### Indicted for Throwing the World's Series Fire Fighters In Bitter Struggle To Check Flame Spread

By Associated Press.

GALVESTON, Oct. 2.—Galveston's second disastrous water front fire in three days, tonight was slowly eating its way through fifteen thousand bales of Mexican sisal stored in section A of pier 41, while firemen, rangers and yardsmen, who have been fighting the blaze since this morning, late this evening prepared to prolong the struggle all night. No estimate of the damage caused by the flames was possible tonight. Both the theory that the fire was of incendiary origin and that it resulted from spontaneous combustion have been advanced but fire department officials tonight refused to commit themselves to either theory.
