Ground Breaking Of Plant Set For June 21

DALLAS — Lone Star Producing Company's Chemical Division will hold an official ground breaking ceremony for its \$20-million nitrogen fertilizer plant at 11 a. m. Friday, June 21.

According to an announcement by Roy E. Jury, division president, the ground-breaking will take place at the plant site adjacent to State Highway 31 six miles east of Kerens in Navarro County. The plant is known as the Trinity River Plant.

"The public is cordially invited to attend the ceremony," he said. Participating in the ceremony will be E. B. Germany, chairman, Texas Industrial Commission; officials of the Producing Company and its parent company, Lone Star Gas Company. John Perryman, Lone Star director of area development, will act as master of ceremonies at the groundbreaking.

Mr. Jury said that a new approach will be applied to the ground-breaking ceremony.

"Rather than break ground with the traditional shovels or with blasting powder, we will apply small shovelful of LSP brand fertilizers to some bushes which will beautify the entrance to the plant site," he explained. The bushes will be planted around a large plant-site sign.

The Trinity River Plant will be completed in late 1964, Mr. Jury said. It will produce about 180,000 tons of LSP brand fertilizer materials yearly using natural gas as the principal raw product. The Chemical Division will employ some 200 persons, with 160 being assigned to the Trinity River Plant, he noted.

John Merritt Member Of Air Police Squadron

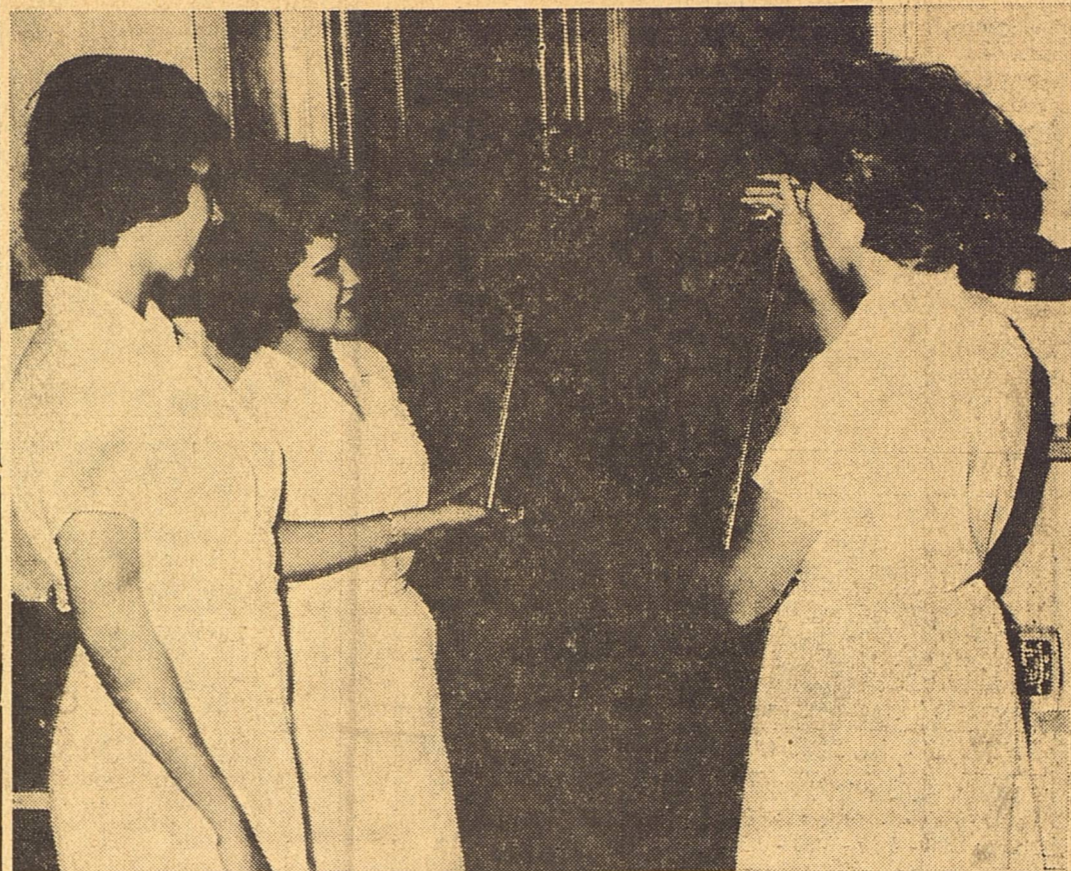

Medical Assistant School of Texas Now in First Session

The first class of the Medical Assistant Schools of Texas is now in session.

The course of study being pursued by the class is the "medical assistant, basic." This is a course designed to be completed in three months. The student, after having satisfactorily completed the course, will be qualified to fill the basic needs common to most all Doctor's offices and clinics in the smaller town.

"This course was set up to fill in intense need experienced by practicing physicians," said Dr. S. J. Jones, director of the school. "Universal standard procedure" technique is emphasized.

The school has branched out, even in this early development stage to incorporate a larger area in which to serve. The Medical Assistant Schools of Texas has joined with the Industrial Engineering Institute and will cover all of the Southwestern states through the other organization.

The school now will offer, in addition to their originally planned resident courses, extension courses. Under the ex-

tension course plan, the student may do much of the basic work at home through correspondence. This will be the first phase.

The second phase will be classroom work which will be held in the town in which the student lives. (Class rooms have now been established in Fort Worth and Dallas). After the classroom work is finished, the student will be brought here for the third and final phase. In the final phase, which will take about a month, the student will be able to put to practical use the knowledge acquired through the first two phases.

The school also plans to train clinic managers. The clinic managerial courses would appeal to young men for this would be career work. The course will include medical inventory and all phases of business required to make a good clinic function properly.

Ranger TESCO Among 10 Sponsors For Symposium

A fascinating vision of a world where the hydrogen bomb has been harnessed inside a nuclear reactor and the Gulf of Mexico yields an almost limitless supply of fuel for an atomic power plant was one of the many wonders of science that was unfolded this week for 500 science-minded Texas high school students and teachers.

They completed Wednesday a three-day meeting of the University of Texas campus listening to and interviewing some of the nations outstanding scientists who described the latest developments in nuclear physics, nuclear fusion research, biophysics and atomic "moon probing." The occasion was the third Texas Nuclear Science Symposium, co-sponsored by the University of Texas and the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, an organization of 10 investor-owned electric utility companies operating in Texas.

The Texas Electric Co. here in Ranger is one of these participating 10.

One of the speakers, Dr. Martin O. Stern of the General Atomic laboratory at San Diego, California, reported important progress in solving a problem that has baffled the world's scientists for 13 years in their efforts to tame the hydrogen bomb for peaceful purposes. He described successful results of the first experiments with a new type "magnetic bottle" that holds strong promise of advancing the day when the energy source of the H-bomb and the sun and the stars will be harnessed for the production of electric power.

The Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation has been engaged since 1957 in a jointly-supported research program with General Dynamic's General Atomic Division. The program is the world's largest privately financed research effort in the field of controlled nuclear fusion and is being directed by some of the nation's outstanding nuclear scientists at the General Atomic laboratories at San Diego, California.

Eastland County Commissioners passed a resolution at their regular Monday meeting which gives notice that the court will convene and sit as a board of equalization on Tuesday, June 25, and Wednesday, June 26.

The board will be in session from 10 a. m. until 3:30 p. m. with noon recess on both days.

Purpose of the board is to see that every person has rendered his property at a fair market value and shall have power to send for persons, books and papers, swear and qualify persons, to ascertain value of such property and to lower or raise the value on the same.

The motion was made by Commissioner Tip Arther and seconded by Commissioner Buck Collins.

Lt. Bridwell Takes 2nd Lone Cedar Title

Charles Bridwell, the poised Army lieutenant from Coleman, won his second successive Lone Cedar Invitation Tournament here over the Country Club Course Sunday.

The former University of Texas links ace took out North Texas University's smooth-swinging Don Wilson, 2-up, in the meet finals.

Bridwell advanced into the final round by virtue of a 3 and 2 triumph over Eastland's James Townzen while Wilson whipped Cisco's Don Johnson 4 and 2, in the semifinals.

The consistent-hitting Bridwell had to come from behind to win the top trophy. He was 2-down after eight holes but drew even by knocking in a difficult putt on No. 11 and never trailed thereafter.

Wilson ran in a 25-footer on No. 15 to draw even with his slightly older opponent but Bridwell won No. 16 to take a 1-up lead, then halved No. 17 and won 18 to prevail.

Bridwell, who was a cool operator in clutch situations, was 2-over par for the match. He shot the front side in 2-over 37, then came in with an even par 35. Wilson was 1-over on the front nine and 3-over coming in.

Wilson went 1-up in the match when Bridwell took a bogey 5 on No. 4. But Wilson bogeyed No. 5, a 430-yard par, while Bridwell got down in regulation strokes to draw even.

Wilson then quickly took a 2-up margin by winning both 7 and 8 with pars. Bridwell reversed the trend on No. 9, winning the hole with a par to make the turn 1-down.

The turning point came on No. 11 for the Coleman native. He skulled his tee shot on the 400-yard hole and was short and to the right of the green with his approach, the ball coming to rest in some high grass. But Bridwell chipped 12 feet past the pin, then ran in his putt on the sloping green to win the hole with a par. Wilson missed a good chance to go ahead on No. 13, two putting from four feet. And on No. 14 Don's drive hit a rocky surface and bounded out of bounds, forcing a two-stroke penalty. Bridwell easily won the hole with a pickup birdie to take the lead for the first time in the match. But it was short lived as

Wilson came back to run in his 25-footer on No. 15 to draw even. Then on No. 16, which is a difficult 230-yard 3-par that extends almost to the surface of Lake Leon, Wilson suffered the fate of three-putting after taking two strokes to get on the green and again fell behind.

The par halved No. 17 with pars and Bridwell capped off his performance by winning 18 with a par after Wilson's bold birdie putt from some 50 feet rolled 10 feet past the cup.

Bridwell was actually hotter in the semis against Townzen, where he went 3 under par and collected four birdies. James Johnson, Abilene's straight-hitter, defeated Coleman's Eddie Smith, 2 and 1, to win the consolation championship. Johnson was 2 over par for the match.
