Brooken Steering Gear Sends FT TO A Vehicle Into Ditch on Caddo Road.

Pinned beneath the wreckage of a five-ton White truck, loaded with seven joints of 15-inch casing, Horace Browning, driver for the Texas Pacific Coal & Oil company, this morning gave directions to rescuers that enabled them to drag him to safety practically uninjured, just in time to prevent him from becoming asphyxiated by the fumes of gasoline that dripped into his face from a smashed tank.

Hardly an inch stood between Browning and death after his truck had dropped head first over the buttress of a culvert just north of the Hamon-Kell track on the Caddo road. The end of the emergency brake handle pressed tightly against the pit of his stomach, while wrecked braces of the steering post and portions of the driver's seat prevented him from squirming from beneath the wreckage unaided. Efforts of early rescuers on the scene to lift a portion of the huge truck sufficiently to remove him were unavailing. At his direction, the emergency brake was released and half crawling, half dragging, he was removed from his position and rushed to the Clinical hospital in Milford's ambulance. After he had been given medical treatment for minor cuts and bruises and a severe shaking up, Browning was removed to his

The fire department was summoned to the scene by passersby, who feared that the leaking gasoline tank would catch fire or that the services of the depart ment would be needed in the attempts to lift the front end of the truck.

The accident occurred about 9:30 as the result of the steering knuckle being lost. As he approached the culvert, Browning realized that he had lost control of his truck and hastily threw on his brakes but not in time to prevent the weight and momentum of the truck from carrying it over the side of the culvert. The front end plunged over a sheer drop of about eight feet. The rear end slid down the sloping embankment and the truck crashed over on one side.

The road at the scene of the accident was blocked by automobiles for several hours after the accident, the occupants on seeing the overturned truck, stopping to inquire as to the number of fatalities. Browning's escape from death or even serious injury was regarded as miraculous.



RADIO POWER TO RUN AUTOS, HEAT HOUSES

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Having unquestionably demonstrated the practicability of transmitting the voice hundreds of miles through the air without wires, radio engineers are now turning their attention toward solving the problem of transmitting electrical power without the use of metallic connecting mediums.

Should they be successful the following are possibilities for the fu-

1. Gigantic radio power stations supplying hundreds of thousands of electric horsepower to machines of industry many miles away.

2. Abolition of the use of gasoline for automobiles-electrical fuel to be supplied to engines from central sta-

3. Universal use of electricity in place of coal for all purposes.

The step of sending power by radio is not nearly so great as that which first gave the means of receiving radio impulses, such as in wireless

Just as roads wear out with the steady pounding of trucks and automobiles over their surface, so do wires wear out from the constant friction of electricity. The Atlantic cable is a case in point. Obviously

it cannot last forever. Another need for the harnessing of radio power to the machines of the world is the shortage of coal, made more acute by the strike. While authorities differ on just how great a supply there is in the United States, leading mine operators have declared that the present supply cannot possibly last for more than 100 years.

To date no system has been developed that will permit the transmission of power wirelessly withou enormous loss. That is because a directional system has not been per fected. Energy must flow in a nar row stream through the air, which is in contradistinction to the present method of broadcasting electrical energy in all directions.
