabaret.



BRITISH PUGS LACK POWER TO PUNCH SO IN DEMAND FOR K, O.

By PAUL BREWSTER, International News Service Special

LONDON, Sept. 11.—"It is time that our young boxers developed an appreciation of the power of a punch.

"For many years it has been a gossip in British boxing circles that it is cley-erness which wins. In a measure that is punch that is hard enough and delivered in the right place will by its effectiveness more than counterbalance all the scientific scoring of points which might have been accomplished by the receiver of the big hit in the preceding rounds."

Thus writes "Corinthian," a well-known

English sporting writer in the Daily Chronicle.

The same sentiment is being echoed by

other sporting writers in London newspapers. Even the good old conservative, straight-laced papers which are read by commuters in first-class railroad com-

commuters in first-class railroad compartments on their way to London have taken this subject.

Their style in dealing with boxing is somewhat heavy, but it suits the mentality of the upper crust of English society; who take the manly art of self-defense quite seriously.
